**Dear District Superintendents:** 

September 17 is Constitution Day and Citizenship Day (Constitution Day). This day commemorates the September 17, 1787 signing of the United States Constitution. Now more than ever, our students- and entire citizenry-need to know the importance of our US Constitution, the rights it guarantees and protects, and that it is critical to be active and engaged in their communities.

Most of our districts passed a Civic Learning Resolution over a year ago and in doing so made a public commitment to develop a plan that promotes the Six Proven Practices of Civic Learning. Through these Proven Practices, your students and staff will become more aware of their role and responsibility as a contributing member of society. Passing the resolution is important, but making it come to life is critical. SCOE and the Power of Democracy Civic Learning Partnership have resources to assist as you work to bring your Civic Learning instructional plans to fruition.

In the coming weeks, a member of our local Civic Education Leadership team will contact you to schedule a meeting to discuss your plans to implement your Civic Learning Resolution.

As September 17 is right around the corner, I encourage you to commemorate Constitution and Citizenship Day in your schools.
