I. OVERVIEW / HISTORY

Sacramento City Unified School District granted Capitol Collegiate Academy's charter petition for establishment on May 6, 2010, and approved the charter petition for four years. The charter petition expires on June 30, 2015.

Sacramento City Unified School District received a charter renewal petition from Capitol Collegiate Academy on January 5, 2015. Capitol Collegiate Academy is seeking a five-year renewal term for their proposed independent charter school for students in grade levels K-8. The purpose of the public hearing is to consider the level of support for the renewal of the charter for Capitol Collegiate Academy.

II. DRIVING GOVERNANCE

The charter renewal process is guided by Education Code 47607 (b). A charter school seeking renewal of its charter shall submit a written request to the Board at least 120 days before the term of the charter is due to expire, but not more than six months before the term of the charter is set to expire. Upon receipt of the notice that a charter school wants to renew its charter and at least 90 days before the expiration date of the charter, the Board shall conduct a public hearing to receive input on whether or not to renew the charter. At least 30 calendar days before the expiration date, the Board shall either grant or deny the request for renewal.

A charter may be renewed an unlimited number of times; however, each renewal must be for exactly five years. (EC § 47607). If a school district fails to make written factual findings to support a denial within 60 days of the district's receipt of a petition, the charter school's petition is automatically renewed. (Cal. Code Regs., tit. 5, §11966.4(c).)



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

MISSION AND VISION

Capitol Collegiate Academy prepares students in grades kindergarten through eight to compete, achieve, and lead in high school, in college and in life.

Capitol Collegiate Academy is a free public charter school founded on the firm belief that all students, regardless of race or socio-economic status, are entitled to a high quality education. We believe that a no-excuses culture is the foundation for success and that with discipline, structure, academic rigor, humility, and unyielding optimism, we will ensure that students have the early foundation necessary to go on and excel in high school, in college, and in their careers.

NEED

In California, prison capacity and planning is based on third grade test scores. Similarly, male students who cannot read on grade level by fourth grade are over one hundred times more likely to go to jail than to go to college. In Sacramento, if only half of the high school drop outs in 2008 had graduated, the city would save over \$10 million per year in taxes paid and public dollars saved. Currently, performance on the California Standards Test remains relatively low in the South Sacramento community. Many schools in this area earned a statewide rank between 1 and 2 out of a possible 10. Further, the majority of students tested in South Sacramento last year were not on grade level, with fewer than 35% of students proficient in reading on average. The South Sacramento community is in need of public school options focused solely on establishing a powerful foundation in the early elementary years, and with the supports and structures designed to meet the clear academic needs of students growing up in these communities. Collaborating with schools to share best practices, working with community partners and parents to support student achievement, and allocating all of our available resources towards our mission will ensure that for our students in South Sacramento, zip code does not determine destiny.

CAPACITY

Capitol Collegiate Academy is founded, developed, governed, and operated by highly-qualified, committed, and mission-aligned education, business, and community leaders. The Founding Group shares a clear and explicit belief that all students, regardless of socio-economic background, should have access to a high quality education and that these students are able to achieve at the same level as their more affluent peers. We believe that college preparation begins in kindergarten and that students should be educated with this end goal in mind. Prominent petitioners for Building Healthy Communities, a collaborative of community organizations in South Sacramento, have expressed the need for and support of our efforts. Using the expertise of this group as well as other community partners, we have assembled a team of legal, business, school, policy, and community leaders, each bringing a component of his or her expertise that will drive the work and success of the Charter School. The Lead Founder of Capitol Collegiate Academy is an urban school leader and educator with a successful background in education and business. It is through the collective work of this strong founding team that Capitol Collegiate

Academy will provide a rigorous elementary education and create college-bound students in some of South Sacramento's most at-risk communities.

CORE BELIEFS

A challenging curriculum and cohesive culture are the foundational stones on which Capitol Collegiate Academy is built. We create a small, safe, and structured learning environment that challenges students to perform at their personal bests. Charter School culture drives the focus of all classrooms, while at the same time addressing the individual needs of each student. Teachers create planning documents that reflect the deliberate consideration of how students learn and what will propel them forward in achievement. Teachers are given the structure, support, and resources needed to collaborate with each other, challenge students in the classroom, and construct exceptional lesson plans and standards-driven curriculum. For those students unable to master academic content during class, daily tutoring and homework support is provided.

CORE VALUES

Capitol Collegiate Academy is characterized by academics and culture. We strive to build a strong community within the Charter School and work to actively engage our students in their learning. As a result, we operate with six core values for members of our school community – humility, effort, respect, optimism, integrity, courage.

LEGISLATIVE INTENT FOR CHARTER SCHOOLS

It is the intent of the Legislature, in enacting the Charter Schools Act of 1992, to provide opportunities for teachers, parents, pupils, and community members to establish and maintain schools that operate independently from the existing school district structure, as a method to accomplish all of the following:

- (a) Improve pupil learning
- (b) Increase learning opportunities for all pupils, with special emphasis on expanded learning experience for pupils who are identified as academically low-achieving
- (c) Encourage the use of different and innovative teaching methods
- (d) Create new professional opportunities for teachers, including the opportunity to be responsible for the learning program at the Charter School site
- (e) Provide parents and pupils with expanded choices in the types of educational opportunities that are available within the public school system
- (f) Hold the Charter Schools established under this part accountable for meeting measurable pupil outcomes, and provide the Charter Schools with a method to change from rule-based to performance-based accountability systems
- (g) Provide vigorous competition within the public school systems to stimulate continued improvements in all public schools

Education Code Section 47605(b)(5)(B), requires each charter school to have a "charter" that provides reasonably comprehensive descriptions of at least the sixteen (16) required elements. The following provisions of this charter coincide with the requirements of Education Code Section 47605.


ELIGIBILITY FOR RENEWAL

Education Code Section 47607(b) sets forth academic threshold requirements for charter schools seeking renewal <u>after</u> they have been in operation for four years. CCA is not required to meet the academic performance criteria as set forth in Education Code 47607(b) because it is currently in its 4th year of operation – that is, CCA has not yet completed its fourth year of operation, so the academic threshold requirements for renewal do not apply to CCA. CCA opened with kindergarten, so no state testing was done. Further, due to the recent changes in state testing, the second grade California Standards Test ("CST") was not available for formal accountability measurement. As a result, CCA had the opportunity to utilize its Terra Nova and STEP assessment data, per its charter petition. Using this nationally normed data set, CCA did meet **all** of the performance measures listed in the original charter application.

LITERACY

The STEP Literacy Assessment® is a developmental literacy assessment, instructional tool, and data management system that defines the pathway and tracks the progress of pre-kindergarten through third grade students as they learn to read. Out of the University of Chicago, STEP


provides a more rigorous literacy assessment for schools. Specifically, STEP provides more rich and high-level data on specific areas of student knowledge in reading that are typically generalized in the more common assessments of Diebels, or the DRA. For example, STEP assesses the exact type of comprehension where student knowledge breaks down (fact, inference, or critical thinking) and provides clear rationale as to why. Further, the bar for moving forward within each level is set at a higher standard than other assessments.

MATH

We teach both a Math Problem Solving as well as a Math Procedures Block. We believe that students should be able to represent their knowledge in both contexts. For Math Problem Solving, we use Singapore Math and Math Investigations. Both focus on *how* students solve and justify problems using multiple methods. In Math Procedures, students focus on standards in small groups and learn the specifics behind the steps to solving math problems. As opposed to the Problem Solving, which requires students to construct meaning *before* knowing how to more technically solve a problem, Math Procedures is the more "traditional" math that formally teaches students the logistical steps required to solve "book and paper" problems. This content is completely based on Common Core State Standards ("CCSS") and California State Standards. Below are our Terra Nova results from last year – this is a *nationally normed assessment that compares our students to the rest of the country*.



^{**}SARC: Because CCA does not have Standardized Testing and Reporting ("STAR") results (we did not have a tested grade


last year), the achievement results on our SARC must legally reflect the Sacramento City Unified School District (SCUSD or the "District") averages. 
EIGHT STATE PRIORITIES



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Oak Park Preparatory Academy ("Oak Park Prep" or "OPPA") is a public, high performing, college preparatory, independent charter school operated by St. HOPE Public Schools ("SHPS"), authorized by the Sacramento City Unified School District Board of Education ("SCUSD" or the "District") for an initial three-year charter term in October 2011. The Charter School is currently in its third year of operation and serves students in grades 7-8.

It is based on objective student and school results, as well as overwhelming parent and community support, that St. HOPE Public Schools, in accordance with the Charter Schools Act of 1992, hereby petitions the District for renewal of the charter for Oak Park Preparatory Academy. Enclosed please find a petition providing clear evidence that OPPA has far exceeded the charter renewal criteria set forth in Education Code Section 47607. For the past three years, OPPA has offered a strong educational program and has exceeded the outcomes outlined in the original charter approved by the District in 2011. The petition also demonstrates that OPPA is operationally and fiscally viable and is compliant with all relevant laws and regulations.

As required by the Charter Schools Act of 1992, the petition contains a reasonably comprehensive description of each of the 16 elements identified in California Education Code Sections 47605(b)(5)(A-P). In addition to the renewal petition, the requisite assurances are provided as well as supplemental materials (referred to as Appendices). These supplemental materials provide supporting information, but are not incorporated into nor considered an official part of the petition.

OPPA is operated by St. HOPE Public Schools (SHPS), a nonprofit, 501(c)(3) public benefit corporation. In the 2014-15 school year SHPS operates four schools in Oak Park, serving approximately 1,800 students in a PreK-12 education pipeline focused on empowering students to obtain a four-year college degree and to serve as leaders in their communities.

OPPA serves a traditionally underserved population of students who, on average, have struggled to achieve at high levels and who have often been denied the choice of a high quality public education. SHPS, in collaboration with the District as its authorizing partner, have established OPPA as a school that provides an academic program rivaling the best in the state. In the following pages, the Charter School has provided a brief overview of OPPA's performance and accomplishments to date.

Mission

Oak Park Prep shares the same mission as all schools within SHPS: To graduate self-motivated, industrious, and critically thinking leaders who are prepared to attend a four-year college, committed to serving others and passionate about life-long learning.

However, Oak Park Prep's mission breaks down the mission and vision of SHPS to target the population of students at the time they will be attending the Charter School. This mission is: To educate students in grades seven and eight to excel in a rigorous high school, succeed at a four year university and lead in their chosen profession.

Need

In 2014, our country celebrated the 60th anniversary of *Brown v. Board of Education,* the historical civil rights case that ordered in free and equal access to public education. *Brown* signaled the Supreme Court's desire to truly leave no child behind. Unfortunately, sixty years later, *Brown's* promise of improved educational opportunities for all children is still unfulfilled, especially for our most underserved children. The achievement gap in education - the difference in tested academic skills between white and minority students and between affluent and poor students - reflects the continuation of an unequal education system. All students need and deserve schools that inspire in them the belief that they can and will achieve. They need schools to foster respect, discipline, motivation and belief, and develop in them the critical academic skills and knowledge necessary to compete on a level playing field.

In 2013, in the Sacramento City Unified School District, fewer than 30% of eighth graders taking General Mathematics in South Sacramento middle schools scored proficient or above; and fewer than 40% of eighth graders at these schools were proficient or advanced in ELA.

Oak Park and South Sacramento are in need of high quality stand-alone middle schools that are (1) focused *solely* on addressing the needs of middle school students, (2) committed to outstanding academic achievement, and (3) provide a college-preparatory curriculum for every student. For students to be able to succeed in demanding college-preparatory high schools, they must have the fundamental literacy skills that underpin a rigorous middle school program. In order to be truly college-ready, students must be able to enter high school prepared to take rigorous and challenging college-prep courses.

Our Beliefs

At Oak Park Prep, we believe that:

- Literacy is the most essential academic skill upon which the majority of all future skill and knowledge acquisition is based.
- All students, regardless of race or socio-economic status, deserve a quality collegepreparatory education.
- When provided with a highly structured, disciplined and supportive learning environment, and with quality, targeted instruction, all students will achieve to the highest academic standards.
- Frequent and continuous assessment is needed for a quality learning environment.
- Our most important partnership is our partnership with our parents.

Results to Date

OPPA has extremely high expectations for all students and members of the school community. Ambitious goals are set for academic achievement and all members of the OPPA team and family are held accountable for meeting these goals. Specifically, OPPA aims to provide all students with the quality of education and schooling that is available at the highest performing schools in the state and nation. All students and families deserve access to excellent schools and OPPA is providing this option to the children of Oak Park and Sacramento. OPPA's short history shows its students are achieving the established goals and the Charter School is one of the top performing stand-alone middle schools in Sacramento.

Students at OPPA have made significant academic strides since the Charter School opened in 2012. Students at OPPA scored the second highest when compared to all stand-alone middle

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schools in SCUSD on the 2013 English Language Arts (ELA) CST, as shown in Table 1. Students scored the highest when compared against the same schools on the 2013 7th grade Math CST, as seen below in Table 2. The trend set in 2012-13 continued the following year as OPPA students were the highest scoring among the same peer group on the 2014 8th grade Science CST, displayed in Table 3.






These data show definitively that what is happening at Oak Park Prep works – that all students, even traditionally low-performing subgroups, can achieve at the highest levels and meet ambitious achievement goals if the expectations are high, all stakeholders work relentlessly, and the necessary support is provided to students, families and staff. Oak Park Prep's academic program is intentionally and strategically designed to ensure all students are meeting the mission, and prepared for college by catching them up when they are not on grade level. As shown by the data, all students are making significant progress and achieving at extraordinary levels.

Charter Renewal Criteria

Evidence of Meeting Charter Renewal Standards Pursuant to Education Code Section 47607(b) and the California Code of Regulations, Title 5, Section 11966.4(a)(1)

Education Code Section 47607(b) requires that a charter school must meet at least one of the following renewal criteria prior to receiving a charter renewal:

- (1) Attained its Academic Performance Index (API) growth target in the prior year or in two of the last three years, both school wide and for all groups of pupils served by the charter school.
- (2) Ranked in deciles 4 to 10, inclusive, on the API in the prior year or in two of the last three years.
- (3) Ranked in deciles 4 to 10 inclusive, in the API for a demographically comparable school in the prior year or in two of the last three years.
- (4) The entity that granted the charter determines that the academic performance of the charter school is at least equal to the academic performance of the public schools that

the charter school pupils would otherwise have been required to attend, as well as the academic performance of the schools in the school district in which the charter school is located, taking into account the composition of the pupil population that is served at the charter school.

The following shall serve as documentation confirming that OPPA exceeds the statutory criteria required for renewal as set forth in Education Code Section 47607(b) (see Appendix 2.4 for the 2013 CDE DataQuest Report):

• OPPA has achieved a statewide API rank of 9 in the prior year, exceeding the minimum threshold rank of 4 required in Education Code Section 47607(b)(2).

Due to the suspension of the CST in 2013-14, no API was calculated for OPPA. Schools that do not have a current year API calculation will use either the more recent API score, an average of the three most recent API scores, or an alternate measure that shows an increase in academic achievement (Assembly Bill 484; See Education Code sections 52052(e)(2)(F) and 52052(e)(4)). OPPA has only one API calculation in its history, so OPPA's API will remain at the 2013 rate of 887, an API which received a statewide ranking of 9 out 10. Data provided by the California Department of Education states that OPPA has exceeded the statewide minimum performance target for API (800), as shown in Table 4. OPPA has no numerically significant student subgroups.

Accordingly, OPPA has met all possible renewal criteria in accordance with Education Code Section 47607(b) given the school's years of operation, and data generated by the state, and therefore should be granted a five-year charter renewal term pursuant to Education Code Section 47607(a)(1).

Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP)

OPPA did not meet AYP for 2013; however, the school does not have previous year's data to meet AYP through alternative methods. Because the CDE has suspended AYP for 2013-14 for K-8th grade schools (due to transition from CST to common core assessment starting in 2014-15), OPPA will hold in its current status for 2014-15, not in Program Improvement (see Table 5). To also be clear, the meeting of AYP has no role in the charter criteria as detailed above.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING AGREEMENT MADE AND ENTERED ON JANUARY 12, 2015 BETWEEN THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA AND SACRAMENTO CITY UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

Under the provision of Government Code Section 19050.8 and State Personnel Board Rule 427, the State of California and the Sacramento City Unified School District enter into an agreement for the assignment of Mr. Charles Watters, to the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (Commission), Certification Division, at 1900 Capitol Avenue Sacramento, California 95811, under the following terms, conditions, and policies:

Justification for Assignment

The employee will be assigned to the position of Division Director (Career Executive Assignment (CEA) Level A) in the Certification Division. The issuance of credentials is a primary function of the agency. The Commission is required by Education Code Section 44330 to issue credentials within fifty (50) business days. The previous division Director vacated the position in September 2014 and while the Commission has worked diligently to fill the position, it is currently unable to successfully recruit a suitable candidate through the regular recruitment process.

Meanwhile the division continues to operate without a division director. Priorities such as putting procedures into place to reduce the credential processing time, and other high-priority tasks remain undone, putting the Commission at risk of non-compliance with statutory requirements. The position is necessary to maintain a high level of productivity in the division, to ensure that the statutory timeline for issuing credentials is met, and to ensure that staff is responsive to the public by answering phones and responding to email in a timely manner. Given the importance of this position to the Commission, and the availability of an Inter-jurisdictional Exchange (IJE) to satisfy the position requirements, the Commission believes the IJE a justifiable method.

Position Data and Supervision

The employee will be assigned to the position of Division Director (CEA Level A) in the Certification Division and will be responsible for directing the statewide teacher credentialing operations. This assignment is responsible for the development and implementation of programs and policies relating to the Commission's mission of safeguarding excellence in education by ensuring all educators meet the Commission's high standards of quality. The employee will perform the following tasks and be responsible for:

- 1) Developing and Implementing Statewide Credentialing Policies: Analyze, interpret, and apply complex federal law and state statutes and regulations governing the certification of educators. Work with other state and local agencies and content experts on complex policy issues concerning the certification of educators. Propose California Code of Regulations to implement and clarify statutes and regulations that affect the licensing of educators and oversee the state approval of regulations adopted by the Commission. Review workload data and feedback from credential preparation programs and employers to identify and make recommendations for policies and strategies to improve current practices. Ensure the accuracy, currency, and clarity of credential requirements and procedures made available through Commission publications including the Credential Information Guide, leaflets, Credential Information Alerts and Commission World Wide Web pages. Collaborate with other division managers to address policy issues that affect teacher preparation and professional practice. Prepare and present policy proposals and reports to the 19-member Commission.
- 2) Managing and Directing: Direct, plan, organize, and coordinate the work of the managers and staff of the Certification Division. Oversee the certifications issued to educators in accordance with California statutes and regulations and ensure the issuance of all authorization within statutory timelines. Implement and maintain policies, systems, and procedures to ensure statutory deadlines are met. Oversee the maintenance of accurate data regarding credential volume and processing times and report data to the Commission and the Legislature as required. Develop annual division operational goals and objectives; review, evaluate, and redirect resources as necessary to meet operational goals. Evaluate and address the staffing and budgetary needs of the division. Directly, and through subordinate managers/supervisors, review and evaluate employee performance, initiate work improvement counseling and training as needed to correct performance deficiencies, initiate, and recommend adverse action as needed to maintain a safe and productive work environment.
- 3) Improving and Maintaining Commission Effectiveness: Develop comprehensive procedural manuals documenting an array of departmental functions, not limited to, the issuance of educator credentials; teacher certification policies, systems, and procedures; Federal and State Personnel regulations, guidelines, and processes; educator discipline; and teacher preparation. Develop and implement division policy changes specific to the Certification Division.

Communicate effectively with Commissioners, legislative staff, institutions of higher education officials, educational organizations, and local, state, and Federal agency officials on sensitive teacher certification policies and issues. Represent the Division at public meetings imparting policy-level information related to credential processing to Commission stakeholders.

4) Performing other related professional assignments consistent with the goals and objectives of the programs to which management is assigned, and with the mission of the Commission.

On Commission meeting days, is the employee will be required to work at Commission headquarters and may be required to be on-site until the conclusion of Commission business.

Costs and Expenses

The Commission will reimburse Sacramento City Unified School District for the employee's salary and benefits via a standard agreement contract. In addition to salary, reimbursement will be paid for employer's contribution toward employee benefits which may include health, dental, vision, life insurance, contributions to the State Teachers Retirement System, unemployment, workers compensation programs, and other fringe benefits, as specified in Exhibit A.

The Commission will reimburse the employee directly for all travel expenses incurred, through the California Automated Travel Expense Reimbursement System, while conducting official business for the Commission during this assignment. For travel purposes, the employee's headquarters will be designated as 1900 Capitol Avenue, Sacramento, California, 95811.

Rights and Benefits

The assignment of Mr. Watters to the Commission during this contract period shall not affect his status and rights as an employee of the Sacramento City Unified School District. Mr. Watters will be entitled to all current and future benefits, salary, and allowance for sick leave, vacation, retirement, Workers Compensation, and other benefits offered to employees of the Sacramento City Unified School District. Mr. Watters will remain an employee of the Sacramento City Unified School District and will not gain any state civil services status or be eligible for benefits offered only to employees of the state as a result considered administrative for open examination purposes.

Application of Rules, Regulations, and Policies

During the period of this assignment, Mr. Watters will be assigned to responsibilities equivalent to the level of Division Director, Career Executive Assignment A. The rules and policies of both the Commission and State of California governing standards of conduct shall apply to Mr. Watters.

Amendments to extend the services of the Visiting Educator assignment will be contingent upon the completion of a written annual evaluation of Mr. Watter's performance in this assignment.

As required under the provision of the Budget Act language, individuals providing services under a Visiting Educator, Interjurisdictional Exchange contract are required to provide full financial disclosure to the Fair Political Practices Commission in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Commission.

Terms of Contract

The contract will commence on February 1, 2015, terminate on January 31, 2017, and consist of 222 working days per year. The contract may be terminated before the expiration date by either party with a thirty (30) day written advance notice.

EXHIBIT D

SPECIAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

Settlement of Disputes

Unless otherwise provided in this Agreement, any dispute concerning a question of fact arising under this Agreement which cannot be resolved informally shall be decided by the following two-step procedures.

- The Contractor shall provide written notice of the particulars of such disputes to the Commission's Project Representative or his/her duly appointed representative. The Project Representative shall respond in writing within ten (10) working days of receipt of the written notice of dispute. Should the Contractor disagree with the Project Representative's decision, the Contractor shall appeal to the second level. Pending the decision on appeal, the Contractor shall proceed diligently with the performance of this Agreement in accordance with the Project Representative's decision.
- 2) The second level appeal shall indicate why the Project Representative's decision is unacceptable, attaching to it the Contractor's original statement of the dispute with supporting documents, along with a copy of the Project Representative's response. This letter shall be sent to the Executive Director of his/her duly appointed representative. The second level appeal shall be filed within fifteen (15) working days of the receipt of the Project Representative's decision. Failure to submit an appeal within the period specified shall constitute a waiver of all such right to an adjustment of this Agreement. The Executive Director or designee shall meet with the Contractor to review the issues raised. A written decision signed by the Executive Director or designee shall be returned to the Contractor within fifteen (15) working days of the receipt of the appeal.

2. Right to Terminate

The Commission reserves the right to terminate this Agreement subject to thirty (30) days written notice to the Contractor. The Contractor shall submit a written request to terminate this Agreement only if the Commission should substantially fail to perform its responsibilities as provided herein.

However, this Agreement can be immediately terminated for cause. The term "for cause" shall mean that the Contractor fails to meet the terms, conditions, and/or responsibilities of the agreement. In this instance, the agreement termination shall be effective as of the date indicated on the Commission's notification to the Agreement.

This Agreement shall be suspended or cancelled without notice, at the option of the Contractor, if the Contractor or Commission's premises or equipment are destroyed by fire or other catastrophe, or so substantially damaged that it is impractical to continue service, or in the event the is unable to render service as a result of any action by any governmental authority.

3. Force Majeure

Neither party shall be liable to the other for any delay in or failure of performance, nor shall any such delay in or failure of performance constitutes default, if such delay or failure is caused by "Force Majeure." As used in this section, "Force Majeure" is defined as follows: Acts of war and acts of God such as earthquakes, floods, and other natural disasters such that performance is impossible.

6.0 AGENDA ADOPTION

President Woo asked for a motion to adopt the agenda. A motion was made to approve by Second Vice

President Pritchett and seconded by Second Vice President Hansen. The Board voted unanimously to adopt the agenda.

7.0 SPECIAL PRESENTATION

7.1 Recognition of the Parent Teacher Home Visit Program for Achieving The 2014 CSBA Golden Bell Award (Christina Pritchett)

Recognition of the program and description of the award was presented by Vice President Christina Pritchett. She had originally nominated the program which was eventually chosen to win the Golden Bell along with four other programs. Over 250 total nominees were submitted. Program coordinator Lisa Levasseur spoke and showed the bell trophy. She thanked Vice President Pritchett, Superintendent Banda, Tu Moua, principals, and teachers for their support. The program started in 1998 at eight schools in our District and is now in 17 states. The program is currently in 38 District schools. She also thanked SCTA, Nikki Milevsky, David Fischer, founding parents, and Executive Director Carrie Rose.

Member Arroyo thanked everyone that is involved in the program and Vice President Pritchett for nominating the program.

A celebration of newly elected Board Members was held with refreshments in the Bistro adjacent to the Community Rooms.

7.4 Annual Organization Meeting of the Board of Education (Darrel Woo)

Election of Officers:

The Board shall elect a President, Vice President, and Second Vice President

President Woo turned the meeting over to Board Secretary Superintendent Banda. Superintendent Banda asked if there were any nominations for the office of President.

Vice President Pritchett moved that the current slate of officers, which have been in office only four months since Patrick Kennedy left the Board, stay the same: President Darrel Woo, Vice President Christina Pritchett, and Second Vice President Jay Hansen. The motion was seconded by Member Arroyo and passed unanimously.

Members of the public may address the Board on non-agenda items that are within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board. Please fill out a yellow card available at the entrance. Speakers may be called in the order that requests are received, or grouped by subject area. We ask that comments are limited to two (2) minutes with no more than 15 minutes per single topic so that as many people as possible may be heard. By law, the Board is allowed to take action only on items on the agenda. The Board may, at its discretion, refer a matter to district staff or calendar the issue for future discussion.

Nikki Milevsky, President of the Sacramento City Teachers' Association, again expressed disappointment in District leadership's decision to change the healthcare offerings and was concerned after a meeting with the Superintendent that no intervention was planned. She said it took over a month to get the District to meet and explain the healthcare plan changes. Yet the District still cannot explain, among other things, a default plan for retirees who are out of area, how retirees that cannot afford the initial month's payment will be able to enroll, the reimbursement process for any person that has experienced a higher cost for services than the plans that were negotiated, and the process for participants who cannot afford to pay the upfront cost for services including lifesaving prescriptions. Also she again mentioned the extreme difficulty active and retired employees have had in getting phone calls returned and questions answered. Finally, she also stated that there is no existing District analysis that justifies how the purported six million dollars in savings will be generated. It was further learned that six million dollars in savings was a number that was provided orally by Keenan and Associates. There is no written analysis on their part to back up their claim. No one in the District or Keenan has appeared to have attempted to quantify the enormous financial exposure the District faces based on its hold harmless promise or the potential law suits the District will inevitably face by anyone harmed by the District's inability to access healthcare services that were previously provided. And no one denies that the money purportedly generated from the savings is being used to boost the take home pay for administrators. She feels it is outrageous to have benefit cuts for the teachers to provide wage increases for administrators. She stated that at this late date Health Net still remains available and so the healthcare changes to teachers can be stopped, but the District has refused to even look into that suggestion. The District has also rejected SCTA's offer to arbitrate the dispute immediately. The District also failed to appear at the informal settlement conference required by Public Employees Relations Board (PERB) on December 15th and notified PERB that the District was not available for the remainder of the month. SCTA has asked PERB for an injunction in the unlawful health care changes. Angie Sutherland, a parent at Hollywood Park Elementary School, congratulated the elected Board members and returning Board members. She also thanked them for their service to the District. She just finished the office of Family and Community Engagement Parent Leadership Pathway Tier Two on Wednesday with a group of other parents at Hollywood Park. She thanked facilitator Cathy Morrison and Terri Sheffield who runs the parent resource center at the school site. She has had a very positive experience at this school.

<u>Grace Trujillo</u> spoke on middle schools. She had a chance to visit all middle schools in the District. She spoke on Sam Brannan and California Middle Schools. She stated that Sutter Middle School has a large enrollment due to years of parent involvement. However she feels parents also need to look at other middle schools as they also provide good programs and resources. Smaller enrollment also has its advantages. The Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores are similar to Sutter Middle School.

Regarding Item 9.1f, minutes of the November 20, 2014 Board meeting, it was mentioned that Mr. Merletti was in the process of gathering reports and photos from Earl Warren Elementary School, Sutter Middle School, and George Washington Carver High School. However, he does not have anything further to report at present. A collage of the solar eclipse and report was provided to the Board. The eclipse reported on was his 27th solar eclipse since 1954.

He explained that the process of developing a school district budget is an on-going process that must be approved by the Board throughout the school year, and in order to effectively develop a fiscal document that reflects the goals and objectives of the District the budget process must include a well-defined budget calendar outlining when specific activities will be completed. Mr. Castillo went over steps covered in the

timeline and next steps.

President Woo asked if there was a motion to move the Item from Conference to Action. A motion was made by Member Arroyo and seconded by Vice President Pritchett. The motion carried unanimously. President Woo then asked if there was a motion to approve the calendar. A motion was made Vice President Pritchett which was seconded by Member Arroyo. The motion passed unanimously.

10.2 Independent Audit Report for the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2014, Submitted by Crowe Horwath LLP (Gerardo Castillo, CPA) Information

Before presentation of the 2013-14 Audit Report, Interim Chief Business Officer Gerardo Castillo publicly thanked Director of Accounting Amari Watkins and Interim Director of Budget Michael Smith and their staffs for their hard work in getting the audit report completed. Mr. Castillo then introduced Lisa Sav, Senior Manager with Crow Horwath. She presented the 2013-14 Audit Report.

Public Comment:

<u>Karen Swett</u> of Making Cents Work stated that her organization is more interested in trends than projections. She has concerns about CalSTRS and also Annual Measurable Objectives. Fifty percent of students are not proficient in English, and approximately 40 percent are not proficient in Math. She feels that if there is a manageable ending fund balance, as it appears there is, then we don't need to continue to put money into that, but rather spend more money on students.

Nikki Milevsky, President of the Sacramento City Teachers' Association (SCTA), asked that attention be drawn to page 48, number 10, Plan Description, which talks about the cost of retiree health benefits. "District teachers qualify for these benefits after attaining age 55 with at least five years of consecutive service to the District, age 50 with 30 years of service (if a member prior to January 1, 2013), or approved disability retirement with five years of service." Ms. Milevsky stated that SCTA is deeply concerned about the inaccuracies of this statement. It does reflect any contract to her knowledge that has ever existed with SCTA. Their prior long-standing contract had been age 55 with 10 years of service. In 2010 that requirement was drastically changed for vesting and lifetime benefits for twenty years at age 55 and a sliding scale so one could retire at age 60 with 15 years of service. She stated that if the unfunded liabilities are being calculated on this information, it is incorrect.

<u>Grace Trujillo</u> has concerns about the unfunded liabilities and feels that it is a problem nationwide for which all need to prepare. She asks that all work together for the common sake of students and our future.

Board Member Comments:

Second Vice President Hansen asked what changes to expect next year due to GASB 68. Ms. Sav directed the Board to page 33 which explains that governments providing defined benefit pensions will need to recognize their long-term obligation for pension benefits as a liability for the first time, and to more comprehensively and comparably measure the annual costs of pension benefits. It will not affect fund financials; it will be reported in the balance sheet. It is similar to how OPEB was functioning; they will be sending information out to the districts showing this is your percentage, this is our unfunded liability, calculate what your liability is. Member

Hansen asked if this will be just for pensions and not for unfunded healthcare costs. Ms. Sav replied that the unfunded healthcare costs would not be included in this amount. Member Hansen asked if unfunded healthcare is listed in the financials now. Mr. Castillo replied that the OPEB is listed in the financials as a footnote, specifically footnote 10 under GASB 45. This is a similar idea, but with CalSTRS and CalPERS, the District will be record it's full proportionate share. The amount is \$611 million while the OPEB amount is \$182 million. These are liabilities going forward which include current employees and retirees.

Member Rodriguez noted the new section in the report regarding free and reduced lunch students. There was an adjustment of 441 students, translating into \$278,000. Member Rodriguez asked what triggered the adjustment. Mr. Castillo replied that this is a case where the Federal and State law do not agree. Free and reduced counts have been done for many years based on Federal law. However LCFF rules are still being clarified. Under Federal law, students that were free and reduced in the prior year were automatically rolled over, and the District had 30 days to change the number for reporting in early October. It took some time to clarify the new State rules which resulted in the adjustment for this year. There is a process in place for next year however. Member Rodriguez asked if there is a different threshold now to qualify for free and reduced lunch. Mr. Castillo answered that the threshold is the same, but the reporting for Federal and State is done differently. Member Rodriguez how the LCFF number will be calculated next year. Mr. Castillo explained the calculation. Member Rodriguez asked what the plan is going forward regarding Associated Student Body (ASB) accounts. Ms. Sav replied that new sites are chosen each year to audit. If there were findings in a prior year for sites, they are not tested again in the subsequent year. She went on to say that it is rare to not have an ASB finding as ASB deals with cash handling. The District has provided training in this area. Member Rodriguez asked if Ms. Sav thought ASB findings could ever be material. Ms. Sav replied that these funds are put in with other non-major, meaning that the materiality threshold is very high, so no. An instant in which it would become material is if records were completely missing and nothing could be verified. Member Rodriguez directed attention to the auditors' report on internal control on page 81. She verified that ASB was audited regarding internal controls, and asked at what point would the auditors consider something material enough on which to report. Ms. Sav responded that material weakness is driven by materiality. A material weakness is found if the auditors believe there is a potential risk that, with controls failing, the result would be material. The material weakness would have to have the potential of reaching a material level. Member Rodriguez asked about the total net position shown on the Statement of Net Position. Ms. Sav directed the Board to page 45, summary of long-term debt, which shows a significant amount of bonds. This money will be invested into building capital assets, so as that debt starts dropping the District will be building up assets. Buildings, modernization of sites, and technology all show up in capital assets. This will help off-set and build up the net position. However, there is the net OPEB liability that keeps increasing and will keep increasing. Also, that entire liability will need to be reported very soon. And in addition to that liability, the District will need to start posting CalSTRS and CalPERS liability next year. Member Rodriguez asked how this affects the District in the market in terms of bond sales. Ms. Sav responded that it can give the funding agencies concern when there is a negative net position. However, with GASB 68 coming out, it must be kept in mind that every State agency is going to have this issue. Therefore, risk assessment rules may change. Member Rodriguez stated that she found the last paragraph regarding declining enrollment on page 12 intriguing, asked Ms. Sav to read the paragraph, and suggested that the Board have a broader discussion on the subject if anyone had concerns. Ms. Sav read the paragraph and stated that any discussion would be management's. Member Rodriguez stated that it basically states the District is still on the verge of fiscal distress and there is no room for error in judgment by the Board regarding fiscality; she asked what else the Board should be considering concerning this statement and the audit in its totality. Ms. Sav replied that question takes her outside of the scope of what she is hired to do and doesn't feel comfortable giving a statement as it could be construed as advice. Member Rodriguez asked why the 41.5 million dollar general fund balance amount is significant. Ms. Sav replied that the District would want to consider the fact that it has only an unassigned fund balance of about almost 18 million dollars and comparing that to the amount of payroll required, consideration should be given to how much is needed for payroll if something did go wrong. Mr. Castillo stated that the amount does not cover half of payroll for a month. This is one of the reasons that the District has become positive for 2014-15 and increased the fund balance. We can project for the next couple of years that the District will be able to make it.

Recommendation: Approve proposed Board policy.

Background/Rationale: The current Board Policy No. 6142.7 Physical Education Instruction was last updated on May 20, 2004, one year before state standards were adopted. The California State Board of Education on January 12, 2005, adopted the *Physical Education Model Content Standards for California Public Schools, Kindergarten through grade Twelve*. In addition, the *Physical Education Framework for California Public Schools: Kindergarten through Grade Twelve* was adopted by the State Board of Education on September 11, 2008.

Sacramento City Unified School District (SCUSD) Board of Education adopted a revised Board Policy No. 5030 Student Wellness on September 6, 2012, which contains physical education information. At that time a revised Board Policy No. 6142.7 Physical Education Instruction was not brought forth. We, therefore, are bringing a revised Physical Education Instruction Policy that aligns with the state laws, requirements and standards.

<u>Financial Considerations</u>: Costs associated with implementation of the policy include funding for revisions to courses of study, acquisition of special teaching authorizations, and professional learning. Total annual costs are estimated to be \$65,000.

I. Overview

Sacramento City Unified School District (SCUSD) recognizes that physical education significantly contributes to students' well-being and to SCUSD's Strategic Plan; therefore, it is an integral part of our student's education experiences. High-quality physical education instruction contributes to good health, develops fundamental and advanced motor skills, improves students' self-confidence and provides opportunities for increased levels of physical fitness that are associated with high academic achievement.

The current Board Policy 6142.7 Physical Education Instruction was last updated on May 20, 2004, one year before state standards were adopted. The California State Board of Education on January 12, 2005, adopted the *Physical Education Model Content Standards for California Public Schools, Kindergarten Through Grade Twelve*. These standards focus on the content of physical education and incorporate the detail required to guide the development of consistent, high-quality physical education instructional programs aimed at students learning and achievement. The standards provide a comprehensive vision of what students need to know and be able to do at each grade level. In addition, the standards provide a model for high school course design. The *Physical Education Framework for California Public Schools: Kindergarten Through Grade Twelve,* was adopted by the State Board of Education on September 11, 2008 and serves as an essential resource for the development, implementation and evaluation of standards-based physical education programs and instruction.

SCUSD Board of Education adopted a revised Board Policy 5030 Student Wellness on September 6, 2012, which contains physical education information. The revisions to the Physical Education Instruction Policy are designed to bring the policy in-alignment with state adopted curricular standards and instructional framework and the District's Student Wellness Policy which reinforce the importance of physical education as a vital component of our students' educational experiences and its contribution to each student's health and well-being, social development, and readiness to learn. On August 15, 2013, the SCUSD Board of Education conducted the first reading of the revised policy.

II. Driving Governance

In schools across the United States, physical education has been substantially reduced in response to budget concerns and pressures to improve academic test scores. Yet the available evidence shows that children who are physically active and fit tend to perform better in the classroom and that daily physical education does not adversely affect academic performance. Schools can provide outstanding learning environments while improving children's health through physical education. The development of Physical Literacy, taught in Physical Education classes has far reaching implications, not only for students' lives, but for the communities in which they live, and for society as a whole. Physical Literacy achievement impacts students' school success, which, in turn, influences their future prospects for employment and quality of life. In addition with the changes in academic expectation as a result of the Common Core State Standards this becomes even more critical. The proposed revisions to the Physical

Education Policy will provide the guidelines necessary to create the learning environments that support quality physical education instruction and learning.

III. Budget

The cost implications of the policy change relate to providing an array of options for students to meet the physical education course requirements for graduation. This encompasses costs associated with bringing the JROTC and marching band courses into compliance with the requirements outlined in CA Education Code including teacher certification, revisions to course of study content, and fitness testing requirements. Also included are costs for increasing the opportunities for students to take and pass the required physical fitness test and professional learning for teachers. The approximate annual cost is \$65,000.

IV. Goals, Objectives and Measures

To measure the impact and effectiveness of the Physical Education Instruction program, the Academic Office will use the Physical Education Mandates Report, the Physical Education Exemptions Report, the FitnessGram Test Results, surveys regarding the EPEC curriculum and any other data agreed upon by the Board and the Superintendent or designee to evaluate program quality and the effectiveness of the district's program in meeting goals for physical education. These measures will serve as a barometer for success.

The Academic Office will assess the quality, effectiveness, and fidelity of the implementation of teaching and learning resources through the consistent review of curriculum content for alignment to standards, cognitive demand, accuracy, diversity, and relevance. The quality of instruction and professional development will be determined through observations of instruction and teacher reflection. Using multiple measures to further ensure validity, the Academic Office will also collect perception data through surveys, evaluations of professional development, and the work of the Physical Education Training Specialist. All results will be used to determine if program changes are warranted.

V. Major Initiatives

The proposed revisions to the Physical Education Policy outlined below are recommended as a result of the work of a Physical Education Steering Committee. This broad-based group of stakeholders comprised of district and site-based staff as well as community partners, reviewed best practices as outlined in the state standards and frameworks as well as those in similar urban school districts and incorporated language proposed by the California School Board Association (CSBA). Below we outline the major proposed changes to the policy.

Alignment to CA Physical Education Standards and Framework

The proposed revised policy is updated to include explicit alignment of the Physical Education program

to the Physical Education standards and framework and the use of a standards aligned curriculum. The revisions also describe the overall course of study for Physical Education in grades 9-12.

Students with Disabilities

The revised policy addresses adaptations to the program to meet the needs of students with disabilities. Students with disabilities will be provided with physical education that is in alignment with their Individualized Education Plan (IEPs) and 504 plans.

Physical Education Minutes

The state of CA Education Code (EC) mandates minutes every ten days for physical education instruction (EC Section 51210(g), 51223, 51222(a)). The revised policy outlines the required minutes at each grade level, K-12, to provide guidance to school sites in scheduling their physical education programs.

Physical Fitness Testing

Annual Physical Fitness testing is required by the state of CA for grades 5, 7, and 9 (EC 60800). The revised policy includes the timeframe during which the testing will occur and what qualifies as passage of the physical fitness test. In addition, requirements for data reporting are outlined.

Exemptions (Temporary and Permanent)

The physical education policy has been revised regarding allowable exemptions from physical education courses, both temporary and permanent. There were no changes to the temporary exemptions in the previous physical education policy. The permanent exemptions have been modified as follows:

- The language in the athletic exemption (EC 51242) was modified to reflect updated language, specifically a shift from the use of the word interscholastic exemptions to athletic exemptions.
- The Two-Year Exemption (EC 51241[b][1]) now reflects changes in Ed Code such as clarity on what constitutes passing the physical fitness test (i.e. passing five of six components of the physical fitness test), which has been required since 2007. It also includes the opportunity to take additional high school elective Physical Education courses if students elect the two-year exemption or fail to pass the physical fitness test in accord with state requirements.
- The 12th grader exemption (EC 51246) was added as it is an allowable exemption that was not in previous Board policy.

Program Evaluation

The new policy includes a program evaluation component as advised by CSBA and utilized by other districts. The program evaluation component will allow the district to assess the impact of the physical education program.

Special Cases for Awarding Physical Education Credit for Non-Physical Education Courses

The state of CA allows districts to award physical education credit to courses other than Physical Education courses if the course meets requirements including those related to the provision of minimum instructional minutes for physical education, various reporting requirements, and the assignment of an appropriately credentialed teacher (EC 33352(b).

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Marching Band

Awarding physical education credit for marching band is a local decision established by the local Governing Board. State requirements still apply and impact a district's ability to award physical education credit for marching band. These requirements include the following according to EC 3352(b)(7) and 5 CCR Section 10060):

- The course must be taught by a teacher with demonstrated subject matter competence in teaching physical education. Demonstrated subject matter competence is determined by a district established Committee on Special Assignments (EC 44258.7).
- The state required 400 minutes of physical education every 10 school days (EC 51222 (a)) is met within the context of the course.
- The course of study for the course outlines how the course meets the objectives and criteria of EC 33352 which lists the eight physical education content areas required for physical education program credit. These eight areas must be taught over a span of the physical education courses a student takes and are as follows: a) effects of physical activity upon dynamic health; b) mechanics of body movement; c) aquatics; d) gymnastics and tumbling; e) individual and dual sports; f) rhythms and dance; g) team sports; and h) combatives. Most students start Marching Band as a freshman and continue Marching Band all four years.
- Students must be administered the physical fitness testing (PFT) pursuant to EC 60800 and the results of the PFT are to be included as part of the school accountability report card.

Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps (JROTC)

Recently, CTC passed a special teaching authorization in Physical Education Designated Subjects Special Subjects in Reserve Officers Training Corps ROTC and Basic Military Drill (BMD). The local school board may approve to award PE credit for JROTC and BMD, however state requirements outlined below, still apply:

- The instructor giving PE credit for JROTC/BMD must meet the higher standard of subject matter competence by passing the CSET in PE or by completing an approved PE subject matter program.
- Holders of the Special Teaching Authorization would only be authorized to teach PE in the context of a JROTC or BMD course that has been approved by the local school board to award PE credit.
- JROTC/BMD courses provided must meet the Physical Education Content Standards for California Public Schools by the State Board of Education and the local governing board takes special action at a public meeting to grant PE credit for these courses.
- The state requires 400 minutes every 10 school days for physical education (Ed code 51222 (a)) at the secondary level.
- The course of study ensures compliance and must meet the objectives and criteria of EC Section 33352 (b)(7) with Title 5, of the California code of Regulations, Section 10060, which lists the eight physical education content areas required for physical education program credit. These eight areas are as follows: a) effects of physical activity upon dynamic health; b) mechanics of

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body movement; c) aquatics; d) gymnastics and tumbling; e) individual and dual sports; f) rhythms and dance; g) team sports; and h) combatives. The above eight areas must be taught over a span of the physical education courses a student takes.

• Student must be administered the physical fitness testing (PFT) pursuant to EC Section 608000 and the results of the PFT are to be included as part of the school accountability report card.

Physical Education Four-Year Sequence

The chart below outlines various four-year physical education sequences for high school students and displays the possible trajectories for students who pass the physical fitness test in ninth grade (row 1), students who do not pass the physical fitness test in 9th grade (row 2), and students who qualify for the athletic exemption (row 3). The chart outlines pathways based on students' qualifying for the various exemptions that are available as well as options for engaging in additional physical education courses beyond the requisite courses.

Instruction

The Board of Education recognizes the research and positive benefits of a quality physical education program on student health and academic achievement and encourages each student to take advantage of the various opportunities for physical activity offered by the District. All students in grades K-12 shall be provided opportunities to be physically active on a regular basis through high-quality physical education instruction and may provide additional opportunities for physical activity throughout the school day. All students are expected to participate in the physical education program according to education code. The program will be modified for students with special needs. Opportunities for moderate to vigorous physical activity (MVPA) shall be provided through physical education classes. The district's physical education activities shall support the district's coordinated student wellness program and encourage students' lifelong fitness.

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The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all students in grades K-12 receive the appropriate amount of high quality physical education required by the Education Code. The school district shall adopt the Physical Education Model Content Standards for California Public Schools Kindergarten through Grade Twelve. The school district shall also implement the contents of the Physical Education Framework for California Public Schools Kindergarten through Grade Twelve.

The District's Physical Education program shall provide a developmentally appropriate sequence of

The District's Physical Education program shall provide a developmentally appropriate sequence of instruction aligned with the state's model content standards and curriculum framework. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the District's program provides all students with equal opportunities for instruction and participation regardless of gender, race or disabilities in accordance with law.

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The Physical Education program will build interest and proficiency in movement skills, encourage students' lifelong fitness through physical activity, and will design and evaluate a strong, cohesive and comprehensive physical education program for all students. The Board of Education shall adopt the Exemplary Physical Education Curriculum (EPEC) for physical education which encompasses the California Content Standards for Physical Education and the National Physical Education Standards.

The District's program shall include a variety of kinesthetic activities including team and individual sports, life time sports and activities, gymnastics, as well as aesthetic movement forms, such as dance.

The overall course of study for grades 9-12 shall include the effects of physical activity upon human health, the mechanics of body movement, aquatics, gymnastics and tumbling, individual and dual sports, rhythms and dance, team sports, and combative (EC 33352; 5 CCR 10060).

The Board shall approve the courses in grades 9-12 for which physical education credit may be granted. The Board, Superintendent and designee will comply with all state laws and guidelines when approving courses for physical education. Ninth graders must take Freshman Physical Education class lead by a credentialed physical education teacher. Independent study may be used to extend a student's education opportunities in physical education 10^{th} - 12^{th} grade. Independent study may be used as an alternative instructional strategy, not an alternative curriculum nor as the exclusive means of course credit offerings for the physical education graduation requirement from a school as specified in the updated California Department of Education's *Independent Study Operations Manual* Students follow the same course of study as the District Physical Education Courses and meet the same academic standards as classroom-based students. Independent study students must adhere to (*EC sections 51222, 51225.3, 51241, and 60800* which requires all grade nine students to be tested in the state's physical performance test (FITNESSGRAM).

Students with disabilities shall be provided instruction in physical education in accordance with their individualized education program or Section 504 accommodation plan.

Teachers and other school and community personnel will not use physical activity (e.g., running laps, pushups) or withhold opportunities for physical activity (e.g., recess, physical education) as punishment.

As per the California Association for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance (CAHPERD) and the National Association for Sport and Physical Education (NASPE) recommendation, the District

shall make every effort to maintain the same ratio in Physical Education classes as exists for other classes in middle school and high school (CCR, Title 5, Section 10060).

Physical Fitness Testing

During the months of February, March, April, or May, students in grades 5, 7, and 9 will undergo the physical fitness testing designated by the State Board of Education (*EC 60800*; 5 *CCR 1041*). Students with physical disabilities and students who are unable to participate in all of the testing tasks shall participate in as much of the physical fitness testing as their physical condition will permit. Summary information will be reported annually to physical education teachers and individual student reports of fitness will be distributed to parents twice a year (Once by October 30th and the final by June 1st). Results will also be included in each school's SACRC reporting

Tools to measure height, weight, heart rates and body composition may be made available to help students more accurately determine their health and fitness level.

Temporary Exemptions

The Superintendent or designee may grant a temporary exemption from physical education under either of the following conditions with the consent of the student: (EC 51241)

- 1. A student is enrolled for one-half time or less.
- 2. A student is ill or injured and a modified program to meet his/her needs cannot be provided.

Permanent Exemptions

The Superintendent or designee may grant a permanent exemption from physical education to an **individual student** under any of the following condition: (EC 51241)

- 1. Enrolled in a juvenile home, ranch, camp or forestry camp school with recreation and exercise scheduled
- 2. Age 16 years or older and has been in grade 10 for one or more academic years
- 3. Enrolled as a postgraduate student

Two-Year Exemptions

With the **student's consent**, the Superintendent or designee may exempt a student from physical education courses for any two years any time during grades 10-12, inclusive, **if** the **student has**

<u>satisfactorily</u> <u>met at least five of the six standards</u> of the state's physical fitness test in grade 9. (EC 51241)

Upon request by students and/or their parents/guardians, the Superintendent or designee may administer the physical fitness test to students in grades 10-12 who need to pass the test in order to qualify for a two-year exemption from physical education courses.

The District Board of Education opted to exempt students from two of the four years of physical education pursuant to paragraph (1) or (2) or both of subdivision (b) of EC section 51241. By exempting students from the additional two years of physical education classes, District high schools are to offer for those exempted students a variety of physical education elective courses (EC 51222(b)). These courses are offered to provide students with the opportunity to specialize in activities of their own choosing. Following a specific regimen and honing their skills, students are then able to develop a personalized plan to ensure a lifetime of fitness and physical activity. (Physical Education Framework for California Public Schools, Kindergarten through Grade Twelve, page 48)

The Superintendent or designee may excuse any student in grade 10, 11 or 12 who attends a regional occupational center or program from attending physical education courses if such attendance results in hardship because of the travel time involved. (Education Code 52316)

Athletics Exemption

The Superintendent or designee may exempt students from physical education when they are participating in interscholastic athletic programs which entail comparable amounts of time and physical activity, provided their physical education, in its entirety, meets the district's curriculum standards.

12th Grader Exemption

Under EC Section 512466 the District Board of Education may exempt any pupil enrolled in his or her last semester or quarter, as the case may be, of the 12th grade who, pursuant to *EC 46145* (minimum required courses per semester or quarter and *EC 46147* (exemption for certain 12th grade students to attend less than the minimum school day), is permitted to attend school less than 240or 180 minutes per day, from attending courses of physical education (*EC 51246*). However, that such pupil may not be exempted pursuant to this section from attending courses of physical education if such pupil would, after such exemption, attend school for 240 minutes or more per day.

Weather

Physical Education staff shall appropriately limit the amount or type of physical exercise required of students during air pollution episodes, hot weather, or other inclement conditions.

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Special Care

Physical education staff shall take special care to ensure that excessive physical exertion is not required of students who have informed staff of a heart or respiratory condition or other physical disability that may restrict such activity. Any dispute concerning such a condition shall be submitted to the principal or designee, who may make appropriate inquiries consistent with state and federal law. An appropriate alternative activity shall be provided for these students.

Staffing

The district shall provide physical education teachers with continuing professional development, including classroom management and instructional strategies designed to keep students engaged and active and to enhance the quality of physical education instruction and assessment.

Program Evaluation

The Superintendent or designees shall annually report to the Board the results of the state physical fitness testing for each school and applicable grade level. He/she shall also report to the Board regarding the number of instructional minutes offered in physical education for each grade level, the schools in compliance with the PE mandated minutes, the number of two-year and permanent exemptions granted pursuant to Education Code 51241, and any other data agreed upon by the Board and the Superintendent or designee to evaluate program quality and the effectiveness of the District's program in meeting goals for physical activity and physical education.

Business Services 2015-2016 Governor's Budget Proposal January 22, 2015



I. OVERVIEW/HISTORY:

The Governor's Budget Proposals for 2015-16 continue the positive theme that has existed over the past two years for public education. As the economy has improved, and been aided by the additional \$7 billion in annual revenues provided by Proposition 30, Governor Brown has been able to advance his agenda with authority for public education. This is great news for Sacramento City Unified School District (SCUSD), especially since SCUSD has been in a budget reduction mode since the 2002-03 school year. In the past seven years, the district has reduced expenditures, enhanced revenues, or used one-time funds for a total of \$150 million dollars to maintain balanced budgets. FY 2014-15 is the first year in several years that SCUSD did not incur reductions, and the first time since FY 2007-08 that positive certification was presented to Sacramento County Office of Education.

The continuing shortfall of previous years was caused primarily by a reduction in state funding with contributing factors of increased employee costs and declining enrollment. California LEA's experienced a significant reduction in revenue limit dollars in that the revenue limit was up to a deficit of 22.272%. The Governor clearly acknowledged that the growth in education budget was warranted largely because of the fact that the cuts to education were much deeper than other areas of the State Budget. The Governor's effort to restore funding to public education is greatly appreciated.

Budget reductions have been made to all employee groups, supplies, services, utilities, and capital outlay. Decisions considered "away from the classroom" were made many years ago. Recent budget savings include increasing class sizes, reducing central office staff, the reduction or elimination of many Tier III programs such as Adult Education, Arts and Music block grant, deferred maintenance, reduced staffing at school sites, and the implementation of furlough days.

With the release of the Governor's Proposed Budget for the 2015-2016 fiscal year we are hopeful that we can continue the recovery process that SCUSD started in FY 2014-15, but because previous years cuts were so severe, it will take several years. Key points of the Governor's Budget are provided below:

- The proposed budget eliminates all remaining education funding deferrals. To be clear, while dollars used to finally eliminate the deferrals count toward Proposition 98 expenditures for the state's purposes, they do not initially provide more spending authority to schools.
- The Budget proposes a Proposition 98 guarantee of \$2.5 billion, or 4%, of additional funding allocated through the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), an average increase of \$306 perpupil over the level provided in 2014-15.

- Reminder: LCFF is designed to distribute additional funds to all school districts over time, but
 with particular emphasis on improving the level of support for English Learners, Foster Youth,
 and students in poverty. The implementation plan for LCFF continues to assume that it will be
 fully funded by 2020-21.
- The Department of Finance staff estimates that the additional funding proposed in the budget will eliminate 32.19% (compare to 20.68% at 1st interim) of the remaining gap between the 2015-2016 funding level and the LCFF funding target for each school district.
- The Governor's Budget Proposal includes more than \$1.1 billion in prior-year mandated cost reimbursement funds as discretionary one-time Proposition 98 funding to further investments in the implementation of Common Core. The allocation amounts to about \$180 per ADA (\$7 million for SCUSD).
- The Governor's budget includes \$500 million block grant for Adult Education. Programs serving
 the highest need populations will have priority to funds and Administrative costs will be limited
 to 5%.
- The Governor's Budget contains \$320.1 million for energy efficiency project grants from Proposition 39 for K-12 agencies (i.e., school districts, COEs, state specials schools, and charter schools).
- Budget proposes a cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) of 1.58% for categorical programs outside
 the LCFF, including Special Education, Child Nutrition, American Indian Education Centers, and
 the American Indian Early Childhood Education Program.
- Federal Education Programs have the same level of funding or small increases.
- Beginning with the 2015-16 fiscal year, school districts are once again required to contribute the minimum amount equal to or greater than 3% of the total General Fund expenditures towards Routine Restricted Maintenance.
- Employer costs for retirement benefits for both the California State Teachers' Retirement System (CalSTRS) and California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS) are projected to nearly double over the next several years.
 - o CalSTRS From 8.25% in 2013-14 to 19.1% in 2020-21
 - o CalPERS From 11.442% in 2013-14 to 20.4% in 2020-21
- No new funding to address the increased district costs for retirement and no new funding for transportation.
- Proposition 30 taxes are temporary:
 - o The .25% sales tax increase expires in 2016 (i.e., the 2016-17 fiscal year)
 - The personal income tax increase expires in 2018 (i.e., the 2018-19 fiscal year)

Overall, a very good State Budget for public education, funding is however only part of the equation. Declining enrollment, increased operating expenses and uncertain future state resources are the key issues facing the Sacramento City Unified School District. The development of future budgets will be influenced by external variables such as the State Budget and enrollment changes. Internal factors of compensation and number of employees must be commensurate with the number of students. Sacramento City Unified School District must be vigilant in monitoring all expenditures to avoid fiscal distress.

II. DRIVING GOVERNANCE:

- Education Code section 42130 requires the Superintendent to submit two Interim Reports to
 the Board of Education during each fiscal year. The first report shall cover the financial and
 budgetary status of the district for the period ending October 31. The second report shall cover
 the period ending January 31. All reports required shall be in a format or on forms prescribed
 by the Superintendent of Public Instruction.
- Education Code section 42131 requires the Board of Education to certify, in writing, whether
 the district is able to meet its financial obligations for the remainder of the fiscal year and,
 based on current forecasts, for the future fiscal year. Certifications shall be based on the
 Board's assessment of the district budget. Certifications shall be classified as positive, qualified
 or negative. This education code section also outlines the role of the County Office of
 Education.
- Education Code Sections 44919, 44951 and 44955 require school districts to provide notice on or before March 15th to certificated employees who are designated for layoff for the subsequent year. The final decision for layoff must occur before May 15th.
- Education Code Sections 45114, 45115, 45117, 45298 and 45308 require school districts to provide not less than 45 days' notice to classified employees of a layoff.
- Education Code section 42127 requires the Governing Board of each school district to adopt a
 budget on or before July 1. The budget to be adopted shall be prepared in accordance with
 Education Code section 42126. The adopted budget shall be submitted to the County Office of
 Education. The County Office of Education determines if the district will be able to meet its
 financial obligations during the fiscal year and ensures a financial plan that will enable the
 district to satisfy its multiyear financial commitments.

III. BUDGET:

Budget projections remain extremely fluid at this point in terms of the budget process. The Governor's Budget Proposals do not mark the end of the Budget cycle—they mark the beginning. The Legislature will have a lot to say about the Governor's priorities, especially with all the new revenues streaming in. This would be the third year in a row that the Governor has made public education his highest priority. In his press conference announcing his Budget, the Governor made the valid point that education took more than its fair share of reductions during the last recession. The Legislature will push for improvements in other areas of the Budget, as they did the last couple of years. The Governor will again be tested, but he has proven that he can stand his ground.

Staff attended the Budget Conference on January 15th and is still reviewing the details.

I. OVERVIEW / HISTORY

On November 6, 2012, the District received authorization, by more than fifty-five percent of the votes cast by eligible voters, to issue General Obligation bonds under two separate measures: Measure Q for \$346 million and Measure R for \$68 million.

Measure Q is to provide for the upgrading of classrooms; science labs; computer systems and technology; renovating heating and ventilation systems; improving student safety and security systems; and repairing roofs, restrooms, floors and plumbing.

Measure R is to provide for the repair of playgrounds and playfields to meet modern safety standards; the improvement of physical education facilities and restrooms; the removal of asbestos and lead paint; and the upgrading of kitchen facilities to improve children's nutrition.

Following the passage of Measures Q and R, the District conducted its first bond sales in the summer of 2013. \$43 million in Measure Q bonds were issued and \$27 million in Measure R bonds were issued. The \$70 million total is to fund projects for the two-year period, 2013-2014 through 2014-2015.

These initial projects were identified in late spring/early summer 2013, and are either complete or in various stages of planning and construction.

In order to keep project construction moving forward, additional bonds were scheduled to be issued this year. The size and timing of the bonds to be issued is dependent on a variety of factors, including the District's project priorities, estimated project costs, resulting expenditure schedules and assessed value in the district.

Measure Q and R projects are evaluated and prioritized using criteria from the Deferred Maintenance Plan and the Sustainable Facilities Master Plan. Each project is identified based on criteria outlined in each of the Plans and then prioritized based on the scoring. High priority projects that can be reasonably completed within the next 2-3 years are then considered as part of the Measure Q and R bond issuance plan.

The original bond issuance plan set forth in 2013 utilized conservative assumptions for estimating the amount of bonds that could be issued through 2019. With higher than assumed growth in assessed value in the District, more bonds can be issued over the next four to five years than originally anticipated. As such, the District's project implementation can be adjusted accordingly. Since assessed value and the economy in general will change from year-to-year likely resulting in modifications to any bond issuance plan, the District will continue to update information and monitor outside factors to ensure the overall success of the bond program.
