LCFF & LCAP	Vanessa Girard Director, Multilingual Literacy	 The needs assessment survey by the parents shows that they want to know more about LCFF and LCAP. The other top two topics were Common Core/new state testing and high school graduation requirements/ A-G university entrance requirements. They will be addressed at the March and May meetings, respectively. Just 2 years ago, school funding in California was totally different than now. The new formula is LCFF (Local Control Funding Formula) which has three parts: <u>Base</u>: Most 'general' – used for basic education purposes <u>Supplemental</u>: Allocated by numbers of students in 'target' subgroups such as Low Income, English Learner, and Foster Youth <u>Concentration</u>: Additional funding based on high number of 'target' students The positive thing about this new formula is that there's flexibility in how to spend the money. However, the flip side to that is, if a school does not have a parent group, the school might be using that money for areas that does not really support the population of students that needs it most. If you are going to receive this fund, you must have a local control and accountability plan (LCAP). Evidence must be provided to demonstrate how funding apportioned on the basis of the number and concentration of unduplicated pupils, pursuant to Education Code sections 2574, 2575, 422238.02, and 42238.03 is used to support such pupils. This funding shall be used to increase or improve services for unduplicated pupils. The LCAP is a 3 years plan that describes the goals, actions, services, and expenditures to support improved student outcomes that address state and local priorities. The LCAP is organized into three sections: Stakeholder Engagement Goals and Progress Indicators Actions, Services, and Expenditures The goals must keep the focus on expected outcomes for students. Progress indicators will show the outcomes sore time and adjustments can be ma
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			 Q: A parent asked that if parents are behind in knowing about LCAP, can they still provide input their thoughts and ideas to the plan? A: DELAC is not behind in providing input. It is part of a parallel process taking place with other parent/community meetings. All information gathered at DELAC is passed directly to the LCAP committee.
