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# Tax Crisis Threatens McClatchy Extracurriculars

Are you on a sports team, the yearbook, drama, marching band, speech and debate, or cheerleading? Are you in any classes with less than 40 students? Do you have a favorite teacher? Do you need to see your counselor? Then this directly affects you.

The expiration of a current tax in California is approaching. When the tax expires, our taxes will be lowered to what they were a few years ago.

Governor Jerry Brown has proposed to extend these taxes, but the California State Legislature is debating on whether or not to include the tax extension proposal on the ballot.

However, hopes for the extension to appear on the ballot are looking dim and if the taxes are not extended, many severe budget cuts will be imposed in addition to the cuts that have already been enacted.

If these taxes expire, many budget cuts will be directed at the public education system. Our school will suffer directly from this. We will lose 12 teachers, two administrators, and our on-site counselors.

The school board will also eliminate all co-curricular education programs.

These include all athletics as well as drama (the school play and musical,) the yearbook, the marching band, debate, and cheerleading. If a program requires extra pay from the district, it's going to be cut.

Many people agree with this and feel that the tax extension's unfairness is not worth its benefits.

At the school, however, many students are doing their part to stop the budget cuts that they don't want to see happen.

As mentioned earlier, many students wore pink to support the staff at our school.

Another thing that students are doing to help the school out is sending short letters on index cards to the state legislature to argue the importance of the tax extension.

We also hope for other schools to join in as well to stop the serious budget cuts. Until the potential
