Since this matter involves the reopening of particular articles of the CBA, and to allow the Board an opportunity to provide and receive comment, the District's initial proposal for amending the CBA is presented to the Board at this public meeting for a public reading. The District's initial proposal is also presented to the Board at this meeting for final approval and "sunshining."

The below initial proposal seeks to negotiate in good faith additions and changes to the CBA that will benefit students and employees and ensure the fiscally sustainable operation of the District in the short and long term. As such, and in light of the budget difficulties currently faced by the District, the District is seeking to "sunshine" its initial proposal and commence negotiations with SCTA.

Early Identification and Intervention System (EIIS): First Steps in Implementation November 15, 2018



Although early warning systems have been in existence for over twenty years, the notion of an early warning system is new in Sacramento. SCUSD is now making great strides forward unveiling its own early warning system, the Early Identification and Intervention System (EIIS). We know from the work of Robert Balfanz that positive attendance, behavior, and course performance (the ABCs) are predictors for high school graduation. We also know that as early as sixth grade, a student struggling in just one of these areas has his or her hope of graduating from high school reduced to a 15-25 % chance.

This is important because by tracking ABCs, it is possible to identify when a student begins to fall off track, providing time to intervene and alter his/her trajectory through school and beyond. By using ABC early indicator data, it is possible to design more targeted and effective interventions at the individual, classroom, school, and even district levels. It is the intent of every educator to identify students as soon as they begin to fall off-track. EIIS makes this possible. When paired with thoughtful business processes, EIIS helps school support teams give the right students, the right support, at exactly the right time.

SCUSD began developing an early warning system in the fall of 2017. A cross functional team came together to explore the creation of an early warning system specific to our District's needs. Initial efforts focused on creating business processes to guide the work as well as designing the technology that would be needed to power a robust and responsive early warning system. A steering team was assisted by an EIIS work team that addressed design and development matters through the spring and summer of 2018. In August of 2018, Student Support and Health Services began providing training to staff on use of the EIIS.

II. Driving Governance:

The overarching governance is the Equity, Access, and Social Justice Guiding Principle which states that *all students will have an equal opportunity to graduate with the greatest number of postsecondary choices from the widest array of options*. Early Warning System research identifies attendance, behavior, and course performance ---the ABCs--- as powerful predictors of high school completion. We know that the earlier a student first sends a signal indicating struggle in one of these areas, the greater the risk that he or she will drop out of school. Therefore, it is of critical importance to recognize these signals as soon as they become apparent. Recognizing the signals, however, is inadequate unless followed by appropriate intervention to help the student(s) regain on-track status.

III. Budget:

Funding for intervention is currently provided from a variety of sources. Although EIIS does not have a direct impact on the budget at this time, there is a need for increased dialogue regarding LCFF priorities in the LCAP as they relate to the needs identified by an early warning system. Given we know that low ABCs predict high school dropout, and high ABCs predict post-secondary success, there is a need for continued dialogue regarding the District's investment in intervention.

IV. Goals, Objectives and Measures:

The US Department of Education defines an early warning system as a system based on data to identify students who exhibit behavior or academic behavior that puts them at risk of dropping out of school. Early warning systems help districts and schools pinpoint student achievement patterns and school climate issues that may contribute to students dropping out.

Our goal for EIIS in SCUSD is to identify students as early as possible so support can be offered. This is the essence of social justice, and core to the work of the district's equity, access, social justice framework. This means creating conditions for success for all students, and providing effective interventions when students are not achieving their full potential. The sooner that we identify struggling students, the sooner we can change outcomes. This is more than increasing attendance or decreasing the behaviors that lead to suspension or expulsion. This is about empowering students to show up to school ready to learn and demonstrating grade level ready outcomes.

We understand that some schools have more resources than others when addressing students that show needs based on early warning indicators. That being said, all schools can do something, and EIIS provides real time data to monitor student progress and guide interventions. Depending on the level of available resources, the expectation is that school staff will not only identify student populations but take actions to change conditions in the present on their behalf. As the district's core value articulates, we know that the system is inequitable by design. The EIIS framework is meant to disrupt those inequities.

V. Major Initiatives:

Optimizing our equity, access and social justice theory of change and guiding principle "all students are given an equal opportunity to graduate with the greatest number of post-secondary choices from the widest array of options," the EIIS tool provides staff with real-time data to drive identification and intervention supports to students and their families.

An EIIS Work Group was convened in Winter-Summer 2018, consisting of district staff, school site principals, Student Support Center staff, and School Counselors. An implementation plan and business processes were developed for schools with varying levels of staffing support that identify the many ways referrals are submitted, who responds to the referral, how referrals are monitored, and available interventions.

For all school site teams, the EIIS tool allows schools to allocate existing resources to students in most need of intervention, as well as the ability to track the efficacy of those interventions over time. It is important to note that some elements in the district's Performance and Targeted Action index include the EIIS framework as sub-elements, including Third Grade Readiness, Middle School Readiness and High School Readiness.

EIIS training has been provided to the groups that follow:

- Student Support: During the Spring-Summer of 2018 a Student Support Database was created and embedded within the EIIS tool, allowing for tracking referrals, assessments, services, case notes, and dispositions for each student. Staff may use the pre-populated filters within the EIIS tool to identify students in need of Student Supports. Starting in the 18-19 school year, staff at 28 school sites with Student Support Centers, as well as our centralized Connect Center, are utilizing the EIIS tool and the Student Support Database.
- Principals: In October 2018, Principals at the 28 schools with Student Support Centers were trained on the EIIS business processes and the tool.
- School Counselors: The EIIS tool allows School Counselors to use pre-populated filters to identify students in need of School Counseling support. In October 2018 Middle School Counselors were trained in using the EIIS business process and tool.
- Attendance Staff: The EIIS tool generates real-time student lists and data for site Attendance Staff to inform their daily attendance practices and targeted interventions in a meaningful and effective way based on a student's attendance tier (color zone.) Once students have been identified through the EIIS Attendance Reports, site Attendance Staff will utilize the EIIS Attendance Staff Application to document and/or view:
 - Current needs (e.g. transportation, health, social/emotional concerns) impacting a student's attendance;
 - The date which an attendance intervention is implemented;
 - A chronological list of attendance interventions previously implemented and by whom;
 - Attendance related communication in the contact log that will be visible to all EIIS users to better coordinate services.

In October of 2018, our Be Here grant schools began training in EIIS.

• Attendance Teams: School site Attendance Teams can use the EIIS Attendance Reports to guide

their regular attendance meetings. In attendance meetings, an analysis of the detailed student level information allows for Attendance Teams to direct school-wide Tier 1 and Tier 2 practices intentionally based on current trends, patterns and identified gaps/needs. Also, Attendance Teams can better assess that referrals to the appropriate Student Support Services (Student Support Centers, Connect Center, School Counselors, etc.) have been made for students identified in Tier 2 and Tier 3. The EIIS tool allows for Attendance Teams to analyze the effectiveness of both schoolwide systems and individual student interventions in real time data. Training in EIIS for attendance teams also began in October of 2018.

VI. Results:

The EIIS system uses the colors green, yellow, red, and purple to help school teams better understand student attendance, behavior, and course performance profiles at any given time. For example, if a student displays green for attendance, behavior, and course performance, he/she:

- Has an attendance rate of 96% or higher
- Does not have any suspensions and less than 2 behavior incidents
- Is achieving at either the significantly on grade level or on grade level according to grades for the most recently completed term

VII. Lessons Learned/Next Steps:

Lessons Learned

- At risk students have always been in our system. We have gained a way to quickly identify them based on early warning system research. Specific and focused conversations about changing conditions in the present are now possible.
- Standardization of practice takes significant time and effort
- Technical process to input interventions in not simple
- Inequity concerns as they relate to needs and resources
- There is a great need to make the why clear if staff is to be enlisted
- Standard work processes improve consistency of services provided
- EIIS allows us to "see the system" and identify articulated measures of success
- Clear expectations regarding intended use is mission critical

Next steps

- Continued efforts to standardize work processes
- Provide training to sites not supported by Student Support Centers
- Continue to provide training to Attendance Staff
- Bring cross functional teams together to discuss trends, use of resources, impact of interventions

I. Overview/History of Department or Program

Developing SCUSD's graduates who are highly prepared to pursue continued educational opportunities and achieve to their potential is an urgent issue for the district. The district's Equity Access and Social Justice Guiding Principle calls for *ALL students to be given an equal opportunity to graduate with the greatest number of postsecondary choices from the widest array of options*. The distance between this goal and the current reality for far too many SCUSD's students is of grave concern.

The disparities in performance in markers such as English Language Arts and Math Achievement, Graduation, A-G and Suspensions are persistent among historically underperforming student groups including students with disabilities, English Learners, Foster Youth, and those who are homeless and socio-economically disadvantaged. This is also true when data on graduation rates are disaggregated by racial and ethnic categories and Latino/a, African American, Native American and certain Asian Pacific Islander groups, namely Hmong and Laotian are the lowest performing groups. However, among the district's diverse racial and ethnic groups, the under performance of African American/Black students on an array of measures is particularly acute especially when viewed in relationship to their percentage in the general population.

The district recognizes that the outcomes it is currently producing are because of the way the system is, and has historically been, designed. Our job is to ensure that Black students and their peers graduate high school ready for whatever they aspire to do next in life this requires that we vigilantly pursue strategies and take action to change the design of the system to support greater student achievement so that all students are able to achieve their personal dreams.

II. Driving Governance:

The overarching governance is the Equity, Access and Social Justice Guiding principle which states that all students will have an equal opportunity to graduate with the greatest number of postsecondary choices from the widest array of options.

From an inequity perspective, there is a comprehensive body of research that documents the factors contributing to the underperformance of Black youth and how it can be addressed (Ed Trust West, 2015, Council of the Great City School, 2013, Jobs for the Future, 2012). In the seminal report from The Education Trust West, *Black Minds Matter (2015)*, the authors note that among California's racially and ethnically diverse student groups, Black students are more likely to:

- Be suspended or expelled,
- Be taught by ineffective teachers,
- Be identified for special education, and

• Take remedial or non-credit bearing course work as college students

Conversely, the report concludes that Black students are least likely to:

- be placed in gifted and talented education programs
- have access to and be given a full sequence of college preparatory classes
- graduate high school in four years
- complete a college degree

These troubling conclusions are born out in SCUSD data on African American student access to opportunities and achievement. We are committed to disrupting the predictability and persistence of these outcomes within our system through a strategic and disciplined approach drawing on research and best practice, assessing and monitoring progress, and partnering with Black students, parents/guardians, and community leaders.

III. Budget:

The budget for this item is still to be determined and will take into consideration the district's current fiscal condition. Funding from grants and other external sources will be investigated and pursued.

IV. Goals, Objectives and Measures:

The district has developed and/or identified several measures to assess if its efforts to impact the academic achievement and social emotional well-being of African American and other underperforming student groups are resulting in improvements. Key indicators are comprised of both formative and summative measures and include, but are not limited to, progress towards and rates of grade level readiness, graduation, A-G completion as well as attendance, suspensions, and students sense of connectedness and safety.

V. Major Initiatives:

The district is currently pursuing a number of initiatives focused on closing opportunity and achievement gaps and addressing the needs of African American as well as other underperforming student groups. These include:

<u>Superintendent Meetings with Community Leaders</u> – During the 2017-18 school year Superintendent Aguilar convened two meetings with a group of Black leaders to listen to concerns and proposed strategies for addressing the needs of African American students. These leaders expressed overwhelming support and commitment and are ready to partner with the district to change the educational trajectory for SCUSD's African American students.

<u>Graduation Task Force and Recommendations</u> – Superintendent Aguilar convened a Graduation Taskforce during the 2017 -18 school year comprised of an array of stakeholders including students, site leaders, community members, and district staff. The taskforce met from

September -June and completed the task of developing a set of rigorous recommendations that will guide district policy and practice and lead to improvements in graduation rates where all students are fully prepared for any postsecondary option they may choose. It is important to note that the graduation taskforce called out the need for additional supports for a few at-risk student groups including African American, English Learner, Foster and Students with Disabilities.

Expanded Learning Summer Program (ELSP) – SCUSD hosted its first Expanded Learning Summer Program, a five to six-week summer program that targeted underperforming students in key grade levels (1st, 3rd, 6th, 8th and 9th -12th). The program also included enrichment opportunities for students in grades 7-8.

<u>Development of Data Infrastructure</u> – The district has developed a strong data infrastructure that will allow staff to monitor the progress of student groups disaggregated by race/ethnicity as well as program groups (i.e. Special Education, English Learner, Foster Youth, etc.).

<u>Work Teams</u> - Superintendent Aguilar has tasked staff with analyzing the district's current infrastructure and systems and to research best practice and identify an initial set of clear impact indicators in key areas impacting outcomes for African American students. These work teams will expand to include other stakeholder groups once initial analyses are complete.

- Grade Level Readiness
- Special Education
- SPSA (Site Planning Process)
- School Climate/Suspensions/Chronic Absenteeism
- Multi-Tiered System of Support

The focus of this presentation will be on the <u>African American Achievement Task Force</u> which kicked off on Thursday, September 27th. This taskforce is charged with recommending best practices to improve student learning outcomes for all African American students. The task force has been meeting weekly with a goal of presenting final recommendations to the board sometime during the Winter of 2019. Key task force actions have included:

- Review of SCUSD student outcome data
- Review of comparative district student outcome data
- Discuss long-term barriers to success and possible solutions
- Sponsor focus groups of:
 - o Principals
 - o Teachers
 - o Students
 - o Parents

The task force will be meeting throughout December to develop and finalize recommendations with the goal of receiving as much broad input as possible.

VI. Results:

Results for SCUSD's Black or African American students reveal a troubling trend in several areas previously mentioned. The results for these students are the lowest or one of the lowest performing racial/ethnic groups when data are disaggregated for this factor. Black or African American students in SCUSD have the:

- Lowest cohort graduation rate for federal ethnic and racial groups for three consecutive years. In 2016-17, the most recent year for which data are available, the cohort graduation rate for Black or African American students was the lowest at 70.3%.
- Second lowest A-G completion rate for federal ethnic and racial groups for three consecutive years. In 2016-17, the most recent year for which data are available, the A-G completion rate for Black or African American students was second lowest at 25.5%. Pacific Islander students had the lowest rate (24.5%) of all federal ethnic and racial groups.
- Lowest percentage of students who met or exceeded ELA and Math standards on the SBAC for three consecutive years. In 2017-18, the most recent year available, 22% and 13% of these students met or exceeded standards in ELA and Math, respectively.
- Third average lowest 2017-18 SAT School Day results in ELA and lowest in Math results of all federal ethnic and racial groups. Pacific Islander and American Indian or Alaska Native students have the second lowest and lowest SAT Math results, respectively.

VII. Lessons Learned/Next Steps:

It will take a combination of district staff, board leadership and community partners to ensure that all students have an equal opportunity to graduate with the greatest number of postsecondary choices from the widest array of options. Next steps towards this end include the following:

- Research training opportunities focused on implicit bias and trauma informed practice to begin with the governance team in order to set the direction for scaling across the district.
- Continue meaningful engagement with African American community leaders and convene a rapid-cycle task force to develop/review/prioritize a set of recommendations for improving outcomes
- Strengthen and improve district initiatives and monitor them intentionally for impact on African American students and their peers.

I. Overview/History of Department or Program

SCUSD commissioned the Council of the Great City Schools (CGCS) to review its special education structure, staffing, practices and services in the fall of 2016 due to a desire to improve upon existing services. The team from the CGCS conducted a comprehensive review and released a report outlining ten recommendations not only for the special education department, but for improvement across various departments within the system to impact the outcomes for students with disabilities. These recommendations were presented to the Board and staff presented an update in June 2017. In addition, Board presentations were delivered in May, 2018 and September, 2018 with further details regarding the implementation of the audit recommendations. This document outlines the additional actions taken by the district since the September, 2018 Board presentation to improve the services provided to students with disabilities and their families.

II. Driving Governance:

In SCUSD our goal is to provide quality instructional and support services to students with disabilities and their families so students are able to achieve to their potential. This is reflected in SCUSD Equity, Access, and Social Justice Guiding Principle which calls for all students to be given an equal opportunity to graduate with the greatest number of postsecondary choices from the widest array of options. To ensure that this guiding principle is true for students with special needs, a systemic approach is required that includes a supportive learning environment for students and families and well thought out instruction with accommodations for their unique learning needs.

In addition, students eligible for special education services are protected by a comprehensive set of federal and state laws. These laws set the foundations for the provision of special educations services by a Local Educational Agency (LEA). 34 CFR§ 300.101 states, "A free and appropriate public education must be available to all children residing in the State between the ages of 3 and 21, inclusive, including children with disabilities who have been suspended or expelled from school." California is organized into Special Education Local Plan Areas to provide a full continuum of services to eligible students with special needs. SCUSD is a single district SELPA. In addition, SCUSD must actively and systematically seek out all students with special needs, from birth to 21 years of age (EC 56300 and EC 56301).

III. Budget:

The budget that supports special education services is derived from multiple sources of federal, state and district funds. Realizing that the average cost to educate a student with an IEP is at least two times the cost of educating a student without special needs, the district contributes a significant amount of funds towards the delivery of services and transportation for the students. The 2018-2019 budget for special education is as follows:

IV. Goals, Objectives and Measures:

To continuously improve upon the services provided, the special education department has developed indicators within the district's Performance and Targeted Action Index (PTAI) that will be used to assess and monitor progress. The progress and academic performance of students will be measured and monitored by analyzing annual indicators including performance on the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) and the California Alternative Assessment (CAA).

Additional indicators to monitor progress on a more frequent basis have been developed. At the elementary, middle, and high school segments, five sub elements will be monitored specific to students receiving special education services. The elementary and middle school elements are:

- Grade Level On-Track Readiness tell us which students are meeting grade level readiness criteria.
- Grade Level Status Growth tells us which students are making growth towards meeting grade level criteria
- Suspension Rate tell us the rate that students are being suspended (in and out of school)
- Percent of Time in Least Restrictive Environment tell us how much time students are spending in less restrictive environments
- EIIS Red Zone Rate provides an early warning or indication of students who are struggling in academics, behavior, and attendance

The high school sub elements are:

- Graduation Rate On-Track Status tell us which students are on track to graduate criteria.
- Grade Level Status Growth tells us which students are making growth towards meeting grade level criteria
- A-G On-Track Status Grades 9-12 tell us which students are on track to meet A-G requirements
- 5th Year Graduation Rate

Academic Office/Special Education Department:

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• Percent of Time in Least Restrictive Environment - tell us how much time students are spending in less restrictive environments

The Special Education Operations sub elements are:

- Percentage of Students Receiving Special Education tells us how many students are receiving special education services
- Disproportionately Identified as Emotional Disturbance -tells us how many students are being over identified as having an Emotional Disturbance
- Social Emotional Well Being Students receiving special education reporting a bullying incident and have a developed safety plan with no recurrence of reports of bullying
- Percentage of IEPs that are Currently Late overdue by one or more days of legal timeline
- Students Attending School of Residence or School of Choice Students are able to attend school of residence or school of choice and services are available there to provide for their individualized learning needs

These indicators, as well additional related indicators provide real time data for District and school site staff to monitor frequently and will inform instructional and organizational shifts needed to improve the outcomes for students with disabilities.

V. Major Initiatives:

The district utilized a Theory of Action framework to assess existing practices and policies related to each of the ten recommendations and to develop draft plans. Using the Theory of Action allows each recommendation to be analyzed in a standardized way which includes the following considerations:

- 1. In understandable terms, what is the question(s) that each sequenced recommendation is asking that we find answer(s) to; what are sample indicators?
- 2. For each sequenced recommendation, identify applicable board policy(ies), or crafted sample language for the Board to consider adopting (the what of governance);
- 3. For each sequenced recommendation, explain whether we are currently able to record *and* access information to answer the question;
- 4. If not, explain the conditions or necessary steps we are taking/will take to be able to answer the question (e.g. requires development of a new database to track information, development of a standard work process, professional learning; and
- 5. Identify case studies to illustrate the challenges we face to answer Step 1 and what we are doing now or planning to do with detailed timelines and milestone completion dates that we will report back to the Board of Education/community

Below we provide a summary of the actions taken and progress made to date on those recommendations that have been the focus of our work since the previous update in September 2018.

<u>Recommendation 1:</u> Broad system-wide Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) Framework and Plan for Implementation and Oversight

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The district formed a MTSS work team in August 2018 comprised of a cross functional team of district and site administrators. The work team has met twice monthly to develop the Theory of Action for recommendation one. The team has drafted a set of indicators to be used to monitor and assess the impact of a mutli-tiered system of supports on student outcomes. These indicators include the following:

Student Outcomes: Academic Interventions

- <u>Grade Level Off Track Status -</u> How many students are receiving a 1/2, D/F and/or failing score at the end of the most recent marking period or assessment?
- <u>Intervention Status</u> How many students who are academically off track are receiving instructional interventions to meet their I learning needs?
- <u>Intervention Growth</u> How many students who participate in an intervention and make expected progress or growth?
- <u>Intervention Growth Retention</u> How many students who participate in an intervention continue to make progress/growth in the next grading period?
- <u>Grade Level on Track Status</u> How many students who received interventions are grade level ready?

Student Outcomes: Advanced Learning Interventions

- Achievement Status How many students who are eligible for GATE or are academically high achieving meet or exceed grade level readiness criteria/assessments?
- Accelerated/Advanced Learning Status How many students receive accelerated/advanced learning opportunities?
- Growth How many students who receive accelerated/advanced learning opportunities make progress or growth on grade level readiness criteria or assessments?
- Achievement Gap or Disproportionality How many students are underrepresented in the category of needing enrichment/advanced learning opportunities?

The team has also reviewed existing Board policy related to Student Study Teams and Acceleration and Retention given that the district does not currently have a specific MTSS policy. CSBA has developed a model policy for Response to Intervention (RtI) and the committee will review and revise it for MTSS.

To gather information on existing site practices related to academic interventions, the MTSS work team has drafted a survey to be administered to all school sites. Similarly, the School Climate and Suspension Work Team has developed a parallel survey to gather information about site practices related to reporting suspensions, approaches to building school climate, and methods for providing behavior related interventions and supports. The target date for administration is before sites leave for winter break.

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In addition, the Early Indicator and Intervention System (EIIS) developed for implementation in 2018-2019 is currently being deployed in schools that have students support centers. EIIS Impact Indicators have been developed to track student growth in attendance and behavior; and Process Indicators developed for triage assessments, individual mental health counseling, psychoeducational groups and supportive counseling/mentoring

<u>Recommendation 2:</u> Special Education Referral, Assessment and Eligibility - Improve consistency and appropriateness of referrals, assessments, and eligibility decisions.

The Special Education Department has continued to provide professional learning to all site administrators in the areas of eligibility, implementation of the IEP, monitoring and accountability for special education services on their site. To date learning sessions were provided on August 2 and September 26, 2018 and a session is scheduled each month for the remainder of the 2018-2019 school year. In addition, all central office certificated staff received professional learning on September 21, 2018 on the same topic areas. Finally, all Language, Speech and Hearing Specialists received professional learning on bilingual assessments on November 9, 2018.

The Special Education Work Team comprised of district and site administrators continues meeting monthly to review and give feedback on plans for the implementation of the audit recommendations and to troubleshoot any areas of implementation of specific recommendations as we move through the various action items to systematize our work.

On October 29th, the automated email notification for an Initial assessment 15-day timeline was implemented. After a strong and consistent collaboration with Technology Service, Case Managers, Principals and Parents now receive progress emails at 15 days, 7 days, 1 day and Overdue Notifications throughout the 15-day timeline until the parent eithers signs the Assessment Plan or rescinds the request for testing in writing. This collaboration with Technology Services and the school sites is also triggering internal data clean-up as an incidental benefit to this new practice. Additional notifications for other steps in the IEP process including 60-day timelines for initial and triennial assessments are planned at the beginning of February.

<u>Recommendation 3:</u> Academic Achievement and Social Emotional Well Being for Students with IEPs -Review and address relevant data pertaining to Academic Achievement and Social/Emotional Well Being for Students with IEPs

The District work team for School Climate/Suspension/Chronic Absenteeism continues to meet on a biweekly basis and as described under Recommendation #1 has developed a survey to gather information on site discipline practices and alternatives to suspension which will be distributed to site administrators prior to winter break.

Also, as presented at the last Board Meeting, all reports of bullying are now being entered into the student information system (Infinite Campus) with additional information on how issues were resolved.

This electronic reporting will assist staff to track data on instances of bullying and incidences of repeated bullying after a safety plan has been developed.

Finally, a curriculum review committee has been established in partnership with SCTA to review, pilot and adopt an intensive supplemental curriculum to use in reading intervention for students who are receiving special education resource services and continue to demonstrate difficulty learning to read well despite individualized specialized academic instruction. It is expected that materials will be piloted after winter break with an adoption recommendation to the Board in June, 2019.

Recommendations 4 & 9: (4)Interoffice Collaboration. With a representative group of principals, the IASs [Instructional Assistant Superintendents], the Deputy Superintendent, and the Chief Academic Officer, discuss the optimum configuration for principals to communicate with each other and central office leadership. Follow up based on these discussions. (9) Shared Accountability for Student Achievement. Consider actions that would strengthen the district's shared accountability for student achievement (e.g. state structure, Single Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA), Dashboard, Strategic Plan, Data, SCTA Collective Bargaining Agreement, Professional Learning, and Shared Accountability for Action) Use of data system and Special Education indicators

The monthly professional learning sessions for site principals continue, with a brief break in October, to provide ongoing learning opportunities for administrators to better support and oversee the special education services delivered on their sites. Feedback from participants has been very positive with comments, such as "I'm leaving with a much better understanding of what needs to happen at my site and my responsibility", "Excellent - very clear and helpful" and, "The presentation was highly engaging, clear and enjoyable."

The Special Education management team now has a standing meeting each week with the Chief Academic Officer and Instructional Assistant Superintendents. This meeting format has provided a vehicle for strong collaboration and just in time problem-solving for issues arising at sites such as staffing, student needs, and parent concerns. This also enables both groups to provide consistent messaging to sites regarding special education practices and issues.

<u>Recommendation 6:</u> School-Based Special Education Personnel. Ensure that personnel who support students with IEPs are employed in sufficient numbers, and are available to meet student needs.

The District continues to have vacancies in several of its classrooms that serves students with Autism. Despite multiple postings, there have not been a sufficient candidate pool to staff these classes and they remain staffed with a substitute. The positions will continue to be posted until filled. To address this need, the District has applied for a state sponsored Local Solutions Grant which, if funded, could provide the District with needed resources to build capacity for recruitment both in and out of state and a

professional learning and support structure using existing staff after the teachers are hired to ensure that they are supported throughout their first year or two of teaching in SCUSD.

<u>Recommendation 7:</u> Compliance Support and Access to Information. Consider actions to improve compliance and access to student special education records (e.g. procedure manual, SCUSD/SCTA Collective Bargaining Agreement, webpage, dispute resolution, special education records).

The District continues to monitor changes to reporting structures at the state level. There are significant changes coming for data reporting for students receiving special education services. The project is being phased in throughout the next year. The system currently used solely for special education data reporting will be merged into the current CALPADS system and additional data collection will be added over time. This conversion will require continued strong collaboration between the Special Education Department and Technology Services.

The Community Advisory Committee has been reconstituted. Meetings were held on September 25 and October 17, 2018. Attendees that applied for membership and attended their second meeting in October were granted membership. There are now 17 new members with additional possible members added as soon as they fulfill the two meeting attendance requirement. Attendance has ranged between 30-40 parents at each meeting. In addition, the group accepted nominations for Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary, and Members-at-Large. Elections are planned for the November 29, 2018 meeting. Once the Executive Committee is elected, the Special Education Department will meet with the group to review current meeting structure, topics and support, and make changes to the current structure as needed.

V. Results:

The district continues to refine the plans for implementing the CGCS recommendations through a focus on a clear Theory if Action and the Equity, Access and Social Justice Guiding Principle. In addition, the comprehensive reviews completed by CDE provided valuable information regarding disproportionality, IEP compliance, comprehensive assessments and delivering services in the least restrictive environment. This change work is comprehensive and will be implemented over time.

VI. Lessons Learned/Next Steps:

The district will continue to draw on the recommendations in the CGCS report to make improvements to special education services as well as to other departments within the organization that impact these services. Lessons learned and next steps include:

- Building the Theory of Action is an on-going process and as feedback is received, revisions are made.
- Greater communication and transparency about the initiatives and work under way to improve the system and their relationship to the CGCSs recommendations is needed.
- Cross disciplinary work teams provide multiple perspectives and builds stronger working relationships to engage in the continuous cycles of improvement

Academic Office/Special Education Department:

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- Systems and processes for regular reporting on the progress and performance of students with disabilities is an important first step, however dedicated time for data analysis and progress monitoring is vital
- Rebuilding the CAC has been a positive step to have this group be a key change agent in the communication and implementation of these plans going forward

Next Steps

- Continue to gather feedback and input about the Theory of Actions from CAC and other stakeholders
- Establish consistent periods for staff to review and analyze data to inform improvements
- Identify key points in the school year to report to the Board on the progress of students with disabilities on the key indicators that have been identified
- Develop related indicators and a process for gathering data on stakeholder satisfaction with the services of the special education department, including a schedule of communication to families regarding special education updates and the implementation of the audit recommendations
- Continue to refine the communication protocol with Instructional Assistant Superintendents to assist sites in providing quality services to their students with disabilities
- Construct a plan for the development and gradual implementation of Learning Centers to return students to their home schools
- Continue to collaborate on culture and climate initiatives on SEL, Bullying prevention, and Restorative Practices.



SERVICES AGREEMENT

Date: November 1, 2018

Place: Sacramento, California

Parties: Sacramento City Unified School District, a political subdivision of the State of California, (hereinafter referred to as the "District"); and Conditions for Learning (hereinafter referred to as "Contractor").

Recitals:

A. The District is a public school district in the County of Sacramento, State of California, and has its administrative offices located at the Serna Center, 5735 47th Avenue, Sacramento, CA 95824.

B. The District desires to engage the services of the Contractor and to have said Contractor render services on the terms and conditions provided in this Agreement.

C. California Government Code Section 53060 authorizes a public school district to contract with and employ any persons to furnish to the District, services and advice in financial, economic, accounting, engineering, legal, or administrative matters if such persons are specially trained, experienced and competent to perform the required services, provided such contract is approved or ratified by the governing board of the school district. Said section further authorizes the District to pay from any available funds such compensation to such persons as it deems proper for the services rendered, as set forth in the contract.

D. The Contractor is specially trained, experienced and competent to perform the services required by the District, and such services are needed on a limited basis.

In consideration of the mutual promises contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1. SERVICES.

The Contractor hereby agrees to provide to the District the services as described below ("Services") at Leataata Floyd Elementary School.

- Support job embedded grade level curriculum planning, in-class coaching, and student work analysis through the utilization of Professional Learning Community collaboration practices.
- Develop instruction and curriculum in language arts, science and social studies that captures student interest and motivates and challenges each child, regardless of ability level, to higher achievement.
- Support instruction through Lesson Design/Delivery, Formative Assessment and Differentiation.
- Develop inventive thinking, adaptability, managing complexity and self-direction (21st Century Skills) through structuring interaction and project-based learning.



- Support educators in developing in-class literacy interventions and supports through formative assessment – words their way, monthly writing samples, literature circles, guided reading and reciprocal teaching.
- Promote English language acquisition and development through academic vocabulary instruction and authentic exhibitions/presentations – through units of study and projectbased learning.

ARTICLE 2. TERM.

This Agreement shall commence on July 1, 2018, and continue June 30, 2019, unless sooner terminated, as set forth in Article 10 of this Agreement, provided all services under this Agreement are performed in a manner that satisfies both the needs and reasonable expectations of the District. The determination of a satisfactory performance shall be in the sole judgment and discretion of the District in light of applicable industry standards, if applicable. The term may be extended by mutual consent of the parties on the same terms and conditions by a mutually executed addendum.

ARTICLE 3. PAYMENT.

District agrees to pay Contractor for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this Agreement as follows:

<u>Flat Rate:</u> The total payment to Contractor, including travel and other expenses, shall be Ninety-Five Thousand Dollars (\$95,000).

Payment shall be made within 30 days upon submission of periodic invoice(s) to the attention of Eric Chapman, Principal, Leataata Floyd Elementary School, 401 McClatchy Way, Sacramento, CA 95818.

ARTICLE 4. EQUIPMENT AND FACILITIES.

District will provide Contractor with access to all needed records and materials during normal business hours upon reasonable notice. However, District shall not be responsible for nor will it be required to provide personnel to accomplish the duties and obligations of Contractor under this Agreement. Contractor will provide all other necessary equipment and facilities to render the services pursuant to this Agreement.

ARTICLE 5. WORKS FOR HIRE/COPYRIGHT/TRADEMARK/PATENT

The Contractor understands and agrees that all matters specifically produced under this Agreement that contain no intellectual property or other protected works owned by Contractor shall be works for hire and shall become the sole property of the District and cannot be used without the District's express written permission. The District shall have the right, title and interest in said matters, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark and/or patent of said matter in the name of the District. The Contractor consents to the use of the Contractor's name in conjunction with the sale, use, performance and distribution of the matters, for any purpose in any medium.

As to those matters specifically produced under this Agreement that are composed of intellectual property or other protected works, Contractor must clearly identify to the District those protected elements included in the completed work. The remainder of the intellectual property of such completed works shall be deemed the sole property of the District. The completed works that



include both elements of Contractor's protected works and the District's protected works, shall be subject to a mutual non-exclusive license agreement that permits either party to utilize the completed work in a manner consistent with this Agreement including the sale, use, performance and distribution of the matters, for any purpose in any medium.

ARTICLE 6. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR.

Contractor's relationship to the District under this Agreement shall be one of an independent contractor. The Contractor and all of their employees shall not be employees or agents of the District and are not entitled to participate in any District pension plans, retirement, health and welfare programs, or any similar programs or benefits, as a result of this Agreement.

The Contractor and their employees or agents rendering services under this agreement shall not be employees of the District for federal or state tax purposes, or for any other purpose. The Contractor acknowledges and agrees that it is the sole responsibility of the Contractor to report as income its compensation from the District and to make the requisite tax filings and payments to the appropriate federal, state, and/or local tax authorities. No part of the Contractor's compensation shall be subject to withholding by the District for the payment of social security, unemployment, or disability insurance, or any other similar state or federal tax obligation.

The Contractor agrees to defend, indemnify and hold the District harmless from any and all claims, losses, liabilities, or damages arising from any contention by a third party that an employer-employee relationship exists by reason of this Agreement.

The District assumes no liability for workers' compensation or liability for loss, damage or injury to persons or property during or relating to the performance of services under this Agreement.

ARTICLE 7. FINGERPRINTING REQUIREMENTS.

Contractor agrees that any employee it provides to the District shall be subject to the fingerprinting and TB requirements set forth in the California Education Code. Pursuant to Education Code §45125.1, Contractor shall certify in writing to the District that neither the employer nor any of its employees who are required to have their fingerprints submitted to the Department of Justice (DOJ), and who may come in contact with pupils, have been convicted of a felony as defined in §45122.1.

Contractor will provide a complete list to the District of all employees cleared by the DOJ who will provide services under this Agreement (or MOU). Contractor shall obtain subsequent arrest service from DOJ for ongoing notification regarding an individual whose fingerprints were submitted pursuant to §45125.1. Upon receipt of such a subsequent arrest notification from DOJ, Contractor shall, within 24 hours, notify the District of such a subsequent arrest notification. If an employee is disqualified from working for the District pursuant to the requirements of the California Education Code, Contractor agrees to provide a replacement employee within 15 days of receiving notification that the previous employee has been disqualified. Failure to adhere to the terms of this provision is grounds for termination of the Agreement.

ARTICLE 8. MUTUAL INDEMNIFICATION.

Each of the Parties shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the other Party, its officers, agents and employees from any and all claims, liabilities and costs, for any damages, sickness, death, or injury to person(s) or property, including payment of reasonable attorney's fees, and including



without limitation all consequential damages, from any cause whatsoever, arising directly or indirectly from or connected with the operations or services performed under this Agreement, caused in whole or in part by the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of the Parties or its agents, employees or subcontractors.

It is the intention of the Parties, where fault is determined to have been contributory, principles of comparative fault will be followed and each Party shall bear the proportionate cost of any damage attributable to fault of that Party. It is further understood and agreed that such indemnification will survive the termination of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 9. INSURANCE.

Prior to commencement of services and during the life of this Agreement, Contractor shall provide the District with a certificate of insurance reflecting its comprehensive general liability insurance coverage in a sum not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence naming District as an additional insured. Such insurance as is afforded by this policy shall be primary, and any insurance carried by District shall be excess and noncontributory. If insurance is not kept in force during the entire term of the Agreement, District may procure the necessary insurance and pay the premium therefore, and the premium shall be paid by the Contractor to the District.

ARTICLE 10. TERMINATION.

The District may terminate this Agreement without cause upon giving the Contractor thirty days written notice. Notice shall be deemed given when received by Contractor, or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.

The District may terminate this Agreement with cause upon written notice of intention to terminate for cause. A Termination for Cause shall include: (a) material violation of this Agreement by the Contractor; (b) any act by the Contractor exposing the District to liability to others for personal injury or property damage; or (c) the Contractor confirms its insolvency or is adjudged a bankrupt; Contractor makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors, or a receiver is appointed on account of the Contractor's insolvency.

Ten (10) calendar days after service of such notice, the condition or violation shall cease, or satisfactory arrangements for the correction thereof be made, or this Agreement shall cease and terminate. In the event of such termination, the District may secure the required services from another contractor. If the cost to the District exceeds the cost of providing the service pursuant to this Agreement, the excess cost shall be charged to and collected from the Contractor. The foregoing provisions are in addition to and not a limitation of any other rights or remedies available to the District. Written notice by the District shall be deemed given when received by the other party or no later than three days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner.

ARTICLE 11. ASSIGNMENT.

This Agreement is for personal services to be performed by the Contractor. Neither this Agreement nor any duties or obligations to be performed under this Agreement shall be assigned without the prior written consent of the District, which shall not be unreasonably withheld. In the event of an assignment to which the District has consented, the assignee or his/her or its legal representative shall agree in writing with the District to personally assume, perform, and be bound by the covenants, obligations, and agreements contained in this Agreement.



ARTICLE 12. NOTICES.

Any notices, requests, demand or other communication required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given on the date of service if served personally on the party to whom notice is to be given, or on the third day after mailing if mailed to the party to whom notice is to be given, by first class mail, registered or certified, postage prepaid, or on the day after dispatching by Federal Express or another overnight delivery service, and properly addressed as follows:

ARTICLE 13. ENTIRE AGREEMENT.

This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties and supersedes all prior understanding between them with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement. There are no promises, terms, conditions or obligations, oral or written, between or among the parties relating to the subject matter of this Agreement that are not fully expressed in this Agreement. This Agreement may not be modified, changed, supplemented or terminated, nor may any obligations under this Agreement be waived, except by written instrument signed by the party to be otherwise expressly permitted in this Agreement.

ARTICLE 14. CONFLICT OF INTEREST.

The Contractor shall abide by and be subject to all applicable District policies, regulations, statutes or other laws regarding conflict of interest. Contractor shall not hire any officer or employee of the District to perform any service covered by this Agreement. If the work is to be performed in connection with a Federal contract or grant, Contractor shall not hire any employee of the United States government to perform any service covered by this Agreement.

Contractor affirms to the best of their knowledge, there exists no actual or potential conflict of interest between Contractor's family, business or financial interest and the services provided under this Agreement. In the event of a change in either private interest or services under this Agreement, any question regarding possible conflict of interest which may arise as a result of such change will be brought to the District's attention in writing.

ARTICLE 15. NONDISCRIMINATION.

It is the policy of the District that in connection with all services performed under contract, there will be no discrimination against any prospective or active employee engaged in the work because of race, color, ancestry, national origin, handicap, religious creed, sex, age or marital status. Contractor agrees to comply with applicable federal and California laws including, but not limited to, the California Fair Employment and Housing Act.

ARTICLE 16. SEVERABILITY.

Should any term or provision of this Agreement be determined to be illegal or in conflict with any law of the State of California, the validity of the remaining portions or provisions shall not be affected thereby. Each term or provision of this Agreement shall be valid and be enforced as written to the full extent permitted by law.



ARTICLE 17. RULES AND REGULATIONS.

All rules and regulations of the District's Board of Education and all federal, state and local laws, ordinance and regulations are to be strictly observed by the Contractor pursuant to this Agreement. Any rule, regulation or law required to be contained in this Agreement shall be deemed to be incorporated herein.

ARTICLE 18. APPLICABLE LAW/VENUE.

This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California. If any action is instituted to enforce or interpret this Agreement, venue shall only be in the appropriate state or federal court having venue over matters arising in Sacramento County, California, provided that nothing in this Agreement shall constitute a waiver of immunity to suit by the District.

- 7. Provide requested materials for participants (e.g., Teacher's Edition).

C. Fiscal: School agrees to pay SCOE \$116,600 within 60 days of invoicing.

D. General Provisions

- 1. <u>Indemnity</u>. Each party agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless each of the other parties (including a party's directors, agents, officers and employees), from any claim, action, or proceeding arising from any actual or alleged act or omissions of the indemnifying party, its director, agents, officers, or employees arising from the indemnifying party's duties and obligations described in this agreement or imposed by law.
 - a. It is the intention of the parties that this section imposes on each party responsibility to the others for the acts and omissions of their respective elected and appointed officials, employees, representatives, agents, subcontractors and volunteers, and that the provisions of comparative fault shall apply. This provision shall survive the termination of this agreement for any claim related to this agreement.
- 2. <u>Independent Agents.</u> This MOU is by and between independent agents and does not create the relationship of agent, servant, employee, partnership, joint venture and/or association between the independent agents.
- 3. <u>Nondiscrimination</u>. Any service provided by the parties pursuant to this Agreement shall be without discrimination based on the actual or perceived race, religious creed, color, national origin, nationality, immigration status, ethnicity, ethnic group identification, ancestry, age, marital status, pregnancy, physical or mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, gender, gender identity, gender expression, sex, or sexual orientation, in accordance with all applicable Federal and State laws and regulations.
- 4. <u>Insurance.</u> All parties shall maintain in full force Commercial Liability Insurance with limits of no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence. Such requirement may be satisfied by coverage through a joint powers authority. Evidence of insurance coverage shall be furnished upon request by a party to this agreement.

5. <u>Entire Agreement.</u> This MOU constitutes the entire agreement and understanding of the parties. All prior understandings, terms or conditions are deemed merged into this MOU. Any changes to this MOU must be agreed to in writing by all parties.

The undersigned represent that they are authorized representatives of the parties and hereby execute this MOU. This MOU may be executed in counterparts each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same document. Photographic copies of the signed counterparts may be used in lieu of the originals for any purpose.

<u>Recommendation</u>: Approve SchoolsFirst as the District's Third Party Administrator (TPA) for 403b and 457 Plans.

Background/Rationale: In July 2018, the District began the selection process for a new TPA. This process began with a Request for Proposals (RFP) that was advertised in the Daily Recorder on July 16, 2018 and July 23, 2018. Proposals were due August 1, 2018. The District received six responses that were then reviewed and scored a panel of 4 District staff using criteria set out in the RFP: Qualifications, Performance Standards, Reporting/Compliance, Fee Structure and Completeness/Quality of Proposal.

The 3 top scoring firms were invited for presentations/interviews. This Tier II evaluation was scored by 6 district staff using these criteria: Overall Presentation, Fee Structure, Implementation Strategy, Online Portal (capability, ease of use, etc.), and Overall Interview. The firms were all asked the same interview questions.

Staff recommends to award to the firm that scored the highest through both tiers of evaluation, SchoolsFirst Federal Credit Union.

Two minor revisions are required by the biannual FPM audit of our Uniform Complaint Procedures ("UCP") Policy. First, the federal "Career Technical Education" program and the Every Student Succeeds Act/No Child Left Behind laws are added to the list of programs applicable to the UCP. Second, the revisions clarify that If the district finds merit in the complaint, the remedy shall go to the affected pupil in the case of complaints regarding: course periods without Educational Content, Reasonable accommodations to a Lactating Pupil, and/or Education of Pupils in Foster Care, Pupils who are Homeless, former Juvenile Court Pupils now enrolled in our school district, and pupils in military families.

Uniform Complaint Procedures

BP 1312.3 Community Relations

The Governing Board recognizes that the district has the primary responsibility to ensure compliance with applicable state and federal laws and regulations governing educational programs. The Board encourages early resolution of complaints whenever possible. To resolve complaints which may require a more formal process, the Board adopts the uniform system of complaint processes specified in 5 CCR 4600-4670 and the accompanying administrative regulation.

The district's uniform complaint procedures (UCP) shall be used to investigate and resolve the following complaints:

1. Any complaint alleging district violation of applicable state or federal law or regulations governing adult education programs, after school education and safety programs, agricultural vocational education, American Indian education centers and early childhood education program assessments, bilingual education, peer assistance and review programs for teachers-, <u>career</u> technical education, career technical and technical education and training programs, child care and development programs, child nutrition programs, consolidated categorical aid programs, compensatory education, Economic Impact Aid, English learner programs, federal education programs in Title I-VII, migrant education, Regional Occupational Centers and Programs, school safety plans, special education programs, State Preschool Programs, Tobacco-Use Prevention Education programs, the Every Student Succeeds Act/No Child Left Behind, and any other district-implemented program which is listed in Education Code 64000(a).

Any complaint alleging the occurrence of unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying) against any student, employee, or other person participating in district programs and activities, including, but not limited to, those programs or activities funded directly by or that receive or benefit from any state financial assistance, based on the person's actual or perceived characteristics of race or ethnicity, color, ancestry, nationality, national origin, immigration status, ethnic group identification, age,

religion, marital status, pregnancy, parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, gender expression, or genetic information, or any other characteristic identified in Education Code 200 or 220, Government Code 11135, or Penal Code 422.55, or based on his/her association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics (5 CCR 4610)

5. Any complaint alleging district noncompliance with legal requirements related to the implementation of the local control and accountability plan (Education Code 52075)

If the district finds merit<u>in the complaint, the in pupil fees, LCAP, and/or a Course Period</u>without Educational Content complaint, the district shall provide a remedy.<u>remedy shall go to</u>the affected pupil in the case of complaints regarding: course periods without Educational Content, Reasonable accommodations to a Lactating Pupil, and/or Education of Pupils in Foster Care, Pupils who are Homeless, former Juvenile Court Pupils now enrolled in our school district, and pupils in military families. <u>Specifically</u>, in Course Period without Education Content the remedy shall go to the affected pupil. In LCAP and pupil fee complaints, the remedy shall go to all affected pupils, parents and guardians, which in the case of pupil fees, also includes reasonable efforts by the district to ensure full reimbursement to all affected pupils, parents and guardians subject to procedures established through regulations adopted by the Board.

6. Any complaint, by or on behalf of any student who is a foster youth, alleging district noncompliance with any legal requirement applicable to the student regarding placement decisions, the responsibilities of the district's educational liaison to the student, the award of credit for coursework satisfactorily completed in another school or district, school transfer, or the grant of an exemption from Board-imposed graduation requirements (Education Code 48853, 48853.5, 49069.5, 51225.1, 51225.2)

7. Any complaint, by or on behalf of a homeless student as defined in 42 USC 11434a, a former juvenile court school student, or a child of a military family as defined in Education Code

49701 who transfers into the district after his/her second year of high school, alleging district noncompliance with any requirement applicable to the student regarding the award of credit for coursework satisfactorily completed in another school or district or the grant of an exemption from Board-imposed graduation requirements (Education Code 51225.1, 51225.2)

8. Any complaint alleging district noncompliance with the requirements of Education Code 51228.1 and 51228.2 that prohibit the assignment of a student in grades 9-12 to a course without educational content for more than one week in any semester or to a course the student has previously satisfactorily completed, without meeting specified conditions (Education Code 51228.3)

9. Any complaint alleging district noncompliance with the physical education instructional minutes requirement for students in elementary school –(Education Code 51210, 51223)

10. Any complaint alleging retaliation against a complainant or other participant in the complaint process or anyone who has acted to uncover or report a violation subject to this policy

11. Any other complaint as specified in a district policy

The Board recognizes that alternative dispute resolution (ADR) can, depending on the nature of the allegations, offer a process to reach a resolution to the complaint that is acceptable to all parties. ADR such as mediation may be offered to resolve complaints that involve more than one student and no adult. However, mediation shall not be offered or used to resolve any complaint involving sexual assault or where there is a reasonable risk that a party to the mediation would feel compelled to participate. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the use of ADR is consistent with state and federal laws and regulations.

The district shall protect all complainants from retaliation. In investigating complaints, the confidentiality of the parties involved shall be protected as required by law. As appropriate for any complaint alleging retaliation or unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying), the Superintendent or designee shall keep confidential the identity of the complainant and/or the subject of the complaint if he/she is different from the complainant, as long as the integrity of the complaint process is maintained.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide training to district staff to ensure awareness and knowledge of current law and related requirements, including the steps and timelines specified in this policy and the accompanying administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain records of all UCP complaints and the investigations of those complaints in accordance with applicable law and district policy.

Non-UCP Complaints

The following complaints shall not be subject to the district's UCP but shall be referred to the specified agency: (5 CCR 4611)

1. Any complaint alleging child abuse or neglect shall be referred to the County Department of Social Services, the County Protective Services Division, and the appropriate law enforcement agency.

2. Any complaint alleging health and safety violations by a child development program shall, for licensed facilities, be referred to Department of Social Services and shall, for licensing-exempt facilities, be referred to the appropriate Child Development regional administrator.

3. Any complaint alleging fraud shall be referred to the California Department of Education.

Any complaint alleging employment discrimination or harassment shall be investigated and resolved by the district in accordance with the procedures specified in AR 4030 - Nondiscrimination in Employment.

In addition, the district's Williams Uniform Complaint Procedures, AR 1312.4, shall be used to investigate and resolve any complaint related to sufficiency of textbooks or instructional materials, emergency or urgent facilities conditions that pose a threat to the health or safety of students or staff, or teacher vacancies and misassignments. The Board recognizes that alternative dispute resolution (ADR) can, depending on the nature of the allegations, offer a process to reach a resolution to the complaint that is acceptable to all parties. ADR such as mediation may be offered to resolve complaints that involve more than one student and no adult. However, mediation shall not be offered or used to resolve any complaint involving sexual assault or where there is a reasonable risk that a party to the mediation would feel compelled to participate. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the use of ADR is consistent with state and federal laws and regulations.

The district shall protect all complainants from retaliation. In investigating complaints, the confidentiality of the parties involved shall be protected as required by law. As appropriate for any complaint alleging retaliation or unlawful discrimination (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying), the Superintendent or designee shall keep confidential the identity of the complainant and/or the subject of the complaint if he/she is different from the complainant, as long as the integrity of the complaint process is maintained.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide training to district staff to ensure awareness and knowledge of current law and related requirements, including the steps and timelines specified in this policy and the accompanying administrative regulation.

3. Any complaint alleging fraud shall be referred to the California Department of Education.

Any complaint alleging employment discrimination or harassment shall be investigated and resolved by the district in accordance with the procedures specified in AR 4030 - Nondiscrimination in Employment.

In addition, the district's Williams Uniform Complaint Procedures, AR 1312.4, shall be used to investigate and resolve any complaint related to sufficiency of textbooks or instructional materials, emergency or urgent facilities conditions that pose a threat to the health or safety of students or staff, or teacher vacancies and misassignments. - **Suspension Incidents:** Total count of ALL suspension incidents off campus and on campus issued from the beginning of school through the report month at the selected entity for the selected population.
