Theodore Elementary School's Vision and Mission Statement

Our mission at Theodore Judah Elementary School is to promote confidence and responsibility in our students through an enriched and engaging approach to teaching the core curriculum. The staff works together with our community partners to create an environment where people feel valued and safe so that each student can develop the skills to access core curriculum and to meet grade level standards. Our emphasis on problem solving, critical thinking, strong communications skills and appreciation for diversity provides all of our students an avenue for success in the 21st century.

Theodore Judah Elementary has been a neighborhood tradition since 1927. On the registry of historic places, this neighborhood school values each student as an individual and welcomes parent involvement. The school supports student academic achievement in all core content areas (i.e. English Language Arts, Math, Social Studies, Science, Physical Education) through a rigorous curriculum based on the Common Core State Standards, which is taught by experienced teachers. By incorporating teaching techniques and strategies designed to engage all students and to promote lifelong learning, all students are held to high standards, and GATE curriculum is embedded in instruction for all classes in grades 2-6. Staff monitors student academic progress during collaborative planning time and academic conferences. This data is used to focus staff professional development, and to provide data to support instructional planning during teacher collaboration sessions. Staff also uses this data to inform supplemental academic student support services, as needed. All students have access to the library and computers. To support proper school readiness and for our youngest learners, Theodore Judah provides Early Kindergarten. This class provides a strong academic and social foundation for kindergarten success.

Our community believes in educating the whole child, and through our strong partnership with our Parent Teacher Association (PTA), we offer the "Alive!" enrichment programs for all students during the school day. Students receive instruction weekly in Music and bi-weekly in Art. Students are also further enriched weekly through our Garden and Science Alive! program, which is complementary to our standards-based science instruction. Students engage in leadership opportunities by participating in our Green Team, and they lead the way in teaching others about recycling, waste reduction and environmental stewardship. We also have a wide variety of after school programs (e.g. TJ Times Student Newspaper, Girls on the Run, Coding) to extend and enrich the learning day. Underpinning our learning is a culture built on our school agreements and values: Be Safe, Be Respectful, Be Responsible, Be Kind, Be Learners. This emphasis on Social Emotional learning is supported by Sanford Harmony's evidence-based curriculum and Theodore Judah's own Project Kindness. The latter is sustained and promoted by the Judah PTA, parents, and teachers to infuse messages and acts of kindness into our school and our community. Volunteers

each month present lessons go into every classroom once a month and provide a discussion and an activity to help the students think about and apply the kindness character values such as gratitude, perspective and empathy to their classroom, the playground, and the greater community.

2022-23 Quality, Currency, Availability of Textbooks and Other Instructional Materials

To realize the vision of Sacramento City Unified School District, which is to fully prepare all students for college and career, it is imperative that the district provides numerous opportunities to expand the professional repertoire of its administrators and teachers. To that end, the district has crafted a high quality professional learning program that is focused on Literacy (including ELA Common Core Standards), English Language Learners, Mathematics, Science, Physical Education and Visual and Performing Arts. Since the onset of Distance Learning in the Spring of 2020, we have provided all teachers and administrators with professional learning on Universal Design for Learning, and the professional learning we have made available is geared to distance learning. The learning opportunities afforded through this program deeply align with the needs of our individual schools, as well as our Local Control Accountability Plan, and connect to every aspect of school practice: thinking curriculum, intentional instructional practices, assessment for learning, and lesson design. Professional learning opportunities are offered during school hours and outside of contracted hours. In addition to on-site coaching and regular professional learning opportunities, a designated collaborative Thursday time provides the opportunity for teachers to engage in collaborative professional learning at their respective schools focusing on deepening their content knowledge, strengthening their instructional repertoire, improving their assessment strategies, and fostering a shared sense of responsibility.

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

Theodore Judah Elementary School, built in 1962, received Facility Inspection Tool (FIT) overall repair rating score of “good” from its most recent facility inspection in May 2018. The district governing Board has adopted cleanliness standards for all district schools to ensure that all schools are clean, safe and functional. The district Operations Department takes great pride following a work order process that provides efficient and timely services to all the sites. The principal works directly with the site custodial staff to develop cleaning schedules to ensure that the school is clean and safe.

The passage of Measure Q, the district’s 2012 general obligation bond, provided facility upgrade funding to all district schools. The district performed Quick Strike projects during the summer of 2014, which allowed schools to pick from one of the following improvements: 1) marquees, 2) closed-circuit television (CCTV) surveillance, 3) exterior painting, or 4) seal coating and striping of parking lots or playgrounds. Fire alarms at all the district schools were upgraded. Additional 10 million dollars have been allocated for safety and security upgrades, which are expected to begin in 2019.

Funding from the federal government through Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC) provided for technology infrastructure improvements to the district’s wireless connectivity. The improvements, which are expected to be completed by the end of 2019, will increase classroom internet access and digital voice communication.

The implementation of Class Size Reduction in grades to K-3 necessitated the construction of a new two-story building that added six new classrooms to the school.

Where the most viable option, LEAs were required to administer the statewide summative assessment in ELA and mathematics. Where a statewide summative assessment was not the most viable option for the LEA (or for one or more grade-level[s] within the LEA) due to the pandemic, LEAs were allowed to report results from a different assessment that met the criteria established by the State Board of Education (SBE) on March 16, 2021. The assessments were required to be:

- Aligned with CA CCSS for ELA and mathematics;
- Available to students in grades 3 through 8, and grade 11; and
- Uniformly administered across a grade, grade span, school, or district to all eligible students.

Options

Note that the CAAs could only be administered in-person following health and safety requirements.
