# New Technology Already Provides Early College Access for Students



- Students dual enroll at the community college for courses that can not be accommodated in a small school setting
- New Tech supports students to achieve success in those programs
  - Calendar alignment
  - College campus visits
  - Dedicated time, monitoring, and support at New Tech to complete their courses
- **Students are already benefiting**
  - Fall Semester - 60 Students (**48%** of all 10th-12th)
  - Spring Semester - CCAP Agreement w/ HSI (39 in HDC 310, 23 in Deaf 310) - non-CCAP (17 12th graders in 26 courses), (**63%** of all 10th-12th)

## In 2023-24, New Tech Serves...

**154** Students  
**79.2%** - Socioeconomically Disadvantaged  
**25%** - Students with Disabilities  
**22%** - ELL  
**66%** - Hispanic  
**12%** African American  
**11%** White

# Becoming an official “Early College” program creates more opportunities

## Early College Programs are...

Innovative partnerships between charter or non-charter public secondary schools and a local community college that allow pupils to earn a high school diploma and up to two year of college credit on four years or less  
(California Education Code (EC)Section 102)

## An early college high school program benefits students by:

- Opportunity to earn college credits while still in high school
- Reducing the overall cost and duration of their higher education
- Helps transition smoothly into college
- Develops advanced academic skills
- Increases the likelihood of completing a degree
- Exposes them to a collegiate environment,
- Fostering a sense of independence and readiness for future academic challenges

ECCHS facilitate a greater participation of at-risk, low-income, and students of color in college level courses.

ECCHS potentially decrease high school dropout rates while increasing students' access to postsecondary education.

# Board Policy on School Renaming

## Excerpts from BP 7310

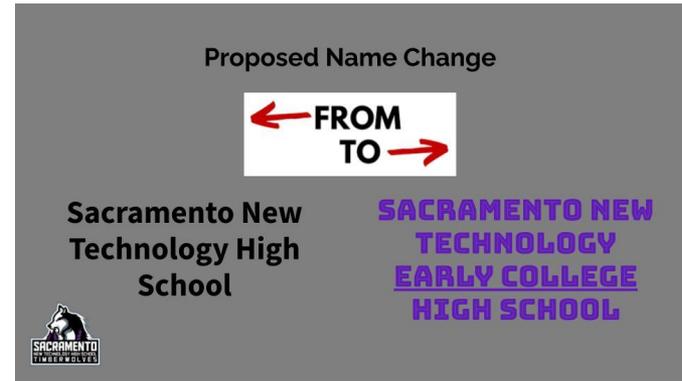
“The Board desires to ensure that the names of District facilities reflect the District’s vision and mission.”

“School/facility names that articulate aspirations of the educational outcomes for District students.”

“School/facility names that reflect the instructional focus of the school.”

“The Board encourages community participation in the process of selecting names.”

- Principal Martin has engaged with the New Technology community as part of the Early College Grant application in 2022-23 and for this name change in 2023-24.



# Other Details

- New Technology is already a recipient of a \$250,000 grant to implement their Early College Program and applying for additional funds.
- The official name change allows for flexibility in # minutes students must be on campus at New Tech vs on college campuses.
- This change will not reduce course offerings at New Tech by New Tech teachers.
