Renewal Law and Regulations

- Overall Approach Similar to initial approval, but some important differences because the school has a track record
 - Charter authorizers must consider the charter school's performance on the California School Dashboard indicators when evaluating a petition to renew a charter school. The new renewal process creates essentially three tiers of renewal.
 - High-Performing Charter Schools
 - Middle-Performing Charter Schools
 - Low-Performing Charter Schools
- Approve unless... Default in the law is approval

Renewal Law & Regulations July 1, 2020 Changes

- 60 days for public hearing, 90 days for decision (30 day extension)
- Petition "deemed complete" by petitioners 2. and legal timeline starts the day submitted
- Posted recommendations and findings 15 3. days before decision
- Decision meeting is a public hearing 4.
- 5. Petitioners are given equal time to present evidence and testimony in response to recommendations and findings (during decision meeting)

Renewal Law & Regulations No Changes

- 1. Must include any new laws
- 2. Look back period of 2 years plus current year
- 3. Material Changes for expansion (grade levels or facilities)
- 4. Academic performance given greatest weight
- 5. Due process rights to school if any major issues / concerns (i.e. Notice of Violation)

Renewal Law & Regulations Renewal Criteria

- 1. Any new laws
- 2. Enrollment data
- 3. Dashboard
 - Academic Performance of significant student groups compared to state based on VERIFIABLE data
 - Year to year growth
- 4. New reasons to deny cannot be considered (i.e. fiscal impact #s 7, 8)
- 5. Sound governance, financials and operations
- 6. If non-renewal, "closure in the best interest of the students"

Renewal Law & Regulations The Basics: Core Charter Performance Questions

- Is the charter school's educational program a success?
- 2. Is the charter school financially viable?
- 3. Is the charter school operating and governed effectively?
- 4. Is the charter school serving public policy purposes?



Renewal Law & Regulations Middle Tier Denial


May deny only upon making written findings of the following:

- School failed to meet or make sufficient progress toward meeting standards; AND
- Closure is in the best interest of students;
 AND
- Its decision placed greater weight on performance on academic measures




Did the school fail to meet or make sufficient progress toward meeting standards?

Mathematics

A comparison of CCA's performance with the state's performance on the color earned for the state indicators in the Dashboard in the school-wide category and its significant subgroups shows that CCA's students' performance was superior school-wide as well as with all significant student groups.


Circumstances that Impacted Analysis of Student Performance:

- California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) was not administered in 2019-2020.
- Verified Data List was not posted in time to be used for evaluation.

Student Performance and Progress


Is the closure of the charter in the best interest of students? No, because its students perform better in English Language Arts than the state, SCUSD, and than the home school of many of its students.

English Language Arts



Is the closure of the charter in the best interest of students? No, because its students perform better in mathematics than the state, SCUSD, and than the home school of many of its students.

Is the charter school's educational program a success?	Yes	 Because the CAASPP was not administered in 2019-20, data was not available for 2 years back plus current year. CCA's performance compared with the state's performance on the color earned on the Dashboard in the school wide category and its significant subgroups shows that CCA's students' performance was superior school wide as well as with all significant student groups.
Is the charter school financially viable?	Yes	CCA exhibits a strong financial position with a 42% average fund balance and reasonable assumptions used for multi-year projections of revenues and expenditures
Is the charter school operating and governed effectively?	Yes	The renewal petition contains reasonably comprehensive descriptions of the 16 elements required as set forth in the Charter Schools Act.
Is the charter school serving public policy purposes?	Yes	It is in the best interest of students.

Staff's Recommendation & Next Steps

Recommendation

Staff recommends that the Board take due consideration to the content of the Executive Summary and requests that the Board conference and take action to approve the petition to renew Capitol Collegiate Academy for a term of five years ending June 30, 2026.

Next Steps

If the Board approves the petition to renew the charter, SCUSD, as the charter authorizer, will provide continued oversight by conducting annual visits and programmatic audits to review the charter school's academic achievement, as well as records of past performance and plans regarding academics, finances, and operations. Additionally, the District and CCA will collaborate on the timely submission of a signed Operational Memorandum of Understanding.
