Comments by Nikki Milevsky of the Sacramento City Teachers Association (SCTA), to the Sacramento City Unified School District (SCUSD) Board of Education, Agenda Item 10.3

February 4, 2021

Good evening Members of the board. In the spring of 2018-19, the district made massive cuts to the child development preschool and infant toddler programs which meant cutting services for our most needy students. This resulted in 544 of our preschool slots being given to a neighboring district, which means they are no longer available for our students here in Sac City. You also laid off over 50 teachers and classified staff, many who are still laid off today.

The board was told that you had to make these massive, painful cuts to child development services because of the false assumption that the child development fund encroaches 2.3 million dollars on to the general fund. The district apparently did not want to prioritize resources to support preschool for our community's most impoverished children.

The problem is that you were told what your staff had <u>projected</u> Child Development would encroach that year and you didn't ask any questions. That projected amount was not even in the ballpark of what the actual expenditures ended up being that year.

The District's Escape Business System June Reports shows what really takes place.

What actually happened in 2018-19 is that the child dev program only encroached 388 thousand dollars. That is less than what you pay the superintendent in salary and benefits.

What actually happened in 2019-20 is that your staff told you that child development program would encroach 869 thousand dollars, but it actually encroached ZERO dollars. That is right; ZERO encroachment.

This year you are told you must make cuts to child dev because it is going to encroach 526 thousand dollars, but will it really?

What discussions have there been to identify the sources of these projections and address them? What alternatives have been looked at? What other options are there?

Let's not forget that Public Information Requests revealed written communication between superintendent Aguilar and SETA that showed that he had already cut the deal to slash the preschool and infant toddler program and give millions in grant dollars back to SETA in January 2019. Long before this board and the Parent committee even knew cuts were being considered.

Please do your job and provide the proper oversite and scrutiny these painful decisions deserve before making another terrible mistake that hurts our students.

We heard it said over and over again at the Special Board Governance meeting on Monday night that you as a board have to trust the Superintendent and trust your staff. But really, you owe it to the public to ensure that the superintendent and the district staff are worthy of your trust.

My name is Gabby Trejo, Executive Director at Sacramento ACT.

While we can appreciate the challenging financial situation the District is facing, we are extremely concerned about the cuts being proposed and considered by the SCUSD Board. We urge the SCUSD Trustees to prioritize the following as you discern the difficult choices in front of you:

1. We believe an equity lens must be applied as you consider every cut that is being proposed by measuring the impact of the cuts and considering the number of English Learners, low income students, and students of color that will be impacted by those cuts: It is clear that some proposed funding cuts target programs that meet the needs of unduplicated students -- low-income, English learners and foster/homeless youth.

2. Prioritizing mental health & protecting social workers: studies report increased stress, particularly depression and anxiety, of youth due to COVID and systemic racism and we know the suicide rate has increased during the pandemic. Now more than ever, social workers and other mental health care providers should not be eliminated. SCUSD and the community actually should be providing additional mental health services for youth.

3. We also urge the district to explore increased revenue options and new revenues to support the students that need it the most and not only focus on cuts to balance the budget. Sacramento County is in the bottom 1/3 of LEA Medi-Cal reimbursements in the state and we are concerned that a lot of money that could support our students' mental health needs is being left at the table.

4. Speaking up for the highest-risk students and parents served by specific programs that will be harmed or closed by these cuts, who may not be as well-represented by public communications with the Board.

Good evening Superintendent Aguilar and Board Members.

Last year, Child Development Schoolage teachers, alongside numerous parents from our various fee-based programs spoke to you about the necessity of keeping our before and after school programs. You know that we offer care to our young charges from Leonardo da Vinci, Matsuyama, Martin Luther King and Theordore Judah school sites. You graciously listened and worked with us to continue our programs. And up until the pandemic, we successfully ran our programs and offered care to families who wanted and yes needed something more than a typical recreational program. It is a partnership within the school and a safe haven for children on campus for children while their parents are at work. But it needs care and attention and vision in order to survive.

Last year we made the necessary adjustments to our program, financially, to become more self-sustaining. Parents believed in and wanted what our programs offered and these parents willingly paid substantially more each month for our service. As I stated earlier, our program is more than a typical before and after school recreational program.

Did you know that we are the only program in Sac City Unified that offers care to E.K/T.K students? Do you know that other programs do not offer care to even the Kindergarten students let alone E.K or T. K students? For these students, our state certificated school age teachers offer learning enrichment opportunities that build upon and in some cases expand what is being taught in the classrooms. You may recall many parents stepping forward last year to tell you this and to tell you this is one of the many reasons that value the program. One of our board members had her oldest child in the E.K. before and after school program. Our program offers expanded kindergarten readiness for her son and so many others. The majority of our E.K. students enter Kindergarten academically and socially ahead of their peers. This is but one part of our program that makes us unique and to be honest necessary to our district.

We are like the small businesses in our communities, small but valuable. Sure it's not for everyone but it is absolutely needed for families needing a more specialized program and one that will offer care/service for families with E.K/T.K students. One with state certificated teachers and one that does not have the staff turn over that so many recreational programs have.

We know that the pandemic has left many scratching their heads and wondering how we can come back when so many of our families that needed childcare may have gone somewhere else during our closure. We have asked our administrators about the vision going forward and as usual no seem to have one. Well, the teachers in the trenches have a vision on how we move forward. We understand that without a vision and fade away. We know that our vision and plan moving forth must be one of unity and opportunity. We understand that now is the

time to be who we say we are, Sacramento City "Unified" School District. All participants must be unified and committed to building back our programs bigger and better than before. Now is the time to partner with our classroom teachers like never before to help our children build back any missed learning opportunities and grounds that may have been lost during the pandemic. To provide parents with peace of mind and certainty that they can return to work without worrying about the quality of care their children will be receiving. Now is the time to be honest about our economic situation and to build upon what we have instead of destroying programs, leaving children and families in some of our district's needlest neighborhoods without equal access and opportunities. Now is not the time to threaten programs with unnecessary cuts in order to project those at the top. Now is not the time to worry those in the trenches about expensive and again unnecessary health care changes or whether or not they will be able to maintain or provide for their own families.

We ask that you look at what we have done and hear what we envision moving forward. We ask that you hear us again. See that we have not let you down. Look at the books and the accounting and see that we provided you a plan last year that would move us towards being self sustaining. We brought you plans even when our leadership was willing to sacrifice our programs. We stepped up and cried out to you to give us the opportunity to present ideas on how to become more self sustaining. You heard us and we Thank you. Now, we ask again that you allow us the opportunity to continue to run our programs as we have a vision and a plan for moving forward. A plan to build back better by bridging the gap that has happened because of the pandemic. A plan could provide care and enrichment to a bigger and new population of E.K/T.K students.

Look carefully at the numbers, note that the school age programs did ok, and see the value in keeping our child development programs as we often service some of the neediest children/families in our district. Let's work together to create a vision for service and opportunities that can be as varied and unique as the children in our district. Let's stand in the gap by offering and expanding service to children and families that other district affiliates do not (childcare and enrichment to E.K. and T.K students).

Let's decide if we should give an ear to those that have no vision for the future or who would rather downsize programs because the job may be too much for them. Perhaps we could embrace the mantra of our nation to "build back better". Perhaps it is time to value the opportunities we have and to expand upon them. Perhaps it is time to value the people that faithfully work in the trenches of our programs, to provide them with the abilities to also maintain their own families and livelihood. Building back better means leveling the playing field. Let's not be top heavy or simply provide for those at the top while making drastic cuts or expenses to those on the bottom. Finally let's take every opportunity to be honest, fair and understanding of each other and the children/families we serve. Union members were encouraged to send a message to the school board to tell them to reject Superintendent Aguilar's Fiscal Recovery Plan that slashes millions to student services and that demands massive takeaways on health insurance, shifting health care costs onto employees, reducing their take-home pay. Despite the indisputably great budget news confirmed by CBO Rose.

Those cuts are drastic. The health care cost-shift does seem a big cut after being used to one of the best health benefits in the state.

However, making the health benefits offered to teachers and staff comparable to those offered in other districts would reduce the deficit significantly while still maintaining very generous benefits and total compensation.

Please do what is necessary to return our district to a healthy organizational status, long term, so we can weather the other crises that are bound to come, so we aren't having to look at cuts to student services every year.

Saying over and over that the money is there doesn't make it so. Numerous audits and warnings from oversight committees outline the problems and offer suggested solutions. Please take the steps needed to address the problems and steer us towards a healthy, sustainable future. I'm sorry that is going to hurt, but we were hurting already and facing further cuts if the unfunded expenses are allowed to continue unabated.

Thank you Superintendent Aguilar and Board members for providing leadership and doing what needs to be done, even if it is difficult or unpopular.

"My name is Scott Chase, a 4th grade teacher in the Sacramento City USD. This is my 32nd year of teaching in the district. Prior to becoming a teacher I was a student of SCUSD from 1970 to 1983.

In 2013 the State of California changed its funding formula on how it funds schools. The new formula (Local Control funding Formula) pays districts more money if they have high numbers of students living in poverty, high numbers of students whom English is their second language and high foster care students. 70% of SCUSDs students qualify for these increased LCFF funds. What does this mean? It means that the SCUSD receives \$2,000 more per student than EIK Grove USD and San Juan USD. In 2013 the SCUSD had an annual budget of \$381,121,215. Now the SCUSD has a budget of \$504,534,628, an increase of \$121,413,413 or 32% increase. Revenues for SCUSD are at all time record levels, meaning the district has more funds now than ever before. In the last 8 years the SCUSD has forecasted huge negative budgets but in fact the district's budget estimates were off by \$126,742,579 in surplus funding. This year the district has a record reserve fund of \$84,699,103. The State of California requires a 2% reserve fund, however the SCUSD currently has an 18% reserve fund. SCUSD revenues will increase by another \$234.8 to \$282.8 million more in the next 3 years. Just this year the district has received \$124 million addtional Federal Funds from the CARES Act 1 and CARES ACT 2.

What has the district planned to do with these increased revenues? At a time of a national teacher shortage and a time when the district has over 100 certificated substitutes the district is proposing a \$20 million cut to teachers' medical benefits, requiring teachers to pay out of pocket for their current health plans and cut teachers' pay by an additional 2%. The cuts would **reduce the take-home pay of every educator--for many the cuts could be as high as a 34.6% reduction** in take-home pay. The district is also proposing massive cuts to students services. Superintendent Jorge Aguilar is proposing the following cuts:

Aguilar's proposed cuts include:

- Cuts to Special Education services, particularly inclusionary practices;
- Cuts to Visual and Performing Arts (VAPA)
- Cuts to Child Development
- Cuts to Mental Health Services for Students
- Cuts to Waldorf programs
- Cuts to Dual Immersion Programs
- Cuts to the International Baccalaureate Program
- Cuts to Small High Schools

Our students in our district serve the best possible programs, including early childhood development, and the best and brightest teachers. These massive cuts to teachers' health benefits and services to students will not foster an environment where children will thrive and reach their full potential. Despite the indisputably great budget news where SCUSD CBO confirmed that Governor Newsom's budget should mean that Sac City proposes a POSITIVELY certifed budget in March, Superintendent Jorge Aguilar is continuing to demand that the SCUSD school board unnecessarily slash services to students and that non-administrative staff take huge cuts in their take-home pay. In 2013-2104 the Sacramento City USD had 40,000 students with a total of 166 administrators. Now in 2020-21 the SCUSD has 40,000 students but now has 274 district administrators (108 MORE ADMINISTRATORS).

President Joe Biden once said,"Don't tell me what you value, show me your budget and I'll tell you what you value". By that measure the SCUSD values administrative bloat over serving the needs of our students.

One final point, there are 1,037 school districts in California. The California Public Employment Relations Board (PERB) has issued *more unfair labor practice complaints against SCUSD in the last 3 years than any other school district in California.*Sincerely, Scott Chase

	My name is Shana Just and I am a teacher at Luther Burbank, a community member of Area 5, and a proud grandparent of a kinder student at Crocker-Riverside. For the last 6 years now, including this one, this District has projected multi-million dollar deficits. Only once did the budget actually end in a deficit, but even then it was so small that the District essentially broke even. Four times, the District actually ended with a surplus sometimes a surplus of tens of millions of dollars. This year, again, the projected budget deficit will disappear and the District will end up with another multi-million dollar surplus.
	For 3 years, we listened to you claim that the District was months away from budget disaster and State takeover and EVERY SINGLE TIME you have been wrong - you have ended up with huge budget surpluses instead. However, the results of that wolf-crying has been: to cause needless anguish and stress among students, families, and employees; to lose great people, staff and students, to surrounding Districts; the destruction of the trust the community had in your ability to perform your duties honestly and effectively.
	Meanwhile, you have wasted 6 MILLION dollars on a air cleaning system that not only doesn't clean the air but actually produces formaldehyde, a cancer-causing substance that we aren't even allowed to use anymore in our science classes. On Sunday, December 19, 2018 at 12:30 a.m., my husband and I were woken up by the police at our front door. Our 13-year-old daughter was texting a suicide prevention hotline. She had made the decision to take her life. Thank God her attempt failed. Our daughter has learning disabilities that the mainstream schools she attended in another district were not able to adequately address, leaving her ashamed, embarrassed, and with failing grades. To make matters worse, she was bullied at school. Her self-esteem was crushed and her emotional health was dangerously fragile. That night in December, she nearly became another statistic: a student who sees no way out of a cycle of desperately needing, but not receiving, academic and social supports promised by schools that fail to deliver.

It became clear that mainstream school was no longer an option for her. Unfortunately, I was completely unaware of what else was available. We knew we could not afford private schools, and home-schooling was not an option as I worked full time. Finally, after reaching out on social media, I learned about a Waldorf option. My daughter was accepted at Golden Valley, a public charter Waldorf school in the San Juan Unified School District, for her 8th grade year. She immediately began to flourish academically and socially and to build back confidence in herself and trust in her school's ability to keep her safe and meet her needs. During her year at Golden Valley Waldorf School, we were able to wean her off anti-depressant and anti-anxiety medications.

Our daughter now attends George Washington Carver School of Arts and Science (Carver High School), the public Waldorf high school in the Sacramento City Unified School District (SCUSD). She is in her freshman year. Although she is challenged by the distance learning platform and her own learning disabilities, with the help of her teachers, she is successfully learning strategies to navigate both. Her teachers are supportive, available, interested, and engaged. Most importantly, she does not feel vulnerable anymore. She feels seen, heard, and safe. Her social and emotional health is the best it's been in over 5 years! Carver high school is providing our daughter what she needs to succeed.

I share this personal story with you to illustrate a point and to ask two questions. It was only through our affiliation with Golden Valley that we learned about Carver High School, the first public Waldorf high school in America, a hidden gem in SCUSD, a school where 95% of the student body reports feeling safe, where 45% of the students come from out of district. Why doesn't the district widely advertise and promote Carver so that students who would thrive in this environment easily know about it? Secondly, what can be done so that Carver can visit middle schools within and outside of the district to inform 8th grade students about this program?

I'm truly distressed to think about what will happen to Carver H.S. with the proposed budget cuts and most importantly, what will happen to my daughter without this life-saving education?

Dear Board Members,

I would strongly urge you to reconsider the budget reduction item which would eliminate paying for student's IB and AP exams included in the Proposed Fiscal Recovery Plan (Item 10.3). As a former student who had the privilege of participating in the IB Programme at Luther Burbank

High School, I can undoubtably attest that eliminating this funding would be a great disservice and obstacle imposed on students' ability to participate in these programs. Currently, the fee for one IB exam is slightly above \$100 and AP exams are slightly below \$100. Regardless, the cost for a full diploma IB candidate would be well over \$600 which is large cost and burden to foist onto a vast majority of socioeconomically disadvantaged students who partake in these programs.

I want to speak from my experience, as a first-generation low-income high school student, the burden of a \$600 price tag from a program would greatly disincentivize my parents from allowing me to partake (especially since my sibling and I were both apart of it). Several, if not most, of my fellow classmates who also faced similar economic hardships (and to a greater extent), may have been withheld the opportunity to participate due to those economic barriers.

As one of SCUSD's Core Values included in the Strategic Plan for 2016-2021, "Equity: Commitment to reducing the academic achievement gap by ensuring that all students have equal access to the opportunities, supports and the tools they need to be successful", I believe that continuing to fund the payment of both IB and AP exams would allow for this Value to continue striving forward. (Unlike schools in wealthier neighborhoods, Burbank does not have an army of parents with the time and resources to volunteer, donate, and advocate at school board meetings). I cannot overstate how impressed I was with those students, with their commitment, their energy, the support they showed for one another. At the same time, the struggles many of them had to overcome were also impossible to ignore: when permission slips needed last minute signatures, often the legal guardian was not a parent, but an older sibling barely out of school. When we traveled to and from school on crowded public transportation, our fellow riders openly expressed shock that these bright, beautifully manner kids were from Luther Burbank.
	These kids work so hard and have been so successful in their program, but I would wager that not a single one of them has the ability to pay the hundreds of dollars in fees to take the IB exams that make their hard work worthwhile. Taking away this funding would be a shocking abdication of our responsibility toward these kids. Those kids and the Luther Burbank IB program are among the best that Sacramento has to offer, and instead of disdain and ongoing hardship, we owe them celebration, support, and full funding.

As a former student who had the privilege of participating in the IB Programme at Luther Burbank High School, I can undoubtably attest that eliminating this funding would be a great disservice and obstacle imposed on students' ability to participate in these programs. Currently, the fee for one IB exam is slightly above \$100 and AP exams are slightly below \$100. Regardless, the cost for a full diploma IB candidate would be well over \$600 which is large cost and burden to foist onto a vast majority of socioeconomically disadvantaged students who partake in these programs.
	I want to speak from my experience, as a first-generation low-income high school student, the burden of a \$600 price tag from a program would greatly disincentivize my parents from allowing me to partake (especially since my sibling and I were both apart of it). Several, if not most, of my fellow classmates who also faced similar economic hardships (and to a greater extent), may have been withheld the opportunity to participate due to those economic barriers.
	As one of SCUSD's Core Values included in the Strategic Plan for 2016-2021, "Equity: Commitment to reducing the academic achievement gap by ensuring that all students have equal access to the opportunities, supports and the tools they need to be successful", I believe that continuing to fund the payment of both IB and AP exams would allow for this Value to continue striving forward. 	Democracy must be learned by each generation.
	Opportunity should be a right, not a privilege.
	I have the honor of serving as the volunteer lead advisor for the local YMCA's Youth & Government Model Legislature and Court program. Our program aims to grow the next generation of engaged Californians who recognize the importance of civic knowledge, civic awareness, and civic action to creating the communities in which we all want to live.
	In addition to increasing civic engagement, our program offers tangential benefits like increasing participants' confidence, improving public speaking skills, and empathy – skills that help kids ready themselves for college and careers. And speaking of college, the leadership and personal growth opportunities afforded by our program look fantastic on college applications.
	Unfortunately, these wonderful benefits come with a sizeable price tag (at least in prepandemic times). I'm proud to say that in 15 years, I never lost a participant due to financial concerns – the YMCA works hard to ensure equal program access to all who want to join. But how many students never joined because they saw the price tag and self-selected out? Because they've never experienced financial support like what we provide before? Because other adults had dangled opportunities in front of them and failed to have their back?
	The cost of participating in extracurricular enrichment programs perpetuates inequity of opportunity.
	There are other programs available to students that similarly foster critical thinking and develop problem solving skills, such as the International Baccalaureate (IB) program. Thankfully, this program is available in several public schools in Sacramento. But the Sacramento City Unified School District Board is considering an action that would harm

the IB program at Burbank High School, a school that is over 85% socioeconomically disadvantaged.

Participation in the IB curriculum culminates in exams, like those for Advanced Placement (AP) classes. And like AP exams, successful performance on IB exams can translate into college credits that save students thousands of dollars. Students must pay a fee to take IB exams. For students at Burbank High School, those fees are paid. The School Board, however, is considering cutting funding for IB and AP fees.

Nearly 55% of Burbank High School seniors are taking at least one IB class. The Burbank IB program is unique, rigorous, and has served thousands of students, mostly from Meadowview, over the last 15 years.

(The School Board also considered cutting the budget for personnel to continue the IB programs at Caleb Greenwood Elementary and Kit Carson International Academy, but decided not to. Neither of those schools serve the South Sacramento area.)

While there's no threat to IB personnel at Burbank, if the district removes funding for the exams, then they have not just moved the goal posts, they have taken them down and bulldozed the end-zone.

Offering programs like IB but removing the funding needed to ensure students can complete them is a betrayal of students' hard work and a waste of their potential. It enforces the idea that some things – like a good education – aren't for them, they are for other, richer kids. Kids whose parents can afford the registration or exam fee.

I don't believe the School Board really thinks that an IB education isn't for Burbank students. But the ill-conceived idea to save money by cutting exam perpetuates inequity at a time when we have claimed, as a community, to have prioritized rooting it out.

I work tirelessly to convince students and their families that my program is for them, regardless of financial means. It's an uphill climb. I urge the School Board not to lose ground, hurt kids, and increase inequity in our city.

During this time I have had the privilege of teaching and learning from hundreds if not close to a thousand IB students. Year after year, students are eager to challenge themselves with hopes of improving their academic record for university AND potentially earn college credit. If the school board cuts the funding that pays for IB exam fees many students' opportunities will be cut short and the IB Programme at Burbank will be essentially eliminated. You see, about 88% of Burbank students are socio-economically disadvantaged and cannot pay for exams out of pocket. A district as diverse as SCUSD, needs to prioritize equity and the promotion of higher education for our most vulnerable populations and the simple act of covering exam fees has the potential to change the course of a family. Last year, Burbank's IB exams cost less than \$80k, and 228 students were served. In that cohort, is senior Viviana Avila-Arementa, the third in her family to complete the IB diploma track this June. Respectively, her older siblings are alumni both of Burbank and the IB program who are now in college or have graduated from 4-year university in large because of the opportunities the IB program opened for them. Like Viviana, the Burbank IB Programme has a number of legacy students since its inception. Our families are knowledgeable and trust the opportunities the IB Program bas led generations change for first-generation, low-income, immigrant, and linguistically diverse families. Comment:	Cutting the VAPA program is a mistake. For years the state and federal governments have mandated that public education prioritize raising standardized test scores to acceptable thresholds at the expense of access to the broader curricula that earlier generations enjoyed. This has harmed students from lower income and working class families, a sizable percentage of whom are children of color.
	No Child Left Behind massively failed to meet its objectives, and yet professional class administrative staff, many of whom have little long term investment in Sacramento, follow a prescribed template of narrowing the curricula for short term gain, but guaranteeing the long term degradation of the Sacramento community. Already Sacramento Unified lacks the robust VAPA programming that it had in prior decades.
	As a parent of two adopted children who came to this country not speaking a word of English, I faced pressure from professional teaching and administrative staff to have them participate in various intervention programs with the aim of raising their standardized test scores in ELA and math to make the schools look good. I learned to say no thank you, in spite of passive-aggressive comments suggesting that I might be limiting my children by not following their prescription.
	Instead we encouraged them to participate in VAPA programs that gave them a level playing field for socializing with their peers and developing collaborative and creative work skills.
	They often scored at the state-defined, 'below proficient' level in ELA. They graduated from high school, completed college, and are gainfully employed in professional careers, even during the pandemic. Both are bilingual with professional level fluency in both languages.
	When you design and pass this budget, ask yourselves, 'would I enroll my own kids or grandkids in any neighborhood school in this district? or would I honestly look for options elsewhere?' More importantly, ask yourselves, 'If I were in a working class family in Sacramento, would my kids have a fair chance to have a professional career?' Budget for schools that you would enthusiastically participate in.

I am a second grade teacher with SCUSD. I came to this school district because I believe all Sacramento public school students deserve access to a quality education that includes art, music, and social emotional learning. Please do not cut student services. Our students and their families need more support now more than ever. Cutting programs and changing placements for the worse will just add to our families' collective trauma. My students' distance learning attendance is best when we are learning through the arts and sharing our learning related to our emotional well-being and identity (SEL "assignments"). VAPA programs, Dual Immersion Programs, smaller more intimate high school programs, the Waldorf Programs are all programs that meet what our students need now more than ever before. This is our opportunity to set aside outdated mandates that prioritize some subjects over the other, that prioritize this industrial model of one size fits most "efficiency" over personalized learning. We teachers are told Universal Design for Learning is the future. Well, here we are. We can no longer design for the middle or for "the average". These specialty programs give our families a choice within our public school offerings. We will lose students to private schools and out-of-district charter schools if we continue to prioritize numbers over needs.

We know developing minds need to feel safe in order to learn. Joy and creativity help us teachers do that. Smaller, inclusive classes help us do that. I cannot make children feel safe and welcome in second grade without Art and Music, without tapping into our students' world languages, without social emotional lessons. Please do not cut student services during this time. Thank you for listening to my plea.

I have taught in Oakland Unified, the North Sacramento area, Lake County, and Rocklin Unified. I have arrived back to my home in Sacramento and I see so much potential here. Stop comparing our students to other districts and other cities and other states. Our students' backgrounds are incredibly diverse, just like their needs. We need leadership to see the potential that is here to prioritize all of students' access to a quality education.

Before I got my current job as the music teacher at California Middle School, I was subbing in the music class at Ethel Phillips Elementary school. I was told the music teacher left in a hurry, because they had found a full time job somewhere else. Who can blame them? So I was subbing with no sub plans. A second grade class full of native Spanish speakers came into the room, so I decided to start by teaching the Spanish folk song "De Colores." I started by singing it to them. As I finished the second verse I looked up and noticed that some of the children had tears streaming down their faces. I asked them what was wrong. One wiped his tears, and with a beautiful grin on his face said, "It was just so beautiful!"

Of course, this event had nothing to do with me or my singing voice. It had to do with the power of music education to support social emotional learning, English language learners, and cultural empowerment. What was beautiful wasn't my voice, but a room in which a white woman from Minnesota sings the anthem of the United Farm Workers in Spanish with a classroom full of hispanic children. Music is uniquely powerful in addressing many of our students', our community's, and our world's most pressing problems. That is why it is so dismaying to me that music education is repeatedly on the list of cuts.

The SCUSD administration purports to value safe, emotionally healthy, and engaged students. They claim to seek family and community empowerment. They say that they're fighting for equity. The list of possible cuts seems to me to show that none of that is true. If it were true, then why are the programs on the forefront of meeting those goals the ones on the chopping block? It does not make sense for an organization that values equity and engaged students to threaten inclusive special education or small high schools. It does not make sense for an organization that values family and community empowerment to cut dual immersion or Waldorf programs. It does not make sense for an organization that values any of those things to cut middle school music.

Your predecessors on the school board in the 90's created equity problems by cutting K-6 music programs. The issues they created are on full display in my classroom today. When 7th graders come to Cal they can choose beginning band or advanced band. However, to choose advanced band they must be coming from certain schools AND have a certain economic standing. They must come from one of the elementary schools that provide a before or after school band program, and their family must have had the means to provide access to an instrument and to pay for the band program. Thankfully, students that did not have these advantages can choose beginning band and be prepared to choose advanced band in 8th grade. That puts all of these students on even footing by the time they're applying for the high school VAPA programs. If you cut middle school music, you will be responsible for making economically disadvantaged students permanently disqualified for music education at SCUSD.

Cutting middle school music programs defunds a major source of family and community engagement. Concerts provide a forum for parents and community members (some of whom do not have time for or interest in parent organizations) to meet each other and school staff, become comfortable in our buildings, and develop relationships with each other and SCUSD. I can use myself as an example for this. I'm not much interested in fundraisers, or science fairs, or carnivals. But if my child is singing with the rest of the kindergarten, I'm there buying a slice of pizza, meeting the principal, and planning a playdate with parents I wouldn't have otherwise met.

Finally, music education has unique power to cultivate safe, emotionally healthy, and engaged students. It's common knowledge that we provide physical education to our students not because they are going to be professional athletes, but because physical education will help them to lead healthful lives. It builds safe, emotionally healthy, engaged students. Music education is the same. We don't provide music education

because all of our students will go on to be professional musicians. We do so because music education helps them prepare to be fully human. Every known culture in history uses music. It's essential to being part of the human family. Music education provides places for second grade boys to weep together in an uplifting, healthy way. It provides 7th graders a forum to discuss systemic racism as we study contemporary protest music with the hashtag #taketwoknees. It teaches 8th graders how to work through political unrest and fear by composing rap music about the riot in Washington D.C. All of those things happened in my very own classroom over the last 14 months.

Cutting middle school music will demonstrate to me that SCUSD does not value safe, emotionally healthy, engaged students. Or, even worse, it will prove that they only think students with the economic means to pay for private lessons until they get to high school are worthy of the safety, emotional health, and engagement that for many students can only come through music.
