### School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements (Most Recent Year)

The main campus was built in 1960. This school has 40 permanent classrooms which include a multipurpose room, a library, and an administrative building. The school also has 3 portables. During the 2004 and 2005 modernization, renovations and upgrades were made in the following areas: health and safety, site interior, exterior, plumbing, and miscellaneous upgrades.

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional. District maintenance staff ensures that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair and working order are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service and that emergency repairs are given the highest priority. The district governing board has adopted cleaning standards for all the schools in the district. A summary of these standards is available at the school office, or at the district operations office. The principal works directly with the custodial staff to develop cleaning schedules to ensure a clean and safe school.

The State Legislature established the Deferred Maintenance Fund (DMF) in 1980 to assist districts in maintaining facilities and sites. The District has participated in the Deferred Maintenance Program since its inception. The program requires both the local district and the State of California to share equally in the cost of major deferred maintenance projects, with the maximum contribution from the State limited to approximately one-half of one percent of the District's General Fund and Adult Education Fund operating budgets. For fiscal years 2008-09 through 2012-13, the Deferred Maintenance Program has been included in the State's Tier III Flexibility Program. Therefore, DMF funds received by the District are deposited in the General Fund, and are unrestricted. Due to state budget cuts for 2010-11 these unrestricted funds have not been designated to deferred maintenance purposes. The funds were used as part of the Tier III recommendations approved by the Board on the May 6, 2010 Board Meeting.

### Opportunities for Parental Involvement (School Year 2017-18)

Every month, Rosa Parks Middle School parents gather to ask questions, discuss ideas, and help shape the school's direction through their involvement with the School Site Council. The monthly Principal's Breakfast presents an informal opportunity for staff and parents to meet with the Principal over breakfast. The Parent Teacher Organization, English Language Advisory Council, and parent volunteers help carry out the school's mission.

Every sports season, parents congregate with the teachers and administrators to applaud the basketball, soccer, or golf teams to victory. During the year, parents enjoy their children's performances at the Band Concert, School plays, and the African American History Night. School staff and families gather at the Hmong New Year Celebration to eat together, share cultural experiences, and have fun. Back to School Night, Open House and Parent Days provide an opportunity for parents to visit our campus to meet with their child's teachers and learn about services that we are able to provide. Academic Accomplishment Breakfasts that honor students on the Honor Roll, Merit Roll, or those who have achieved 100% attendance, and an Eighth-Grade Promotion Celebration afford staff and students an opportunity to celebrate academic achievement together.

Daily, parents are able to call to meet with administrators or teachers, the counselor or Healthy Start Coordinator. Teachers are encouraged to develop positive relationships with parents through ongoing communication. Parents are also called if their child receives a referral or detention. Routinely, parents help prepare for special events. The new Parents' Center is now open. This parent center provides parents with access to resources and services, while providing a means for becoming more involved in campus life. Parents are an integral part of the Rosa Parks academic community and the middle-school experience. Parent Workshops, Testing /Informational Workshops are available to parents as well. We encourage and create opportunities for the engagement of all of our families in the education and success of our students.

#### Professional Development provided for Teachers

To realize the vision of Sacramento City Unified School District, which is to fully prepare all students for college career and life, it is imperative that the district provides numerous opportunities to expand the professional repertoire of its administrators and teachers.

To that end, the district has crafted a high quality professional program that is focused on the ELA and math Common Core State Standards, the Next Generation Science Standards, English Language Learners, Balanced Literacy and Instructional Strategies for Addressing the Needs of Diverse Learners. These areas of focus were derived from needs assessments coupled with the analysis of student learning of specific content and that is ongoing with follow-up opportunities, models effective practices, and uses assessments to guide and monitor progress. The learning opportunities afforded through



this program deeply align with the needs of our individual schools, as well as our strategic plan, and connect to every aspect of school practice: thinking curriculum, intentional instructional practices, assessment for learning, and lesson design.

These learning experiences, which are offered during the school day and after-school are supported with on-site coaching, are complemented with the required collaborative time built into the school day on Thursdays, which is designated for teachers to engage in collaborative professional learning at their respective school sites. Such communities of practices, under the leadership and guidance of site administrators, afford our teachers the opportunity to deepen their content knowledge, strengthen their instructional repertoire, improve their assessment strategies, and foster a shared sense of responsibility. As a result, every teacher will help to promote and nurture a community of learners in which the individual school staff is not only enriched, but the district as a whole is enhanced.

DataQuest is an online data tool located on the CDE DataQuest Web page at <http://dq.cde.ca.gov/dataquest/> that contains additional information about this school and comparisons of the school to the district and the county. Specifically, DataQuest is a dynamic system that provides reports for accountability (e.g., test data, enrollment, high school graduates, dropouts, course enrollments, staffing, and data regarding English learners).

**Internet Access**

Internet access is available at public libraries and other locations that are publicly accessible (e.g., the California State Library). Access to the Internet at libraries and public locations is generally provided on a first-come, first-served basis. Other use restrictions may include the hours of operation, the length of time that a workstation may be used (depending on availability), the types of software programs available on a workstation, and the ability to print documents.
