## 2022-23 School Overview

Children are first at James Marshall. Staff is engaging every student so they are challenged in a meaningful and captivating manner. There are strong community ties creating a happy and safe environment for students.

James W. Marshall Elementary is located in the heart of the Rosemont community. The entire staff at James Marshall is committed to the academic and social emotional success of every student. Teachers and support staff collaborate on a regular basis to review data to help guide daily instruction. We have several programs that enhance our daily classroom instruction. By effectively utilizing paraprofessionals and resource teachers, we provide leveled intervention in English-language arts for all first through 4th students during the school day. This model allows for small group instruction at the students' instructional level. James Marshall has a partnership with CSU Sacramento and benefits from two different programs. The CSUS Readers program provides one on one before school tutoring in reading and the Classroom Tutoring program provides college students who help in classrooms on campus. James Marshall uses the Dreambox Learning program to help students close gaps in their mathematical learning as well. In addition, students are served by a variety of different Special Education classes on campus.

In addition to students' academic needs, James Marshall staff tries to focus on the whole child. We integrate social emotional learning, character education and growth mindset into our daily teaching. We offer extracurricular activities whenever possible. We have an active flag football team, basketball team and the Stride Program as well as fun filled and educational field trips and exciting assemblies such as "Fantasy Theater," which exposes all students to the arts and music.

Parent involvement is encouraged at James Marshall. Parents are encouraged to become active in our Parent Teacher Group as well as our School Site Council and English Learner Advisory Committee. Parents are welcome on campus anytime and can volunteer in classrooms. The Parent Teacher Group and the staff at James Marshall work collectively to provide as many opportunities for parent education as possible, such as Family Science Night and an annual Art Show.

James Marshall has Pre-School on site. Free before and after school care, academic support and enrichment activities are also available through the Empowering Possibilities Unlimited program.

## 2022-23 Quality, Currency, Availability of Textbooks and Other Instructional Materials

To realize the vision of Sacramento City Unified School District, which is to fully prepare all students for college and career, it is imperative that the district provides numerous opportunities to expand the professional repertoire of its administrators and teachers. To that end, the district has crafted a high quality professional learning program that is focused on Literacy (including ELA Common Core Standards), English Language Learners, Mathematics, Science, Physical Education and Visual and Performing Arts. Since the onset of Distance Learning in the Spring of 2020, we have provided all teachers and administrators with professional learning on Universal Design for Learning, and the professional learning we have made available is geared to distance learning. The learning opportunities afforded through this program deeply align with the needs of our individual schools, as well as our Local Control Accountability Plan, and connect to every aspect of school practice: thinking curriculum, intentional instructional practices, assessment for learning, and lesson design. Professional learning opportunities are offered during school hours and outside of contracted hours. In addition to on-site coaching and regular professional learning opportunities, a designated collaborative Thursday time provides the opportunity for teachers to engage in collaborative professional learning at their respective schools focusing on deepening their content knowledge, strengthening their instructional repertoire, improving their assessment strategies, and fostering a shared sense of responsibility.

## School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

James W. Marshall Elementary School, built in 1964, received Facility Inspection Tool (FIT) overall repair rating score of “good” from its most recent facility inspection in June 2018. The district governing Board has adopted cleanliness standards for all district schools to ensure that all schools are clean, safe and functional. The district Operations Department takes great pride following a work order process that provides efficient and timely services to all the sites. The principal works directly with the site custodial staff to develop cleaning schedules to ensure that the school is clean and safe.

The passage of Measure Q, the district’s 2012 general obligation bond, provided facility upgrade funding to all district schools. The district performed Quick Strike projects during the summer of 2014, which allowed schools to pick from one of the following improvements: 1) marquees, 2) closed-circuit television (CCTV) surveillance, 3) exterior painting, or 4) seal coating and striping of parking lots or playgrounds. Fire alarms at all the district schools were upgraded. Additional 10 million dollars have been allocated for safety and security upgrades, which are expected to begin in 2019.

Funding from the federal government through Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC) provided for technology infrastructure improvements to the district’s wireless connectivity. The improvements, which are expected to be completed by the end of 2019, will increase classroom internet access and digital voice communication.

Where the most viable option, LEAs were required to administer the statewide summative assessment in ELA and mathematics. Where a statewide summative assessment was not the most viable option for the LEA (or for one or more grade-level[s] within the LEA) due to the pandemic, LEAs were allowed to report results from a different assessment that met the criteria established by the State Board of Education (SBE) on March 16, 2021. To that end, the district strives to provide staff with professional learning opportunities that focus on ensuring that all students have access to culturally responsive high-quality instruction and supports through Universal Design for Learning and anti-bias/anti-racist practices in a robust multi-tiered system of support.
