RESOLUTION NO. 3179

RECOGNITION OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING AWARENESS MONTH, JANUARY 2021

WHEREAS, the California Child Welfare Council reports that the fast-growing criminal industry of commercial sexual exploitation affects 100,000-300,000 children a year nationally, with 11-14 being the most common ages of victims coerced into the industry, but human trafficking specialists in the Sacramento area have estimated ages even younger;

WHEREAS, there is a lack of available data on the impact of commercial sexual exploitation within our community, but the District, and others, strongly believe even one case of youth victimization is too many;

WHEREAS, the Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children (CSEC) is a form of human trafficking and child abuse, where the child is treated as a commercial sexual object, involving the exchange of sexual activity for money or something of value;

WHEREAS, exploited children endure complex trauma that negatively affects psychosocial development, physical health, and academic engagement, which may manifest in chronic absenteeism, low academic performance, and increase the probability of school dropout;

WHEREAS, particularly vulnerable students disproportionately represented as a sexually exploited youth are often homeless, in the foster youth system, African American, LGBTQ, unaccompanied minors, undocumented, possess special education needs, and/or have had contact with the juvenile justice system;

WHEREAS, since 2009, the District has taken a leadership role in the development of bodies of work that help combat and prevent the Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children and other exploitation/trafficking of youth in the Sacramento community;

WHEREAS, California Senate Bill 855: Human Services was signed on June 20, 2014 and outlined training and prevention and intervention services to be provided to caseworkers and vulnerable youth;

WHEREAS, California Senate Bill 794: Child Welfare Services was signed by the Governor on October 1, 2015 and requires county child welfare agencies and probation departments to implement policies and procedures to identify, document, and determine appropriate services for children and youth who are receiving child welfare services pursuant to federal law and are, or are at risk of becoming, victims of commercial sexual exploitation;

WHEREAS, California Senate Bill 1322: Commercial Sex Acts: Minors was signed September 26, 2016 and removes the criminal penalty for youth engaged in commercial sex trade as a victim of CSEC;

WHEREAS, California Assembly Bill 1227: Human Trafficking Prevention Education and Training Act was signed October 7, 2017 and requires school districts to ensure that all pupils in grades 7 to 12 receive comprehensive sexual health education. Under the act, this instruction includes, among other things, information about sexual harassment, sexual assault, adolescent relationship abuse, intimate partner violence, and sex trafficking; and

WHEREAS, the District is a party to a Sacramento County Commercially Sexually Exploited Children (CSEC) Program Interagency Protocol Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) whereas the parties of the MOU have formed a CSEC Steering Committee to provide ongoing oversight and support to ensure the County agencies and partners effectively collaborate to better identify and serve victims of commercial sexual exploitation and children at risk of becoming exploited.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Governing Board of the Sacramento City Unified School District stands in solidarity with staff, partners, community members, and all local agencies working to eliminate and address the CSEC crisis that exists in Sacramento;

RESOLVED FURTHER, that the Sacramento City Unified School District will infuse CSEC awareness, prevention and intervention into all applicable District units, policies and trainings, such as the biannual mandatory child abuse trainings;

RESOLVED FURTHER, prevention and intervention items will continue as capacity is built out through the hearing and placement office, student support and health services, and youth development departments;

RESOLVED FURTHER, that the District will create a policy that mirrors the requirements outlined in AB 1227:

RESOLVED FURTHER, to recognize that this is a District's priority and encourage the schools to engage their local communities and invest a portion of their local school autonomy allocation in a CSEC awareness and prevention program;

RESOLVED FURTHER, that District Staff will develop and implement a CSEC awareness and prevention model for secondary schools in the District. This program will include, but is not limited to: 1) supplemental resources to support the prevention-education used with the required adopted comprehensive sexual health curriculum in a health course, 2) training for school staff, 3) a reference guide for school site use, and 4) a reporting strategy for annual updates to the Board and public; and, be it finally;

RESOLVED, that a proposed implementation plan, including budget, and timeline will be prepared for review and approval within 60 days of the adoption of the Superintendent's FY 2021-22 budget, subject to the availability of resources and the District's LCAP investment priorities, and will identify opportunities to re-purpose funds, leverage funds and seek new revenue;

The purpose of this agenda item to hold the required public hearing for the charter renewal process.


On July 1, 2006, the Sacramento City Unified School District (SCUSD) approved the initial charter petition of the California Montessori Project - Capitol Campus (CMP). The term of its current petition started on July 1, 2016, and expires on June 30, 2021.


CMP submitted a petition to renew its charter to SCUSD on Friday, December 11, 2020. CMP is requesting a renewal of its charter to continue to operate its independent charter school for students from kindergarten to eighth grade. The CMP academic program offers a tuition-free Montessori Education.



II. DRIVING GOVERNANCE

The charter petition process is guided by Education Code 47605. The education code requires that no later than 60 days after receiving a petition, the school district's governing Board shall hold a public hearing. The purpose of the public hearing is to consider the support for the petition from the district's teachers, other employees, and parents. Though it is not in the statute, the public hearing is also used as an opportunity for the charter school to present directly to the Board as to why its petition should be renewed. As such CMP staff will be providing an update on the charter school and any relevant information regarding its performance.

Unless both parties agree to an extension of 30 days, within 90 days of receipt of the petition, the school district's governing Board shall either grant or deny the charter. The school district's governing Board shall publish all staff recommendations and findings regarding the petition at least 15 days before the public hearing when the school district's governing Board will grant or deny the charter. At this public hearing, when the school district's governing Board shall either grant or deny the charter, the petitioners shall have equivalent time to present evidence and testimony to respond to the recommendations and findings.

III. BUDGET

The petitioners for CMP should include budget details in their petition. District staff will review the charter school's financials and publish their recommendations and findings at least 15 days before the public hearing when the Board will grant or deny the charter's renewal.

IV. GOALS, OBJECTIVES, AND MEASURES

The Education Code states that the objective of the public hearing is to consider the support for the petition from the district's teachers, other employees, and parents. Though it is not in the statute, the public hearing is also used as an opportunity for the charter school to present directly to the Board as to why its petition should be renewed. As such CMP staff will be providing an update on the charter school and any relevant information regarding its performance.



Though it is not in the statute, the public hearing is also used as an opportunity for the charter school to present directly to the Board as to why its petition should be renewed. As such CCA staff will be providing an update on the charter school and any relevant information regarding its performance.

Unless both parties agree to an extension of 30 days, within 90 days of receipt of the petition, the school district's governing Board shall either grant or deny the charter. The school district's governing Board shall publish all staff recommendations and findings regarding the petition at least 15 days before the public hearing when the school district's governing Board will grant or deny the charter. At this public hearing, when the school district's governing Board shall either grant or deny the charter, the petitioners shall have equivalent time to present evidence and testimony to respond to the recommendations and findings.

The petitioners for CCA should include budget details in their petition. District staff will review the charter school's financials and publish their recommendations and findings at least 15 days before the public hearing when the Board will grant or deny the charter's renewal.

The Education Code states that the objective of the public hearing is to consider the support for the petition from the district's teachers, other employees, and parents. Though it is not in the statute, the public hearing is also used as an opportunity for the charter school to present directly to the Board as to why its petition should be renewed. Board Policy

The Governing Board recognizes the immediate and long-term health advantages of breastfeeding for infants and mothers and desires to provide a supportive environment for any district employee to express milk for her infant child upon her return to work following the birth of the child. The Board prohibits discrimination, harassment, and/or retaliation against any district employee who chooses to express breast milk for her infant child while at work.

(cf. 4030 – Nondiscrimination in Employment) (cf. 4031 – Complaints Concerning Discrimination in Employment)

The district shall provide a reasonable amount of break time to accommodate an employee each time she has a need to express breast milk for her infant child. (Labor Code 1030)

To the extent possible, such break time shall run concurrently with the break time already provided to the employee. Any additional break time used by a non-exempt employee for this purpose shall be unpaid. (Labor Code 1030; 29 USC 207)

The employee shall be provided a private location, other than a restroom, which is in close proximity to her work area and meets the requirements of Labor Code 1031 and 29 USC 207, as applicable.

Employees are encouraged to notify their supervisor or other appropriate personnel in advance of their intent to make use of the accommodations offered for employees who are nursing mothers. As needed, the supervisor shall work with the employee to address arrangements and scheduling in order to ensure that the employees' essential job duties are covered during the break time.

Lactation accommodations may be denied only in limited circumstances in accordance with law. (Labor Code 1032; 29 USC 207)

Before an employee's supervisor makes a determination to deny lactation accommodations, he/she shall consult the Superintendent or designee. In any case in which lactation accommodations are denied, the Superintendent or designee shall document the options that were considered and the reasons for denying the accommodations.

Education For Homeless Children

The Governing Board recognizes its obligation desires to ensure that homeless students have access to the same, free, and appropriate public education provided to all-other students within the district. The district shall provide homeless students with access to education and other services necessary, including full access to before and after school and extra-curricular activities, for these students them to meet the same challenging performance academic standards as other students.

<u>The</u> <u>Students shall not be segregated into a separate school or program based on their status as Superintendent or designee shall identify and remove any barriers to the identification and enrollment of homeless, nor shall students and to the retention of homeless students <u>due to absences</u> or outstanding fees or fines. In order to identify district students who are homeless, the Superintendent or designee may give a housing questionnaire to all parents/guardians during school registration, make referral forms readily available, include the district liaison's contact information on the district and school web sites, provide materials in a language easily understood by families and students, provide school staff with professional development on the definition and signs of homelessness, and contact appropriate local agencies to coordinate referrals for homeless children and youth and unaccompanied youth.

The district shall provide transportation for a homeless student to and from his/her school of origin when the student is residing within the district. If the student moves outside of district boundaries, but continues to attend his/her school of origin within this district, the Superintendent or designee shall consult with the superintendent of the district in which the student is now residing to agree upon a method to apportion the responsibility and costs of the transportation. CARES Act Grant Subaward Agreement

This CARES ACT GRANT SUBAWARD AGREEMENT (this "Subaward Agreement") dated September 22, 2020, for purposes of identification, is between VALLEY VISION, a California nonprofit corporation, acting as fiscal agent for the Sacramento Valley Manufacturing Initiative (SVMI), and the subrecipient, the Charles A Jones Career & Education Center, the adult education school for the Sacramento City Unified School District.

Background

WHEREAS, Valley Vision is the "Grantee" under that certain CARES Act Grant Agreement between the CITY OF SACRAMENTO, a California municipal corporation (the "City") and Valley Vision, a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A (the "Grant Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Grant Agreement, Valley Vision is obligated to enter into subaward agreements with a multidisciplinary coalition of workforce development organizations and individuals, including Subrecipient, to assist Valley Vision & SVMI to implement the Program (as such term is defined in the Grant Agreement); and

WHEREAS, the Subrecipient desires to assist Valley Vision to implement the Program by carrying out the activities listed in Exhibit B attached hereto (the "Authorized Activities"); and

WHEREAS, with these background facts in mind, Valley Vision and Subrecipient agree as follows:

Agreement

- 1. **Term**. This Subaward Agreement takes effect on the date that all parties have signed it, as indicated by the dates in the signature blocks below, and shall remain in effect until December 30, 2020, or the expiration or termination of the Grant Agreement, subject to the termination provisions set forth herein.
- 2. Disbursement of Subaward. Valley Vision shall disburse to the Subrecipient, from the CRF funds received by Valley Vision under the Grant Agreement, a sum not to exceed \$28,760 as provided in Exhibit C. The funds disbursed by VALLEY VISION under this Subaward Agreement are referred to as the "Subaward." The Subaward constitutes "CRF funds" (as such term is defined in the Grant Agreement) and VALLEY VISION shall not be obligated to disburse any portion of the Subaward to the Subrecipient unless and until VALLEY VISION has received CRF funds from the City under the Grant Agreement.
- 3. Subrecipient's Obligations. Subrecipient acknowledges and agrees that, inasmuch as the Subaward is a subaward of CRF funds, Subrecipient shall be bound by, and shall comply with, all the obligations that the Grant Agreement imposes on Valley Vision. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, Subrecipient specifically acknowledges and agrees that the following provisions of the Grant Agreement shall apply to Subrecipient, with such changes in the content of such provisions as are necessary to substitute Subrecipient for Grantee:
 - a. Section 3 (Separate Accounts);
 - b. Section 4 (Authorized Uses); provided that in paragraph (a) thereof, references to attachment 1 and attachment 2 shall refer to Exhibits B and C, respectively, of this Subaward Agreement;

- c. Section 5 (Books and Records);
- d. Section 6 (Supervision or Discipline of Minors);
- e. Section 8 (Pass-through Entity and Subrecipient Requirements); provided that in paragraphs (g) and (h) thereof, references to the City shall be changed to VALLEY VISION; and provided, further, that Subrecipient shall provide the closeout report described in paragraph (h) thereof to VALLEY VISION no later than March 1, 2021;
- f. Section 13 (Conflicts of Interest).

For the avoidance of doubt, the Subrecipient agrees that (x) it shall not use CRF funds to supplant funding provided by the City to the Subrecipient under any other agreement; (y) it shall include a term in every grant subaward agreement and contract that prohibits the subrecipient or contractor from using CRF funds to supplant funding provided by the City directly or indirectly to the subrecipient or contractor; and (z) if it has received other CRF funds from the City or any other entity, or has received other federal funds (e.g., payroll protection act loan, etc.), it shall not use the CRF funds awarded pursuant to this Subaward Agreement to pay for direct or indirect costs already covered by the other federal funds or CRF fund payments.

- 4. Books and Records. In addition to Subrecipient's obligations under Section 5 of the Grant Agreement, during the term of this Subaward Agreement and for the period of time required under Section 5 of the Grant Agreement, Subrecipient shall (a) make its books, records, accounts, employees, performance-related records, property, and equipment related to this Subaward Agreement available to VALLEY VISION at all reasonable times so that VALLEY VISION may determine that Subrecipient has complied with this Subaward Agreement; and (b) upon demand by VALLEY VISION, reimburse VALLEY VISION for all CRF funds that VALLEY VISION determines were expended for activities other than Authorized Activities in accordance with the CARES Act and the Guidance.
- 5. **Reports**. In addition to Subrecipient's reporting obligations under Section 8 of the Grant Agreement, Subrecipient shall document and timely report to VALLEY VISION the information detailed in Section 2 of Attachment 1 of the Grant Agreement (as applicable to the Authorized Activities being performed by Subrecipient under this Subaward Agreement), so as to enable VALLEY VISION to fulfill its documentation and reporting obligations to the City under such Section.
- 6. Indemnity. Subrecipient shall defend, hold harmless and indemnify VALLEY VISION, its officers, directors, employees, and agents, and each and every one of them, from and against any and all actions, damages, costs, liabilities, claims, demands, losses, judgments, penalties, costs, and expenses of every type and description, including, but not limited to, any fees and/or costs reasonably incurred by VALLEY VISION's attorneys and any fees and expenses incurred in enforcing this provision (collectively, "Liabilities"), including Liabilities arising from personal injury or death, damage to personal, real, or intellectual property or the environment, contractual or other economic damages, or regulatory penalties, arising out of or in any way related to this Subaward Agreement, whether or not (i) such Liabilities are caused in part by a party indemnified hereunder or (ii) such Liabilities are litigated, settled, or reduced to judgment, except that the foregoing indemnity does not apply to liability for any damage or expense for death or bodily injury to persons or damage to property to the extent arising from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of VALLEY VISION, its agents, servants, or independent

contractors who are directly responsible to VALLEY VISION, except when such agents, servants, or independent contractors are under the direct supervision and control of the Subrecipient.

- 7. Insurance. During the term of this Subaward Agreement, the Subrecipient shall maintain insurance coverage that meets the requirements set forth in Section 12 of the Grant Agreement, with the additional requirement that, for purposes of this Subaward Agreement, wherever Section 12 refers to the City, such references shall also include VALLEY VISION, and wherever Section 12 refers to the City, its officials, employees, and/or volunteers, such references shall also include VALLEY VISION, its officers, employees, and/or volunteers.
- 8. **Termination**. This Subaward Agreement shall automatically terminate in the event that the Grant Agreement is terminated. In addition, VALLEY VISION may terminate this Subaward Agreement if VALLEY VISION determines that:
 - a. The Subrecipient has failed to perform, or has performed unsatisfactorily, any term of this Subaward Agreement, including failing to use the CRF funds solely for Authorized Activities in accordance with the CARES Act and the Guidance;
 - The Subrecipient has made (with or without knowledge) any material misrepresentation of any nature with respect to any information or statements furnished to VALLEY VISION in connection with this Subaward Agreement; or
 - c. There is pending litigation with respect to the performance by Subrecipient of any of its duties or obligations under this Subaward Agreement that may materially jeopardize or adversely affect the undertaking of or the carrying out of the Authorized Activities.

In the event of termination of this Subaward Agreement for any reason, Subrecipient shall immediately return all unexpended CRF funds to VALLEY VISION or, if directed by VALLEY VISION or the City, to the City.

9. Miscellaneous.

a. Notices. Any notice, request, report, or demand under this Subaward Agreement must be in writing and will be considered properly given and effective only when mailed or delivered in the manner provided by this paragraph to the persons identified below or their successors. A mailed notice, application, request, report, or demand will be effective or will be considered to have been given on the third calendar day after it is deposited in the United States Mail (certified mail and return receipt requested), addressed as set forth below, with postage prepaid. A notice, application, request, report, or demand sent in any other manner will be effective or will be considered properly given when actually delivered. Any party may change its address for these purposes by giving written notice of the change to the other party in the manner provided in this paragraph.

- c. Assignment. The Subrecipient may not assign or otherwise transfer this Subaward Agreement or any interest in it without VALLEY VISION's written consent, which VALLEY VISION may grant or deny in its sole discretion. An assignment or other transfer made contrary to this paragraph is void.
- d. Successors and Assigns. This Subaward Agreement binds and inures to the benefit of the successors and assigns of the parties. This paragraph does not constitute VALLEY VISION's consent to any assignment of this Subaward Agreement or any interest in this Subaward Agreement.
- e. *Interpretation*. This Subaward Agreement is to be interpreted and applied in accordance with California law. The exhibits attached hereto are part of this Subaward Agreement.
- f. Waiver of Breach. A party's failure to insist on strict performance of this Subaward Agreement or to exercise any right or remedy upon the other party's breach of this agreement will not constitute a waiver of the performance, right, or remedy. A party's waiver of the other party's breach of any term or provision in this Subaward Agreement is not a continuing waiver or a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same or any other term or provision. A waiver is binding only if set forth in writing and signed by the waiving party.
- g. Severability. If a court with jurisdiction rules that any nonmaterial part of this Subaward Agreement is invalid, unenforceable, or contrary to law or public policy, then the rest of this Subaward Agreement remains valid and fully enforceable.
- h. *Counterparts*. The parties may sign this Subaward Agreement in counterparts, each of which is considered an original, but all of which constitute the same agreement. Facsimiles, pdfs, and photocopies of signature pages of the Subaward Agreement have the same binding effect as originals.
- i. Time of Essence. Time is of the essence in performing this Subaward Agreement.
- j. *Compliance with all Laws, Requirements, and Orders*. The Subrecipient shall comply with all applicable laws, regulations, orders of public officials, and requirements in

- connection with this Subaward Agreement, including all non-discrimination and equal opportunity laws.
- k. Authority to Sign. The person signing this agreement on Subrecipient's behalf represents that he or she is authorized to do so and that no further action beyond his or her signature is required to bind Subrecipient to this Subaward Agreement. VALLEY VISION shall have no obligations whatsoever under this Subaward Agreement, unless and until this agreement is executed by an authorized officer of VALLEY VISION.
- I. Tax Implications and Consequences. VALLEY VISION makes no representations as to the tax consequences associated with the disbursement of CRF funds related to this Subaward Agreement, and any determination related to this issue is the sole responsibility of the Subrecipient. Subrecipient acknowledges consulting with its own tax advisors or tax attorneys regarding this transaction or having had an opportunity to do so prior to signing this Subaward Agreement. Subrecipient acknowledges VALLEY VISION cannot provide advice regarding the tax consequences or implications of the CRF funds disbursed to Subrecipient under the terms of this Subaward Agreement.
- m. Integration and Modification. This Subaward Agreement sets forth the parties' entire understanding regarding the matters set forth above and is intended to be their final, complete, and exclusive expression of those matters. It supersedes all prior or contemporaneous agreements, representations, and negotiations—written, oral, express, or implied—and may be modified only by another written agreement signed by both parties.
- n. *Survival*. The following provisions shall survive termination or expiration of this Subaward Agreement for any reason, in addition to those that by their nature are intended to survive termination: Books and Records, Indemnity.

In addition to the specific terms of the Grant Award Letter for Grant Number 117819, Kaiser Foundation Hospital's ("KFH") award of this Grant, managed by the KFH Northern California Community Benefit Programs Division, is contingent upon Grantee's compliance with the following terms and conditions, and Grantee agrees to all these terms and conditions. Together, the Grant Award Letter and these terms and conditions are "the Agreement."

1. Tax-Exempt Status

Grantee is a (i) tax-exempt organization currently recognized by the Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") as a public charity described in section 501(c)(3), (8), (10) or (19) or 501(k) or 509(a)(1), (2), or (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code") or (ii) a local, state or federal government agency. If Grantee is a public charity as described in (i), then Grantee represents and warrants that

- Grantee's tax-exempt status under the Code has not been revoked or modified since the issuance
 of the IRS determination letter provided to KFH and shall not be revoked or modified during the
 term of this Grant; and
- there is no issue presently pending before any office of the IRS that could result in any proposed changes to Grantees' tax-exempt status under the Code; and
- Grantee shall immediately notify KFH if Grantee's tax-exempt status is revoked, suspended or modified during the term of this Grant.

2. Expenditure of Funds

This Grant must be used for the project identified in the Grant Award Letter, as described in the Grantee's proposal and related correspondence, and may not be expended for any other purposes without KFH's prior written approval. If the Grant is intended to support a specific project or to provide general support for a specific period, any portion of the Grant unexpended at the completion of the project at the end of the period shall be returned immediately to KFH, unless otherwise agreed by KFH in writing. Grantee may <u>not</u> expend any Grant funds for any purpose that is not charitable or educational, for any political or lobbying activity, or for any purpose other than one specified in Section 170(c)(2)(b) of the Code. Grantee must obtain prior written approval from KFH for changes to budgetary allocations that amount to 10% or more of the total budget of the Grant award or for changes to the Grant period.

Grantee may not use any portion of this grant in connection with the enrollment of individuals in any Qualified Health Plan or non-Qualified Health Plan. If Grantee serves as a Certified Enrollment Entity or Navigator funded by the California Health Benefit Exchange (Covered California), Grantee will fully comply with any applicable state and federal statutes, regulations, and sub-regulatory guidance requiring disclosure of receipt of this funding to Covered California and consumers receiving application assistance from Grantee's personnel.

3. No Assignment or Delegation

Grantee may not assign, or otherwise transfer, its rights or delegate any of its obligations under this Grant without prior written approval from KFH.

4. Records and Reports

Grantee is required to keep a record of all receipts and expenditures relating to this Grant and to provide KFH with written reports summarizing the progress made, as detailed on KFH's reporting requirements outline. KFH may also require additional interim reports. Grantee's reports should describe its progress in achieving the purposes of the Grant and include a detailed accounting of the uses or expenditure of all Grant



funds. Grantee also agrees to provide any other information reasonably requested by KFH. If Grantee obtains any audited financial statements covering any part of the Grant period, Grantee shall provide a copy to KFH as well. Grantee is required to keep the financial records with respect to this Grant, along with copies of any reports submitted to KFH, for at least four years following the year in which all Grant funds are fully expended.

5. Required Notification

Grantee is required to provide KFH with immediate written notification of: (1) any changes in its tax-exempt status; (2) its inability to expend the Grant for the purposes described in the Grant Award Letter; (3) any expenditure from this Grant made for any purpose other than those for which the Grant was intended; (4) any modification of the budget, Scope of Work of timeline; and (5) any significant changes in Grantee's leadership or staffing.

6. Reasonable Access for Evaluation

Grantee is expected to actively participate in the evaluation of Kaiser Permanente's Community Benefit Program, including KFH's evaluation of Grantee's project within that program. At KFH's request, Grantee will permit KFH and its representatives to conduct site visits and have reasonable access during regular business hours to Grantee's files, records, accounts, personnel and clients or other beneficiaries for the purpose of making financial audits, verifications or program evaluations as KFH deems necessary or appropriate concerning this Grant award.

7. Publicity

Whenever possible, Grantee shall obtain KFH's prior written or oral consent of any proposed publicity concerning this Grant prior to the release of such publicity. When acknowledging this Grant, Grantee will incorporate the following text: "The project is supported by Kaiser Permanente Northern California Community Benefit Programs."

KFH may include information regarding this Grant, including the amount and purpose, photographs provided by Grantee, Grantee's logo or trademark, or other information or materials about Grantee's organization and activities, in KFH's periodic public reports, newsletters, online channels, and news releases.

8. Right to Modify or Revoke Payments

Payments made under this Grant are contingent upon Grantee's compliance with the terms of this Agreement. KFH reserves the right to discontinue, modify or withhold any payments to be made under this Grant award or to require a total or partial refund of any Grant funds if, in KFH's sole discretion, such action is necessary: (i) because Grantee has not fully complied with the terms and conditions of this Grant, including without limitation, Grantee's loss of tax-exempt status or Grantee's use of Grant funds for purposes other than those designated; (ii) to protect the purpose and objectives of the Grant or any other charitable activities of KFH or the Kaiser Permanente Medical Care Program; or (iii) to comply with the requirement of any law, regulation, or regulatory agency policy applicable to Grantee, KFH or this Grant.

9. Termination

KFH may terminate this Grant for convenience upon 30 days' written notice to Grantee and may terminate this Grant immediately for the reasons specified in Section 8 or for Grantee's engagement in willful misconduct or negligence.



10. Independent Contractors

With respect to administration of this Grant, the parties understand and agree that each is at all times acting and performing as an independent contractor with respect to the other. Except as expressly set forth in this Agreement, neither party, nor any of its employees, shall be construed to be the agent, employee or representative of the other for any purpose, or liable for any acts or omissions of the other.

11. Compliance

Grantee shall (i) maintain, in full force and effect, all required governmental or professional licenses and credentials for itself, its facilities and it employees and all other persons engaged in work in conjunction with this Grant, and (ii) perform its duties and obligations under this Agreement according to industry standards and in compliance with all applicable laws. As an organization with numerous contracts with the federal government, KFH and its affiliates are subject to various federal laws, executive orders and regulations regarding equal opportunity and affirmative action. <u>Recommendation</u>: Board to approve the amendment to Leataata Floyd Elementary School Farm and Community Project Agreement

<u>Background/Rationale</u>: On December 6, 2018, City of Sacramento and the District entered into the Leataata Floyd Elementary School Farm and Community Garden Project Agreement which allowed for the City to use excess land at the school site to establish an urban farm and a community garden to benefit the residents within the Northwest Land Park development and the surrounding community, including the students who attend the school and their parents.

The Farm will be developed as urban farm for the purpose of educating students about agriculture, environmental protection, health and nutrition. Previously, in January 2016, the District approved the Food Literacy Center, a non-profit corporation, as operator of the Floyd Farm. Food Literacy intends to also use the Farm to educate school parents and the larger community about how sustainable gardening provides health and nutrition benefits.

The Community Garden component will allow for School staff, parents, and community members to obtain rights to a garden plot to grow their own fruits and vegetables. The Community Garden will be operated and maintained by the City.

Students, their parents, and other residents within the Northwest Land Park community will benefit from the establishment of the Farm and the Community Garden as an educational and recreational learning center. CA Education Code Section 10900 authorizes school districts to work with cities to conduct programs of community education and recreation for children and adults.

The attached Amendment between the City and District further outlines that before the farm commences operation, and before each fiscal year thereafter, the City and District would agree on a budget, subject to each party's funds and budget constraints, to apportion the payment for all operational and maintenance expenses, including utilities and staff costs associated with the Food Literacy Center, to support the farm. The Parties desire to specify the amount of payments to be made by City for the farm maintenance and the farm easement from the Northwest Land Park maintenance assessment district. This component was previously not included on the December 6, 2018 agreement between the city and District.

<u>Financial Considerations</u>: This agreement would provide \$26,300 for a Farm Maintenance Fund provided by the City and directed towards the Food Literacy Center. It would also include \$82,500 provided by the City to the District for payment of the City Easement.

AMENDMENT TO LEATAATA FLOYD ELEMENTARY SCHOOL FARM AND COMMUNITY GARDEN PROJECT AGREEMENT

(collectively, the "Parties").		

Background

- A. On December 6, 2018, City and District entered into the Leataata Floyd Elementary School Farm and Community Garden Project Agreement (the "Principal Agreement") which allowed for the City to use excess land at the school site to establish an urban farm and a community garden to benefit the residents within the Northwest Land Park development and the surrounding community, including the students who attend the school and their parents. On April 22, 2019, the District conveyed to the City an easement over the excess land. The easement provided that after the farm is constructed, the District would have the exclusive rights to operate and maintain the farm and that the City would fund a portion of the farm maintenance costs using the proceeds from the Northwest Land Park maintenance assessment district. However, the City has been unable to access the easement area to construct the farm and community garden due to District's construction of the farm building for the school.
- B. The farm is to be developed as urban farm for the purpose of educating students about agriculture, environmental protection, health and nutrition. The District is constructing the farm building to use for processing the vegetables grown on the farm and for instruction on the benefits of a healthy diet. The District has made arrangements with Food Literacy Center, a non-profit corporation, for operation of the farm. Food Literacy Center intends to also use the farm to educate school parents and the larger community about how sustainable organic gardening provides health and nutrition benefits.
- C. The Principal Agreement provided that before the farm commences operation, and before each fiscal year thereafter, the City and District would agree on a budget, subject to each party's funds and budget constraints, to apportion the payment for all operational and maintenance expenses, including utilities and staff costs associated with the Food Literacy Center, to support the farm. The Parties desire to specify the amount of payments to be made by City for the farm maintenance and the farm easement from the Northwest Land Park maintenance assessment district.

Agreement

NOW THEREFORE, it is mutually agreed between the Parties as follows:

1. Allocation of Maintenance Assessment District Funds

Section 5, Farm Maintenance and Operation Costs, of the Principal Agreement is amended to read in its entirety as follows:

"5. <u>FARM MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION COSTS</u> – The City has established a maintenance assessment community facilities district (CFD) that encompasses the Northwest Land Park development project. Included in the maintenance assessment is an allocation for park maintenance, which includes the off-site Farm and Community Garden, and payment for the easement.

City will pay the District \$26,300 (the "Farm Maintenance Fund") on an annual basis after construction of the farm and community garden is completed. This amount will increase annually by the inflation index adopted when the CFD was established. Eligible Farm Maintenance Fund costs include (a) purchase of supplies (e.g., plants and seeds), equipment (e.g., hand tools), and equipment such as vehicles (e.g., tractor); (b) repair and replacement of irrigation systems, lighting, and fencing; (c) utility costs (e.g., water and power); and (d) staff costs for Farm operations and labor.

City will pay District \$82,500 for the Farm and Community Garden Easement (the "Easement Fee") on an annual basis after District allows City access to the easement area to construct the farm and community garden. This amount is for District's use to maintain the Farm Building or any other expense related to the school's farm and nutrition program. This amount will increase annually by the inflation index adopted when the CFD was established.

The Setzer Family Foundation and Developer have established a fund in the amount of \$100,000 to be allocated for the Farm at \$20,000 per year. Funds are to be used to support the Farm operation and maintenance expenses during the first five years of operation which are not covered by the Farm Maintenance Fund, and for equipment and maintenance of the Farm Building.

If after expenditure of the Setzer Family Foundation grant, there are capital improvements needed for the Farm or the Farm Building or there are equipment and maintenance costs for the Farm or the Farm Building which are not covered by the CFD proceeds, the City and District shall meet to determine if there is additional funding available to cover such costs.

City will initiate collection of the CFD proceeds for the Easement Fee within six months after the City obtains access to the easement area, and for the Farm Maintenance Fund within six months after the Farm and Community Garden improvements have been completed. The Parties anticipate that there may be a shortage in the amount of the CFD proceeds for the initial year (FY 2021-22) due to the process for increasing the existing Northwest Land Park CFD assessment and collecting the proceeds on a semi-annual basis based on the tax collection schedule.

The District shall invoice City one-half of the Farm Maintenance Fund and the Easement Fee, respectively, in January and June each year at the time when the County Tax Collector distributes the CFD proceeds to the City. The District will

provide City with documentation of the Farm maintenance expenses incurred on an annual basis to verify use of the Farm Maintenance Fund proceeds. All costs associated with the operation and maintenance of the Community Garden shall be borne by the City."

2. **Entire Agreement**. This Amendment constitutes the entire agreement, and supersedes any prior written or oral agreements, between the Parties with respect to the matters contained herein. All other terms and conditions of the Principal Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

5.0 ANNOUNCEMENT OF ACTION TAKEN IN CLOSED SESSION

Counsel Jerry Behrens announced that Special Education OAH Case No. 2020080529 was unanimously approved with a 7-0 vote.

President Ryan announced that the Board in a vote of 5-2 moved forward with a positive Superintendent's evaluation. Members Garcia and Vang voted no on the positive evaluation. She explained that this positive evaluation for the 2019-2020 school year will mean the extension of the Superintendent's employment agreement through June 30, 2024, per the evergreen clause that the Board unanimously voted on last year.

Superintendent Aguilar thanked the Board for his positive evaluation and said that he will be deferring his salary increase that is provided in his employment agreement at this time. He also thanked and acknowledged labor partner United Professional Educators (UPE) for sharing and requesting that he join them in taking a two percent salary reduction, consistent with their proposal to "take the lead and consider the state auditor's recommendations of two percent across the board salary reduction in all bargaining units agree to sign on the dotted line". At this time, he too would make this commitment as we all need to pitch in and do our part to lead by example in order to tackle the District's urgent budget crisis.

Board Comments:

Second Vice President Minnick thanked Student Member Sheikh and said he was surprised to know that mental health was not considered a rationale for missing school. He would like to make sure that when a Board policy is created that there is an element of it that includes a process or understanding of how supports for students will be implemented.

Member Murawski aligned herself with Second Vice President Minnick's comments and commended Student Member Sheikh for bringing this forward; she appreciates his continued leadership on this issue.

Member Murawski motioned to move the resolution, and Member Woo seconded.

Vice President Pritchett also echoed the comments of her colleagues and thanked Student Member Sheikh. She spoke about the social-emotional effects of distance learning and requested that training be available to staff.

Member Garcia congratulated and applauded Student Member Sheikh's efforts in bringing this discussion to the Board. She appreciates that we are talking about mental health without a stigma. She asked the Board or Superintendent to find ways to advocate for additional funds and resources at the state and federal levels. She is also concerned with follow-up for students that are repeatedly absent for mental health reasons.

President Ryan reminded struggling students that there is a support line, 916 support.

A vote was taken, and the motion to approve was passed unanimously.

9.0 BOARD WORKSHOP/STRATEGIC PLAN AND OTHER INITIATIVES

9.1 College Going and CTE Update (Vincent Harris, Linda Kingston, and Christina Espinosa)

Information

The update was given by Chief Continuous Improvement and Accountability Officer Vincent Harris, Director of Guidance and Counseling, Christina Espinosa, and Director of Master Scheduling/CTE Linda Kingston.

Public Comment: Liz Guillen

Board Comments:

President Ryan acknowledged that Superintendent Aguilar has been approached by the governor's office to provide insight on the statewide longitudinal data system that Ms. Guillen spoke to. She asked, given the pandemic, how are we adjusting our response to students who might meet the indicators to be able to be eligible for a four-year college, but are following trends we are seeing across the state and under matching. Ms. Espinosa said that what they are hearing is that many students that would have typically applied to a four-year college are choosing to go to a two-year college due to cost, and because it is remote learning.

Superintendent Aguilar acknowledged comments made by staff and said there was an article in the Los Angeles Times today about national clearinghouse data which showed a 22 percent decrease in college going rates this Fall. This has particularly hit the most vulnerable populations. He said this is an area we are focused on putting a lot of attention to both centrally and at the site level.

Member Murawski expressed her appreciation for Principal Egan and Ms. Cunningham's work and their participation in the presentation.

Member Garcia thanked the presenters and those present from C. K. McClatchy High School and their case study. She asked how much sharing of best practices happens across sites. Ms. Espinosa responded and gave examples and additional information. Member Garcia noted a gap on CSU admittance and asked if we know where students go that are not admitted. Ms. Espinosa said that as a best practice many counselors encourage students to also submit an application to community college.

Student Member Sheikh thanked the presenters and noted that he received his packet in the mail.

Member Woo thanked the counselors present.

9.2 2020-21 First Interim Financial Report and FCMAT Update (Rose Ramos)

Action (Roll Call Vote)

Chief Business Officer Rose Ramos presented the 2020-21 First Interim Budget, which covered financial reporting requirements and the District's fiscal status, First Interim 2020-21 budget changes since the revised adopted budget, multi-year projections, the budget calendar, a FCMAT matrix update, and summary.

Public Comment: David Fisher Nikki Milevsky

Board Comments:

President Ryan asked Ms. Ramos to address the continued fallacy that we can use one-time funds to off-set a multi-year projected deficit. Ms. Ramos said we cannot use one-time funds to address the structural deficit. She also explained the common margin between projected balance and the actuals.

Member Murawski noted that we have projected significant deficits in past years and some actions of the District and the Board have helped to close those deficits. She asked Ms. Ramos to clarify the \$15 million drop that would be associated with reduction in enrollment of 1,500 students. She asked if that number is assumed in the 2022-23 budget. Ms. Ramos said that is a risk, and we have an opportunity to increase that. Due to SB98 we know we will be held harmless for the coming year, but there is a decline in supplemental concentration dollars. Member Murawski asked if the decline in enrollment is not carried over to the final year of the projection. Ms. Ramos said no, not yet.

Member Garcia thanked Ms. Ramos for the presentation. She asked about free and reduced lunch numbers. Ms. Ramos said the number was revised recently with an increase. Member Garcia spoke about the difficulty now in getting the forms. She asked where one-time savings go. Ms. Ramos said that on the unrestricted side they help off-set the deficit eventually and on the restricted side they are carried over if allowed. Member Garcia asked about the projection in Special Education expenditures. Ms. Ramos said it is based on trend analysis and it will probably have to be reconsidered this year as it is an off-year for us. She spoke to the impact of Special Education contracts. Member Garcia asked about state funding for restoring deferrals in relation to the COLA and subsequent effect on the \$56 million dollar deficit. Ms. Ramos said the deferrals do not impact the deficit per se and, assuming everything remains equal and we do receive a COLA, the *COLA* will reduce the deficit assuming we do not add expenses. One percent represents about \$4 million.

Vice President Pritchett motioned to approve this item, and Member Murawski seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Superintendent Aguilar introduced the topic and spoke about the short and long-term impact of reductions, and he noted that these cuts do not require negotiations with labor partners. He said that if we do not control the high cost of total compensation packages, whether by the direction of the Board or under the direction of a state administrator, these cuts will happen.

Student Board Member Sheikh's preferential vote was also yes.

Superintendent Aguilar made some comments regarding data,
and then the team presented on academic outcomes, student
engagement, and human capital.

Board Comments:

Member Rhodes asked if the number of D and F grades given could be attributed to COVID-19 and the workload. He asked if these grades are part of the 50 percent floor. Mr. Harris responded that these grades are under the revised grading scale and that they will need to dig a little deeper to determine the root cause. Member Rhodes said that the work being done with English language learners is to be applauded, and he asked Ms. Kretschman to speak on how we plan to connect with Black, Native American, and homeless students. Ms. Kretschman said that a lot of the work being done is to work with and support school sites. She explained that support and also explained variations by site. She then spoke specifically to what work is being done for homeless students. She spoke of consistency, and Member Rhodes agreed that consistency is key. He asked to hear more about Native American students, and Ms. Kaur spoke to that. Member Rhodes asked to have more detailed Native American data, and Ms. Kaur said she will provide that.

Vice President Murawski thanked the team for an informative presentation; she recognized Victoria Flores and her health team. She also recognized Ashley Clark for her work in the community. She thanked Principal Hanson for her improvement work across the board and asked her about

assessment data. Principal Hanson gave examples of how this is used in the classroom to improve skills. Vice President Murawski asked about the troubling information on phonics. Superintendent Aguilar and Ms. Baeta addressed this concern and spoke about participation rates. Ms. Baeta also spoke about the struggle of mandated training/professional learning for all. Vice President Murawski closed by commenting on the importance of providing a good foundation for those in grades K-3.

Member Garcia thanked the team for the presentation and acknowledged the hard work of all. She feels it is very important for parents and students to know where students are in terms of academics and testing. She thanked Principal Hanson for her classroom examples and for speaking on the difference between a common assessment and a teacher assessment, and she stated that both are important and necessary. She looks forward to seeing data from the second round of assessments. She is troubled by low participation rates at the high school level and asked what strategies are in place so that students accelerate their learning when we do not have information. Mr. Turkie said that without the information it is very difficult to target instruction. Member Garcia asked about tier three efforts that relate to home visitations for not engaged students. She asked why students were not engaging. Ms. Kretschman replied that there are many reasons, of which she went over. Member Garcia asked about leaves of absences for employees and how that relates to hiring substitutes. Chief Human Resources Officer Cancy McArn addressed the question and said that there are various reasons for the leaves and an increase due to the two types of COVID-19 leaves. Member Garcia asked about substitutes in a distance learning environment and what the transition is like. Ms. McArn said that credentialed teachers can teach beyond the more usual 20 day limit for substitutes. She said the department can sometimes provide some credential support for more restrictive credentials. The department is trying to be as flexible as possible. She shared that the Curriculum and Instruction department has also begun providing additional training for substitutes, which has been helpful.

President Pritchett thanked staff for their work during this difficult time. She also acknowledged that there is room for improvement, and she asked for the state average in terms of graduation rates, and how the District compares. Ms. Espinosa said she will need to get that information. President Pritchett said it appears that students are being marked absent when they have their camera off, and she asked if that is being addressed. Ms. Kretschman said that they should not be marked absent if the camera is off, and if that happens they

should contact their site and speak to the attendance staff. She noted that there are three ways a student is marked present: attending via Zoom with the camera on or off, submitting an assignment for that day, or communicating with school site staff. President Pritchett asked if home visits are being done through the Parent Teacher Home Visits. Ms. Kretschman said they are different; it is her understanding that the Parent Teacher Home Visits are being done virtually. President Pritchett asked if we are targeting families that we know do not have parents at home during distance learning. Ms. Flores spoke about home check-ins that her staff and other staff are doing.

Second Vice President Woo asked how the absence numbers reflect in LCAP numbers and if those visiting homes are bringing the forms to be filled out. Ms. Kretschman explained all of the efforts being done to make sure that everyone has those applications.

Member Villa thanked staff for putting this report and presentation together. She said that providing assessments for the entire District is crucial. She would like to see more information on what can be done, why those assessments are not being done, and what we can do with that data.

Member Phillips asked if the District has programs that are specifically for African Americans and Latinx students. Ms. Kaur said that we serve American Indian students under Title XI, and she is not aware of any other specific programs, but some targeted programming is done in the Youth Development department for men and women of color. She noted the Men's and Women's Leadership Academies that are specifically targeted for African American students. Ms. Phillips said she would like to find out more about this.

Superintendent Aguilar shared some additional information on graduation requirements A-G. He tied this to assessments and spoke on the importance of avoiding a plateau.

Student Member Sheikh concurred with the Superintendent, and said that there is so much that is unacceptable about the data seen. He noted the increase in D and F grades, chronic absence, the low percentage of those being tested, and extremely low percentage scores of second graders in phonics. He also noted the positive areas of increase in attendance through the learning hubs, in English language learning, and home visits. He pointed out that most of what is beneficial is happening in person and not over Zoom, and therefore feels we should emphasize an option for in-person learning for those in grades K-3.

9.0 BOARD WORKSHOP/STRATEGIC PLAN AND OTHER INITIATIVES

9.1 Suspension of Senior Project Graduation Requirement of Board Policy (BP) 6146.1 for 2020-2021 School Year (Christine Baeta and Matt Turkie) Action (Roll Call Vote)

Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction Matt Turkie presented. He went over high school graduation requirements, senior project requirements, conditions in the current pandemic, and next steps.

Board Comments:

President Pritchett said she asked that this item be brought to the Board, and she made a motion to approve it. Member Garcia seconded and asked if there was an analysis of the other graduation requirements that students might not be able to complete due to the pandemic. Mr. Turkie explained that the credits in eight different areas are those that are taken by all students, and many are needed for A-G requirements. The other requirement out of the ten is a proficiency in Technology Literacy, which all students are showing due to the current circumstances through distance learning, and may be brought to the Board in the future as it is embedded in Common Core.

Vice President Murawski asked if there are students in a normal year that would graduate but for the senior project requirement. Mr. Turkie said he does not have numbers, but as a former principal of a high school, shared that they would go through iterations with students where there would be a certain level that students had to reach. If they did not reach that level, they would not be on for graduation, and generally students would then need to re-do their presentation and re-defend their senior project. So yes, the requirement could keep a student from graduating. She asked Student Member Sheikh for his thoughts.

Student Member Sheikh said he thinks it would be unreasonable to ask students to go out and do this level of community work at this time. Therefore, he supports the motion.

President Pritchett asked about students that have already begun working on their senior project, some since last year. She asked if those students could receive extra credit. Mr. Turkie said that he and two Instructional Assistant Superintendents met recently to discuss this, and principals were saying that they would like to

make this an assignment for credit for students that have already done the project, not holding other students responsible for it as an assignment however.

Member Villa thanked President Pritchett for bringing this up, as it came up with many students this week at a listening session.

Vice President Murawski said she would like the students that did complete the senior project to be recognized. President Pritchett said she feels this is a great recommendation. Superintendent Aguilar asked if we could come back after assessing with principals on how we can create a balanced approach to this. He noted that this was also an issue for students last Spring, and it came to the Board for the same reason.

The motion on the table for this item passed unanimously.


