Utilizing a Request for Proposal process, the district sought to partner with an educational software provider who could offer a comprehensive, fully integrated, operational assessment system with the following components and capacities: (1) an English language arts and mathematics Common Core State Standards (CCSS) aligned item bank; (2) assessment form and item development; (3) online and scan form-based assessment delivery platform, including scoring and reporting functions, that can support district and site-developed common assessments; and (4) ability to integrate with the district's student information system, Infinite Campus. SOFTWARE LICENSE AND SUPPORT AGREEMENT

This Software License and Support Agreement ("*Agreement*") is entered into effective as of the date fully executed by both parties ("*Effective Date*") by and between Illuminate Education, Inc., a California corporation ("*Illuminate*"), and *Sacramento City Unified School District* ("*District*"), referred to individually as "party" and collectively as "parties."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, District desires to implement a web-based software system for student data and assessment management;

WHEREAS, Illuminate has developed and owns such a system known as the Illuminate Data and Assessment Management System (the "*Software*");

WHEREAS, Illuminate also has licensed from third parties the right to make available in conjunction with the Software (i) a database of test questions known as "*INSPECT*" ("*Item Bank*") and (ii) software for automated grading of multiple choice exams ("*Grading Software*"); and

WHEREAS, District desires to license the Software and obtain the services as provided herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual representations, warranties and agreements contained herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

AGREEMENT

1. Term of Agreement. Unless earlier terminated as provided herein, the initial term of this Agreement shall be from the Effective Date through **June 30, 2017** ("*Initial Term*"). This Agreement shall thereafter automatically renew for additional successive one year periods unless written notice of non-renewal is given by either party to the other at least 60 days prior to the end of the then-current term (each a "*Renewal Term*" and together with the Initial Term, the "*Term*"), unless sooner terminated as provided herein.

2. License of Software to District; Third Party Services.

(a) License. Subject to the terms of this Agreement, Illuminate hereby grants to District a limited, non-exclusive, non-sublicensable and non-transferrable license for District employees, students and their parents or guardians (collectively, "*District Users*") to use the Software during the Term with respect to each of the District locations listed on Exhibit A hereto. Exhibit A may be amended for future school years to include additional District locations. The District Users may not use the Software other than with respect to the locations set forth on Exhibit A or for other than District operations. District is responsible for the actions of all District Users, for ensuring that only authorized District Users are provided access to the Software, and that access of District Users authorized by the District is limited to that portion of the Software and District Data (as defined below) as is reasonably necessary in order to fulfill the purposes of this Agreement.

(b) Third Party Services. Illuminate has entered into agreements with third parties that permit it to authorize the District Users to download from such third parties' servers, or otherwise access, and use, through the Software, (A) the Grading Software and (B) the Item Bank, subject, in the case of the Grading Software, to execution of a standard end user license agreement with the third party provider. So long as Illuminate continues to have the right from the applicable third party to authorize District to use the Grading Software and the Item Bank in connection with the Software, it will enable the Software to allow District Users to do so. In the event that Illuminate ceases to have such right, or the applicable third party dissolves or otherwise ceases to make such product available to Illuminate, Illuminate will work with District to identify an alternative product providing substantially similar functionality and on substantially similar terms, and make such product available to District. If Illuminate is unable to find or obtain the right to provide an alternative product on such terms, District's sole remedy will be a reduction in the Annual License Fee under Section 3(a) and 3(b) by \$1.00 per student, in the case of the unavailability of the Grading Software, and \$1.50 per student, in the case of the unavailability of the Item Bank. Illuminate makes no representations or warranties regarding the functionality, quality or continuing availability of either the Grading Software or the Item Bank (or any alternative product) and will have no liability with respect thereto.

3. Annual Software License Fee. District agrees to pay to Illuminate an annual license fee (the "*Annual License Fee*") for use of the Software and applicable third party services as set forth below.

(a) Initial School Year. A fee for the initial school year beginning **July 16, 2015** and continuing through **June 30, 2016** consisting of:

- (i) \$4.00 per student for use of the Software and the Grading Software; and
- (ii) \$1.50 per student for use of the Item Bank.

(b) Subsequent School Years During Initial Term. A fee for each school year during the Initial Term after the initial school year, subject to an increase by Illuminate no more often than annually for changes in the cost of living, consisting of:

- (i) \$4.00 per student for use of the Software and the Grading Software; and
- (ii) \$1.50 per student for use of the Item Bank.

(c) Student Count. The parties agree that the number of students to be used in calculating the Annual License Fee for each school year (the "*Student Count*") shall be determined as follows:

- (i) for the initial school year, the Student Count shall be the number of students during the preceding school year based upon **CBED's** at schools in the District that will be using or are authorized to use the Software; and

for each subsequent school year the Student Count will be the number of students during the preceding school year based upon CBED's at schools in the District that will be using or are authorized to use the Software.

(d) The annual license fee will include the base items innumerated in the System Included Functionality List

By way of example, the estimated Annual License Fees for the Initial Term assuming no change in cost of living and a Student Count of **39,013** would be as follows:

(d) Renewal School Years. A fee per student (calculated based on Student Count) for each school year after the Initial Term equal to that generally charged by Illuminate to school districts at the time of renewal.

(e) Payment. The Annual License Fee for each school year shall be paid by District within 30 days of receipt of an invoice from Illuminate.

(f) Failure to Make Payment. In the event District fails to pay the Annual License Fee or other fees due hereunder when due it will constitute a material breach of this Agreement and, upon notice from Illuminate, District agrees to immediately cease, and to cause District Users to cease, using the Software and Illuminate will have no further obligation to provide any maintenance or support to District or District Users.

(g) Taxes. The fees in this Section 3 and in Section 5 below do not include sales, use or similar taxes which may be applicable. District is solely responsible and liable for payment of all sales, use, excise, value added or similar taxes, duties or charges imposed by any federal, state or local government or jurisdiction with respect to any fees or other payments to be made by District to Illuminate under this Agreement, excluding taxes based on Illuminate's overall net income.

4. Ownership of Software; Third Party Materials. Illuminate and its licensors are and will remain the exclusive owners of all right, title and interest in and to the Software and all derivative works, and in the materials licensed by Illuminate from third parties ("*Third Party Materials*"), including but not limited to copyrights, patent rights, and trade secrets and all other intellectual property rights as may exist now and/or hereafter come into existence, subject only to the rights of third parties in open source components and the limited license granted under this Agreement. In addition, Illuminate shall own any and all other ideas, concepts, themes, technology, algorithms, programming codes, documentation or other intellectual property or copyrightable material conceived, developed, created, written or contributed by Illuminate pursuant to this Agreement ("*Specific Developments*"). District will have no rights in the Software, any derivative works, the Specific Developments or Third Party Materials, except the license and related rights expressly set forth in this Agreement. District agrees not to (i) alter, merge, modify, adapt or translate the Software or Third Party Materials, or decompile, reverse-engineer, disassemble, or otherwise reduce the Software or Third Party Materials to a human-perceivable form, (ii) sell, rent, lease or sublicense the Software or Third Party Materials or (iii) create derivative works based upon the Software or Third Party Materials.

5. Software Implementation, Data Conversion, Hosting and Training Services. Illuminate agrees to provide the services associated with the implementation of the Software, data conversion, hosting and training of District employees on the use of the Software as follows:

(a) Task List. A preliminary list of tasks and associated targeted completion dates are set forth on Exhibit B attached hereto.

(b) Hosting. The Software and District's data will be hosted on Illuminate's servers (included in the Annual License Fee).

(c) Importing of Data. Illuminate will assist District with importing District's data into the Software within 45 business days after Illuminate is provided reasonable access to usable District Data, and with importing Illuminate data into the District's student information system (Infinite Campus).

(d) Initial Training. Illuminate will provide up to **10** days of initial training to District in the basic use of the Software at a charge of **\$1,500** per day, to be presented as both parties mutually agree. Fees for initial training will be billed by Illuminate in the month following the applicable training. Initial training fees shall be paid within 30 days of receipt of an invoice from Illuminate. By way of example, the estimated initial training fees assuming the maximum number of training days are used would be as follows:

6. Additional Training and Services. Upon written request and authorization by District, Illuminate will conduct additional training and provide additional services to District. Custom software development shall be at a rate of **\$120** per hour. Training after initial training is exhausted will be at a rate of **\$1,500** per day for on-site training and **\$500** per day for on-line training. Fees for such services shall be due and payable within 30 days of receipt of an invoice from Illuminate. Additional support will be rendered by an implementation manager assigned to the District.

(a) Deliverables. Common Core Aligned Item Bank. Illuminate will be responsible for providing Common Core-aligned items as outlined in the RFP that include : a) a range of items with more than 50% of items per grade level at Depth of Knowledge levels 2-4, and b) items aligned to the SBAC item types aligned to SBAC.

(b) Deliverables. New Item Request. Illuminate will work with the district to accommodate new item requests and revisions to existing items as deemed agreeable by both parties. Illuminate may work with third party services as noted in 2b to facilitate the needs of the district at a no additional cost to the district.

(c) Deliverables. The Development of Benchmarks/Interim Assessments. Illuminate will work with the district to develop 3 interim assessments for Math and ELA per tested grade level that matches the districts curriculum map.

7. Ownership and Control of District Data. District will retain ownership of, and the ability to control, all District data imported into the Software ("**District Data**"). District Data includes pupil records, as defined in California Education Code §49073.1(d)(5) ("**Pupil Records**"). Illuminate may, however, use and disclose to third parties District Data that has been anonymized or de-identified. Upon the termination of this Agreement, to the extent District Data resides on Illuminate servers, Illuminate agrees to assist in the transfer all District Data back to District in an industry standard open format such as SQL at no charge.

8. Responsibilities of District. District agrees to prepare and furnish to Illuminate upon request such information as is reasonably requested by Illuminate in order for Illuminate to perform its obligations under this Agreement.

9. Illuminate Software Maintenance and Support. Illuminate agrees to provide maintenance and support of the Software. Such maintenance and support will include coverage in the form of bug fixes and other corrections to the Software; telephone and e-mail support for questions regarding operations of the Software; change the Software as necessary to incorporate upgrades and new features; support to District in resolving problems/errors resulting from misuse or hardware/software failure; telephone or web conferences with District to address future growth or modifications to the Software. Maintenance and support of the Software is provided at no additional cost to District. Illuminate is not responsible for, nor will it have any liability resulting from, (a) modifications to or alterations of the Software or databases by District or District Users, unless such modification or alteration is approved in writing by Illuminate, or (b) any failure of District or District Users equipment or software.

10. Confidentiality.

(a) Confidential Information Defined. Each party (the "*Disclosing Party*") may from time to time during the Term disclose to the other party (the "*Receiving Party*") certain information regarding the Disclosing Party's business, including technical, marketing, financial, employee, planning, and other confidential or proprietary information ("*Confidential Information*"). The Software, Third Party Materials and related know-how, technology, system designs, layouts, software, concepts, techniques, data and files will be considered Confidential Information of Illuminate. District Data will be considered Confidential Information of District.

(b) Protection of Confidential Information. The Receiving Party will protect the Disclosing Party's Confidential Information from unauthorized use, access, or disclosure in the same manner as the Receiving Party protects its own confidential or proprietary information of a similar nature and with no less than reasonable care. District acknowledges that the Software is maintained as a trade secret by Illuminate, and agrees to use reasonable care in preserving such secrecy, including making such information available only to those District Users required to have access in order to fulfill the purposes of this Agreement. Illuminate acknowledges that Pupil Records must be protected and will take all legally required actions in accord with the California Education Code, including the designation and training of responsible individuals, to ensure the security and confidentiality of Pupil Records.

(c) Exceptions. The Receiving Party's obligations under this section with respect to any Confidential Information of the Disclosing Party will terminate if the Receiving Party can demonstrate that such information: (i) was already known to the Receiving Party at the time of disclosure by the Disclosing Party; (ii) is disclosed to the Receiving Party by a third party who had the right to make such disclosure without any confidentiality restrictions; (iii) is, or through no fault of the Receiving Party has become, generally available to the public; or (iv) is independently developed by the Receiving Party without access to, or use of, the Disclosing Party's Confidential Information. In addition, the Receiving Party will be allowed to disclose Confidential Information of the Disclosing Party to the extent that such disclosure is (i) approved in writing by the Disclosing Party, (ii) necessary for the Receiving Party to enforce its rights under this Agreement in connection with a legal proceeding; or (iii) required by law or by the

order of a court or similar judicial or administrative body, provided that the Receiving Party notifies the Disclosing Party of such required disclosure promptly and in writing and cooperates with the Disclosing Party, at the Disclosing Party's reasonable request and expense, in any lawful action to contest or limit the scope of such required disclosure.

(d) Return of Confidential Information. In addition to Illuminate's obligations under Section 6, promptly upon the written request of the Disclosing Party following termination of this Agreement, the Receiving Party will either, at Disclosing Party's option, return to the Disclosing Party or destroy all Confidential Information of the Disclosing Party in the Receiving Party's possession or control and certify in writing that it has fully complied with its obligations under this Section.

(e) Use of Confidential Information. The Receiving Party will not use Confidential Information of the Disclosing Party for any purpose prohibited by law or other than as required or reasonably contemplated by this Agreement. Illuminate further agrees it will not use any personally identifiable information in District Data to engage in or facilitate targeted advertising.

(f) Injunctive Relief. Because monetary damages may not be sufficient to remedy a violation of the provisions of this section, a Disclosing Party shall be entitled, upon becoming aware of any such violation and without waiving any other rights or remedies it may have, to seek whatever injunctive or other equitable relief it may deem appropriate.

11. Privacy and Collection of District Data.

(a) Compliance with Law. Each of Illuminate and District represents and warrants that it, and its officials, agents, employees and subcontractors is familiar with the provisions of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act ("**FERPA**") and equivalent state provisions, and each party agrees that it will comply with such provisions and take all reasonable measures necessary to protect student education records from unauthorized acquisition or release. In the event that any unauthorized acquisition or release of student education records occurs, each party agrees to advise the other promptly upon discovery of such unauthorized acquisition or release. In the event that either party becomes aware of a data breach resulting in the unauthorized acquisition or release of confidential student records, it shall take immediate steps to limit and mitigate such security breach to the extent possible. Illuminate and District will work cooperatively in determining an action plan, including any required notification of affected persons. The party at fault for the data breach resulting in the unauthorized acquisition or release will be responsible for providing any required remedies to the extent possible.

(b) Sharing of District Data. Illuminate will not share District Data except (i) as directed by District, (ii) to District Users as contemplated by this Agreement, (iii) to Illuminate's subcontractors who need access to fulfill Illuminate's obligations under this Agreement and who have agreed to maintain the confidentiality (as noted in Section 9) of such information or (iv) as required by applicable law. When Illuminate believes that any disclosure is required by applicable law, it shall promptly notify the District prior to the disclosure and give the District a reasonable opportunity to object to the disclosure.

(c) Storage and Process. Illuminate will store and process District Data in accordance with commercially reasonable practices, including appropriate administrative, physical, and technical safeguards, to secure such data from unauthorized access, disclosure, alteration, and use. Illuminate will make available to the District a copy of the District Data for download and use on a daily basis.

(d) Right to Correct. A parent, legal guardian, or student who has reached 18 years of age may review personally identifiable information in the student's education records and correct erroneous information by serving a written request for access or description of the erroneous information and written request for correction upon District and furnishing District, upon request, such information as is reasonably requested to respond to the request. District is responsible for correcting all such erroneous information and Illuminate agrees to fully cooperate with District to make such corrections.

(e) Social Security Numbers. District agrees that it will not collect or store as part of the District Data or otherwise any social security numbers.

12. Illuminate Warranty.

(a) Software Warranty. Illuminate warrants to District that the Software as delivered, will materially comply with the published specifications of Illuminate for such Software. Illuminate's obligations under this warranty are limited to providing District with a copy of corrected Software. Illuminate does not warrant that the operation of the Software will be uninterrupted or error-free. IN PARTICULAR, FOR PURPOSES OF THE FOREGOING WARRANTY, ILLUMINATE AND DISTRICT ACKNOWLEDGE THAT THE SOFTWARE IS NOT AND CANNOT BE MADE TO BE 100% ACCURATE, AND THAT ANY ERRORS OR FAILURE TO PERFORM SHALL NOT BE DEEMED A BREACH OF SUCH WARRANTY UNLESS THEY ARE SIGNIFICANT AND NOT TO BE EXPECTED IN LIGHT OF THE LIMITATIONS OF SOFTWARE OF THIS TYPE.

(b) No Other Warranty. EXCEPT AS EXPRESSLY SET FORTH ABOVE, ILLUMINATE DISCLAIMS ALL WARRANTIES, EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, WITH REGARD TO ALL TECHNOLOGY, THIRD PARTY MATERIALS, SOFTWARE OR DERIVATIVE WORKS PROVIDED OR OTHERWISE LICENSED TO DISTRICT IN CONNECTION WITH THIS AGREEMENT, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO, THE IMPLIED WARRANTIES OF MERCHANTABILITY, FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR USE AND NON-INFRINGEMENT.

13. Indemnification.

(a) By Illuminate. Illuminate agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless District and its directors, officers, employees, and agents from and against all damages, costs (including reasonable attorneys' fees), judgments and other expenses arising out of or on account of any third party claim: (i) alleging that the Software infringes or misappropriates the proprietary or intellectual property rights of any third party, except to the extent that such infringement results from District's misuse of or modifications to the Software; (ii) that results from the negligence or intentional misconduct of Illuminate or its employees or agents; or (iii)

that results from any breach of any of the representations, warranties or covenants contained herein by Illuminate.

(b) By District. To the extent permitted under applicable law, District agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless Illuminate and its directors, officers, employees, and agents from and against all damages, costs (including reasonable attorneys' fees), judgments and other expenses arising out of or on account of any third party claim that results from (i) the negligence or intentional misconduct of District or its employees or agents or (ii) any breach of any of the representations, warranties or covenants contained herein by District.

(c) Indemnification Procedure. The parties' obligation to indemnify is subject to the conditions that the party with the obligation to indemnify ("*Indemnifying Party*") is given prompt notice of any such claims and is given primary control of and all reasonably requested assistance (at the other party's cost) for the defense of such claims (with counsel reasonably satisfactory to the party being indemnified ("*Indemnified Party*")), provided that the Indemnified Party shall under no circumstances be required to admit liability, and provided further that any delay in notification shall not relieve the Indemnifying Party of its obligations hereunder except to the extent that the delay materially impairs its ability to indemnify. Without limiting the foregoing, the Indemnified Party may participate in the defense at its own expense and with its own counsel; provided that if the Indemnified Party reasonably concludes that the Indemnifying Party has conflicting interests or different defenses available with respect to such claim, the reasonable fees and expenses of one counsel to the Indemnified Party shall be borne by the Indemnifying Party. The Indemnifying Party shall not enter into or acquiesce to any settlement containing any admission of or stipulation to any guilt, fault, liability or wrongdoing on the part of the Indemnified Party or which would otherwise adversely affect the Indemnified Party without the Indemnified Party's prior written consent (which shall not be unreasonably withheld). The Indemnifying Party shall keep the Indemnified Party advised of the status of the claims and the defense thereof and shall consider in good faith the recommendations made by the Indemnified Party with respect thereto.

14. Insurance. Illuminate agrees to carry a comprehensive general and automobile liability insurance with limits of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000.00) per occurrence combined single limit for bodily injury and property damage in a form mutually acceptable to both parties to protect Illuminate and District against liability or claims of liability which may arise out of this Agreement. Illuminate agrees to maintain workers' compensation insurance as required under applicable law.

15. Termination.

(a) Termination by District. District may terminate this Agreement without cause prior to the expiration of the Term, effective upon the end of a District fiscal year, by giving Illuminate written notice of its intent to so terminate at least sixty (60) days prior to the end of such District fiscal year.

(b) Termination for Cause. Either party may terminate this Agreement prior to the expiration of the Term, effective immediately upon written notice to the other party, in the event of a material breach of this Agreement by the other party hereto, which breach remains uncured for more than thirty (30) days after written notice thereof. In addition, either party may

terminate this Agreement upon ten (10) days written notice to the other party upon the occurrence of any one or more of the following: (i) the institution by or against the other party of insolvency, receivership, or bankruptcy proceedings or any other proceedings for the settlement of the other party's debts; (ii) the other party making an assignment for the benefit of creditors; or (iii) the other party's dissolution.

(c) Rights in Law and Equity Remain. The foregoing rights to terminate are in addition to, not in lieu of, all other rights and remedies which may be available to either party under this Agreement, at law and/or in equity.

(d) Survival. The obligations in the following Sections will survive any expiration or termination of this Agreement: Sections 2(b), 4, 6, 9, 10, 11, 12, 14 and 15 and any obligations to pay for license fees, services, training or taxes pursuant to Sections 3 or 5 that were earned or payable relating to the period prior to termination.

16. Miscellaneous.

(a) Entire Agreement; Counterparts. This Agreement and the Exhibits hereto contain the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the transactions contemplated hereby and supersedes all prior negotiations, commitments, agreements and understandings between them with respect thereto. This Agreement may be executed in two or more counterparts, all of which when taken together shall be considered one and the same agreement and will become effective when counterparts have been signed by each party and delivered to the other party, it being understood that both parties need not sign the same counterpart. In the event that any signature is delivered by facsimile transmission, or by e-mail delivery of a ".pdf" data file, such signature will create a valid and binding obligation of the party executing (or on whose behalf such signature is executed) with the same force and effect as if such facsimile signature page were an original thereof.

(b) Notices. All notices, requests, demands and consents to be made hereunder to the parties hereto pursuant to this Agreement will be in writing and will be sufficiently given if personally delivered, sent by other means of electronic transmission (including electronic mail) or sent by mail, postage prepaid to the party at the following addresses or to such other address as either party may hereafter designate to the other in accordance herewith:

- (c) Assignment; Successors and Assigns. Neither party may assign this Agreement or its obligations hereunder without the prior written consent of the other party hereto, except that either party may assign this Agreement in connection with a sale of all or substantially all its outstanding equity or assets without the consent of the other party hereto. Subject to the foregoing, this Agreement will be binding upon, and inure to the benefit of, each of the parties hereto and, except as otherwise expressly provided herein, their respective legal representatives, successors and assigns.
- (d) Amendments, Waivers and Severability. Except as otherwise provided herein, this Agreement may be amended, and compliance with any provision of this Agreement may be omitted or waived, only by written agreement duly signed by Illuminate and District. Any provision of this Agreement that is prohibited or unenforceable in any jurisdiction will not invalidate or render unenforceable the remaining provisions of this Agreement.
- (e) Governing Law. This Agreement will be governed by, and construed and enforced in accordance with, the substantive laws of the State of California, without regard to its principles of conflicts of laws.
- (f) Relationship of the Parties. Nothing contained in this Agreement will be construed as creating any agency, partnership, or other form of joint enterprise between the parties. The relationship between the parties will at all times be that of independent contractors. Neither party will have authority to contract for or bind the other in any manner whatsoever. This Agreement confers no rights upon either party except those expressly granted herein.
- (g) Interpretation. This Agreement will be construed without regard to any presumption or rule requiring construction or interpretation against the party drafting an instrument or causing any instrument to be drafted. The headings in this Agreement are for reference only and will not affect the interpretation of this Agreement.
- (h) No Third-Party Beneficiaries. This Agreement is for the sole benefit of the parties hereto and their respective successors and permitted assigns and nothing herein, express or implied, is intended to or will confer upon any other person or entity any legal or equitable right, benefit or remedy of any nature whatsoever under or by reason of this Agreement.

(i) Improper Payments. Illuminate represents and warrants that it has not directly or indirectly offered or given, and will not directly or indirectly offer or give, to any employee, agent or representative of District any cash or noncash gratuity or payment with a view toward securing any business from District or influencing such person with respect to the conditions, or performance of any contracts with or orders from District, including without limitation this Agreement.

(j) Limitation of Liability. In no event will either party be liable to the other party or to any third party for any incidental, special, indirect, exemplary, punitive or consequential damages arising out of or relating to this Agreement, including any damages for business interruption, loss of use, or lost or damaged data, whether arising out of breach of contract, tort (including negligence) or otherwise, even if such party or any of its authorized representatives has been advised of the possibility of such damages. Each party's aggregate liability arising out of or relating to this Agreement for any damages, costs, judgments, expenses or loss resulting from any claims, demands, or actions arising out of or relating to this Agreement (including indemnification) will not exceed the fees paid or due payable by District to Illuminate during the preceding twelve months pursuant to this Agreement.

(k) Force Majeure. Neither party will be liable to the other for any delay or failure to perform due to causes beyond its reasonable control. Performance times will be considered extended for a period of time equivalent to time lost because of any such delay by providing prompt written notice of such expected delay to the other party.

(l) Due Authority of Signatories. Each individual signing this Agreement on behalf of a party represents and warrants that he or she has been duly authorized by appropriate action of such party to execute, and thereby bind such party to, this Agreement.

Recommendation: Approve the 2015-16 Single Plans for Student Achievement for K-12 schools.

Background/Rationale: Each school participating in state and federally funded programs, per the Consolidated Application (ConApp), is required to develop or update its Single Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA) on an annual basis. The stated purpose of the SPSA is to “improve the academic performance of all pupils to the level of performance goals, as established by the Academic Performance Index.” (Ed. Code 64001)

Financial Considerations: Plans outline actions that will be supported with state and federal funds as allocated to each respective site.

9.3 Superintendent’s Report (José L. Banda)

Information

Superintendent Banda noted that at the last meeting he shared information on the great summer learning programs offered to our students. Tonight he spoke of summer learning that is going on for our employees and reported that Principals, Assistant Principals, and teacher leaders from nine schools came together at the Serna Center this week to learn about restorative practices with staff from the International Institute for Restorative Practices. Schools that participated are California Middle, Albert Einstein Middle, Oak Ridge Elementary, Will C. Wood Middle, Luther Burbank High School, John Sloat Elementary, John Bidwell Elementary, New Technology High School, and Sutterville Elementary. Over the four day program our educators studied the theory behind restorative practice and learned about relational trust-building. This week we have also had teams of educators at Hollywood Park Elementary in an advanced institute on Balanced Literacy. Balanced Literacy is a workshop approach to reading and writing instruction. Also, starting on August 24th, we will be collaborating with the Sacramento City Teachers Association on a professional learning series about our new revised K-6 report card. Finally, Superintendent Banda gave a shout out to our

Facilities team. They have been working hard all summer on projects to improve the safety and sustainability of our schools. They have completed 97 projects on 46 sites that range from repairs funded by the State's Emergency Repair Program to deferred maintenance and green upgrades. Almost all projects will be completed by the start of school on Thursday, September 3rd. Those that are not finished will not impact students or classrooms in any way. The Superintendent congratulated all staff who spent the summer making our schools better for the families and children we serve.

9.4 President's Report (Darrel Woo)

Information

President Woo said that the Go B'Nanas group we saw tonight is a fantastic touring teaching team. This is part of the summer of service of 2015. He reiterated what the Superintendent said about the District's expanded learning program. He toured the program and shared what he observed at the middle school and high school level. He saw an opportunity to grow management teams that take a concept and have the class decide on budgeting their own needs. It all culminates in a presentation at the end of summer that he found fantastic. What the students learn in the classroom during the school year is implemented during the summer. President Woo thanked the Packard Foundation for helping to fund this with a large grant to the District. The Packard Foundation has been very impressed with what the District has achieved with their grant funds over the years, and President Woo hopes they continue to provide grants so that we can continue to improve and expand the program as well as use it as a model for the rest of the State of California. President Woo complimented Youth Services for a job well-done, especially Monroe Howard who is leading the team.

Vice President Pritchett reported that the Superintendent Evaluation Committee has finalized and sent a survey to community members and staff. There has been great response so far; she asked that if you have received the survey, please take it.

Member Arroyo announced that yesterday District staff did a phenomenal job at West Campus in outlining the process of what is ahead in terms of replacing Principal Thomas. Principal Thomas was there for a number of years. For any parents and students that were not able to be there yesterday, Member Arroyo explained that there is still opportunity for members of the community to tell staff what they would like to see in the next principal. They can e-mail Member Arroyo through the District website. Hopefully staff will wrap up the process of getting what criteria is wanted in order to develop interview questions by the middle of next week.

Second Vice President Hansen reported on progress of the Floyd Farms project. He hopes to have something to bring forward for review soon. The City of Sacramento and Councilmember Steve Hansen have been good partners on this project. The home construction that is happening around Leataata Floyd Elementary School and Health Professions High School is moving along rapidly, and this will provide more opportunity for students to come to our District. Second Vice President Hansen also reported that Crocker/Riverside Elementary School had their first meeting on having an Early Kinder program. He gave a shout out to Area Assistant Superintendent Mary Hardin Young for helping arrange that meeting and to fellow Board members for supporting an Early Kinder program

at the school and in Trustee Area 1. He reported that it looks like it will be a full program from the start, and he feels it is important to expand the program to more schools. In closing, Vice President Hansen reported on an opportunity he had in attending the Kennedy School at Harvard for the month of July.

10.0 BOARD WORKSHOP/STRATEGIC PLAN AND OTHER INITIATIVES

- 10.1 Adoption of Initial Proposal to Sacramento City Teachers' Association (SCTA) Regarding Certificated Unit Collective Bargaining Agreement Negotiations (Cancy McArn) **Action**

Chief Human Resources Officer Cancy McArn and Employee Relations Director Cindy Nguyen presented the initial proposal related to upcoming negotiations with SCTA for Board approval. Ms. McArn explained that this initial proposal is to engage in negotiations based on conversations around Article 12, Compensation, and Article 13, Employee Benefits. Under Article 12, Compensation, the District is interested in total compensation and modifications that will enable the District to continue to offer competitive salaries to certificated employees while maintaining a sustainable budget. The District is interested in negotiating these enhancements. In addition, due to the complexity of benefits and added requirements associated with Affordable Care Act, under Article 13, Employee Benefits, the District is also interested in beginning general benefit-related conversations for the 2016-17 school year.

President Woo entertained a motion, and a motion was made by Vice President Pritchett. The motion was seconded by Second Vice President Hansen and passed unanimously with Member Ryan absent.

- 10.2 Approve Washington Elementary School Reopening (Al Rogers) **Conference/Action**

Chief Strategy Officer Al Rogers gave a presentation on the reopening of Washington Elementary School. He gave a history of the school and a summary of the closure that happened two years ago. He then explained circumstances within the community now that merit reopening Washington Elementary School as a destination school. A timeline of events was given that would lead to reopening in September of 2016.

Public Comments:

Steven Hansen, City of Sacramento Councilmember for District 4, reported on two housing projects in midtown that were just approved. He feels these approved projects give support to a decision to reopen this neighborhood school. Due to the number of workers that migrate into downtown during the work week, he supports the reopening of Washington Elementary School, especially as a destination school.

Anna Molander said it is important for Washington Elementary School to reopen if we are to build a strong downtown, and she thanked the Board for considering this tonight and for considering the growth that is going on around the school.

George Raya, representing Marshall School/New Era Park Neighborhood Association, said that they have noticed a younger demographic joining their organization and moving into the central city. He stated that there are private schools, but not public schools for the northern half of the central city. The Association is

excited that the Board is looking at reopening Washington Elementary School.

Mikey Hothi, President of the Sacramento County Young Democrats, asked that everyone support the reopening of Washington Elementary School.

Board Member Comments:

Member Arroyo mentioned the closure of Washington Elementary School along with the closure of six other schools two years ago, and he said he is happy to be here today to see the Board looking at the needs of the community. He also feels it is exciting that there will be a principal that can take on the development of getting the project on-track immediately.

Member Cochrane thanked the 47 people that e-mailed her in support of reopening Washington Elementary School. She also thanked Second Vice President Hansen for his work on this. Member Cochrane feels the reopening of Washington Elementary School will be a rich asset for the neighborhood; it will create a destination program that will dig very deep into twentieth-first century standards. She feels it will be a wonderful thing for the District and Sacramento.

Member Rodriguez thanked Jay Hansen and his team. She also thanked Councilmember Hansen for reaching out to her early-on. She said it is wonderful to see one of the schools that closed two years ago be reopened. She noted, however, that a couple of weeks ago we gave one of our facilities away. She asked why the northern part of Sacramento is always in the forefront and why, when speaking of this area, we speak of design teams and creative, innovative measures, but when it comes to south side Sacramento we hear “let’s just give them a community center”. There are children in the community that are going to 17 different schools. They are English language learners and high poverty; they only hope that they can have a school within walking distance. Member Rodriguez said that no one listened, and that it is a tragedy. She noted that, as we speak, a presiding Bishop over a faith base of four million is having a conversation about racism in America. They are asking what are we doing, what kind of decisions are we making, and who are we impacting with these decisions. Member Rodriguez said she wants to bring that forward here; when we make decisions, who are we making these decisions to and for. She would love to see more schools opened and communities thriving around a school that is providing a high-rigor education with equity and access for all students, not just the ones that have a community that know how to vocalize, coalesce, and come together to push matters forward. It is the ones that do not come to us that we should be more concerned with; we should go out into their community to understand their needs, desires, and wants so that they can be successful. She is happy that we are opening Washington Elementary School, but she wants more schools open.

Vice President Pritchett said she is very happy, and hopefully the Board will vote to approve this item. She thanked Second Vice President Hansen and Councilmember Hansen for their continuous efforts to reach out to the community. She also thanked the other Board members for recognizing that this is a need in the community. She agrees with Member Rodriguez that in the future we need to be discussing and looking at the data and finding out what the needs in the other communities are. She looks forward to being at future meetings at Washington Elementary School. She encouraged the Board to approve this item.

Member Cochrane read a statement for Member Ryan, who could not be present: “Board Member Ryan regrets that her work requires her to be in Southern California tonight, but she asks that I express her strong support for the reopening of Washington Elementary and her hopes that the Board can develop a school design that will best serve Sacramento area families.”

Second Vice President Hansen said it is an exciting evening to have this opportunity to speak on the reopening of Washington Elementary School. He appreciates the presentation and acknowledged that it has been a long process. He said that the vote to close schools as a new Board member was the most difficult he

has had to make so far, but feels it was the right thing to do at that time. Luckily, however, we have all been working together to make those circumstances change. Downtown is exploding in growth; Sacramento is a destination city, and it should have many destination schools. He feels this is a way to grow the city and thinks we can work with our council-partners to make more parts of Sacramento destinations for businesses and jobs. Then we can grow the city to encompass the vision of Member Rodriguz, fellow Board members, and others. He appreciates the partnership with Councilmember Hansen and hopes that it inspires more work between the city and the District. The community has really come together on this. Having great academic programs is not only the right thing for the community, but will bring more students to the District. He looks forward to learning more about David Lubin Elementary and appreciates the school bringing information forward. He also has learned much about the program at David Lubin Elementary from Member Cochrane. Vice President Hansen noted that Washington was built in 1916, so when it reopens it will be the school's 100th anniversary. He appreciates the presentation and the Board's support on this Item.

President Woo invited Second Vice President Hansen to make a motion to approve this Item. Second Vice President Hansen did so, and President Woo seconded the motion. There was no further discussion, and the motion passed 6-0 with Member Ryan being absent.

Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) Update
September 3, 2015

I. Introduction:

At the June 18, 2015 Board of Education meeting, staff presented the 2015-16 Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) for adoption. The plan was adopted and forwarded to the Sacramento County Office of Education (SCOE) for technical review and approval prior to review by the California Department of Education (CDE).

The district received direction from SCOE to make specific additions and/or amendments to the document. County staff advised the district that these changes are “not substantive” and do not require Board action; however they are provided as an information item. The district received written approval of the 2015-16 LCAP from SCOE on August 18, 2015.

The application process for the parent advisory committees for the 2015-16 school year will be outlined for the Board.

II. Driving Governance:

According to Ed Code 52060 on or before July 1, 2015, the Governing Board of each school district shall adopt a Local Control Accountability Plan (“LCAP”) using a template adopted by the State Board of Education (“SBE”), effective for three years with annual updates. It will include the district’s annual goals for all students and for each subgroup in regard to the eight state priorities and any local priorities, as well as the plans for implementing actions to achieve those goals.

Statute requires the district to consult with all stakeholders, and illustrate how stakeholder engagement is reflected in the plan. The district must show the inclusion of parents, including parents or legal guardians of targeted disadvantaged pupils in the planning and implementation of the LCFF, including the engagement with a parent advisory committee (PAC) and English learner parent advisory committee.

III. Revisions to Plan:

The Final LCAP includes the following additions and/or amendments per direction from the SCOE. *(Note that a version of the Board-adopted LCAP with changes highlighted is included as an attachment. The final document is posted on the district website (www.scusd.edu/LCAP) in English, Spanish and Hmong.)*

Stakeholders interested in participating in the statute-specified Parent Advisory Committee for the 2016-17 LCAP will complete an online application with the following information:

- A brief summary of why they want to serve on this committee and why they feel their voice is representative of their area and/or one or more of the subgroups explicitly called out in LCFF

The district will promote and publicize the application process to ensure the applicant pool is inclusive and representative of the entire community.

V. Parent Advisory Committee Selection:

Each SCUSD Trustee and the Superintendent will select two (2) members for the committee from the pool of applicants. The committee will include sixteen (16) members. Staff recommends that Trustees make every effort to appoint representatives from their Trustee Area.

VI. Parent Advisory Committee Demographics:

In order to ensure this committee is reflective of the diverse community we serve, as well as subgroups explicitly called out in LCFF, the group must include a minimum number of representatives in key demographic areas.

The LCAP Parent Advisory Committee must include

- At least ten (10) parents/guardians/caregivers
- At least eleven (11) representatives that represent a Title 1 school (current parent, former parent, student or staff member)

Note these representations are consistent with the district's demographic breakdown. Approximately 68% of SCUSD students qualify for Free or Reduced Price Lunch; approximately 22% of SCUSD students are English-learners (EL); approximately 13% of SCUSD students receive special education services. There are approximately 755 Homeless and 227 foster youth in SCUSD.

VII. English Learner Parent Advisory Committee:

The district has heard concerns from many about the progress of our students who are English Learners, and to that end, is escalating efforts to engage parents of English Learners. Finding a dedicated group of parents of our EL students is critical to our success.

As a result, the English Learner Parent Advisory Committee will be engaged through a parallel process to the LCAP PAC. Stakeholders interested in participating in the English Learner Parent Advisory Committee will be recruited at school sites and through the District English Learner Advisory Committee (DELAC), which meets for the first time this year November 12, 2015.

The district will promote and publicize the application process so that the applicant pool is inclusive and representative of the entire community. While EL parents from all school sites will be contacted, additional outreach will be implemented at school sites with over 35% English learners.

In order to ensure this committee reflects the diverse community we serve the composition of the committee will be balanced with regard to language, segment (elementary, middle, etc.) and geographic region. Additionally, the committee will include:

- Parents of English Learners
- Parents of Reclassified students
- Staff and/or community members that work with English Learner students

SUBJECT: 2015-2016 LCAP and Adopted Budget Report

Dear Superintendent Banda:

In accordance with Education Code sections 52070 and 42127, the Sacramento County Office of Education has reviewed the Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) and adopted budget of the Sacramento City Unified School District for fiscal year 2015-2016.

Education Code requires that the County Superintendent approve the LCAP or annual update for each school district after determining all of the following:

- The LCAP adheres to the template adopted by the State Board of Education.
- The budget includes expenditures sufficient to implement the specific actions and strategies included in the LCAP.
- The LCAP adheres to the expenditure requirements for funds apportioned on the basis of the number and concentration of unduplicated students pursuant to sections 42238.02 and 42238.03.

Based on our review, your LCAP is **approved**.

Education Code requires that the County Superintendent approve, conditionally approve, or disapprove the adopted final budget for each school district after doing the following:

- Examine the adopted budget to determine whether it complies with the standards and criteria established pursuant to section 33127, and identify any technical corrections needed to bring the budget into compliance with those standards and criteria.



- Determine whether the adopted budget will allow the district to meet its financial obligations during the current fiscal year and is consistent with a financial plan that will enable the district to satisfy its multi-year financial commitments.
- Determine whether the adopted budget includes the expenditures necessary to implement the LCAP or annual update to the LCAP.

Based upon our review of the adopted budget, the district's 2015-2016 budget has been **approved** as submitted with the following comments:

- Based on the multi-year projections and assumptions provided by the district, it appears that the district will meet its 2% unrestricted reserve requirement for the current fiscal year and the two subsequent fiscal years. The district is projecting a decrease of \$6,204,868 in the unrestricted General Fund balance for 2016-2017 and \$10,716,442 in 2017-2018.
- The district continues to project declining enrollment and is expecting decreases of 1,076 ADA in 2015-2016, 754 ADA in 2016-2017, and 400 ADA in 2017-2018.
- It is noted that in 2015-2016, the Child Development Fund requires a contribution of \$1.5 million from the General Fund for support. Our understanding is that the district's Head Start funding was significantly cut and this contribution was needed to continue the current Child Development program. It is also our understanding that the district anticipates consistent continued contributions of approximately \$1.5 million annually.

We are requesting that the district provide the following:

- The district projects ADA will continue to decline and projects a reduction of the unrestricted fund balance of \$6,204,868 in 2016-2017 and \$10,716,442 in 2017-2018. We recommend that the district develop and implement a budget reduction plan for 2016-2017 and 2017-2018. This plan must be viable and must restore the district to full solvency. It should include, but not be limited to, supporting expenditures from on-going revenue sources and be independent from any one-time income. Please submit a budget reduction plan with the First Period Interim Report.
- In previous years, the Child Development Fund was a self-sustaining fund and did not require contributions from the General Fund for support. We recommend that the district develop and submit to the county office with the First Period Interim Report, a budget reduction plan to solve the Child Development Fund encroachment. The optimal resolution would require that the Child Development Fund be self-sustaining.

- As you are aware, the Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB) liability continues to be a problem that draws on district resources. The last actuary report shows that the estimated unfunded liability will grow from approximately \$611 million at June 30, 2013 to \$658 million at June 30, 2016. Our understanding is that the 2015-2016 budget has approximately \$2 million allocated to contribute to the OPEB Trust. We are very disappointed that the district has not done more to fund this obligation, as a \$2 million contribution barely begins to address the problem. The continued lack of urgency to address this obligation only increases the encroachment on the General Fund. This encroachment cannot be sustained without further eroding educational programs. Once again, we are requesting that the district develop a viable long-term liability reduction plan. As always, SCOE staff is available to assist the district in this endeavor. Please submit a viable long-term OPEB liability plan with the First Interim Period Report.
- Notify us immediately, and provide for our review, any changes to the budget.
- Continue to closely monitor future enrollment trends and inform us of budget adjustments should enrollment trends fluctuate.
- During the implementation period of the Local Control Funding Formula, the district should be prepared to share information with its stakeholders about the new funding formula and its impact on the district's budget, the budget development process, and the expectations for the LCAP.

Community Meetings

As a practice, stakeholders are invited to all events by multiple methods: email, autodial phone reminders, flyers, web, media, and social media. Staff personally invited parents, Parent Leadership Pathway participants, district advisory committees, as well as other community partners and groups. Translation and childcare are provided.

February 17 Community Meeting

This meeting included an overview of the impact of last year’s engagement in the creation of the LCAP, and a recap of the outreach. In small groups, including one group facilitated in Spanish, and one group in Hmong, and one of students, staff shared the existing goals and the actions that support each goal.

February 17 Community Meeting:

Facilitators recorded responses for each goal on what is working at their school sites, and what could be expanded or added to support student success. For each goal, a gradient voting method was used so that each person could indicate their approval of each goal from Agree Completely to Disagree.

The gradient voting results showed this level of agreement with the goals:

- Goal 1 (College and Career Ready Students) 70% Agree/Mostly Agree
- Goal 2 (Safe, Clean, Healthy Schools) 81% Agree/Mostly Agree
- Goal 3 (Family and Community Engagement) 82% Agree/Mostly Agree

March 26 Community Meeting

At the March meeting, Chief Business Officer Gerardo Castillo shared a Budget presentation with a recap of the prior year, and updated projections for 2015-2016, including challenges that the district faces with increased utilities, retirement, and health care costs. The Annual Update metrics were shared with small groups as part of the facilitated discussion.

March 26 Community Meeting

Following Mr. Castillo’s presentation, the participants broke up into groups for discussions around the prompt, “Should additional discretionary funds become available, what programs or services would you like to see expanded or added?” District staff framed the conversation around the existing goals of the LCAP.

Responses from both community meetings were recorded and the input used to inform the draft plan.

May 14 Community Meeting

The draft LCAP (published in English, Spanish and Hmong) was shared in an "open house" format, with bilingual staff available to discuss the programs supported under each of the three district goals, and answer questions. Laptop computers were available for participants to take the online survey that night. Paper surveys were also available.

May 14 Community Meeting

The attendees were able to have an in-depth conversation with district staff and members of the LCAP Parent Advisory Committee, The meeting room was set in "stations" depicting Stakeholder Engagement, Goals 1, 2, and 3. Other tables held laptop computers so that attendees could take the LCAP draft survey, and copies of the full document as well as the translated "Community Guide to the LCAP."

District English Learners Advisory Committee (DELAC)

DELAC members were presented with the gradient method to vote on LCAP goals in February:

- Goal 1 (College and Career Ready Students) 79% Agree/Mostly Agree
- Goal 2 (Safe, Clean, Healthy Schools) 88% Agree/Mostly Agree
- Goal 3 (Family and Community Engagement) over 94% Agree/Mostly Agree

The Annual Update was shared in March. Charted responses from the DELAC committee were used to inform the draft plan.

The DELAC subcommittee on LCAP was self-selected to compose comments for the superintendent on the draft. The subcommittee was comprised of parents, community members, a principal and a district administrator.

Their comments highlighted concerns for student support in several areas:

- High-quality ELD instruction time and professional learning for teachers
- Academic supports for EL students
- Elementary arts instruction
- Translation and interpretation services
- Additional counselors, nurses, custodians, bilingual instructional assistants
- Increased parent engagement opportunities

Student Advisory Council (SAC)

Staff attended and presented information for the district's Student Advisory Council. Students outside of the SAC were surveyed in 7th period classes in partnership with expanded learning providers.

The Student Advisory Council is comprised of representatives from all 13 high schools. They provided feedback on the goals at the community meeting and also the engagement process. The student trustee to the Board of Education also attended one LCAP Parent Advisory Committee meeting.

- Student Achievement, Other student outcomes: More resources in expanded learning around technology including more supports for students exploring college and career.
- School Climate and Student Engagement, including increased staff training.

Collective Bargaining Groups / District Staff

Staff presented information to the district's bargaining partners throughout the year. The district's website has a permanent link to LCAP Resources on the home page, and frequent articles in the "e-Connection" and staff newsletter advised of progress.

Community Planning Process and LCAP Survey # 2

To gather input on the LCAP draft, the district again relied on the Community Planning Process (CPP), a grass-roots model utilized to gather authentic input and feedback on important topics such as the LCAP. It relies on key community-organizing strategies: empowering community members as Public Education Volunteers (PEVs) to engage with their personal and professional networks to share information and gather input. The PEVs who were part of the process last year were invited to help again by personal invitation. Other stakeholder groups such as the LCAP Advisory Committee, DELAC, CAC and PTA were invited to training as well.

Training Dates at the District Office:

- April 24
- April 29
- May 1

An additional PEV training was offered for 15 staff members at La Familia Counseling Center.

All divisions of staff, particularly certificated, were strongly represented in the survey process, advocating for class size reduction and increases in FTEs for nurses, custodians and counselors.

Members of SCTA and Teamsters provided informational presentations to the LCAP Advisory Committee.

The Community Planning Process information-gathering through Survey # 2 was during April and May, 2015. To date, more than 1,900 respondents completed the second LCAP survey.

Survey results to date include these priorities, the majority of which have been expanded and enhanced in this year's LCAP:

Goal 1 - College and Career Ready Students

- Class size reduction, before- and after-school opportunities, Common Core-aligned teacher training, academic counselors

Goal 2 - Safe, Clean and Healthy Schools

- Nurses, psychologists, social workers, programs to improve climate and culture

Goal 3 - Family and Community Engagement

- Parent outreach and training, translation services

The survey included a rating of stakeholder interest in the LCAP. A full report of the survey results will be available on the district's web site: www.scusd.edu/LCAP.

School Site Engagement

Authentic community engagement cannot just happen at the Central Office or at district-level settings. Parents, staff, students and community members have expressed a comfort level in holding meetings at the school-site level as well.

Staff produced a Community Guide that captures the key sections of the LCAP: Goals, Actions, Services and Expenditures and the Annual Update metrics.

Paired with the survey, the Community Guide provides an overview of LCFF and LCAP, the state-required metrics used to measure progress in our Annual Update, and the stated goals, activities, services and expenditures that are part of the plan. The survey asks stakeholders for their understanding of the plan; whether they believe our plan supports positive student outcomes in our district, and gives an opportunity to comment on the document while in draft form.

To ensure that the LCAP draft and survey was shared at every school site, SCUSD principals were provided a toolkit of communication materials for facilitating staff and parent meetings at their respective sites. Weekly updates and reminders were provided through the Principals [online] Bulletin Board.

Staff targeted outreach to school sites that were statistically under-represented in the first survey of this year. Principals engaged with parents and staff at standing School Site Council meetings, PTA meetings, English Learner Advisory Council (ELAC) meetings, Collaborative Planning Time (CPT) and staff meetings. At many sites, district staff or PEVs attended the meetings to help facilitate the discussion. Meeting dates were documented by staff with school site leadership. The meetings took place May 1 through May 26, 2015 at the discretion of the site.

Several members of the LCAP Advisory Committee, and the Family and Community Engagement staff were driving forces in reaching out to school sites.

Staff verified that 100% of schools held at least one meeting at which LCAP was discussed. Those in attendance at meetings included administration, certificated and classified staff, parents, community partners, and community members.

<p>What changes in actions, services, and expenditures will be made as a result of reviewing past progress and/or changes to goals?</p>	<p>Producing college and career-ready students is a long-standing goal for Sacramento City Unified School District, and this goal will continue to guide the district's work, as has been reinforced by community stakeholders. At the end of this year (2014-15), district staff will review CAASPP data to establish baseline proficiency and below proficiency levels. With these baselines set, the district will establish targets for 2015-16, 2016-17 and 2017-18 school years.</p> <p>The first LCAP Annual Update has shown that while the district has made some gains with student outcomes, there is still work to be done. The district will continue the implementation of Common Core State Standards (CCSS), with integrated and designated professional learning focusing on both domains (Math and ELA) within the framework. The number of parents trained was lower than anticipated, but as it was the second year for CCSS implementation, fewer district trainings were held: schools provided information to families through other, non-documented means: Parent-Teacher conferences, Academic Parent-Teacher Team meetings, etc. Two Training Specialists have been added to facilitate the implementation of the Next Generation Science Standards.</p> <p>The focus on the new California English Language Development (ELD) standards will be enhanced with an additional "Trailblazer" professional learning cadre in the 2015-16 school year, and additional funds for the Multilingual Literacy department will include both materials and instructional support. The district believes that</p>		

expansion of support for schools and teachers in the area of ELD will help EL students to meet the Federal AMAO targets. All staff will receive professional learning; the district will continue to provide it for our instructional assistants, including bilingual instructional assistants.

Many stakeholders expressed the need for additional counselors at the middle school and high school level, to better prepare students for college and career. There will be five additional counselors added to the district to reduce the ratio of students to counselors. Additional counselors will be able to better monitor students who are at risk of not graduating, will communicate the importance of meeting a-g standards to both students and families, and will actively promote enrollment in Linked Learning Pathways, especially English Learners, low income students and foster youth. The district identified the need to do a better job identifying students in the Pathways and additional counselors will result in improved student monitoring.

Due to declining enrollment district-wide, Linked Learning Pathways showed a decrease in the number of students enrolled. Starting in 2015-16, the district will report Pathways enrollment as a rate, with the target threshold of 60% enrollment in grades 9-12.

The district will also continue to focus on early literacy with an additional site for Early Kindergarten, supported by LCFF.

There was a need to make a data correction in the percent of students scoring 3 or better on Advanced Placement (AP) Tests. The correct calculation is included in the Expected Annual Measurable Outcomes for 2015-16.

What changes in actions, services, and expenditures will be made as a result of reviewing past progress and/or changes to goals?	<p>Ensuring that every student attends a school that is safe, clean and healthy is a top priority for Sacramento City Unified and a goal that is shared by our families, staff, students and community partners, reinforced by surveys and community conversations. This commitment can be seen in SCUSD's work to improve the climate at our schools through bullying prevention efforts, Social Emotional Learning focus, Men's Leadership Academies and Restorative Practices initiative. While not reflected in this plan, SCUSD's Healthy Food Task Force is working to improve the quality of the 50,000 meals Nutrition Services provides to children daily and to promote the planting of school gardens to help children see the link between healthy eating and an improved lifestyle.</p> <p>During the Great Recession, cuts to custodial staff, plant managers and student support workers stretched thin our resources. With direction from the LCAP and with additional funding from LCFF and Proposition 30, many of these critically important positions are being restored. As we continued to hear from stakeholders about the condition of school sites, we plan to increase custodial staff further.</p> <p>A portion of the contract with Sacramento Police Department for School Resource Officers (SROs) was funded by LCFF in the 2014-15 school year. Stakeholders, most notably the LCAP Parent Advisory Committee, questioned the use of supplemental and concentration dollars for that service. For the 2015-16 school year, district SROs have been moved to base funding.</p> <p>Because Restorative Justice Practices were not fully implemented as planned, funding is carried over in this area to fulfill this intended service. Positive school climate is one of the top priorities for our community, and the district has hired an Assistant Superintendent of Equity to lead this work, including the development of metrics to show the effects of expanding Social Emotional Learning programs.</p> <p>Expansion of nursing staff, social workers and mental health services will further objectives under this LCAP goal.</p>

<p>What changes in actions, services, and expenditures will be made as a result of reviewing past progress and/or changes to goals?</p>	<p>Increasing Family and Community Engagement is a top priority for the Sacramento City Unified School District (SCUSD). The work of the district Parent Resource Center staff has been recognized by the California Department of Education as progressive, trending towards innovative, on the State Family Engagement Framework rubric. The focus of the department is to increase the capacity of both parents and staff in best practices of family engagement, so that families feel valued and empowered to be advocates for their students' educational needs.</p> <p>The Parent/Teacher Home Visit Project (PTHVP) is a valued partner of the SCUSD, successfully building relationships with families as they help them to understand how to support their students' academic performance. The Parent/Teacher Home Visit Project team expanded their Academic Parent-Teacher Team (APTT) model this year, but some school sites did not have the capacity to support it. While highly successful, the goals for APTT will be set slightly lower in the next year, because success depends on the “buy in” of the community.</p> <p>This year, the Parents as Partners in Schools workshop series was expanded into the Parent Leadership Pathway (PLP), based on the need to provide additional learning opportunities for parents. The PLP is a three-tiered series offering progressively more sophisticated topics on education and parenting as participants complete each 10 week session. The series is offered at school sites, in the language(s) both verbal and written of that community, at the time determined by the parent participants' site, with childcare and a light snack provided. The number of parent participants in the workshop series did not reach the set goal, due to a staff transfer, while the number of EL participants in the program exceeded the target. The program will continue for the 2015-16 school year.</p> <p>There are a number of other engagement opportunities within our district for parents. Parents and caregivers are offered other learning activities, such as the monthly Parent Information Exchange luncheon, field trips to CSU Sacramento and Sacramento City College, and parent advisory committees such as the District Advisory Committee, Community Advisory Committee for Special Education, and the District English Learner Advisory Committee. Parent Resource Center staff also provided one- and two-hour workshops at school sites throughout the year for School Site Councils, PTAs, and other parent meetings on a variety of topics, as well as staff training in parent engagement through the Parent Resource Center Collaborative. To ensure that parents are part of decision-making bodies, the district has added a metric in the 2015-16 LCAP to ensure that all School Site Councils are properly composed, and has also set a goal for greater participation in District English Learner Advisory Committee (DELAC) meetings.</p> <p>The activities of the district Parent Resource Center staff and the Parent/Teacher Home Visit Project will continue for the 2015-16 year. However, because LCFF Parent Engagement allocations at school sites were not always fully realized, we will track the allocations more closely in 2015-16 with the expectation that sites will utilize the funds that they encumbered.</p>

<p>In Sacramento City Unified School District, the percentage of students within the target subgroups is approximately 71% of the overall student population, when charter schools are not included. Approximately \$39,000,000 LCFF supplemental and concentration grant funds are allocated in addition to base funds both district-wide and schoolwide for supports that were identified as highly important by our stakeholders, such as class size reduction, expansion of early learning opportunities, Linked Learning Career Pathways, professional learning; and additional staff, including counselors, nurses, social workers, librarians, and parent outreach staff and translators.</p>	
<p>Our student data, as well as stakeholder input, helped to inform the district that these expenditures are necessary and appropriate for our target subgroups. The table below indicates an overview of supplemental/concentration grant expenditures that will be used to meet the needs of English Learners, low-income students, and foster youth.</p>

To further reduce the ratio of students to teachers to meet the eventual goal of 24:1, the district has invested just over \$7 million in class size reduction by 3 students in grades K-3. The Student Teacher Achievement Ratio study (STAR) documented that reductions in the primary grades can make a “measurable and lasting difference in student achievement, especially for students from low income families.” (Word, Johnson & Bain, 1990). To enable the district’s teachers to be most effective in providing attention to unduplicated students, professional learning shall include strategies to take advantage of the reduction in class size. Principals and other administrative staff (Site Instructional Coordinators, Resource Teachers) shall also include guidance during supervision and observation so that class size reduction is truly beneficial to unduplicated students.

The district has invested in professional learning with the addition of Training Specialists at both district and site level; and Resource Teachers at school sites. Training specialists will support high quality instruction around implementation of the Common Core State Standards in English/Language Arts and Math, as well as Next Generation Science Standards, the new English Language Development standards, and Visual and Performing Arts. At school sites, Resource Teachers can provide opportunities for intervention for unduplicated students who are performing below proficiency, particularly in the secondary segment where class size is larger. With an identified need for greater progress for English Learners, additional support has been identified for multilingual literacy.

In Sacramento, there is a need to provide early literacy and preschool opportunities for unduplicated students, many of whom do not have the resources to attend a private, or fee-for-service, preschool program. Both preschool and early/transitional kindergarten are partially supported with LCFF funds. An additional early Kindergarten site is planned for the 2015-16 school year.

To further the district goal for college and career readiness for all, academic counselors will be increased at high schools to decrease the student-counselor ratio. Each middle school will benefit with an increase of FTE as well. Counselors are tasked with identifying students at risk, monitoring grades and progress towards graduation, as well as monitoring A-G completion. The counselors will also provide advisement on college applications, college readiness tests, financial aid resources, and more, for both students and parents. The services provided by counselors can be targeted to unduplicated students so that they will receive insight and strategies that students with greater resources typically are able to access. Counselors at middle schools will ensure that students and families have awareness of the many high school options available through Linked Learning Pathways, International Baccalaureate (IB) programs, and will ensure understanding of the courses needed to fulfill A-G requirements.

Librarians and library/media technicians are included in supplemental and concentration grant funding in order to ensure that all students, but in particular low-income students, have access to technology. Many stakeholders, but notably, SCUSD’s Student Advisory Council, indicated that access to technology is a priority for student success. In this community, many homes do not have a computer or connectivity to the Internet. Public library hours have been truncated. District librarians focus on ensuring that students learn technology skills, and gain understanding of, and have access to, the Internet for academic purposes. District stakeholders have expressed that technology and media literacy is a critical component in closing the achievement gap and promoting college and career success for unduplicated students.

The district has increased staff in our Foster Youth Services department to provide mentoring and academic counseling to Foster Youth. Support is also provided to Linked Learning/Career Pathways so that unduplicated students may have experience in an employment sector that interests them, and learn professional skills in the classroom while getting a variety of work-based learning experiences such as mentorships or internship opportunities.

The loss of custodial staff due to fiscal realities during the last recession greatly impacted district schools. In order to maintain a safe, clean, and healthy environment, SCUSD site administrators, as well as classified and certificated staff, performed tasks that were necessary to keep students safe and the school environment in good condition. Even so, SCUSD stakeholders have still expressed that schools were not sufficiently clean, and that non-custodians performing custodial tasks were not serving in their assigned capacity. All SCUSD students will benefit from cleaner schools for reasons of health and safety. Unduplicated students will benefit when their teachers have sufficient time to provide direct instruction, check for understanding, and reteach or provide intervention. They continue to benefit when site administrators can provide instructional coaching and mentoring to improve delivery of curriculum to students who are struggling, as well as to provide leadership in promoting positive school climate and handling discipline fairly.

School climate is a top priority for our community; parent advisory groups, staff and students repeatedly expressed the need for wrap-around services, alternative discipline practices, positive school environment and safety. Many times students have difficulty accessing the core curriculum when health issues arise, or when bullying or mental health issues arise. The district has allocated supplemental and concentration funds to provide additional nurses, social workers, school psychologists; and also to expand support of Social Emotional Learning and Restorative Justice practices. These additional supports should help unduplicated students improve attendance and engagement, and report more positively on feeling safe and welcome at school.

Increased funding for parent engagement staff helps families of unduplicated students overcome barriers that sometimes affect participation in school activities. Parent engagement staff focuses on making schools more welcoming, and builds capacity by facilitating education and training for parents. The district also ensures that every School Site Council is properly composed so that parents are equal partners in the decision-making process. As a multi-lingual and multi-ethnic district, additional resources have been allocated to increase staff in the Matriculation and Orientation Center to provide Spanish and Hmong translation and interpretation services. Language support helps parents and caregivers to understand ways to support their child's education, to become more knowledgeable about the education system (including college and career pathways), and to feel fully in partnership with the school and the district.

Sacramento City Unified School District (SCUSD) has allocated resources to increase or improve services for unduplicated students, in accordance with a review of student data, surveys (of parents, staff, and community) and feedback from our parent advisory committees. As a district with over 55% free and reduced-price meal recipients, SCUSD may use LCFF resources for all students. The district has allocated more than the minimum proportionality percentage (MPP) of funds to provide an increased or improved service to low income, English learner and foster youth students.

Use of Supplemental and Concentration Grant Funds: Sections 3A & 3B

The County Office of Education asked the district to revise this section completely, and remove reference to specific amounts associated with each service. The revision is provided in narrative form to justify and describe in a qualitative way why, and how, the actions in the 2015-16 LCAP are the “most effective” use of supplemental and concentration grant funds for unduplicated students.

The revision cites research, and describes structures that will be in place for the upcoming school year. The narrative provides detail for the use of supplemental and concentration grant funds, most notably in these actions:

- Ensuring that teachers are provided professional learning strategies to take advantage of lower class sizes;
- Implementing all state standards, including English Language Development, Next Generation Science Standards, and Visual & Performing Arts;
- Decreasing disparities in access to early childhood education with an additional Early Kindergarten site;
- Describing the ways that additional counselors will provide robust support to the district’s targeted students;
- Staffing all secondary with district librarians to diminish gaps in media literacy and technology use for unduplicated students;
- Restoring custodial staff;
- Highlighting the importance of positive school climate and alternative discipline strategies;
- Reducing barriers for families, and providing educational opportunities and other support with stabilized funding for the Family and Community Engagement department.

LCAP Advisory Committee Application



In 2013-14, the state of California changed the way it funds school districts. The new model, called the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), allows districts more freedom in how funds are spent but also requires the development of a Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) that aligns spending to specific district goals for student achievement.

One key aspect of the LCAP process is the engagement of parents/guardians and students — including foster youth and those from low-income and English learner communities — in providing input and feedback.

Annually, SCUSD will form an LCAP Parent Advisory Committee to review and provide input on sections of the LCAP. SCUSD has a strong record of parent/guardian engagement in district-level planning and is excited to partner with this group in shaping the district's vision and actions for the coming years.

Committee Demographics

To be sure that this committee is reflective of the diverse community we serve, as well as subgroups explicitly called out in LCFF, the group must include a minimum number of representatives in key demographic areas.

The LCAP Parent Advisory Committee must include:

- At least ten (10) parents/guardians/caregivers
- At least eleven (11) representatives that represent a Title 1 school (current parent, former parent, student, staff member, parent advocate, community partner or other qualified representative)
- At least three (3) representatives that represent English-learners (current parent, former parent, student or staff member)
- At least two (2) representatives that represent special needs students (current parent, former parent, student or staff member)
- At least one (1) representative from the Homeless/Foster Youth community
- No more than three (3) staff members

Note that these representations are intentionally consistent with the district's demographic breakdown. In 2014-15, there were approximately 68% of SCUSD students qualified for Free or Reduced Price Lunch; approximately 22% of SCUSD students are English-learners; approximately 13% of SCUSD students receive special education services. There are approximately 755 homeless students and 215 foster youth in SCUSD.

I. Introduction:

The district's existing Strategic Plan was launched in 2010, as a descriptive companion to the Board of Education-adopted Mission Statement: Students graduate as globally competitive, lifelong learners, prepared to succeed in a career and higher education institution of their choice to secure gainful employment and contribute to society. The three foundational pillars of the Strategic Plan: Career- and College-Ready Students, Family and Community Engagement, and Organizational Transformation, have guided the work of the district to date, but with new leadership it is an appropriate time to revisit the Strategic Plan.

The district has engaged Pivot Learning Partners, a nonprofit organization known for innovative and impactful work with school districts nationwide, to lead the Strategic Planning process with staff. The revised Strategic Plan will be presented to the Board of Education in June, 2016 for implementation in the 2016-17 school year.

II. Driving Governance:

According to Ed Code 52060 on or before July 1, 2015, the Governing Board of each school district shall adopt a Local Control Accountability Plan ("LCAP") using a template adopted by the State Board of Education ("SBE"), effective for three years with annual updates. It will include the district's annual goals for all students and for each subgroup in regard to the eight state priorities and any local priorities, as well as the plans for implementing actions to achieve those goals. The current LCAP includes three goals that loosely mirror the three goals in the 2010-14 Strategic Plan. The district will ensure that the strategic planning process will include alignment with the LCAP, and by extension, with the Single Plan for Student Achievement written by school site leadership. Alignment between these three major plans will lead to growth in student achievement and a positive experience in school for every student.

Just as the Local Control Funding Formula statute requires the district to consult with all stakeholders upon developing the LCAP, the district will follow that model upon developing the Strategic Plan. The district will include parents, students, classified and certificated staff, and community members as the plan is being developed.

III. Leadership:

The Strategic Planning Process will be led by Chief Strategy Officer, Al Rogers, Ed.D. Together with the Superintendent's Cabinet, Dr. Rogers has assembled a Design Team for the process. The Design Team is charged with examining and analyzing data, talking to stakeholders, developing the prototypes, and gathering feedback on the prototypes. The Steering Committee for the Strategic Plan will be the Superintendent's Executive Cabinet, plus one board member.

V. Fall Engagement Plan (Cycle 1):

The district will rely heavily on the Community Planning Process and Public Education Volunteers (PEVs) to gather feedback on the Strategic Plan. The first cycle of feedback will begin in November 2015. PEVs will be recruited and trained in October, 2015. Every school site will also be asked to host a meeting in November or early December to share the first prototype Strategic Plan with their community. Principals will receive a toolkit to simplify the communication with talking points, a PowerPoint, and other promotional materials.

Existing district advisory committees will also be engaged for feedback in Cycle 1: LCAP Advisory Committee, District English Learners Advisory Committee (DELAC), Community Advisory Committee for Special Education, Indian Education Parent Advisory, Student Advisory Council, etc. The district will ensure that labor partners and community partners – including elected leadership – are consulted through Cycle 1.



VI. RESULTS:

Nine new schools will join forty-five existing schools that are receiving training and support with Social Emotional Learning. Additionally, another nine schools will begin implementing Positive Behavior Intervention Support. Each site has committed to a three year implementation plan. We are also thrilled to have started building our knowledge around restorative practices. Ten schools participated in training over the summer. Participating sites will meet and decide which components of restorative practice to implement at this time. Finally, we have partnered with the National Equity Project to strengthen equity leadership capacity throughout the district. We look forward to seeing robust learning opportunities and growth in each of these areas.

VII. LESSONS LEARNED/NEXT STEPS:

This work will be continuous and ongoing. There will be multiple professional development opportunities throughout the year. Participants will have the opportunity to build knowledge and capacity through additional trainings, networked discussion groups, or demonstration sites.
