Master Services and License Agreement Between Sacramento City USD and Accelerate Education

Sacramento City USD ("**Customer**") and Accelerate Education Incorporated, a Nevada corporation ("Accelerate") enter into this Master Services and License Agreement (the "**Agreement**") as of the 15th day of August, 2016.

1) Products and Services

Subject to the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement, Accelerate agrees to provide the products and perform the services described in the attached Exhibits. Accelerate reserves the right, from time to time, to add, change or discontinue any of its products or services.

2) Title to Licensed Materials

Customer acknowledges and agrees that Accelerate shall retain all right, title and interest in and to the all products licensed to Customer hereunder, including without limitation all content, curriculum, delivery systems, documentation, including releases and code bases, which Accelerate may from time to time provide to Customer hereunder (the "Licensed Materials") and which Customer and Accelerate agree shall be added to Exhibit A. Nothing herein transfers or conveys to Customer any ownership right, title or interest in or to the Licensed Materials or to any copy thereof or any Accelerate Intellectual Property therein.

"Accelerate Intellectual Property" includes everything which Accelerate makes, conceives, develops, discovers, reduces to practice or fixes in a tangible medium of expression, alone or with others, pursuant to the terms of this Agreement, including without limitation any courses created by Accelerate, and all intellectual property that Accelerate has or will develop, including developments, concepts, ideas, procedures, and original works of authorship, including but not limited to interim work product, outlines, modifications and derivative works, and all similar matters, whether or not copyrightable, and also includes all records and expressions of those matters.

3) Grant of License

<u>License Terms</u>. Accelerate hereby grants Customer a non-transferable, non-exclusive, royalty-free license to access and use the Licensed Materials listed in Exhibit A during the term of this Agreement. All such access and use of the Licensed Materials shall be subject to the terms and conditions hereof.

Customer shall use its best efforts to prevent any improper use of the Licensed Materials or any violation of Accelerate's rights in the Accelerate Intellectual Property, and shall, under no circumstances, sell, lease, assign, sublicense or otherwise transfer the Licensed Materials except as provided herein. Customer shall not remove any proprietary, copyright, patent, trademark, design right, trade secret, or any other proprietary rights legends from the Licensed Materials. Customer agrees not to disassemble, decompile, translate into human readable form or into another computer language, reconstruct or decrypt, or reverse engineer, all or any part of the Licensed Materials. Further, Customer shall not write or develop any derivative works or computer programs based upon any part of the Licensed Materials.

4) Term and Termination

Initial Term. The initial term of this Agreement ("Initial Term") shall commence on the date of the Agreement and shall continue for a three (3) year period. At the end of the Initial Term, this Agreement will automatically renew for succeeding 12-month periods (each, a "Renewal Term") unless either party notifies the other at least thirty (30) days prior to the end of such relevant Initial Term or Renewal Term that it does not intend to renew.

Termination. Either party may terminate this Agreement on written notice if the other party materially breaches any term or condition of this Agreement and fails to cure such breach within ten (10) days in after the date of written notice to cure.

5) Fees, Invoices; Late Fees; Interest

Current pricing for the Licensed Materials is set forth in the Exhibit B attached hereto.

Accelerate shall invoice Customer for Licensed Materials in Exhibit A. Customer shall pay all invoices within thirty (30) days of the date of the invoice. In the event that any invoice for fees is not paid in full within 30 days of the invoice date, Customer shall pay an additional late payment fee equal to 2.0% of the unpaid amount, plus simple interest on the balance owing at the rate of 18% per annum beginning 60 days after the date of the invoice as well as any costs incurred by Accelerate in collecting the unpaid amount.

6) Accelerate Representations and Warranties

Delivery. Accelerate represents and warrants that (a) it has full power and authority to enter into, and to perform its obligations under, this Agreement; (b) it has all registrations, licenses and approvals necessary to conduct its business and to enter into and perform its obligations under this Agreement.

Functionality. Accelerate represents and warrants that it will use its best efforts to make the Licensed Materials function in a manner satisfactory to Customer and as outlined in this Agreement, and according to published documentation; however, the parties acknowledge that the technology employed has limitations beyond the control of Accelerate.

Intellectual Property. Accelerate represents and warrants that neither Accelerate, in connection with performing the Services, nor the Licensed Materials will knowingly infringe any patent, copyright, trademark or trade secret or other proprietary right of any person.

7) Customer Warranties and Representations

Customer represents and warrants that (a) it has full power and authority to enter into, and to perform its obligations under, this Agreement; (b) it has all registrations, licenses and approvals necessary to conduct its business and to enter into and perform its obligations under this Agreement. Customer will not knowingly infringe any patent, copyright, trademark or trade secret or other proprietary right of any person. Customer further represents and warrants that it shall have in force valid agreements with any of its employees, subcontractors or other third parties who may have access to the Licensed Materials sufficient to ensure such parties' compliance with the terms of this Agreement regarding the use and protection of the Licensed Materials and Accelerate Intellectual Property.

8) Limited Liability

ASIDE FROM THE WARRANTIES PROVIDED HEREIN, THE LICENSED MATERIALS ARE PROVIDED "AS IS," WITHOUT WARRANTY, EITHER EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, INCLUDING ANY IMPLIED WARRANTY OF MERCHANTABILITY, QUALITY, PERFORMANCE OR FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE. ACCELERATE'S MAXIMUM LIABILITY UNDER THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE FOR DIRECT DAMAGES AND SHALL BE LIMITED TO THE REFUND OF ALL FEES PAID BY CUSTOMER UNDER THIS AGREEMENT. ACCELERATE WILL NOT BE LIABLE FOR ANY PROPERTY DAMAGE, PERSONAL INJURY, LOSS OF USE, INTERRUPTION OF BUSINESS, LOSS OF PROFITS, OR OTHER SPECIAL, INCIDENTAL OR CONSEQUENTIAL DAMAGES, HOWEVER CAUSED, WHETHER FOR BREACH OF WARRANTY, CONTRACT, TORT (INCLUDING NEGLIGENCE), STRICT LIABILITY OR OTHERWISE.

9) FERPA

Accelerate warrants to Customer that it will not make available or distribute any student information in violation of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act ("The Buckley Amendment" or "FERPA").

10) Confidentiality

Each party agrees that during the existence of this Agreement and for two (2) years thereafter it will hold in strictest confidence, and will not use or disclose to any third party, any Confidential Information of the other party. The term "Confidential Information" shall mean all non-public information, whether business or technical in nature that the other party designates as being confidential, or which under the circumstances of disclosure ought to be treated as confidential. If any party has any questions as to what comprises Confidential Information of the other party, it agrees to consult with such other party prior to any disclosure. Confidential Information shall not include information that was known to the receiving party prior to disclosure, information that is independently developed by the receiving party who had no access to the other party's Confidential Information, or information that becomes publicly available through no fault of the receiving party. The restrictions on disclosure imposed by this Section shall not apply to information that is required by law or order of a court, administrative agency or other governmental body to be disclosed by the receiving party.

11) Notice

All notices, requests, demands and other communications under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be effective upon receipt.

Notice to Customer. Unless hereinafter changed by written notice, any notice to Accelerate or Customer, other than invoices and notice with respect to invoices, shall be delivered or mailed to:

12) Force Majeure

Neither party shall be considered to be in default as a result of its delay or failure to perform its obligations herein when such delay or failure arises out of causes beyond the reasonable control of the party.

13) Indemnification

Each party shall indemnify, defend, and hold the other harmless from and against any and all third party claims, liabilities, damages, losses, costs and expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees) arising out of or relating to any breach or alleged breach of this Agreement by the indemnifying party. This is upon the condition that the party seeking indemnification shall give the other party prompt written notice of such suit and full right and opportunity to conduct the defense thereof, together with full information and all reasonable cooperation. No costs or expenses shall be incurred for the account of the other party without its written consent.

14) Dispute Resolution & Mediation

Except for any claims seeking injunctive relief, in the event of any dispute, claim or controversy arising out of or relating to this Agreement or the breach thereof (a "Dispute"), the parties shall first attempt to resolve the Dispute, without formal proceedings, through a telephone conference between Accelerate's CEO or other designated representative and Customer's CEO or other designated representative. If the parties are unable to resolve the Dispute within ten (10) business days of receipt of a written notice from the other that

details the Dispute, then upon notice by either party to the other, the Dispute shall be finally determined and settled by arbitration in accordance with the Commercial Arbitration Rules of the American Arbitration Association ("AAA"). Unless otherwise agreed by the parties, the arbitration panel shall consist of one arbitrator chosen in accordance with the AAA. Any such arbitrator shall be knowledgeable in the subject area in which the Dispute arises. Each party shall be entitled to representation by counsel, to appear and present written and oral evidence and argument and to cross-examine witnesses presented by the other party. The arbitration award shall be in writing and the arbitrator shall provide written reasons for the award. The award of the arbitrator shall be final and binding on the parties hereto and may be enforced in any court of competent jurisdiction. The prevailing party in any action or proceeding to enforce its rights hereunder shall be entitled to recover reasonable attorneys' fees and other reasonable costs, including fees of the arbitrator and the AAA, incurred in the action or proceedings. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Arizona. The parties agree that all facts and other information relating to any arbitration arising under this Agreement shall be kept confidential to the fullest extent permitted by law.

15) Binding Effect

This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties hereto and their respective successors and affiliates.

16) Entire Agreement; Assignment

This Agreement (including the Exhibits) sets forth the entire understanding of the parties with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement and supersedes any and all prior understandings and agreements, whether written or oral, between the parties with respect to such subject matter. Neither party may assign this Agreement, in whole or in part, without the other party's written consent; provided, however, that either party may assign this Agreement without such consent in connection with any merger, consolidation, any sale of all or substantially all of such party's assets.

17) Severability

If any provision of this Agreement shall be invalid or unenforceable in any respect for any reason, the validity and enforceability of any such provision in any other respect and of the remaining provisions of this Agreement shall not be in any way impaired; provided, however, that the parties will attempt to agree upon a valid and enforceable provision which shall be a reasonable substitute for each invalid provision or unenforceable provision in light of the tenor of this Agreement and, upon so agreeing, shall incorporate such substitute provision into this Agreement.

Exhibit C to Master Services and License Agreement between Customer and Accelerate Education

This Exhibit is part of the Agreement between Customer and Accelerate with respect to additional responsibilities as provided herein. Except as otherwise defined in this Exhibit, all capitalized terms shall have the meanings given to them in the Agreement.

Customer shall ensure that all authorized users of the fitness courses licensed to Customer by Accelerate ("Fitness Courses") agree in writing to be bound by and to comply with the consent and release terms of use ("Terms of Use") set forth below, and the code of conduct ("Code of Conduct") set forth below, if any. If an authorized user is a minor, Customer shall require that the Terms of Use and Code of Conduct (if any) be executed by the parent or other legal guardian of each such minor, granting the parent's permission for such minor to access and use the Fitness Courses, acknowledging the risks of participation in the Fitness Courses and releasing Accelerate and its licensors from all liability related to such participation. Customer shall provide Accelerate with a copy of each and all of the signed consents. The Terms of Use shall be worded in substantially the same manner as provided below.

Terms of Use

The following waiver must be signed by any authorized user over the age of 18 or by the parents of any authorized users who are under the age of 18.

1. Background/Rationale: Districts in the State of California are required to submit a Consolidated Application (ConApp) for specified federally funded programs. The application is completed in multiple parts. The ConApp Spring Report identifies the programs for which the district is requesting funding as well as the public and private, non-profit schools that plan to participate in selected federal programs. The ConApp also serves as a system for reporting program and fiscal data to CDE about the utilization of federal program funds. Local school boards are required to approve the application for funding page. JOINT VENTURE AND LICENSE AGREEMENT BETWEEN SACRAMENTO CITY UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AND RIVER OAK CENTER FOR CHILDREN

THIS JOINT VENTURE AND LICENSE AGREEMENT ("Agreement" or "License") is made and entered into upon approval between the parties below which is anticipated to be on or about June 16, 2016 ("Effective Date"), by and between the Sacramento City Unified School District ("District") and River Oak Center for Children ("ROC"), a California nonprofit corporation (collectively, the "Parties"). The operative date ("Operative Date") shall be the date of occupancy by ROC which is anticipated to be on or about September 15, 2016 (the "Occupancy Date").

WHEREAS, the District owns property at 4625 44th Street in the City of Sacramento which was previously known as Fruit Ridge Elementary School ("Fruit Ridge"); and

WHEREAS, the District and ROC desire to enter into a joint venture and license relationship for the use of the premises at Fruit Ridge described below and the use of a 48' x 40' modular building (collectively, the "Premises"); and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the License is the purpose and goals of the River Oak Center for Children; and

WHEREAS, the Agreement sets forth the terms and conditions for such use.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree to the following terms and conditions:

ARTICLE I

JOINT VENTURE AND LICENSE USE

Joint Venture and License; Premises. The Parties enter into a joint venture and 1.1 license relationship for the use of the Premises. The District, as Licensor, hereby grants to ROC, as Licensee, a license (the "License") for the mutual benefit of the community and children served by both the District and ROC. Pursuant to the License, ROC shall have the right to use, subject to the terms and conditions herein, the Premises at Fruit Ridge as more particularly described in Attachment A incorporated herein by this reference. The square footage for the classrooms is approximately 3,855 square feet plus an additional approximate 1,900 square feet for the modular building. The Premises, for the purpose of the License, may be adjusted from year to year. The license year shall be the fiscal year from July 1 to June 30 (the "License Year"). For the first year, the License Year shall commence on September 1, 2016 and shall end on June 30, 2017. The Premises as described in Attachment A shall be the Premises for the first License Year. Thereafter, from year to year, the Parties will meet to discuss potential decreases in requested square footage. Potential increases in square footage may only be accommodated and negotiated by reaching an agreement with the District, ROC and the Fruit Ridge Community Collaborative (FRCC). Any adjustments, as described in the Agreement, shall be negotiated at least 90 days before the end of the License Year (the "Negotiation Period") and by the providing of written notice as set forth in section 5.11 below.

1.2 **License Fee.** The initial License Fee shall be \$1.88 per square foot per year for the Premises. For the classrooms described in section 1.4(a), payment of the License Fee shall commence on September 1, 2016. For the modular building described in section 1.4(b), the License Fee shall commence on November 1, 2016. The District shall maintain and make necessary repairs and maintenance of mechanical systems including HVAC and electrical systems supporting the modular building. ROC shall be responsible for all inspections as required by law, including but not limited to, fire and safety inspections and any fees required to be paid for any such inspections. If ROC replaces or modifies any mechanical or electrical systems supporting the modular building, notice shall be given to the District. If any subsequent maintenance requires parts which are not in the usual inventory of the District or which are unique as opposed to District facilities, ROC shall pay or reimburse the District for any such parts required in maintenance of the modular building. After the first License Year, any adjustments to the License Fee may not be increased more than 10% above the prior year's License Fee based upon the costs incurred by the District relating to the Premises and other considerations identified by the District. The License Fee shall be negotiated each year, after the first License Year during the Negotiation Period. The License Fee shall be paid quarterly, and shall be due, beginning in the first License Year, on or before October 15, 2016 (a pro-rated License Fee), January 15, 2017, and April 15, 2017, with a new cycle of quarterly payments for each subsequent License Year beginning thereafter, on or before July 15, and continuing through each quarter thereafter. A late payment fee of \$50 for each week of delinquency after the quarterly payment shall be due and payable plus a 5% interest charge on the principal of the License Fee. Acceptance of payment of a delinquent License Fee, and late payment fee plus interest, shall not waive other remedies of the District to terminate or revoke the License granted herein.

1.3 <u>License Deposit</u>. To assure that ROC performs its obligations under the License, and as a source for the payment of any delinquent License Fee due, Licensee agrees to deposit with the District an amount of \$1,000 (the "License Deposit"). The License Deposit shall be made with the District in a fund which will bear interest at the same rate as District funds pursuant to deposit requirements imposed on public school districts. Any unused License Deposit plus interest earned shall be remitted to ROC.

1.4 **<u>Repairs and Alterations</u>**.

a. Classrooms. ROC accepts occupancy of classrooms 16, 17, 18, and 19 of the Premises in "as is" condition, provided that the District shall ensure that mechanical systems such as HVAC and plumbing are in working condition prior to the Occupancy Date. District shall be responsible for all maintenance and necessary repairs to the classrooms, including all mechanical systems such as HVAC and electrical systems. ROC shall be responsible for all inspections as required by law, including but not limited to, fire and safety inspections and any fees required to be paid for any such inspections. In addition, ROC shall make the improvements as described in Attachment B. Any repairs or improvements, including those described in Attachment B, (collectively, "ROC Improvements") shall be submitted to the District for review and approval. The District reserves the right to require, depending on the nature and scope of ROC's Improvements, lien releases, bonding requirements, insurance during construction, and compliance with other legal

obligations associated with such improvements on school property. The District shall have the right to recover any costs caused by any licensee committing waste or causing destruction or dilapidation, normal wear and tear excepted.

b. <u>Modular Building</u>. In addition to classrooms 16, 17, 18, and 19, ROC shall have the right, at its cost, to relocate the modular building on approximately 1,900 square feet located near classroom 19 per the proposed site plan of ROC. The modular building shall be relocated by ROC on temporary wood crib foundations with connections to existing campus utilities. A new ramp, stair and landing would also need to be provided to access both doors of the building. Modest improvements to this building would be required to upgrade the building for current use. The HVAC system would need cleaning and service, the carpet replaced and minor accessible upgrades may be required to the restroom to meet current ADA requirements. Additionally the building would need cleaning, exterior paint, window coverings, signage and data/phone systems. River Oak shall be responsible for all costs regarding the relocation and improvements to the modular building. Thereafter, District shall be responsible for maintenance as set forth in section 1.2.

Although a preliminary site analysis has been performed and has indicated the proposed location meets all fire and life safety code requirements of the current 2013 California Building Code, ROC shall be responsible for compliance with all codes and regulations to comply with all fire and safety requirements. ROC shall be responsible for all approvals by the Division of State Architect ("DSA") and other approvals by the state or local agencies for all inspections as required by law. This analysis took into effect building type, occupancy classifications, construction type and location on property relative to other existing buildings. Additionally, the analysis reviewed at the building location relative to required fire department emergency vehicle access, gates and fire water points of connection. This analysis will be formalized as part of the complete project development requirements and reviewed and approved by the Division of the State Architect (DSA) and local fire authority.

Since a portion of the Premises and improvements may need to be separately improved by DSA, ROC shall appropriately describe the scope of the use, including project use, that needs to be performed by duly qualified and licensed contractors including any requirement for a general contractor. ROC shall select a duly licensed architect for work, at ROC's expense, for any design and other requirements as required by DSA or local regulation. All costs associated, including but not limited to, fire and safety fees, DSA fees, testing, and other inspections shall be paid by ROC. Sample floor plans are attached as Attachment C.

c. <u>Estimated Costs; Savings for Common Area Improvements</u>. Estimated costs incurred by ROC are attached as Attachment D. However, ROC shall be

responsible for any and all costs regardless of the estimate. In the event there are cost savings from funds provided through Supervisor Phil Serna, which are estimated to be approximately \$25,000, the funds will be used for improvements in the common area at Fruit Ridge as agreed by the District, ROC, and the FRCC Advisory Board.

1.5 **Common Area.** Reservation of any common area space at Fruit Ridge shall be coordinated in accordance with the rules and regulations adopted by Fruit Ridge Community Collaborative ("FRCC").

1.6 **Premises Inspection; Keys and Codes**. During normal business hours, the District may enter and inspect the Premises for compliance under the License and for compliance by any sublicensee. Such entry shall not unreasonably interfere with the activities being conducted at the Premises. All licensees shall conduct their activities without causing waste, vandalism, or a nuisance at the Premises. ROC waives any claim for damages for injury, inconvenience or interference with ROC's activities, or any loss of occupancy or quiet enjoyment, caused by such entry, except to the extent caused by the gross negligence, recklessness or willful misconduct of District or any person under its explicit direction or control. District shall have keys, or key cards, to unlock all doors on the Premises and the right to enter by any means necessary for entry, including in the event of an emergency. ROC shall provide all such keys, key cards, or other security codes for immediate access as necessary for fire and safety purposes. Any entry to the Premises obtained by District by any means shall not under any circumstances be construed or deemed to be a forcible or unlawful entry into the Premises, or a constructive or actual ejectment of ROC from the Premises or any portion thereof.

ARTICLE II

TERM OF LICENSE

2.1 <u>Term</u>. The term ("Term") of the License and Agreement shall commence on the Effective Date and shall terminate, unless terminated earlier below, June 30, 2022 ("Termination Date"). Upon mutual consent, in writing between the Parties, the Term may be extended. Notwithstanding the Termination Date, the License and Agreement may be terminated earlier ("Early Termination Date") as follows:

2.2 <u>Early Termination for Convenience</u>. The Agreement may be terminated by either Party for convenience. Notice of such termination shall be given at least ninety 180 days before the end of a License Year and shall be effective at the end of the following License Year.

2.3 Early Termination for Cause. The Agreement may also be terminated by either Party at any time for cause. "Cause" shall consist of a breach of any non-technical provision of the Agreement, and the failure of the breaching party to cure the breach within sixty (60) days of being notified of the breach, or such other date as the Parties may agree or a reasonable time to cure the breach not to exceed one hundred and twenty (120) days. If District terminates the Agreement for cause, it may bring an action to recover any damages from ROC including any unpaid License Fee and to revoke the License.

2.4 Vacation of Premises. On or before the Termination Date or Early Termination

Date, ROC shall return the Premises, including the classrooms and modular building, in a clean condition, ordinary wear and tear excepted. ROC shall be responsible for the cost of any damage caused to the Premises and/or the affected portions of the Premises resulting from ROC's surrender of the Premises. On or before the Termination Date or Early Termination Date, ROC and ROC's agents, officers, employees, volunteers and independent contractors shall immediately vacate the Premises. ROC shall have the right to remove furnishings and equipment without damaging the classrooms or the modular building.

ARTICLE III

ASSESSMENTS, TAXES, FEES, CHARGES, AND UTILITIES

ROC shall pay or cause to be paid, and hold District and the property of District, including the Premises, free and harmless from all assessments, taxes, fees, and charges, including but not limited to, charges for the furnishing of telephone services and other public utilities, including internet access and use. ROC shall be billed quarterly, payable within 30 days, of all utility use incurred by ROC. Utility charges shall be proportional to the share of the utility costs of other users at Fruit Ridge and shall be administered and collected by the District. District shall not be liable in damages or otherwise for any interruption in the supply of any utility services to the Premises nor shall any such interruption constitute any ground for an abatement of ROC's obligations under the Agreement, unless such is the result of the gross negligence or willful misconduct of District. The use of tax exempt property, such as the Premises, may subject persons or entities occupying the Premises to a "possessory interest tax." To the extent ROC is subject to a possessory interest tax for its use, the tax shall be paid by ROC.

ARTICLE IV

INSURANCE AND SAFETY

4.1 **Insurance Requirements**. ROC shall maintain insurance in the minimum amounts as required by the District. For the first License Year, there shall be a minimum of \$1,000,000 per occurrence for both Premises liability and personal liability. In subsequent License Years, the insurance requirements may be adjusted depending on the scope of uses by ROC. ROC shall submit evidence of such insurance and shall name the District as an additional insured prior to occupancy. As an additional insured, ROC's policy requirements shall: (i) name District as an additional insured and be provided on an occurrence basis; (ii) state that such policy is primary, excess, and non-contributing with any other insurance carried by District; (iii) state that the naming of an additional insured shall not negate any right the additional insured would have had as claimant under the policy if not so named; and (iv) state that not less than 30 days written notice shall be given to District before the cancellation or reduction of coverage or amount of such policy.

A certificate issued by the carrier, or carriers, of the policies described herein shall be delivered to District prior to ROC's, its employees, volunteers and/or its independent contractors first entry onto the Premises. Each such certificate shall set forth the limits, coverage, and other provisions required under this section. A renewal certificate for each of the policies described above shall be delivered to District not less than thirty (30) days before the expiration of the term of such

policy. Coverage shall be subject to District's approval and shall carry a rating of A:X or higher and the insurance carrier shall be admitted in California to provide insurance coverage and issue policies.

The policy requirements may be made part of a blanket policy of insurance so long as such blanket policy contains all of the provisions required herein and does not reduce the coverage, impair District's rights under the Agreement, or negate, or decrease, ROC's obligations under the Agreement.

4.2 <u>Safety</u>. ROC shall be solely and completely responsible for conditions of the Premises, including safety of all persons and property. The foregoing shall include but not be limited to ensuring that the installation of any improvements to the Premises are adequately secured by ROC to avoid the creation of an attractive nuisance or other hazardous condition. ROC, its agents, employees, invitees, volunteers and independent contractors shall fully comply with all state, federal and other laws, rules, regulations, and orders relating to safety. All materials, equipment, and supplies provided for the Premises and services provided shall fully conform to all applicable State, local and Federal safety laws, rules, regulations, and orders.

4.3 Occurrence of a Casualty. If at any time during the Term, the Premises and any related improvements are destroyed in whole or in part by fire, theft, the elements, or any other cause not the fault of District or any person or entity under its explicit direction or control, if caused in whole or in part by ROC, its employees, agents, invitees, guests, vendors, or any other person acting under ROC's control or direction, the Agreement shall continue in full force and effect and ROC, at its sole cost and expense, shall be responsible for repairing and restoring the damaged Premises and related improvements and shall diligently proceed with such repairs and/or restoration until completion. If at any time the Premises and any related improvements are destroyed in whole or in part by fire, theft, the elements, or any other cause not the fault of ROC, its employees, agents, invitees, guests, vendors, or any other person acting under ROC's control or direction, then at its option the District may terminate this License upon written notice to ROC and may at its option proceed with repairs and/or restoration of the Premises.

4.4 **Indemnity By ROC**. Except to the extent caused by the gross negligence, recklessness or willful misconduct of District or any person or entity under its explicit direction or control, ROC shall indemnify and hold District, its officers, agents, employees, members of its Board of Education free and harmless from any and all liability, claims, loss, damages, or expenses resulting from ROC's occupation and use of the Premises, specifically including, without limitation, any liability, claim, loss, damage, or expense arising by reason of:

4.4.1 The death or injury of any person who is an employee, guest, invitee, or agent of ROC, or by reason of the damages to or destruction of any property, including property owned by ROC or by any person who is an employee or agent of ROC, from any cause whatsoever as a direct result of operating the Program Services or ROC's use and/or occupancy of the Premises while that person or property is in or about the Premises or in any way connected with the Premises or with any of ROC's improvements or personal property on the Premises;

4.4.2 The death or injury of any person, including any person who is an employee, guest, invitee, or agent of ROC, or by reason of the damage to or destruction of any property, including property owned by ROC or any person who is an employee or agent of ROC,

caused or allegedly caused by either (1) the condition of the Premises or improvements on the Premises; or (2) any act or omission on the Premises by ROC or any person in or about the Premises with the permission and consent of ROC;

4.4.3 Any work, including alterations, performed on the Premises or materials furnished to the Premises at the instance or request of ROC or any person or entity acting for or on behalf of ROC; and

4.4.4 ROC's failure to perform any provision of the Agreement or to comply with any requirement of applicable law or any requirement imposed on ROC or the Premises by any duly authorized agency or political subdivision.

4.5 <u>Limitation of Liability</u>. Neither District, nor any of its officers, agents, employees, and members of its Board of Education, shall be personally liable in any manner or to any extent under or in connection with the Agreement. ROC waives any and all such personal liability against the District and the individuals stated herein.

ARTICLE V

GENERAL TERMS AND PROVISIONS

5.1 **Entire Agreement**. The Agreement constitutes the sole and entire agreement between the Parties with respect to the subject matter dealt with in the Agreement and all understandings, oral or written, with respect to the subject matter of the Agreement are hereby superseded. Any additional provisions or requirements shall not be binding on the Parties except through an amendment pursuant to section 5.3.

5.2 **<u>Future Assurances</u>**. Each Party hereto shall cooperate and take such actions as may reasonably be required by the other Party hereto in order to carry out the provisions of the Agreement and the transactions contemplated by the Agreement.

5.3 <u>Amendment of Agreement</u>. No modification of, deletion from, or addition to the Agreement shall be effective unless made in writing and executed by both District and ROC.

5.4 <u>Waiver</u>. The failure by either Party to enforce any term or provision of the Agreement shall not constitute a waiver of that term or provision, or any other term or provision. No waiver by either Party of any term or provision of the Agreement shall be deemed or shall constitute a waiver of any other provision of the Agreement, nor shall any waiver constitute a continuing waiver unless otherwise expressly provided in writing.

5.5 <u>Severability</u>. In the event any clause, sentence, term or provision of the Agreement shall be held by any court of competent jurisdiction to be illegal, invalid, or unenforceable for any reason, the remaining portions of the Agreement shall nonetheless remain in full force and effect.

5.6 <u>**Construction of Agreement**</u>. The terms and provisions of the Agreement shall be liberally constructed to effectuate the purpose of the Agreement.

5.7 <u>Governing Law and Venue</u>. The Agreement shall be governed by and interpreted

under the laws of the State of California applicable to instruments, persons, transactions and subject matter which have legal contacts and relationships exclusively within the State of California. Subject to the alternative dispute resolution provision set forth in section 5.12, any action or proceeding seeking any equitable remedies or remedies at law with respect to the provisions of the Agreement shall be brought in the Superior Court for the County of Sacramento.

5.8 <u>Assignment</u>. ROC shall not have the right to assign the Agreement or any interest in the Agreement, without District's prior written consent. Any assignment made without such prior written consent shall be void, and at the option of District, shall terminate the Agreement. No right under the Agreement, nor claim for any money due or to become due hereunder shall be asserted against District, or persons acting for District, by reason of any assignment of the Agreement without District's written consent. Consent to one assignment, or other transfer shall not be deemed to constitute consent to any subsequent assignment, or other transfer.

5.9 <u>**Binding Effect.</u>** The Agreements, conditions, and provisions contained in the Agreement shall, subject to provisions for assignment, apply to and bind the heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and assigns of the parties to it.</u>

5.10 <u>Independent Contractor</u>. ROC is an independent contractor, not an officer, employee or agent of District.

5.11 <u>Notices</u>. Any notice required or desired to be given pursuant to the Agreement shall be in writing, duly addressed to the Parties below. By written notice in conformance herewith, either Party may change the address to which notices to said party must be delivered. Any notice deposited with the United States Postal Service shall be deemed to have been duly given upon confirmed receipt, if sent by certified or registered mail, postage prepaid, addressed as set forth below or as changed as set forth herein. Notice may also be given by facsimile with proof of transmission, or by express mail with proof of delivery. Notice sent by any other manner shall be effective only upon actual receipt thereof.

If facsimile transmission is made, each Party shall supply a fax number to the other Party.

5.12 <u>Alternative Dispute Resolution</u>. In the event of any dispute regarding the

provisions of the Agreement, the Parties shall attempt to mediate a resolution. If mediation is not successful, the Parties agree to submit their dispute to binding arbitration with an acceptable third party, or if the Parties cannot agree, with either the American Arbitration Association ("AAA") or JAMS in Sacramento County. Each Party shall share the cost of the mediator/arbitrator and each Party shall bear their respective attorneys fees and costs.

5.13 <u>Incorporation of Attachments</u>. Attachment A is incorporated in the Agreement as though set forth fully and at length herein. Any subsequent attachments through amendments shall be deemed to be incorporated herein by reference.

5.14 <u>Headings and References</u>. The headings of the Agreement are for purposes of reference only and shall not limit or define the meaning of the provisions of the Agreement.

5.15 <u>Signature In Counterparts</u>. The Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, all of which, taken together, shall constitute the same instrument. A copy, original or facsimile with all signatures appended together shall be deemed a fully executed Agreement. Electronic signatures, and copies of all signatures, shall have the same force and effect as original signatures.

5.16 **<u>Remedies</u>**. The remedies of the District shall not be exclusive but shall be cumulative and in addition to all remedies now or hereafter available at law or in equity.

5.17 <u>Warranty of Authority</u>. The signatories of ROC warrant they have full authority to bind the corporation known as River Oak Center for Children and to execute and deliver the Agreement on behalf of the corporation.

Improvements to classrooms 16, 17, 18 & 19 will address existing deteriorated condition issues and are generally limited to the upgrades of existing floor and wall finishes and casework replacement. The following is a list of basic improvements River Oak proposes making to these four classrooms:

1. Cover the lower 8 feet of all walls with new vinyl-wrapped tackable wall panels and decorative

chair rails and paint walls and ceiling above. This would involve the removal of existing white marker boards, tack boards and decorative wood trim. Existing surface mounted power and low voltage systems would be maintained and moved to the surface of the new tack panels without disruption or disconnection.

- 2. Remove existing deteriorated wood shelving at front door areas and replace with new plastic laminate storage cabinets, base cabinets, countertops and upper cabinets.
- 3. Paint interior and exterior doors and frames.
- 4. Replace existing carpet and VCT flooring with new.
- 5. Replace existing vinyl draperies with new vertical PVC blinds.
- 6. Provide new room & door signage.
- 7. Install new power circuits in Classroom 18 for new furniture cubicles.
- 8. Install new surface mounted low voltage pathways for data and phones, however most data and phone distribution with be via ROC wireless networks.
- 9. Allow for the option to replace the existing overhead pendant lighting with new LED pendant fixtures and Title 24 compliant controls.

All the work in these 4 rooms should be considered as general maintenance and repair improvements. This work would be designed by a licensed architect and fully coordinated with the Sacramento City Unified School District Facilities, Operations and Maintenance departments and be performed by a qualified and licensed general contractor. It is not anticipated this work would be required to be processed through the Division of the State Architect.

Within these rooms all existing power distribution, fire detection systems, HVAC and controls will remain at the time of occupancy by ROC. The District shall not be responsible for any maintenance or repairs as ROC is accepting the classrooms in an as is condition. The District shall not be responsible for any hazardous material abatement. Any such cost shall be borne by ROC.

1.0 OPEN SESSION / CALL TO ORDER / ROLL CALL

The meeting was called to order at 4:35 p.m. by President Pritchett, and roll was taken.

Members Present: President Christina Pritchett Vice President Hansen Ellen Cochrane Darrel Woo

Members Absent: Second Vice President Jessie Ryan (arrived at 7:30 p.m.) Gustavo Arroyo (arrived at 7:20 p.m.) Diana Rodriguez

A quorum was reached.

2.0 MAY REVISION AND BUDGET WORKSHOP FOR 2016-2017 (Gerardo Castillo, CPA)

Chief Business Officer Gerardo Castillo said that the presentation is a combination of the May Revision and Budget Workshop. He covered themes presented by the governor. Director Michael Smith of Budget Services joined him to cover the Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) priorities and how they align to the budget. They reviewed investments started in 2015-16 and continuing, supplemental and concentration expenditures, and one-time expenditures.

Public Comment:

<u>Carl Pinkston</u>, who is with the Black Parallel School Board and a member of the LCAP advisory committee, expressed a concern with the omission of notebooks for kids in critical schools regarding supplemental and concentrations funds. He also feels there is a need to reduce the number of School Resource Officers. He would like to see more training related to Restorative Justice.

<u>Liz Guillen</u>, of Public Advocates, said that there is flexibility in fund spending but that the spending must demonstrate funds are being used to increase or improve services that are principally directed to meet needs so that goals can be effectively met, especially if done on a district-wide basis as Sacramento City Unified School District has chosen to do. She feels parts of the presentation were not clear.

Board Member Comments:

Member Cochrane asked if we have reduced class sizes this year. Mr. Castillo said yes; for 2015-16 we will be fully compliant with LCFF at 24 to 1. Member Cochrane then asked if funding for counselors is to cover existing counselors or for new counselors. Mr. Castillo replied that it is for existing, but by covering in the manner budgeted funds are freed for the sites to use for other things. He said if the FTE is not covered in this way the positions would be eliminated. Member Cochrane then asked about ROTC funding. Mr. Castillo explained how these positions are covered and said that the positions are to serve high need students. Member Cochrane referred to slide 32 and asked if we are in a deficit. Mr. Castillo said yes, for new revenue versus new expenditures. Member Cochrane asked if the one-time discretionary funds are set. Mr. Castillo said it is still at the proposal stage. Superintendent Banda noted that budget recommendations come from all areas, including input from sites. Part of the process is to get feed-back tonight from the Board.

Vice President Hansen noted that 23% of LCFF increase goes toward retirement funding and asked what that covers. Mr. Castillo said this is pension only and does not include health care. Vice President Hansen asked if 23% has gone to this all along. Mr. Castillo said it has been between 20 and 25%. Vice President Hansen noted that the next generation of students will bear the burden if there is another recession. He then asked about the child development fund. Mr. Castillo explained the funding of the pre-school programs. Vice President Hansen asked how much FTE the restored custodial staff represents. Ms. McArn replied. Vice President Hansen requested more specific information be provided to him later. He also asked for some more information regarding academic and career counseling, how many foster students we currently have, and that the school site council plans for his area be sent to him. He then noted that Public Advocates has just filed a lawsuit against Los Angeles Unified for \$400 million dollars and asked Ms. Guillen some related questions regarding rules around concentration and supplemental funds. Ms. Guillen explained. She feels the single plan should address the school site plans and is concerned that they do not. Vice President Hansen then asked for Public Advocates view on covering costs for teachers; the State Superintendent has said this is justified use. Ms. Guillen said that she disagrees with the interpretation of what the State Superintendent said. District-wide salary increases can be covered with base funding; covering with supplemental and concentration funding must be justified as an increase or improvement in service.

Board Member Woo asked, regarding the 2014-15 general fund balance of 12.5%, if there is a projection for 2016-17. Mr. Castillo said it will be about the same.

President Pritchett recommended rotation of employees, would like funds for the Transportation parking lot used for a school site instead, and asked for more information on active shooter training. Ms. Allen gave clarification on the parking lot. President Pritchett would still like the matter reconsidered.

She asked the Board to find an alternative to spending \$45 million dollars on a kitchen when sites like Hiram Johnson and C. K. McClatchy High Schools and underserved students deserve more.

10.1 Public Hearing on the Initial Charter Petition for Growth Public Schools (Jack Kraemer and David Richards) Conference

Charter Oversight Coordinator Jack Kraemer facilitated the public hearing of the initial charter petition for Growth Public Schools. He introduced lead petitioner David Richards. Mr. Kraemer gave an overview of the charter school, the process for the initial charter petition, the purpose of public hearing, and next steps. Mr. Richards then gave his presentation and introduced Larisa Cespedes who also spoke.

Board Member Comments:

Vice President Hansen asked how diversity will be ensured. Mr. Richards said they look at the demographics of the district and then strategically recruit those demographics. Vice President Hansen noted that our District has a fairly high percentage of special education students, about 16 percent, and he asked if there are parent participation requirements. Mr. Richards replied they encourage 30 hours a year.

Member Woo also commented on the high percentage of special education students and asked how the

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school progressed from when the school opened in 2011 to 2013. He also asked about some blank spaces under the 2012 base. Mr. Richards said they did not have enough special education students to create a base for some demographics. He also spoke about why it is risky for special education students to attend schools that are not yet established.

President Pritchett asked how many students were at his Bay Area school. Mr. Richards replied that it is a 400 student high school. The new school will be a K-8 with 600 students in the year 2025. President Pritchett asked where his focus will be on recruiting. Mr. Richards said their approach will be to stay in the City of Sacramento, but they assume they will have students come from Rancho Cordova and other areas due to the location. They feel they will draw from the surrounding area within a 10 minute driving distance.

Member Woo has concerns with declining enrollment at Sacramento City Unified School District. Therefore he suggested other districts, which surround Rancho Cordova, as potential recruiting areas.

10.2 Approve Resolution No. 2892: Material Revision of the Charter for Bowling Green Charter School (Jack Kraemer) **Conference**/Action

Charter Oversight Coordinator Jack Kraemer introduced Susan Gibson, Principal of Bowling Green McCoy Charter School, and Principal Silvia Torres of Bowling Green Chacon Charter School. They gave an overview of the charter school and spoke on District concerns and school responses, statutory requirements for material revisions, and recommendation of charter oversight. The recommendation was for the Board to adopt the resolution.

12.6 Information Sharing By Board Members

Second Vice President Ryan gave an update on the Sacramento Parent Teacher Association. She said there will be a meeting on June 20th. If they are able to bring together enough members and amend the by-laws, the PTA will continue. Otherwise, they will be forced to disband. She also reported on recent and upcoming events at the Fruit Ridge Community Collaborative. She spoke at the Young Feminist Alliance Annual Conference recently. 13.0 BOARD WORKSHOP/STRATEGIC PLAN AND OTHER INITIATIVES

13.1 Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children (CSEC) (Stacey Bell, Aliya Holmes, Information STREAT Team)

Youth Development Director Stacey Bell and Foster Youth Service Coordinator Aliya Holmes presented. They covered youth development/targeted prevention and intervention, gave an introduction to CSEC, Sexually Exploited Children and Teens (SECT), the STREAT Team, and went over next steps. Ms. Holmes introduced a member of the STREAT Team who spoke about their work and showed a video. Information

Public Comment: None.

Board Member Comments:

Member Cochrane thanked the presenters and spoke about the importance of attendance. She thanked the presenters for pinpointing that. She gave some suggestions and made recommendations to her fellow Board members. She suggested providing a pocket card to teachers with an A-B-C list and adding a referral component to the attendance phone system. She feels these would be things that can be done relatively quickly. She also spoke about the importance of communication with identified students.

Second Vice President Ryan complimented Ms. Bell on her leadership and work. She asked what it would take to be able to serve more students and also asked if there is a way to be more thoughtful in leveraging community partners. Ms. Bell answered that they have budgeted out the cost to have an additional position and also talked about current partnership collaborations.

Member Woo thanked the presenters and spoke about My Sister's House. He said that sometime this year they hope to open a shelter for victims of human trafficking. This will be done in collaboration with a two year grant from WEAVE.

Member Arroyo thanked the presenters and spoke about budgeting for the needs of Ms. Bell's department. He spoke about the bigger issues and needs that are connected to this problem. He would like to see this issue come up as a regular item so that this and other issues can be prioritized and acted upon.

Vice President Hansen thanked the presenters. He asked about the 26 students that the department is working with now. Ms. Holmes answered that some are foster youth and some referrals. He also asked what our working relationship is with the County. Ms. Bell said that we are part of a County-wide action team and that the STREAT team was part of the child welfare council's report about two years ago. Vice President Hansen asked the department to ask the Board for help when they are trying to connect with the County in regard to grants and other help.

President Pritchett thanked the presenters. She spoke about project Shine and the budget. She asked the STREAT Team member how the Board can help. She replied that basic needs must be met. Ms. Bell said that we are limited in being able to provide basic needs as per Board policy we are not allowed to purchase clothing and personal items. This would be difficult to do anyway because of budget constraints. All supports happen in the after school space or during lunch time; they are able to leverage funding for staff in this way. Most needs are provided through community partnerships, although those are limited as well. We have used the Clothes Closet before and have partnerships with City of Refuge, Elk Grove Unified School District, and faith-based organizations. President Pritchett noted that the feedback she gets from District teachers is that our mandated reporting training is not sufficient. Chief Human Resource Officer Cancy McArn responded that they will continue to work on this. Ms. Bell said they have gone to school sites and provided additional training upon request. President Pritchett would like to have a Board resolution in January in support of Human Trafficking Month. She would also like to see the STREAT Team working in more schools and asked that the video shown be sent to all Board members.

Member Arroyo asked if the 26 cases they have is their capacity or if that is the number that has come to them. Ms. Bell said that is their capacity; they have had 111 students identified as exploited or at high risk. They collaborate with social workers and other agencies.

I. OVERVIEW / HISTORY

In July, 2013, the State Legislature approved a new funding system for all California public schools. This new funding system, Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), requires every Local Education Agency to write a Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) to identify and attend to student needs, district goals, and expenditures. The 2016-17 school year represents the third year of LCFF.

II. DRIVING GOVERNANCE

According to Ed Code 52060, on or before July 1, annually, the Governing Board of each school district shall adopt a Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) using a template adopted by the California State Board of Education (SBE), effective for three years with annual updates.

The LCAP is the LCFF's vehicle for transparency in decision-making and community stakeholder engagement. It must describe for each school district, and each school within the district, the annual goals and specific actions to achieve those goals for all students and subgroups of students identified in Education Code 52052, including students with disabilities. Through the LCAP, districts describe actions planned to achieve the goals it has identified, along with budget details showing the types of state expenditures made to support these actions.

There are at least two public meetings where the LCAP is shared, along with the district's budget. The first meeting is a public hearing that allows for recommendations and comments from the public about the LCAP and budget. The second meeting is when the LCAP and budget are adopted at the end of the traditional school year and after the State's "May Revise" of the Budget.

III. BUDGET

Funds provided through the state's Local Control Funding Formula represent approximately 65% of the district's total revenue.

IV. GOALS, OBJECTIVES, AND MEASURES

Staff recommends that the Board adopts the 2016-17 LCAP.

V. MAJOR INITIATIVES

The LCAP provides focus for the work of the school district. The forthcoming Strategic Plan will provide direction for the district's LCAP going forward. The Data Dashboard will be a tool for all stakeholders to easily access LCAP data and other important district data at a district level and a school site level.

<u>Recommendation</u>: Adopt the proposed 2016-17 Budget for all funds presented as a Public Hearing Item at the June 16th, 2016 Board Meeting.

Background/Rationale: At the June 16, 2016 Board meeting, a public hearing was conducted on the proposed 2016-17 Budget for all funds. Administration is now requesting action to adopt the proposed Budget. As indicated at the prior Board meeting, by June 30th of each year, the school district must adopt a budget for all funds for the ensuing fiscal year. Prior to adoption of the budget, the Board must conduct a public hearing. This is in accordance with state prescribed procedures for single budget adoption, which require that the budget be adopted and submitted to the County Office of Education on state required forms by June 30th. The 2016-17 Budget establishes expenditure authority for the district to conduct business for the next fiscal year.

The proposed 2016-17 budget is based on the May Revise Budget that was presented by the Governor on May 13, 2016 and incorporates recommendations from the Sacramento County Office of Education. While the Governor's May Revise Budget is a very significant event in the process, the final impact to the district will not be known until the state budget is signed. School districts have 45 days after the final state budget is signed to amend and resubmit their budget.

The complete set of state required forms is quite voluminous and is available on the district's website as presented at the June 16, 2016 Board Meeting.

Financial Considerations: The proposed budget establishes expenditure authority for all funds.

I. OVERVIEW / HISTORY

Since August 2015, staff has worked with community stakeholders in an inclusive process to update the SCUSD Strategic Plan.

The district's planning and design process has yielded a Strategic Plan that will:

- Align long term strategic actions with the Local Control and Accountability Plan,
- Reflect best educational practices, and will be feasible and sustainable,
- Capture the shared vision of SCUSD stakeholder groups, including students and their families, teachers, administrators, central office staff, community members, the Superintendent, and the Board of Education.
- Harness the power of on-going study of performance indicators to track implementation and effects as a means to continuous improvement.

Following the establishment of a Design Team and a creation of a district Needs Assessment, in November 2015, the Strategy and Innovation Office shared the first draft of the proposed Strategic Plan in outline form.

After a period of engagement on the draft ("Cycle 1"), a revised second draft was created to share through a series of regional meetings ("Cycle 2") during April and May 2016. The second round of engagement established that there was sufficient support for the revised plan. The third draft of the Strategic Plan is presented for a final round of feedback by Board members, for adoption at the end of June, 2016 for implementation beginning in the 2016-17 school year.

II. DRIVING GOVERNANCE

The district's previous Strategic Plan was launched in 2010, as a descriptive companion to the Board of Education-adopted Mission Statement: *Students graduate as globally competitive, lifelong learners, prepared to succeed in a career and higher education institution of their choice to secure gainful employment and contribute to society.* The three foundational pillars of the previous Strategic Plan: *Career- and College-Ready Students, Family and Community Engagement, and Organizational Transformation*, guided the work of the district to date.

III. BUDGET

Relying primarily on district resources, we have been able to keep the costs within budget.

IV. GOALS, OBJECTIVES, AND MEASURES

There are three key ideas driving this work:

- The Strategic Plan is an exercise for us as a community to envision excellence for our students, and from ourselves.
- The Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) is the detailed plan that will actualize the intentions and commitments of the Strategic Plan.
- Our Data Dashboard will make leading and lagging indicators available to all stakeholders as a means to authentic, shared community leadership.

V. MAJOR INITIATIVES

The Strategic Plan will provide a framework for district culture, norms and student supports for five years. It is expected that the Strategic Plan will align with the LCAP and, by extension, the Single Plan for Student Achievement at each school site.

VI. RESULTS

The draft Strategic Plan is framed around four major goals. Included with each of the goals is a list of sample initiatives and associated activities that the district is committed to achieve.

- College, Career and Life-Ready Graduates
- Safe, Emotionally Healthy and Engaged Students
- Family and Community Empowerment
- Operational Excellence

In order to put forth this updated draft of the Strategic Plan, staff has utilized the following tools:

- Strategic Plan Design Team research and refinement
- Cycle 2 Community Meetings
- Collaborative seminars with labor partners, the Student Advisory Council, DELAC, Community Advisory Committee on Special Education, and the Parent Information Exchange
- Ongoing review and development with the Superintendent's Extended and Executive Cabinets
- Applicable work of innovative partner districts

The draft plan presented at the June 16 Board meeting includes proposed metrics to measure the effectiveness of the plan's implementation and on-going efforts to improve District services.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE SACRAMENTO CITY UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT CALLING AN ELECTION FOR VOTER APPROVAL OF AN EDUCATION PARCEL TAX, ESTABLISHING SPECIFICATIONS OF THE ELECTION ORDER, AND REQUESTING CONSOLIDATION WITH THE STATEWIDE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 8, 2016

WHEREAS, the Sacramento City Unified School District (the "District") is determined to provide excellent educational programs to all its students; and

WHEREAS, improving support services for students in SCUSD and those transitioning to college and careers are essential elements of the District's initiative to deliver educational excellence; and

WHEREAS, the District has determined that educational excellence requires early intervention strategies such as counseling, tutoring, mentoring and other intensive support services to reduce the drop-out rate and help students who are struggling; and

WHEREAS, many children in our community have need of supplemental academic and counseling programs to prevent them from dropping out or getting behind academically; and

WHEREAS, years of research shows that high quality arts and music education is essential to the development of the "whole child" and contributes significantly to raising student achievement; and

WHEREAS, every school, especially those with historically underserved student populations, would benefit from high quality arts and music education; and

WHEREAS, the District desires to improve student access to student support staff who represent the diversity of the community; and

WHEREAS, only 22 of the 76 schools in the District have direct access to intensive on-site student supports; and

WHEREAS, it is a District imperative to reduce expulsions and suspensions for all students, particularly among African American, Latino, AANHPI (Asian American, Native Hawaiian, Pacific Islander) and low income students; and

WHEREAS, the District has a need to provide school staff who are bilingual to be able to communicate effectively with students and parents; and

WHEREAS, high-quality teachers, counselors, social workers and school staff are essential for improving school climate and parental engagement; and

WHEREAS, research shows that innovative programs such as restorative justice, social-emotional learning and positive behavior supports can have a significant and positive impact on student success; and

WHEREAS, specialized training for school staff is needed in the areas of socialemotional learning, restorative justice, cultural competency and other areas in order to improve school climate, reduce suspensions and expulsions, and promote student success and well-being; and

WHEREAS, funding from the State of California (the "State") has been insufficient to meet these goals, and the District has no assurance that State funding will permit the District to meet these goals in the future; and

WHEREAS, funding from the Federal Government is insufficient to meet these goals, and the District has no assurance that Federal funding will permit the District to meet these goals in the future; and

WHEREAS, according to a 2016 report by Children Now, California ranks 42nd in per pupil spending on K-12 education when compared to other states; and

WHEREAS, all funds raised in these qualified special taxes are spent equitably for the benefit of at-risk students in our local district; and

WHEREAS, the District shall create a Citizens Oversight Committee to ensure all funds benefit children most in need; and

WHEREAS, Section 4 of Article XIIIA of the California Constitution and Sections 50075 et seq., 50079 and 53722 et seq., of the California Government Code authorize a school district, upon approval by two-thirds of the electorate voting on the measure, to levy a an education parcel tax (a "qualified special tax" under California Government Code Section 50079) on all taxable, non-exempt real property within the District, with an exemption for persons aged 65 years or older residing in the District, for education purposes following notice and a public hearing; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the District (the "Board") has conducted a noticed public hearing on whether to request that the District's voters authorize funding to continue the programs identified below.

NOW THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE SACRAMENTO CITY UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT HEREBY RESOLVES,

DETERMINES AND ORDERS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The foregoing recitals are true and correct and the Board so finds and determines.

Section 2. The Board has determined in its best judgment that in order to maintain quality education within the District, an election is advisable and on that basis hereby requests the Sacramento County Voter Registration and Elections (hereafter referred to as the "Sacramento County Registrar of Voters") to call and conduct an election and submit to the voters of the District the question of whether to adopt an education parcel tax in order to maintain the quality of the District's public education for the benefit of all students and citizens.

Section 3. The education parcel tax shall be in the amounts and for the purposes set forth in the attached <u>Exhibit A</u> beginning as of July 1, 2017, assessed against each parcel of taxable land located wholly or partly in the District. A parcel shall be defined as any unit of land located wholly or partly in the District that now receives a separate tax bill for *ad valorem* property taxes from the Sacramento County Tax Collector.

Section 4. The date of the election shall be November 8, 2016.

Section 5. The purpose of the election shall be for the voters in the District to vote on a ballot measure, a full copy of which is attached hereto and marked <u>Exhibit A</u> and incorporated by reference herein for inclusion in the ballot pamphlet. As required by California Elections Code section 13247, the abbreviated form of the measure to appear on the ballot is attached hereto as <u>Exhibit B</u>.

Section 6. The Board has the authority for ordering the election.

Section 7. The authority for the specifications of this election order is contained in Sections 5304 and 5322 of the California Education Code and Section 50079 of the California Government Code.

Section 8. This Resolution shall stand as the order to the Sacramento County Registrar of Voters to call an election within the current boundaries of the District on November 8, 2016.

Section 9. The Secretary of the Board, or authorized designee, is hereby directed immediately to send a certified copy of this Resolution to the Sacramento County Registrar of Voters, the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors, and the Sacramento County Superintendent of Schools so that said Superintendent receives it no later than August 12, 2016.

Section 10. The Sacramento County Superintendent of Schools is hereby requested to deliver this Resolution, which constitutes the order of election, and a formal notice of the election to the Sacramento County Registrar of Voters. The Sacramento County Superintendent

of Schools is hereby requested to perform the duties called for under Education Code Section 5302, to call the election, prepare recommendations, statements, or arguments for the election as required, and to receive petitions, as necessary.

Section 11. The Sacramento County Superintendent of Schools is hereby requested to prepare and execute a Formal Notice of School Parcel Tax Election and Consolidation Order containing the information specified in Section 5361 of the Education Code, in substantially the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit C</u> (the "Notice") and to timely call the election, by publishing and/or posting the Notice as required by law. The Secretary of this Board, or authorized designee, on behalf of and as may be requested by the Sacramento County Superintendent of Schools, is authorized to cause all notices required by law in connection herewith to be published and posted, as the case may be.

Section 12. Pursuant to Section 5303 of the Education Code, the Sacramento County Registrar of Voters is hereby requested to take all steps incident to the preparation for and the holding of the election in accordance with law and these specifications and with election costs to be borne by the District pursuant to Section 5421 of the Education Code.

- (a) *Request to Call and Hold Election.* The County Registrar is hereby requested to consolidate the election ordered hereby with any and all other elections to be held on November 8, 2016, within the District.
- (b) *Voter Pamphlet.* The County Registrar is hereby requested to reprint the measure in its entirety in the voter information pamphlet to be distributed to voters pursuant to section 13307 of the California Elections Code. In the event the measure in <u>Exhibit A</u> will not be reprinted in the voter information pamphlet in its entirety, the County Registrar is hereby requested to print, immediately below the impartial analysis of the measure, in no less than 10-point boldface type, a legend substantially as follows:

The above statement is an impartial analysis of Measure ______. If you desire a copy of the measure, please call the Sacramento County Registrar of Voters at (______) and a copy will be mailed to you at no cost.

(c) *Delivery of Notices.* The Board requests that the Registrar of Voters deliver a copy of all published notices to the Secretary of this Board pursuant to Section 12113 of the Elections Code.

Section 13. The Board of Supervisors of Sacramento County is authorized to canvass the returns of the election pursuant to Section 10411 of the Elections Code.

Section 14. In accordance with Education Code section 5342 and Elections Code section 10402.5, it is hereby requested that the election to be held hereunder be consolidated

by the Sacramento County Registrar of Voters and the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors, for all purposes, with any and all other elections also called to be held on November 8, 2016, insofar as said elections are to be held in the same territory or in territory that is in part the same as the territory of the District.

Section 15. The Board shall provide in each year, pursuant to Government Code section 7902.1 or any successor provision of law, for any increase in the District's appropriations limit as shall be necessary to ensure that proceeds of the special tax may be spent for the authorized purposes.

Section 16. Subject to approval by two-thirds of the voters, the education parcel tax shall become effective as of July 1, 2017, and be collected by the Sacramento County Tax Collector at the same time and in the same manner as and along with, and shall be subject to the same penalties as, general ad valorem property taxes collected by the Sacramento County Tax Collector. The tax and penalty shall bear interest until paid at the same rate as the rate for unpaid ad valorem property taxes. With respect to all general property tax matters within its jurisdiction, the County Tax Collector shall make all final determinations of tax exemption or relief for any reason, and that decision shall be final and binding. With respect to matters specific to the levy of the special tax, including the senior citizen exemption for persons who are 65 years of age or older, the decisions of the District shall be final and binding.

Section 17. The members of the Board, the Superintendent of the District, the Deputy Superintendent, the Chief Business Officer, their designees, and cabinet officers of the District (collectively, "officers") are hereby authorized and directed, individually and collectively, to do any and all things and to execute, deliver, and perform any and all agreements and documents that they deem necessary or advisable in order to effectuate the purposes of this Resolution, including, without limitation, to prepare and submit for inclusion in the voter information pamphlet an argument in favor of passage of the ballot measure, and any rebuttal argument, within the time established by the County Registrar, which shall be considered the official ballot argument of this Board as sponsor of the proposition. All actions heretofore taken by the officers and agents of the District that are in conformity with the purposes and intent of this Resolution are hereby ratified, confirmed, and approved in all respects.

Section 18. The members of the Board, the Superintendent of the District, and officers of the District are hereby requested and directed, individually and collectively, to provide accountability measures pursuant to Government Code Section 50075.1 that include, but are not limited to, all of the following:

- (a) *Specific Purpose.* The proceeds of the special tax shall be applied only to the specific purposes identified in the Full Text of Special Tax Measure (Exhibit A).
- (b) *Separate Fund.* The proceeds of the special tax shall be deposited into a fund, which shall be kept separate and apart from other funds of the District.
- (c) Annual Report. No later than January 1 of each year while the tax is in effect,

the District shall prepare and file with the Board a report detailing the amount of funds collected and expended, and the status of any project authorized to be funded by this Measure pursuant to Government Code section 50075.3.

Section 19. That the District's Superintendent, the officers referenced in Section 17, and their designees are hereby authorized and directed to make any changes to the text of the measure described in this Resolution, or to the abbreviated form of the measure, or to the text of this Resolution, as may be convenient or necessary to comply with the intent of this Resolution, the requirements of elections officials, and requirements of law.

Section 20. This resolution shall take effect from and after its adoption.

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EXHIBIT A

FULL TEXT OF SPECIAL TAX MEASURE

TO PROVIDE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS AND SUPPORT SERVICES FOR STUDENTS WITHIN SACRAMENTO CITY UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

INTRODUCTION

This measure provides needed funding to provide educational programs and support services for students within the Sacramento City Unified School District.

PURPOSE

The Sacramento City Unified School District is determined to provide excellent educational programs to all its students. Improving support services for students in SCUSD -- and those transitioning to college and careers -- is an essential element of the District's initiative to deliver educational excellence. Early intervention strategies such as counseling, tutoring, mentoring and other intensive support services can reduce the drop-out rate and help students who are struggling. In addition, years of research show that a high-quality arts and music education is critical to the development of the "whole child" and contribute significantly to raising student achievement. Every school, especially those with historically underserved student populations, would benefit from high-quality arts and music education. Every student should have access to support staff that reflects the diversity of the community.

SCUSD has many needs that must be met for the district to achieve its goals. Currently, only 22 out of 76 schools offer intensive on-site student supports. Expulsion and suspension rates need to be reduced for all students and particularly for African American, Latino, AANHPI (Asian American, Native Hawaiian, Pacific Islander) and low-income students. The district has a need to provide school staff that is bilingual to communicate effectively with students and parents. Highly qualified and well-trained teachers, counselors and school staff are also crucial for improving school climate and parental engagement. Data shows that innovative programs such as restorative justice, social-emotional learning and positive behavior supports can have a significant and positive impact on student success.

RATE AND PROCEDURE

Subject to two-thirds approval of the voters, this local funding measure and its parcel tax (a "qualified special tax" under Government Code section 50079) will become effective as of July 1, 2017. The tax will be levied at the rate of \$75 per parcel of taxable real property per year for 6 years. The tax will be collected by the Sacramento County Tax Collector (the "Tax Collector") at the same time as and along with, and will be subject to the same penalties as general *ad valorem* taxes collected by said Tax Collector. The tax and penalty will bear interest at the same rate as the rate for unpaid *ad valorem* property taxes until paid. Any tax levied will become a lien upon

the properties against which taxes are assessed and collectible as herein provided.

With respect to all general property tax matters within its jurisdiction, the Sacramento County Tax Assessor or other appropriate County tax official (the "County") will make all final determinations of tax exemption or relief for any reason, and that decision will be final and binding. With respect to matters specific to the levy of the special tax, including the Senior Citizen Exemption, the decisions of the District will be final and binding. The procedures described herein, and any additional procedures established by the Board of Education, will be the exclusive claims procedure for claimants seeking an exemption, refund, reduction, or recomputation of the special tax. Whether any particular claim is to be resolved by the District or by the County will be determined by the District, in co-ordination with the County as necessary.

The Board may adopt such additional or supplemental procedures as it deems necessary or convenient for the administration of the special tax.

A "parcel of taxable real property" is defined as any unit of real property within the District's boundaries that receives a separate tax bill for ad valorem property taxes from the County Tax Collector. All property that is otherwise exempt from or upon which no ad valorem property taxes are levied in any year will also be exempt from the special tax in such year.

EXEMPTION FOR SENIOR CITIZENS

An exemption will be granted on any parcel owned by one or more persons who are aged sixtyfive (65) years or older and who occupy said parcel as a principal residence, upon application for exemption. Applications for such exemptions must be made to the District on or before July 1, 2017, or before July 1 of any succeeding tax year. Any one approved application from a qualified applicant will provide an exemption for the parcel for the remaining term of the special tax so long as such applicant continues to own and occupy the parcel as his or her principal residence.

The District will annually provide to the Tax Collector or other appropriate County tax official a list of parcels that the District has approved for a Senior Citizen Exemption.

ACCOUNTABILITY AND COMPLIANCE MEASURES

In accordance with the requirements of California Government Code sections 50075.1 and 50075.3, the following accountability measures, among others, shall apply to the special taxes levied in accordance with this Measure:

(a) Proceeds of this special tax shall be deposited into a fund which shall be kept separate and apart from other funds in the District and shall be applied only as set forth in this Measure.

(b) An annual report, including the revenues generated by this special tax and the expenditures of these monies and the status of any projects funded by these monies, shall be filed by the chief fiscal officer of the District with the Board no later than January 1 of the year following the

fiscal year during which the monies were expended.

(c) In addition, an oversight committee of citizens will be appointed or designated by the Board to ensure that the special tax proceeds are spent for their authorized purposes, and to report annually to the Board and the public regarding the expenditure of such proceeds.

PROTECTION OF FUNDING

Current law forbids any decrease in State or Federal funding to the District because of the District's adoption of a parcel tax. However, if any such funds are reduced because of the adoption of this parcel tax, then the amount of the special taxes will be reduced annually as necessary in order to restore such State or Federal funding.
