Background/Rationale: On August 22, 2018, the District received a letter from the Sacramento County Office of Education (SCOE) informing the District that the 2018-19 Budget was disapproved. In accordance with Education Code 42127d, the District was appointed an independent Fiscal Advisor to work with the District in order to address the deficiency in the subsequent year budget.

The budget disapproval also qualified the District to receive independent auditing support from FCMAT at no cost to the District. In October 2018, FCMAT conducted a Fiscal Health Risk Analysis Study of the District. The Fiscal Health Risk Analysis Report contains the findings of their study.



I. OVERVIEW/HISTORY:

On June 21, 2018, the District Adopted the Proposed Fiscal Year 2018-19 Budget. On August 22, 2018, the Sacramento County Office of Education (SCOE) sent a letter notifying the District the 2018-19 Budget was disapproved.

On August 29, 2018, staff met with SCOE and held a conference call with the Fiscal Crisis & Management Assistance Team (FCMAT) to discuss next steps. SCOE assigned an independent Fiscal Advisor to work with the District and set a deadline of October 8, 2018 to submit a revised adopted budget to SCOE for approval.

Staff is working closely with the Fiscal Advisor. On September 6, 2018, staff presented an update on the 2018-19 disapproved budget. On October 4, 2018, staff presented, and the Board approved, the revised adopted budget that contained corrections as well as recommendations from the Fiscal Advisor.

On October 15, 2018, FCMAT began its Fiscal Health Risk Analysis Study of the District to identify the District's specific risk rating for fiscal insolvency. The FCMAT team spent three days at the District office conducting staff interviews and reviewing District financial information.

In 2006, the District previously requested a FCMAT analysis of district budgeting practices and its 2005-06 budget assumptions and projections. The Fiscal Review Report was issued September 21, 2006 and included recommendations for improvement.

II. Driving Governance:


- In accordance with the 2018-19 Budget Act, the FCMAT team was assigned to study the fiscal health of the District due to the SCOE Superintendent disapproving the District's 2018-19 budget.
- The SCOE Superintendent was informed of the agreement between FCMAT and the District, and will receive a copy of the final report. The final report will also be published on the FCMAT website.

College Application Process Update December 13, 2018



I. Overview/History of Department or Program

Sacramento City Unified School District's (SCUSD) Equity, Access, and Social Justice Guiding Principle is to ensure every student has an equal opportunity to graduate with the greatest number of postsecondary choices from the widest array of options. This report serves as an update on the efforts related to the college application process and how data made available through the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding with local colleges and universities via the College Futures Foundation was utilized, specifically Sacramento State University.

In terms of background, the California State University (CSU)/University of California (UC) application cycle is open from October 1- November 30, the Los Rios Community College application was made available November 1, and the private colleges have an application window that also starts in October and often runs well into the spring.

Following the October college eligibility letter mailing, the high school teams have been coordinating a series of college application presentations and hands-on application workshops to support students navigate the application processes. Partnerships with UC Davis, UC Merced, CSU Sacramento, Sacramento City College, and Cal-SOAP ensured all 12th grade students received segment specific information and support with the college application process.

In an effort to change conditions in the present, data from the UC Merced created A-G Course Monitoring Tool which identifies students who are minimally eligible to apply to a CSU were pulled to ensure students were invited to attend a series of college support activities. These data were then paired with the files that Sacramento State shared with us to identify who had submitted an application and who had not.

As of December 3, 2018, a total of 4 exchanges took place. This data enabled the Counseling team(s) to provide more targeted support to those students who had not yet submitted a CSU application. Examples of this support include day, afterschool, and evening application workshops. Data was also leveraged out of the California College Guidance Initiative (CCGI) platform. For the first time, students were able to upload course work directly to their CSU application directly which reduced the amount of manual coursework entry. This will allow us to see which CSU's and community colleges students applied to outside of Sacramento City College and CSU Sacramento.

During the month of November weekly email updates communicating the college application numbers were shared with Instructional Assistant Superintendents, Counselors, Associate Principals, and Principals. The data was also shared via the monthly Counselor meeting and during 3 principal meeting(s). in addition, the Youth Development Department was also

leveraged utilizing the student led podcast as a platform to encourage their peers to submit a college application.

The final application numbers are not yet available given the extension of the CSU application deadline to 12/15 due to the recent wildfires, but we are confident that there was a more coherent system in place than in previous years. We anticipate a positive outcome and will work towards leveraging the data exchange MOU to support students with the matriculation process to increase the likelihood of them enrolling in college.

II. Driving Governance:

The overarching governance is the Equity, Access and Social Justice Guiding principle which states that all students will have an equal opportunity to graduate with the greatest number of postsecondary choices from the widest array of options.

III. Budget:

\$300,000 from the College Futures Foundation which funds infrastructure related to the data exchanges and the college eligibility letter

IV. Goals, Objectives and Measures:

The impact of the college going efforts will be measured by seeing an increase in the total number of students who ultimately apply to a college/university that matches their academic profile. The data will be accessed via the recently signed MOU with the local institutions of higher ed i.e., Los Rios Community College, CSU Sacramento, UC Davis, and UC Merced.

- Develop space for sites to share best practices
- Currently collaborating with CSU Sacramento's Dean of Counseling to develop training modules regarding this particular topic and others
- Continue working with the Youth Development Department to explore student led college going campaigns

- **Cumulative Enrollment:** Cumulative Enrollment consists of the total number of students who were actively enrolled from the beginning of school through the Report Month. For mobile students, they will be counted in the cumulative enrollment for each school in which they have attended during the school year.
- **Suspension Incidents:** Total count of ALL suspension incidents off campus and on campus issued from the beginning of school through the report month at the selected entity for the selected population.
- **Distinct Count of Suspended Students:** Total distinct count of ALL students suspended one or more times. Students who are suspended multiple times are only counted once.
- **Suspension Rate:** The Distinct Count of Suspended Students divided by Cumulative Enrollment.

- Percent of Students Suspended with One Suspension: The number of students with only one suspension divided by the Distinct Count of Suspended Students.
- Percent of Students Suspended with Multiple Suspensions: The number of students with two or more suspensions divided by the Distinct Count of Suspended Students.
