

# **Community Schools End of Year Report**

#### What we implemented:


- Club for Muslim students

- Community Partnerships with Sac Republic (Buddy Bench), Pro Youth, and CHAMPS4Life.







### Food and Nutrition

In a focus group with our cafeteria staff, they highlighted a desire to interact with the students more in order to build positive interactions and relationships. Next Steps: recruit parent volunteers to allow more interaction for cafeteria staff and calmer dining

experience for students.

#### What We Implemented:

- Ongoing meetings with the director of Central Kitchen to address the concerns of the community.
- Collaboration with Central Kitchen to have students taste test new foods and give feedback.
- At their request, substitute stipend set aside for cafeteria staff to visit other school sites and bring back ideas. They instituted positive ideas before from other sites.

### 05.

PE

• In listening sessions with students and staff, PE was addressed as a needed area of improvement.

#### What We Implemented

- The CSIT (community school implementation team) budgeted \$1,000 to obtain PE materials that help teach teamwork and positive interactions since they do not have a PE curriculum or funding.
- We sought out community partners to help teach PE, specifically Sac Republic who offers an 8 week PE takeover in collaboration with UC Davis Health. We are hoping to be chosen next year for the program.

Next Steps: Involve families in seeking a solution.










### For programs offered, the survey showed that field trips are a top 3 priority for families (behind tutoring and sports).

### **Field Trips**

Next Steps: Involve Families and Community Partners in future field trip planning and implementation. Continue seeking grant funding.

What We Implemented:

Our community partner, ASES created the Exploritorium field trip for our 4th and 5th graders. They obtained funding, buses, volunteers, and handled all of the paperwork. We are grateful to our ASES coordinator! The Exploritorium donated approximately \$34,000 worth of free tickets for our families after the event.

- To get more chaperones, we are making volunteering easier by bringing fingerprinting services to the school site. This year we offered this service at one community event.
- Implemented a better volunteer tracking system.
- Working with the district to get community specialists trained to run the fingerprinting machine at the school sites.
- Applied for the Explore the Coast grant to take 5th graders to the ocean for the next 3 years.
- Seeking more community partnerships for funding for future trips.



#### **Our Parents are our Best Partners**


- Many parents stated that they would like to be more involved on campus.
