

Federal Program Monitoring and SPSA:

Compensatory Education (Title I)

The LEA will monitor students' progress by carrying out the following:

- (a) Developing and implementing a well-rounded program of instruction to meet the academic needs of all students. (20 U.S.C. § 6312[b][1][A])
- (b) Identifying students who may be at risk for academic failure. (20 U.S.C. § 6312[b][1][B])
- (c) Providing additional educational assistance to individual students the LEA or school determines need help in meeting the challenging state academic standards. (20 U.S.C. § 6312[b][1][C])
- (d) Identifying and implementing instructional and other strategies intended to strengthen academic program and improve school conditions for student learning. (20 U.S.C. § 6312[b][1][D])
- (e) Demonstrating through the evaluation that the program is not one of low effectiveness. (5 CCR § 3942.)

In Schoolwide Program Schools:

- The activity/expenditure is aligned to meet challenging state academic content standards (ESSA Section 1112 [a] and [b])
- The activity/expenditure meet a need identified in the comprehensive needs assessment (ESSA Section 1114[b][6])
- The activity expenditure in an evidence based educational strategy (ESSA Section 1103; 1114[d] and 1115[h]).
- The activity expenditure is reasonable necessary and allocable ~~set~~ to the program (2 Code of Federal Regulations Section 200.404-200.405)
- The activity/expenditure included in the SPSA (EC Section 52853)
- The activity/expenditure has been reviewed, approved and recommended by the SSC to the local governing board (EC 52855 & 64001)
- The SPSA has been approved by the local governing board.
- The SSC annually evaluates progress toward accomplishing goals.

Fiscal Monitoring

Allowable Costs:

Schoolwide Plans – ESSA Section 1114(b):

- Are regularly monitored and revised if necessary, based on student needs.
- Activities are based on a comprehensive needs assessment
- Includes strategies that the schools will be implementing to address students, particularly the needs of at risk students.
