<u>Learning Support Unit/Department</u>: Academic Office: Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA)

Recommendation: To conduct a Public Hearing on the SELPA's Annual Service Delivery Plan and the Annual Budget Plan.

Background/Rationale:

- The SCUSD SELPA Local Plan requires a service plan and budget be developed and updated annually.
- The Annual Service Plan describes the full continuum of services provided by the district for students, birth to 22 years of age, including students with low incidence disabilities.
- The Budget Plan describes those funds received in accordance with EC 56836 and the expenditures of those funds

Financial Considerations: The funds received from the federal government, pursuant to PL 94-142 (now codified as *Individuals with Disabilities Education Act – IDEA*) or in the subsequent reauthorization of 1977 and 2004, are not sufficient to meet the needs of our special education students. Currently, the federal dollars cover approximately 15% of the total cost to provide special education services. In addition, the effects of the district's declining enrollment have had a negative impact on the amount of funding received from the state. Nevertheless, the district continues to work toward reducing or leveling its share of cost without impacting the services provided to the students in order to remain compliant with the law.

I. Overview/History:

An important step in realizing our District's vision for Pillar One of the Strategic Plan, Career and College Ready Students, is to solidify the alignment of our special education services and practices to serve our students in a manner that is equitable, provides access to the general curriculum, meets their unique needs, and closes the achievement gap. Our special education students' success is our success. To that end, the district is committed to educating our students, to the greatest extent possible, in age appropriate general education classroom settings in their neighborhood schools, in order to prepare them for college or career. Furthermore, the Special Education Department is restructuring its system of supports and laying a stronger foundation that will position our students for success in preschool through grade 12 and beyond, and setting them on a path to develop skills and abilities needed to become responsible, productive citizens in today's global society. Through these efforts, we are moving toward a more inclusive setting aimed at improving the education outcomes for both our special and general education students.

Assembly Bill (AB) 602, Chapter 654, Statutes of 1997, requires the Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA) to submit an Annual Budget and Service Plan that is adopted at a public hearing. As required in Education Code Section (EC) 56205, these plans must identify expected expenditures, including a description of the services provided and their physical location. The plan must also demonstrate that all individuals with exceptional needs have access to services and instruction appropriate to meet their needs as specified in their Individualized Education Program. The Annual Service and Budget Plan must be adopted by the Board and submitted to CDE on or before March 31, 2011.

The Annual Budget Plan shall identify expected expenditures for all items required including, but not limited to the following:

- (A) Funds received in accordance with Chapter 7.2 (commencing with EC 56836)
- (B) Administrative costs of the plan
- (C) Special education services to pupils with severe disabilities and low incidence disabilities
- (D) Special education services to pupils with nonsevere disabilities
- (E) Supplemental aids and services to meet the individual needs of pupils placed in regular education classrooms and environments
- (F) Regionalized operations and services, and direct instructional support by program specialists in accordance with Article 6 (commencing with EC 56836.23) of Chapter 7.2

The funds received from the federal government, pursuant to PL 94-142 (now codified as *Individuals with Disabilities Education Act – IDEA*) or in the subsequent reauthorization of 1977 and 2004, are not sufficient to meet the needs of our students who receive special education services. Currently, the federal dollars received cover approximately 15% of the total costs of special education. In addition, the effects of the district's declining enrollment have had a negative impact on the amount of funding from the state. Nevertheless, the district continues to work toward reducing or leveling its share of cost without impacting the services provided to the students in order to be compliant with the law.

IV. Goals, Objectives and Measures:

Provide an equitable special education program which is aligned to the District's Strategic Plan, appropriate to meet the needs of our students and is compliant with the law.

V. Major Initiatives:

The Sacramento City Unified School District SELPA continues to provide a full continuum of services to meet the needs of students with special needs as specified in their Individualized Education Program.

The district has implemented an Inclusive Practices initiative at six Early Implementation sites (Jed Smith, Oak Ridge, Sutterville, Caleb Greenwood, California Middle School and CK McClatchy High School) during the 2010-2011 school year. Students receiving special education services at these six sites are spending increasing amounts of time in the general education classroom by being provided appropriate support from both general and special education teachers. Knowing that inclusive practice is developmental and it takes three to five years or more to largely adopt this belief system, we are building on the philosophy of "going slow to go fast." We will continue developing these schools next year as they will become our demonstration sites as we move forward with expanding to more sites.

The department is reorganizing its operational structure to provide increased and ongoing support to the school sites as they expand their inclusive practices and the district reduces its reliance on nonpublic schools/agencies to provide comprehensive services to our students within the district. Currently, we are seeking information from other districts regarding their special education organizational structure; looking at long term restructuring of some work assignments in the central office and continuing to return students to our programs from nonpublic schools/agencies.

VI. Results:

The achievement of our special education students is improving, but the achievement gap continues to exist. (2010 – 29.4% of students with disabilities Proficient in ELA and 35.3% of students with disabilities Proficient in Math; compared to 2009 -28.2% of students with disabilities Proficient in ELA and 31.6% of students with disabilities Proficient in Math.) The district's work on multiple fronts, which supports every student's achievement and equitable access, will benefit each student with special needs as well.

VII. Lessons Learned/Next Steps:

- Continue to ensure that our service delivery system is equitable and meets state and federal requirements.
- Continue to learn and refine our inclusive practices so that we are ready to expand to additional sites when the budget allows.

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- Continue work to reorganize the department's organizational structure to better support school sites and reduce our reliance on nonpublic schools and agencies.
- Continue proactive outreach to parents to provide information and empowerment strategies to advocate on behalf of their special needs children.
- Continue to return students from nonpublic schools/agencies to district programs
- Continue regional work with the five Special Education Local Plan Areas (SELPAs) to ensure an equitable fee structure for services that are provided on a contract basis. (2009-2010 reduced nonpublic school calendars by 5 days and initiated positive attendance policy; 2010-2011 reduced all nonpublic agency fees by 10%; 2011-2012 will reduce nonpublic school calendars by additional 5 days)
