Actual Size. Steve Jenkins. Houghton. \$16.00. Grades PreK-3

An oversize book that presents Jenkins' signature collage illustrations of animals appearing at actual size. Small animals fit nicely on the pages, and larger animals are cleverly pictured with just a hand or a jowl. Illustrations are accompanied by short informational text. **Open Court: Animals**

Airborn. Kenneth Oppel. HarperCollins. \$18.00. Grades 6-8

Matt, a young cabin boy aboard an airship, and Kate, a wealthy young girl traveling with her chaperone, team up to search for the existence of mysterious winged creatures reportedly living hundreds of feet above the Earth's surface.

Al Capone Does My Shirts. Gennifer Choldenko. Putnam. \$16.00. Grades 5-8

A twelve-year-old boy named Moose moves to Alcatraz Island in 1935 when guards' families were housed there, and has to contend with his extraordinary new environment in addition to life with his autistic sister. **Open Court: A Question of Value**

Alphabet Room. Sara Pinto. Bloomsbury. \$17.00. Pre S - K

Each double spread in this alphabet book shows a letter and corresponding object. Lifiable flaps hide pictures that show a room that fills up with the featured objects thus creating a cumulative tale. Bright illustrations. **Open Court: Let's Read**

America the Beautiful. Katharine Lee Bates. Illus. by Chris Gall. Little, Brown. \$17.00. Grades K-5

Presents the 1893 poem written by Katharine Lee Bates in celebration of the beauty of America. The illustrations depicting American scenes and the diverse contributions of all Americans are hand engraved on clay-coated board and digitized with computer graphics. The resulting images resemble woodcuts. Includes the musical notation for the song inspired by the poem. **Open Court: Red, White, and Blue**

American Revolution Battles and Leaders. Ed. by Aaron R. Murray. DK. \$17.00.

Grades 5-8

Offers a brief overview of the American Revolution, highlighting key people, places, and events, with more than two hundred paintings, portraits, artifacts, and maps. This heavily illustrated volume works well for quick facts and summaries of important battles. **Open Court: Making a New Nation**

Ancient Romans, The. Allison Lassieur. Franklin Watts. Grades 6-8

Surveys the history and culture of ancient Rome and examines Roman government and the power of the senate, the rise of the monarchy, scholars and Roman soldiers, the role of women, religion, and slavery. This is an attractive, thorough, and comprehensible book, illustrated with full-color photos and reproductions. **Open Court: Ancient Civilizations**

Anybodies. N.E. Bode. Illus. by Peter Ferguson. HarperCollins. \$16.00 Grades 5-8

After learning that she is not the biological daughter of boring Mr. and Mrs. Drudger, Fern embarks on magical adventures with her real father and finally finds "a place that feels like home." Includes inside jokes for children who are fans of children's literature, for example, the appearance of a tree bearing a giant peach.

Apples to Oregon: Being the (Slightly) True Narrative of How a Brave Pioneer Father Brought Apples, Peaches, Pears, Plums, Grapes and Cherries (and Children) across the Plains. Deborah Hopkinson. Illus. by Nancy Carpenter. Simon & Schuster. \$16.00.

Grades K-4

A pioneer father transports his beloved fruit trees and his family to Oregon in the mid-nineteenth century. Based loosely on the life of Henderson Luelling, a pioneer who transported plants and fruit trees to Oregon in 1847. Illustrated with oil paintings.

Open Court: Our Country and Its People, Going West

April Foolishness. Teresa Bateman. Illus. by Nadine Bernard Westcott. Albert Whitman. \$16.00. Grades K-3

Grandma, Grandpa, and the grandkids enjoy April Fools' Day on the farm. The grandkids race in and out of the kitchen reporting a series of catastrophes, but Grandpa just keeps cooking breakfast, sure that these events are just April foolery. Children may notice the story parallels the children's tales and Grandpa's actions, for example, when the kids report the pigs are loose, he reaches for the bacon, when the hens are loose, he reaches for the eggs. A humorous gotcha ending. Illustrated with bright watercolor and ink artwork.

Are We Alone? Scientists Search for Life in Space. Gloria Skurzynski. National Geographic. \$19.00. Grades 5-7

Presents a study of space and the possibility of extraterrestrial civilizations and discusses UFO sightings throughout the twentieth century, crop circles, and other paranormal occurrences. Well-placed color photographs and illustrations are important tools in helping readers to understand the science presented. **Open Court: Astronomy**

Atomic Ace: (He's Just My Dad). Jeff Weigel. Albert Whitman. \$16.00. Grades 1-4

In this rhyming story told in comic book format, a boy considers his family normal, though his superhero dad, Atomic Ace, does amazing feats, even battling the evil Insect King. The comic-strip panels alternate between super heroics and regular-guy domesticity in this humorous look at a hero balancing work and home.

B for Buster. Iain Lawrence. Delacorte. \$16.00. Grades 7+

Sixteen-year-old Kak, desperate to escape his abusive parents, lies about his age in the spring of 1943 to enlist in the Canadian Air Force and soon finds himself based in England as part of a crew flying bombing raids over Germany. This is a coming-of-age novel and a fascinating bit of aviation history.

Baby Babka, the Gorgeous Genius. Jane Breskin Zalben. Illus. by Victoria Chess. Clarion. \$15.00. Grades K-3

Unhappy when her baby sister turns out to be a brother, Beryl schemes with her brother Sam to make the newborn disappear, but Uncle Morty helps by telling stories of the love his big sisters had for him, even when he squirted one with pickle juice and ruined another's doll. The soft, rounded illustrations bring the characters to life.

Baby Brains: The Smartest Baby in the Whole World. Simon James. Candlewick. \$16.00. Grades PreK-2

Mr. and Mrs. Brains wanted to be sure their baby was going to be very intelligent, reading, playing music and the news for the unborn baby. He is indeed intelligent, and by the time he is just a few months old, is an astronaut. However, when Baby Brains finds himself alone in space, he wants his mommy, and normalcy is restored in the form of a warm bath, a tickle, and a nap in his own crib. Tricked by a fox into giving up his share of cherries, a famous Japanese poet is inspired to write a haiku and the fox, ashamed of his actions, must devise another trick to set things right. The lush illustrations are composed of pastoral scenes highlighted with kimono-silk patterns. **Open Court: Kindness**

Basilisk. N.M. Browne. Bloomsbury. \$18.00. Grades 7-12

Two teens who discover they are sharing the same dream of dragons fight to stop the evil dictator from bringing their dreams to life in the form of a terrible basilisk with the power to literally scare people to death.

Bee-Man of Orn. Frank Stockton. Illus. by P.J. Lynch. Candlewick. \$18.00. Grades 1-5

The Bee-Man of Orn first appeared as a short story in St. Nicholas magazine in November 1883. The Bee-man, informed by a Junior Sorcerer that he was once something or someone entirely different, sets out to discover his original form so that he can be changed back. Includes a DVD that shows P.J. Lynch at work in his studio. Lush paintings in watercolor-and-gouache. **Open Court: Storytelling, Fine Arts**

Behind You. Jacqueline Woodson. Putnam. \$16.00. Grades 8-12

After fifteen-year-old Jeremiah is mistakenly shot by police, the people who love him struggle to cope with their loss as they recall his life and death, unaware that he is watching over them.

Best Cat in the World. Lesléa Newman. Illus. by Ronald Himler. Eerdmans. \$14.00. Grades K-3

A young boy deals with the loss of his beloved cat Charlie, that he called the best cat in the world. When he accepts the arrival of a new kitten, he learns to appreciate the differences and begins to realize that there can be more than one best cat in the world. The watercolor and pencil illustrations create a just right quietness for this tender story.

Open Court: Finding Friends

Best Pet of All. David LaRochelle. Illus. by Hanako Wakiyama. Dutton. \$16.00. Grades K-3

A young boy enlists the help of a dragon to persuade his mother to let him have a dog as a pet. Kids will cheer the solution in which he finally gets the dog he has longed for. Retro-style illustrations add a bit of sly humor to this tale. **Open Court: Animals**

Big House. Carolyn Coman. Illus. by Rob Shepperson. Front Street. \$15.00. Grades 4-6

When Ivy and Ray's parents are sent to jail, and left in the custody of their parent's accusers, they decide to look for evidence that will "spring" their parents. Illustrated with a whimsical-style black-and-white art. **Open Court: Risks and Consequences**

Biggest Soap. Carole Lexa Schaefer. Illus. by Stacey Dressen-McQueen. Farrar. \$16.00. Grades K-3

When Kessy, who lives in the Truk Islands of Micronesia, is sent by his mother to buy laundry soap, he hurries back to listen to her storytelling, discovering that his own experience makes a good story too. The artwork features lush tropical colors and islanders wearing brightly patterned clothes. **Open Court: Sharing Stories**

Bittle. Patricia MacLachlan & Emily MacLachlan. Illus. by Dan Yaccarino. HarperCollins. \$17.00. Grades PreK-2

Nigel, the marmalade cat and Julia, the rotund beagle, think they will have no use for the new baby in their house, but after awhile they realize that they have come to love her. Readers see that she loves them too as the book concludes with her first words: "Woof" and "Meow." Illustrated with bold and bright gouache paintings. **Open Court: Kindness**

Blood Gold. Michael Cadnum. Viking. \$17.00. Grades 7-12

After an arduous journey, Will Dwinelle and his friend Ben finally reach California in 1849 intending to bring home the man who betrayed the honor of a girl back home in Philadelphia, but find themselves tempted by the riches of the Gold Rush.

Blow Out the Moon. Libby Koponen. Little, Brown. \$17.00. Grades 3-6

A fictionalized account of the author's childhood experiences moving from the United States to London, England, and attending a boarding school. The diary-like text is lively with anecdotes, creating a nostalgic memoir.

Blue Bowl Down: An Appalachian Rhyme. C.M. Millen. Illus. by Holly Meade.

Candlewick. \$17.00. Grades PreK-2

Rhyming text reveals the process of preparing bread dough in the evening while the stove is still warm so that it will rise overnight, ready to bake into loaves before the family awakens the next morning. The lullaby-like text sings with repeated phrases and words, making it an excellent read-aloud choice. Illustrated with watercolor and collage artwork.

Bones Rock!: Everything You Need to Know to Be a Paleontologist. Peter Larson & Kristin Donnan. Invisible Cities. \$12.00. Grades 5-9

A comprehensive guide to paleontology for young readers, which explains how to dig for fossils, clean them, keep records, and develop and test theories and describes projects from the authors' experience, including the excavation of the Tyrannosaurus rex known as Sue. Illustrated with high-quality color photographs, diagrams, and drawings.

Book of Dead Days. Marcus Sedgwick. Random House. \$16.00. Grades 6-9

A magician named Valerian has only the last five days of a late-medieval year between Christmas and New Year to save his own life after making a pact with the devil years before. He seeks the help of a servant boy and an orphan girl named Willow.

Bound. Donna Jo Napoli. Simon & Schuster. \$17.00. Grades 5-9

In a novel based on Chinese Cinderella tales, fourteen-year-old stepchild Xing-Xing endures a life of neglect and servitude, as her stepmother cruelly mutilates her own child's feet so that she alone might marry well. The story takes place in the Ming Dynasty and is enriched with well-rounded characters and with accurate information about a specific time and place in Chinese history.

Bremen Town Musicians and Other Animal Tales from Grimm. Doris Orgel. Illus. Brian Kitchen. Roaring Book. \$16.00. Grades K-3.

Presents illustrated retellings of six animal stories by the Grimm brothers, including the title work in which four aging animals, no longer of any use to their masters, find a new home after outwitting a gang of robbers.

Bucking the Sarge. Christopher Paul Curtis. Random House. \$18.00. Grades 8-12

Deeply involved in his cold and manipulative mother's shady business dealings in Flint, Michigan, fourteen-year-old Luther keeps a sense of humor while running the Happy Neighbor Group Home For Men, all the while dreaming of going to college and becoming a philosopher.

Cactus Soup. Eric Kimmel. Illus. by Phil Huling. Marshall Cavendish. \$17.00. Grades K-4

Text mostly in English with some Spanish. During the Mexican Revolution, when a troop of hungry soldiers comes to a town where all the food has been hidden, they charm the townspeople into helping make a soup from water and a cactus thorn. This Stone Soup story is set in the Mexico of the Zapatistas and highlighted with bright watercolor illustrations.

Camel's Lament. Charles Edward Carryl. Illus. by Charles Santore. Random House. \$17.00. Grades K-4

The camel compares his life with that of other animals of the world in this poetic offering from a contemporary of Lewis Carroll and Edward Lear. The rich and detailed illustrations bring the text of the poem to life. **Open Court: Animals, Poetry**

Cats in Krasinski Square. Karen Hesse. Illus. Wendy Watson. Scholastic. \$17.00. Grades 2-4

Two Jewish sisters, escapees of the infamous Warsaw ghetto, devise a plan to thwart an attempt by the Gestapo to intercept food bound for starving people behind the dark Wall. The story, told in free verse poetry, describes how the abandoned cats were used to distract the Gestapo's dogs. **Open Court: Kindness, Courage.**

Cave Paintings to Picasso: The Inside Scoop on 50 Art Masterpieces Henry Sayre. Chronicle. \$23.00. Grades 3+

Introduces fifty celebrated works of art, including King Tut's sarcophagus and Andy Warhol's paintings of Campbell's soup cans. Each spread features a sharply reproduced image of an individual artwork, a time line placing the work in history, and a story about the artist, the medium, or the piece's origins. **Open Court: Fine Art**

César: Sí, se puede! / Yes, We Can! Carmen Bernier-Grand. Illus. by David Diaz. Marshall Cavendish. \$15.00. Grades 3-6

Tells the life story of Cesar Chavez, whose efforts as a labor leader in the mid-twentieth century brought better working conditions to migrant farmworkers in the U.S. This is a powerful biography told through poems, many of which are in Spanish. Illustrated with stylized, computer-drawn, folk-art illustrations by David Diaz. **Open Court: Taking a Stand**

Chanda's Secrets. Allan Stratton. Firefly/Annick. \$20.00. Grade 8 up.

Chandra Kabelo, a sixteen-year-old in a small South African town, faces down shame and stigma in her efforts to help friends and family members who are dying of AIDS.

Chasing Vermeer. Blue Balliett. Illus. by Brett Helquist. Scholastic. \$17.00. Grades 4-8

When seemingly unrelated and strange events start to happen and a precious Vermeer painting disappears, eleven-year-olds Petra and Calder combine their talents to solve an international art scandal. This is a debut novel which mixes mystery, puzzles, possibilities, and art. **Open Court: Fine Art**

Children's Night Sky Atlas. Robin Scagell. DK. \$19.00. Grades 3-6

Contains a variety of maps used to identify stars, constellations, nebulas, and planets in the night sky, includes see-through maps and general information on star gazing. Spiral bound. **Open Court: Astronomy**

Christopher Mouse: The Tale of a Small Traveler. William Wise. Illus. by Patrick Benson. Bloomsbury. \$16.00. Grades 3-5

After being sold to an unscrupulous pet store owner, a young mouse lives with several owners and has many adventures that are full of daring, lessons, and hope. Finally, he ends up with an appreciative family. A good read aloud choice as well as a good choice for children moving past beginning readers. The ink illustrations and the enticing cover will help them along. **Open Court: Storytelling**

Circle Unbroken. Margot Theis Raven. Illus. by E.B. Lewis. Farrar. \$16.00. Grades K-5

A grandmother tells a young girl the tale of beautiful Gullah sweetgrass baskets, a craft that was brought from West Africa to South Carolina and Georgia. The rich watercolor illustrations depict the setting in the Sea Islands off the coast of Georgia, and show how these baskets keep their African heritage alive. Includes a bibliography and notes on how sweetgrass baskets are made. **Open Court: Heritage**

- Civil War Battles and Leaders.** Ed. By Aaron R. Murry. DK. \$13.00. Grades 5-8
Offers a battle-by-battle overview of the Civil War and profiles key military and civilian leaders from the era. This is a slim volume, illustrated with well placed color spot art, thumbnail-sized portraits, small maps showing troop movements, vintage photos, and helpful pull-quotes.
- Clare and Francis.** Guido Visconte. Illus. by Bimba Landmann. Eerdmans. \$20.00.
Grades 3-6
Reviews the lives and works of two members of Assisi society, Francis and Clare, who renounced their wealth and founded religious orders dedicated to relying on God and living in peace, poverty, and humility. The illustrations incorporate a Byzantine style, and are accented in gold gilt.
- Cluck O'Clock.** Kes Gray. Illus. by Mary McQuillan. Holiday House. \$17.00. Grades K-3
A group of chickens has a full day on the farm, from eating breakfast early in the morning to avoiding a fox late at night. Narrated in rhyme, the story features artwork that incorporates egg clocks and makes for a delightful lesson on telling time. **Open Court: Let's Read, Animals**
- Coming on Home Soon.** Jacqueline Woodson. Illus. by E. B. Lewis. Putnam. \$17.00.
Grades K-4
After Mama takes a job in Chicago during World War II, Ada Ruth stays with Grandma but misses her mother who loves her more than rain and snow. The story ends on a positive note as the long-awaited letter from Mama promising she'll be home. Illustrated with warm watercolor paintings that are a perfect backdrop for the story. (Caldecott Honor 2005) **Open Court: Courage, Country Life**
- Cooper's Lesson.** Sun Yung Shin. Illus. by Kim Cogan. Children's Book Press. \$17.00.
Grades K-4
Cooper, confused about his half-American, half-Korean heritage, gains insights from Mr. Lee, the owner of the neighborhood grocery store, whose insistence on speaking Korean to Cooper takes the young boy from anger to understanding. Illustrated with full-page oil paintings. Text in English and Korean. **Open Court: Our Country and Its People**
- Count on Us: American Women in the Military.** Amy Nathan. \$18.00. National Geographic.
Grades 9-12
A well-designed and comprehensive book tells of the contributions American women involved in the armed forces from the Revolutionary War to the present, including the 2003 invasion of Iraq. Illustrations and mini biographies of women in each time period provide a solid historical overview. Quotations, insets, and many period photographs bring the narrative to life.
- A Coyote's In The House.** Elmore Leonard. Harper Collins. \$14.00. Grades 4-8
Antwan, a coyote, befriends Buddy, an aging movie-star pooch, poses as a dog to move in with a human family, and finds himself giving his new pal advice when Buddy decides to eschew humans and take a walk on the wild side. This canine version of The Prince and the Pauper features quirky characters, a strong plot, and retro red and black illustrations that break up the text. **Open Court: Storytelling**
- A Crack in the Line.** Michael Lawrence. Greenwillow. \$16.00. Grades 8-12
Sixteen-year-old Alaric discovers how to travel to an alternate reality, where his mother is alive and his place in the family is held by a girl named Naia.
- Creature Carnival.** Marilyn Singer. Illus. by Gris Grimly. \$14.00. Hyperion. Grades 2-4
Presents a collection of poems about the fabled beasts that are part of the Creature Carnival, including the Sphinx, Cerberus, Nessie, the Frog Prince, and others. The

- rhymed couplets bounce along and are accompanied by ink-and-watercolor illustrations that create a ghoulish menagerie of characters. **Open Court: Let's Read**
- Crow-Girl: The Children of Crow Cove, The.** Bodil Bredsdorff. Farrar. \$17.00. Grades 4-6
After the death of her grandmother, a young orphaned girl leaves her house by the cove and begins a journey which leads her to people and experiences that exemplify the wisdom her grandmother had shared with her. Translated from the Danish, this novel has features clean, spare prose. **Open Court: Journeys and Quests**
- Cup of the World.** John Dickinson. Random House. \$16.00. Grades 9-12
Phaedra, the willful daughter of a baron, sets off an unforeseeable chain of events and a battle between good and evil when she announces her intention to marry for love. The story features a well described setting and well-developed characters.
- Curse of the Blue Tattoo: Being an Account of the Misadventures of Jacky Faber, Midshipman and Fine Lady.** L. A. Meyer. Harcourt. \$17.00. Grades 8-12
In 1803, after being exposed as a girl and forced to leave her ship, Jacky Faber finds herself attending school in Boston, where, instead of learning to be a lady, she battles her snobbish classmates, roams the city in search of adventure, and learns to ride a horse. A sequel to *Bloody Jack* (2002).
- Dante's Daughter.** Kimberley Heuston. Front Street. \$17.00. Grades 7-12
In fourteenth-century Italy, Antonia, the daughter of Dante Alighieri, longs for a stable family and home while developing her artistic talent and seeking a place for herself in a world with limited options for women.
- Don't Forget I Love You.** Miriam Moss. Illus. by Anna Currey. Dial. \$16.00. Grades PreK-2
After spending too much time playing with his favorite toy, Billy and his mother are very late for nursery school and his mother forgets some crucial things as she rushes to work. Warm pastels complement the happily-ever after ending. **Open Court: School**
- Don't Forget to Come Back!** Robie Harris. Illus. by Harry Bliss. Candlewick. \$16.00. Grades PreK-2
When her parents go out for the evening, a little girl uses a variety of strategies to dissuade them, even threatens to run off to Alaska. In the end, she has a good time with the hip, easy-going babysitter. The ink-and-watercolor artwork adds humor and details from a child's point of view. **Open Court: Stick to It**
- Doodler Doodling.** Rita G. Gelman. Illus. by Paul O. Zelinsky. Greenwillow. \$17.00. Grades 2-4
A young doodler begins drawing as her teachers teach and allows her imagination to run free to a surprising conclusion. This is a playful tribute to the creative process, and is illustrated with her doodles and scribbling. Includes fold-out pages. **Open Court: Imagination**
- Double Helix: A Novel.** Nancy Werlin. Dial. \$16.00. Grades 9-12
Eighteen-year-old Eli discovers a shocking secret about his life and his family while working for a Nobel Prize-winning scientist whose specialty is genetic engineering. The author builds suspense and creates clever manipulations that keep readers eagerly turning the pages.
- Dragon Rider.** Cornelia Funke. Scholastic. \$13.00. Grades 4-8
After learning that humans are headed toward his hidden home, Firedrake, a silver dragon, is joined by a brownie and an orphan boy in a quest to find the legendary valley known as the Rim of Heaven, encountering friendly and unfriendly creatures along the way, and struggling to evade the relentless pursuit of an old enemy. **Open Court: Journeys and Quests**

Dream of Freedom: The Civil Rights Movement from 1954 to 1968. Diane McWhorter. Scholastic. \$20.00. Grades 5-8

Examines the rise of the Civil Rights movement in America, the men and women whose lives made an impact in the pursuit of social and political equality, and landmark Supreme Court cases that changed the fabric of American society in the mid-to-late twentieth century. **Open Court: Taking a Stand**

Drop of Blood, A. Paul Showers. Illus. by Edward Miller. HarperCollins. \$17.00. Grades K-3
A simple introduction to the composition and functions of blood. The Dracula-inspired illustrations by Miller give a fresh look to an old favorite from the Let's Read-and-Find-Out series.

Duck for President. Doreen Cronin. Illus. by Betsy Lewin. Simon & Schuster. \$14.00. Grades K-3

When Duck of Click, Clack, Moo fame gets tired of working for Farmer Brown, his political ambition eventually leads to his being elected President. He quickly learns that it's not much fun running the government, and retires to write his memoirs, graduating from the typewriter to a computer. **Open Court: Red, White, and Blue**

Dust to Eat: Drought and Depression in the 1930s. Michael L. Cooper. Clarion. \$13.00
Grades 5-8

Presents a photographic chronicle of the 1930s, focusing on Depression and the dust storms that crippled the Great Plains, and looks at the effects of the twin disasters on American society and domestic policy. Illustrated with stunning black-and-white archival photos that are accompanied by eyewitness reports. Pair with the fiction selection *Out of the Dust* by Karen Hesse. **Open Court: Heritage**

Elena's Serenade. Campbell Geeslin. Illus. by Ana Juan. Simon & Schuster. \$15.00. Grades K-4

In Mexico, a little girl who wishes to be a glassblower is rebuked by her father, who says, "Who ever heard of a girl glassblower?" Undeterred, she disguises herself as a boy and lands a position as an apprentice. Along the way, she gains confidence. Illustrated with acrylic and crayon artwork. **Open Court: Stick to It**

Ella's Big Chance: A Jazz Age Cinderella. Shirley Hughes. Simon and Schuster. \$17.00. Grades K-4

- Kumak's Fish: A Tall Tale from the Far North.** Michael Bania. Alaska Northwest. \$14.00. Grades K-3
On a beautiful Arctic morning when Kumak and his family go ice fishing, Kumak hooks what seems like an enormous fish, and the entire village gets involved. This comical tale combines folklore with some realistic detail of the Arctic setting and community. Light watercolor washes outlined in ink show an icy setting while still conveying the joyful energy of the people as they work together to bring in the fish. **Open Court: Storytelling**
- La La Rose.** Satomi Ichikawa. Putnam. \$16.00. Grades K-3
La La Rose, a young girl's stuffed rabbit, gets lost in Luxembourg Gardens. While lost, she is thrown around by a soccer team, falls down some stairs, and lands in a pond before being picked up by a little girl who brings doll and owner back together. Illustrated with ink-and-watercolor paintings that are a wonderful mix of action sweetness.
- Legend of Buddy Bush.** Sheila Moses. Simon & Schuster. \$16.00. Grades 6-9
In 1947, twelve-year-old Pattie Mae is sustained by her dreams of escaping Rich Square, North Carolina, and moving to Harlem when her Uncle Buddy is under arrest for attempted rape of a white woman and her grandfather is diagnosed with a terminal brain tumor.
- Little Gentleman, The.** Philippa Pearce. Illus. by Tom Pohrt. Greewillow. \$17.00. Grades 3-5
A young girl's dull life is transformed when she meets and befriends an extraordinary talking mole that likes to be read to and tell of his past exploits throughout the centuries. There are many exciting and dangerous events in this humorous and moving novel.
- Little Rabbit Goes to School.** Harry Horse. Peachtree. \$14.00. Grades K-3
Little Rabbit takes his favorite toy, Charlie Horse, along for his first day of school and when there is trouble, he blames it all on Charlie. Ink-and-watercolor illustrations showcase a charming woodland world. **Open Court: School**
- Lizzie Bright and the Buckminster Boy.** Gary D. Schmidt. Clarion. \$15.00. Grades 7-12
In 1911, Turner Buckminster hates his new home of Phippsburg, Maine, but things improve when he meets Lizzie Bright Griffin, a girl from a poor, nearby island community founded by former slaves that the town fathers--and Turner's--want to change into a tourist spot.
- Look at My Book: How Kids Can Write & Illustrate Terrific Books.** Loreen Ludy. Holiday House. \$17.00. Grades 2- 4
Provides ideas and simple directions for writing, illustrating, designing, and binding books. The format includes as lists, captioned illustrations, and thought bubbles, making the book accessible even to emerging readers and writers. Includes a list of age-

appropriate books dealing with writing and illustration, and research skills for teachers, parents, and young authors. **Open Court: Sharing Stories**

Looking for Seabirds: Journal from an Alaskan Voyage. Sophie Webb. Houghton Mifflin. \$16.00. Grades 4-8

In her narrative and watercolor artwork, she gives equal time to the details of daily life aboard a research vessel and to her observations of a variety of marine life. **Open Court: Journeys and Quests**

Lost Colony of Roanoke. Jean Fritz. Illus. by Hudson Talbott. Putnam. \$17.00. Grades 3-5
Describes the English colony of Roanoke, which was founded in 1585, and discusses the mystery of its disappearance. In Fritz's lively narrative style, the conjectures, hoaxes, and evidence that have fueled speculation about the colony for 400 years is discussed. Includes artwork that reflects the work of John White and sixteenth-century portrait artists. **Open Court: Changing America**

Love and Roast Chicken: A Trickster Tale from the Andes Mountains. Barbara Knutson. Carolrhoda. \$17.00. Grades K-4

In this folktale from the Andes, a clever guinea pig repeatedly outsmarts the fox that wants to eat him for dinner. The author, who lived in Peru, includes an author's note, a glossary and pronunciation guides for the Spanish and Quechua words that appear in the story. Illustrated with bright watercolors by the author. **Open Court: Storytelling**

Lucky Leaf. Kevin O'Malley. Walker. 18.00. Grades K-3

After his mother tells him to stop playing video games and go outside, a young boy tries to catch the last leaf on a tree, thinking it will bring him luck. The story is illustrated with inked artwork that is colored digitally and laid out like a comic strip in panels.

Madam President: The Extraordinary, True (and Evolving) story of Women in Politics.

Catherine Thimmesh. Illus. by Douglas B. Jones. Houghton. \$17.00. Grades 4-8

This is an introduction to women, some better known than others, who have influenced politics and policies in the United States and in the world. The author presents short narratives highlighting each woman's achievements, including a well-chosen quotation from each one, and concludes with a list of source material and a time line. Illustrated with color cartoons that add interest and supplementary tidbits of information.

Me Baby, You Baby. Ashley Wolff. Dutton. \$15.00. Grades K-1

Simple rhyming text describes a day in the life of two babies as they greet the day, go to the zoo with their mothers, and return home at night. The text is a bouncy rhyme that makes this a good read aloud choice for young children. The warm, colorful illustrations are softly drawn and include zoo animals. **Open Court: Let's Read**

Merlin and the Making of the King. Margaret Hodges. Illus. by Trina Schart Hyman. Holiday. \$17.00. Grades 4-8

A retelling of four Arthurian legends, The Sword in the Stone, Excalibur, The Lady of the Lake, and The Last Great Battle, which feature Merlin, King Arthur, and other familiar figures. The author successfully distills the many tales of Arthurian legend into a brief but understandable story. The acrylic paintings are illuminated with heraldic colors and gold in the tradition of medieval bookmaking. **Open Court: Journeys and Quests**

Messenger. Lois Lowry. Houghton. \$16.00. Grades 6+

In this novel that unites characters from *The Giver* and *Gathering Blue*, Matty, a young member of a utopian community that values honesty, conceals an emerging healing power that he cannot explain or understand.

Mimmy and Sophie All around the Town. Tiriam Cohen. Illus. by Thomas F. Yezerki. Farrar. \$16.00. Grades 2-4

Describes the experiences of two sisters growing up in Brooklyn in the time of Shirley Temple movies and trolleys in six short chapters. The format provides an excellent first chapter book for newly independent readers. The stories are enhanced by many ink-and-wash illustrations. **Open Court: Friendship**

Miss Bridie Chose a Shovel. Leslie Connor. Illus. by Mary Azarian. Houghton. \$16.00 Grades K-3

Miss Bridie emigrates to America in 1856 and chooses to bring a shovel, which proves to be a useful tool throughout her life. This is a lyrical tribute to hard working immigrants, and is expressively illustrated with wood cuts that provide additional details to the time and place. **Open Court: Our Country and Its People**

Mississippi Morning. Ruth Vander Zee. Illus. Floyd Cooper. Eerdmans Books for Young Readers. \$16.00. Grades 3-6

Amidst the economic depression and the racial tension of the 1930s, a boy discovers a horrible secret of his father's involvement in the Ku Klux Klan. Warm oil paintings create the perfect sense of time, place, and atmosphere. **Open Court: Taking a Stand**

Missy Violet and Me. Barbara Hathaway. Houghton Mifflin. Grades 3-6

During the early 1900s, eleven-year-old Viney spends her summer working for the local midwife and learns firsthand about birth, death, and "catchin' babies." Based on the fond memories of the author's mother, these are warm and funny stories with some memorable characters. **Open Court: From Mystery to Medicine**

Mister Seahorse. Eric Carle. Putnam. \$17.00. Grades K-3

After Mrs. Seahorse lays her eggs on Mr. Seahorse's belly, he drifts through the water, greeting other fish fathers who are taking care of their eggs. The artwork illustrates how different kinds of fish can hide themselves, executed in Carle's signature elegant painted tissue-paper collages. **Open Court: Animals, Look Again**

Monkey Business. Wallace Edwards. Kids Can Press. Grades 2-5

Introduces idioms through a collection of animal portraits and illustrations. The artwork is full of details that young readers will enjoy discovering with each subsequent reading. Use when teaching idioms in **Open Court**, Grade 4, Unit 3.

Montmorency: Thief, Liar, Gentleman?. Eleanor Updale. Scholastic. \$17.00. Grades 6-9

In Victorian London, after his life is saved by a young physician, a thief utilizes the knowledge he gains in prison and from the scientific lectures he attends as the physician's case study exhibit to create a new, highly successful, double life for himself. Short chapters and a fast-paced plot make this a readable historical fiction that paints an accurate picture of the times. Look for the sequel coming in 2005, *Montmorency on the Rocks: Doctor, Aristocrat, Murderer?* **Open Court: From Mystery to Medicine**

Mouse in the House. Ann Hassett. Illus. by John Hassett. Houghton. \$15.00. Grades K-3

When Nana Quimby is upset by the mouse in the house, Father gets an owl, which also upsets Nana, so Mother gets a dog ... until the family ends up with an elephant in the house. The tale comes full circle when the Quimbys use a certain rodent to get rid of the elephant. Illustrated with colorful artwork in a folk-art style. **Open Court: Animals**

Mr. Maxwell's Mouse. Frank Asch. Illus. by Devin Asch. Kids Can Press. \$16.00. Grades K-4

Mr. Maxwell celebrates his promotion by treating himself to a live mouse at the Paw and Claw restaurant; however, the mouse is a clever one, and outsmarts Mr. Maxwell. This slightly dark story is well illustrated with computer-generated art that is stylishly elegant, and executed in dark hues of slate and black. **Open Court: Being Afraid**

Mrs. Watson Wants Your Teeth. Alison McGhee. Illus. by Harry Bliss. Harcourt. \$16.00. Grades K-2

A first grader is frightened on her first day of school after hearing a rumor that her teacher is a 300-year-old alien with a purple tongue who steals baby teeth from her students. The clever watercolor and black-ink illustrations provide details that will keep children looking. **Open Court: Being Afraid**

My Kindergarten. Rosemary Wells. Hyperion. \$17.00. Grades K-1

Emily, a little rabbit child, and her classmates learn many new things as they journey through the months of their kindergarten year of school. This is a reassuring picture book that is illustrated with detailed panels and spreads of well-dressed animal characters.

My Light. Molly Bang. Scholastic. \$17.00. Grades 2-4

The sun explains the different ways in which its light is transformed into energy which powers the bulbs that illuminate the night, and explains how we harness energy from water, wind, earth, and sun. The science is sound and the illustrations enhance the information.

Never Mind! A Twin Novel. Avi & Rachel Vail. HarperCollins. \$16.00. Grades 5-7

Twelve-year-old New York City twins Meg and Edward have nothing in common, so they are just as shocked as everyone else when Meg's hopes for popularity and Edward's mischievous schemes coincidentally collide in a hilarious showdown. The tale is written by two writers and told in alternating chapters that provide each twin with a separate narrative.

New Found Land: Lewis and Clark's Voyage of Discovery. Allan Wolf. Candlewick. \$19.00. Grades 6-8

Letters and thoughts of fourteen participants are presented in a poetic style to tell the story of the journey of Lewis and Clark to the Pacific and back. Four years of research is shown in an author's note, and includes maps and a list of the crew and the Native American nations encountered. **Open Court: Going West**

Night Eater, The. Ana Juan. A. A. Levine. \$17.00. Grades K-2

The Night Eater, who brings each new day by gobbling up the darkness, decides he is too fat and stops eating, with dire consequences. Illustrated with rounded shapes and bright colors in a surrealist art style. **Open Court: Shadows**

Noisy Way to Bed. Ian Whybrow. Illus. by Tiphonie Beeke. Scholastic. \$16.00. Grades K-1

As a sleepy boy decides it is bedtime and sets out across the farm toward home, he meets several animals who, in their noisy way, express the same idea. The rhyming verse encourages young children to join in to the telling of the tale. The story is accompanied by full-page, mixed-media pictures that provide a pleasing blend of colors, textures, and facial expressions. **Open Court: Let's Read, Animals**

Old Hickory: Andrew Jackson and the American People. Albert Marrin. Dutton. \$25.00.
Grades 7+

Presents a study of the seventh president of the United States, Andrew Jackson, and chronicles his childhood, participation in the Revolutionary War and War of 1812, and his political policies that led to problems with Native Americans and the "Trail of Tears."

One Little Seed. Elaine Greenstein. Viking. \$11.00. Grades K-1

Depicts a seed's growth from initial planting through its development and eventual blossoming as a bright sunflower. Folk-influenced, full-bleed watercolors accompany the text.

One of Those Hideous Books Where the Mother Dies. Sonya Sones. Simon & Schuster. \$16.00. Grades 7-12

Fifteen-year-old Ruby Milliken leaves her best friend, her boyfriend, her aunt, and her mother's grave in Boston and reluctantly flies to Los Angeles to live with her father, a famous movie star who divorced her mother before Ruby was born. Ruby is plunked into the middle of Hollywood celebrity, and learns to adjust. Told in one- to two-page breezy poetic prose-style entries.

When his computer breaks down, a little boy discovers that imagination is way more fun than a computer game. The tale unfolds in dialogue and is highlighted by Colón's warm watercolor and pencil artwork. **Open Court: Imagination**

Otto and the Flying Twins: The First Book of the Karmidee. Charlotte Haptie. Holiday House. \$18.00. Grades 4-7

Young Otto comes to the rescue when he discovers that his family and city are the last remnants of an ancient magical world now under threat from the Normal Police. This is a fast paced adventure that is a good choice for middle graders looking for an entertaining fantasy.

Our Nest. Reeve Lindbergh. Illus. by Jill McElmurry. Candlewick. \$16.00. Grades PreK-2
A rhymed view of the interrelatedness and belonging of all things and creatures in the universe, from the stars, to the sea, to a mouse, to a child. The folk-art style illustrations lend simplicity to the concept of the interrelatedness of nature. **Open Court: Animals**

Our Secret, Siri Aang. Christina Kessler. Philomel. \$18.00. Grades 4-8

Text mostly in English with some Masai. Namelok, a Masai girl, tries to persuade her traditionalist father to delay her initiation and marriage because they will restrict her freedom and keep her from the black rhino mother and baby she is protecting from poachers. **Open Court: Perseverance**

Out-of-This-World Astronomy: 50 Amazing Activities & Projects. Joe Rhatigan and Rain Newcome. Sterling. \$17.00. Grades 4-7

Introduces "the study of stuff in space," providing statistics, quizzes, activities, and experiments about the stars and planets. The text is lively, and the activities are suitably linked to the ideas covered. Illustrated with colorful, photo-filled layouts that support the text. Includes Web sites, a glossary and index. **Open Court: Astronomy**

Outside and Inside Killer Bees. Sandra Markle. Walker. \$18.00 Grades 3-6

Provides information about killer bees, explaining the similarities and differences between European and Africanized honeybees, discussing the spread of the Africanized, or killer bees, from Brazil to North America, and examining efforts to control killer bee populations. Illustrated with full color photographs.

Panda Rescue: Changing the Future for Endangered Wildlife. Dan Bortolotti. Firefly. \$17.00. Grades 3-8

Discusses threats to the survival of the giant panda and examines panda conservation efforts around the world. Includes a time line of conservation efforts, short profiles of conservationists, and forecasts of the animals' future. Illustrated with full color photographs. **Open Court: Ecology**

A detailed history of the Parthenon exploring its construction and restoration. This is a retelling of a folktale, in which a group of slaves, unable to bear their sadness and starvation any longer, calls upon the African magic that allows them to fly away. Illustrated with large paintings that are magic realism at its finest. This is an illustrated version of the title story in Hamilton's 1985 book, *People Could Fly: American Black Folktales*. **Open Court: Survival**

People of Sparks. Jeanne Duprau. Random. \$16.00. Grades 5-9

Lina and Doon are thrilled to see their people join them above ground in the vibrant village of Sparks, but suspicion and prejudice soon turn the villagers and newcomers against each other. Sequel to *The City of Ember* (2003).

Peter and the Starcatchers. Dave Barry and Ridley Pearson. Hyperion. \$18.00. Grades 4-8

Discusses the assassination of President Abraham Lincoln in 1865; discussing how John Wilkes Booth executed and was punished for the killing and how the event transformed Lincoln from man to myth. The illustrations, a combination of photos and archival illustrations, help to make this a highly readable text that will engage readers.

Pride of African Tales, A. Donna Washington. Illus. by James Ransome. HarperCollins. \$17.00. Grades 2-5

A collection of African folktales originating in the storytelling tradition that include trickster stories, porquoi and cautionary tales. A map of Africa pinpoints the countries of

origin. The paintings that illustrate the tales draw elements from African textiles. **Open Court: Storytelling**

Prince Across the Water. Jane Yolen. Putnam/Philomel. \$19.00. Grades 5-8

In 1746, a year after the Scottish clans have rallied to the call of their exiled prince, Charles Stuart, to take up arms against England's tyranny, fourteen-year-old, epileptic Duncan MacDonald and his cousin, Ewan, run away to join the fight at Culloden and discover the harsh reality of war.

Presents the story of the transcontinental railroad and those who built it including both Irish and Chinese immigrants and former slaves. The numerous illustrations include vintage black-and-white photos, sepia photos, maps, and several attractive softly tinted, pen-and-ink drawings. **Open Court: A Changing America**

Presents an autobiographical account in both narrative and the drawings of artist Ange Zhang who witnessed the Cultural Revolution in China in the 1960s and, like his father, found himself at odds with the ideology of Mao. **Open Court: Taking a Stand**

Reluctant Dragon, The. Kenneth Grahame. Illus. by Inga Moore. Candlewick. \$18.00. Grades 3-6

In this beautifully illustrated, abridged version of the original, the boy who finds the dragon in the cave knows it is a kindly, harmless one, but how can he convince the frightened villagers and, especially, St. George the dragon killer that there is no cause for concern? The colored pencil and ink drawings provide detailed images of town and countryside, as well as close-ups of the friendly dragon. **Open Court: Imagination**

Remember D-Day: The Plan, the Invasion, Survivor Stories. Ronald J. Drez. National Geographic. \$16.00. Grades 4-8

Discusses the events and personalities involved in the momentous Allied invasion of France on June 6, 1944. The large format is easily accessible and contains many fine illustrations that include black-and-white photos of individuals and battle scenes and color shots of leaders, sites, and artifacts.

Remember: The Journey to School Integration. Toni Morrison. Houghton Mifflin. \$18.00. Grades 3-8

Presents a selection of archival photographs that document events surrounding the integration of U.S. schools following the 1954 Supreme Court decision in *Brown v. Board of Education*, and includes captions in which Toni Morrison imagines what the people in the pictures must have been thinking and feeling.

Right Dog for the Job: Ira's Path from Service Dog to Guide Dog. Dorothy Hinshaw Patent. Photos by William Muñoz. Walker. \$20.00. Grades 3-5

Tells how a golden retriever is trained as a service dog, to help someone who has trouble moving their arms or legs, and later as a guide dog for a man who cannot see. Includes many large, full color photographs that follow the dog's growth and relationships.

Roman Army: The Legendary Soldiers Who Created an Empire. Dyan Blacklock. Illus. by David Kennett. Walker. \$18.00. Grades 4-8

Presents an illustrated history of the Roman Army, including information about its composition, organization, training, methods, weapons, and campaigns. Includes discussion of the treatment of the defeated people, captives, and individual soldiers. Rooster Gallo. Jorge Elias Luján. Translated by Elisa Amado. Illus. by Manuel Monroy. Groundwood. \$15.00. Grades PreK-2

Rotten Ralph Feels Rotten. Jack Gantos. Illus. by Nicole Rubel. Farrar. \$15.00. Grades 1-3
Rotten Ralph comes to appreciate Sarah's healthy cat food after he gets sick from eating out of trash cans. This cautionary tale about eating junk food is accompanied by bright artwork that lights up this beginning reader.

Ruby Lu, Brave and True. Lenore Look. Illus. by Anne Wilsdorf. Simon & Schuster. \$16.00. Grades 1-3

Almost-eight-year-old Ruby Lu spends time with her baby brother, goes to Chinese school, performs magic tricks and learns to drive, and has adventures with both old and new friends. This beginning chapter book includes some Chinese words and poetic phrases. Illustrated with pencil artwork that bounces throughout the story. **Open Court: Storytelling**

Saving Francesca. Merlina Marchetta. Knopf. \$16.00. Grades 9-12

Sixteen-year-old Francesca could use her outspoken mother's help with the problems of being one of a handful of girls at a parochial school that has just turned co-ed, but her mother has suddenly become severely depressed.

Saying Goodbye to Lulu. Corinne Demas. Illus. by Ard Hoyt. Little, Brown. \$16.00. Grades PreK-2

After taking care of her dog Lulu whose general health is declining, the dog dies, and the girl grieves but then continues with her life. This is a touching story that will resound with any child who has lost a beloved pet. Illustrated with ink-and-colored-pencil drawings washed with watercolors.

School at the Crooked Creek. Laurie Lawlor. Illus. Ronald Himler. Holiday House. \$16.00. Grades 2-5

Living on the 19th-century Indiana frontier with his parents and irritable older sister Louise, six-year-old Beansie dreads his first day of school, but his resilience surprises even his sister. This short chapter book depicts the struggle on the frontier from a young boy's point of view, and is illustrated with black and white drawings.

After Jack becomes apprenticed to a Druid bard, he and his little sister Lucy are captured by Viking Berserkers and taken to the home of King Ivar the Boneless and his half-troll queen, leading Jack to undertake a vital quest to Jotunheim, home of the trolls.

Search for the Golden Moon Bear: Science and Adventure in the Asian Tropics. Sy Montgomery. Houghton Mifflin. \$17.00. Grades 5-8

The author shares the story of her dangerous journeys throughout Southeast Asia, along with evolutionary biologist Gary Galbreath, in search of the golden moon bear and evidence that will prove whether or not it is a previously unknown species or subspecies. Illustrated with full color photographs by the author and biologist. **Open Court: Ecology**

Secrets of the Sphinx. James Cross Giblin. Illus. by Bagram Ibatoulline. Scholastic. \$18.00. Grades 4-7

Discusses some of Egypt's most famous artifacts and monuments, including the pyramids, the Rosetta Stone, and, especially, the Great Sphinx, presenting research and speculation about their origins and their future. Sixteen-year-old Bridget, member of an Irish Traveler community in the U.S., questions the traditions of her family's nomadic, criminal way of life and begins to consider breaking free. The first-person narration is sprinkled with raunchy humor and some expletives but is strong and convincing.

September Roses. Jeanette Winter. Farrar. \$14.00. Grades K-3

Two sisters find a good use for the roses they are transporting from South Africa to a flower show in New York City. The women arrive in New York on the morning of September 11, along with the 2,400 flowers they had planned to exhibit. Stranded at the airport, they are offered shelter by a stranger. As a way of thanking him, the sisters take their roses to Union Square Park and arrange the blossoms into the shape of the fallen buildings. Based on a factual anecdote. Beautifully illustrated.

Sequoyah: The Cherokee Man Who Gave His People Writing. James Rumford. Translated by Anna Sixkiller Huckaby. Houghton. \$16.00. Grades 1-4

This is a biography of Sequoyah, a member of the Cherokee nation who was born in the 1760s in eastern Tennessee and who developed the first written alphabet and language for the Cherokee people. Shadows of Ghadames. Joelle Stolz. Delacourte. \$16.00. Grades 5-8.

At the end of the nineteenth century in Libya, eleven-year-old Malika simultaneously enjoys and feels constricted by the narrow world of women, but an injured stranger enters her home and disrupts the traditional order of things. Conveys the traditional Muslim world.

She'll Be Comin' 'Round the Mountain. Philemon Sturges. Illus. by Ashley Wolff. Little, Brown. \$14.00. Grade K-3

New words to the traditional tune describe a camper-driving, "hootin'" and "shoutin'" guest and the party that will begin when she arrives. This southwestern variation of the traditional folk song is accompanied by bright illustrations. **Open Court: Let's Read**

Shhhhh! Everybody's Sleeping. Julie Markes. Illus. David Parkins. Harper Collins. \$16.00. Grades PreK-2

A young girl watches as the activities across the street from her bus stop mirror the upcoming acts in the circus that's coming to town. This is an almost wordless picture book with spectacular illustrations. Silk Umbrellas. Carolyn Marsden. Candlewick. \$15.00. Grades 3-6

Eleven-year-old Noi worries that she will have to stop painting the silk umbrellas her family sells at the market near their Thai village and be forced to join her older sister in difficult work at a local factory instead. A few Thai words appear in the text and are generally understandable from context; they are also translated in the appended glossary.

Living in Flemington, New Jersey, in 1935, twelve-year-old Katie Leigh Flynn describes, in a series of poems, the effect on her small town of the ongoing trial of Bruno Hauptmann for the kidnapping and murder of Charles Lindbergh's baby son. The tale presents the Depression-era milieu during which the trial unfolded and, at the same time, conveys the seriousness of an episode that may have been a miscarriage of justice.

Chronicles, in "instant message" format, the day-to-day experiences, feelings, and plans of three friends, Zoe, Maddie, and Angela, as they begin tenth grade. Even though the plot is familiar, it is the girls' distinctly compelling IM voices that will hook readers.

Two Eggs, Please. Sarah Weeks. Illus. by Betsy Lewin. Simon & Schuster. \$16.00. Grades K-1

A look at the many different ways to prepare the very same food, as everyone in a diner orders eggs. A good illustration of the concept of similarities and differences, for example when the cook breaks open a brown egg and a white egg that are different, but inside they are the same. Illustrated with amusing watercolor cartoons.

Under the Watson's Porch. Susan Shreve. Knopf. \$16.00. Grades 5-8

Twelve-year-old Ellie's boring summer becomes exciting when she develops a crush on her new next-door neighbor, Tommy, an older boy who is a foster kid with a troubled past, who she is sure her parents won't like. Tommy suggests that they run a camp for younger kids under the old Watson sisters' porch. There, he intends to have kids plant seeds that will magically sprout into lollipops. A touching look at a first infatuation.

Under the Wolf, Under the Dog. Adam Rapp. Candlewick. Grades 9-12

Sixteen-year-old Steve struggles to make sense of his mother's terminal breast cancer and his brother's suicide. This is not a book for timid readers or those easily offended or shocked by rough language or graphic descriptions. As Steve fights his way out from under the "dog" of depression, readers will cheer him on.

Devoted to making lists about everything in his life, Wallace the mouse discovers the joys of spontaneity and adventure when he becomes friends with his neighbor Albert. The comical art is expressive, rendered in soft colors and incorporates Wallace's lists. The story presents a positive message about trying new experiences and embracing new friendships. **Open Court: Friendship**

William Shakespeare's Hamlet. Retold by Bruce Coville. Illus. by Leonid Gore. Dial. \$17.00. Grades 4-8

First published in England, it features fast, frank talk about friends, family, and snogging ("I didn't know you could do that standing up").

With Courage and Cloth: Winning the Fight for a Woman's Right to Vote. Ann Bausum. National Geographic. \$22.00. Grades 6+

Chronicles the long history of the fight for women's voting rights, beginning in 1848, with a focus on the years between 1913 and 1920 when the Nineteenth Amendment was passed, and includes profiles of notable women in the struggle. Illustrated with sepia-tone photographs that are highlighted in the signature colors of the movement, purple, gold, and white. **Open Court: Taking a Stand**

Woman for President: The Story of Victoria Woodhull. Kathleen Krull. Illus. by Jane Dyer. Walker. \$17.00. Grades 3-8

Describes the life of Victoria Woodhull, the first woman to run for president, have a seat on the stock exchange, own a newspaper, and speak before Congress. Writing style is lively and engaging and Dyer's large, photo-realist watercolors capture the sense of the age and involve both eye and imagination. In this novel written as a collection of eyewitness poems, the excitement and anticipation of attending the circus on July 6, 1944 in Hartford, Connecticut, turns to horror when a fire engulfs the circus tent, killing nearly 180 people, mostly women and children. Based on a real circus fire in Hartford, Connecticut, in 1944 that killed 167 in a few minutes and injured more than 500.

Worth. A. LaFaye. Simon & Schuster. \$16.00. Grades 5-8

After breaking his leg, eleven-year-old Nate feels useless because he cannot work on the family farm in nineteenth-century Nebraska, so when his father brings home an orphan boy to help with the chores, Nate feels even worse. The angry first-person narrative is brutally honest. The two boys both lonely and heartsick, and finally discover that they need each other. It is a lively story of these two boys that is set against a backdrop of the Orphan Trains, range wars, lynchings, drownings, and sheep killings.

Wow! City! Robert Neubecker. Hyperion. \$17.00. Grades PreK-2

Izzy, raised in the mountains, has only one word to describe the people, buildings, cars, and other exciting things she sees in the big, bustling city. Bright, bold illustrations feature a seek-and-find subplot that extends to the stunning endpapers.

Three female students from Ashbury High write to three male students from rival Brookfield High as part of a pen pal program, leading to romance, humiliation, revenge plots, and war between the schools. There are a few coarse moments, a reference to a blow job and some caustic outbursts, but the characters are real and the screwball humor will attract teens.

You Can't Rush a Cat. Karleen Bradford. Orca. \$15.00. Grades K-3

Jessica helps her sometimes lonely grandfather to befriend a homeless cat. As a comment that cats can't be hurried, Jessica and her grandfather watch, and gradually are able to win the little cat over. Illustrated with soft watercolor illustrations. **Open Court: Animals**

Young Man and the Sea, The. Rodman Philbrick. Scholastic. \$17.00. Grades 5-8

After his mother's death, twelve-year-old Skiff Beaman decides that it is up to him to earn money to take care of himself and his father, so he undertakes a dangerous trip alone out on the ocean off the coast of Maine to try to catch a huge blue fin tuna. This is a fast-paced novel that offers an atmospheric Maine setting, and a hero for whom to root.
