Presents striking photographs of sculptures that focus attention on three-dimensional artwork of different styles and materials. Each sculpture is captioned with the artist's name and the work's title. Accompanied by child friendly comments that add interest.

S Adventures of Odysseus, Lupton, Hugh, \$18.00, Barefoot (2006), Grades 3-6

An illustrated adaptation of Homer's classic tale of Odysseus and his adventures after the long Trojan War. The text is framed with bright mosaic-style illustrations of the heroes and monsters, in watercolor, gouache, and gold ink. **Open Court: Ancient Civilizations**

S At Gleason's Gym, Lewin, Ted, \$18.00, Roaring Book, Grades 2-5

Looks at the action at Gleason's Gym in Brooklyn through the eyes of Sugar Boy, a nine-year-old boxing champion, who is following in the footsteps of former Gleason's trainees like Muhammad Ali and Jake La Motta. Illustrated with rich watercolor artwork. Presents a view of boxing as a sport for young children-both boys and girls-as well as adults.

Babies in the Bayou, Arnosky, Jim, \$17.00, Putnam, Grades K-3

There are many babies in the bayou, and even though they might have sharp white teeth, hard shells, webbed feet, or quick claws, their mothers still need to protect them. Told through poetic text and illustrated with soft acrylics, the various baby animals are presented. **Open Court: Animals**

© Ballerina Dreams: a True Story, Thompson, Lauren, \$17.00, Feiwel & Friends, Grades PreK-2

Focuses on five little girls who long desperately to be ballerinas on stage. Each has a disability, such as cerebral or Erbs palsy, that affects leg and arm muscles. This true story tells how they had their dreams come true by becoming ballerinas. The photographs show the difficulties encountered by these girls as well as the range of ability of motion.

Barnum Brown: Dinosaur Hunter, Sheldon, David, \$17.00, Grades K-3

An illustrated biography of early twentieth-century paleontologist, Barnum Brown, the man who is credited with first discovering the bones of the Tyrannosaurus Rex. The highly readable text is accompanied by textured ink, gouache, and acrylic paintings, that show shadowy dinosaurs looking over Brown's shoulder as he works. **Open Court: Fossils**

© Battle of Iwo Jima: Guerrilla Warfare in the Pacific, The, Hama, Larry, \$22.00, Rosen, Grades 5-8

Tells the story of the Battle of Iwo Jima in graphic novel format, also providing introductory information on the important commanders, the island, and the war with Japan up to that point. Illustrated by Williams in camouflage colors, Williams does a terrific job of examining the ups and downs of the battle as well as the horror of so many losses, on both sides.

Being Caribou: Five Months on Foot with a Caribou Herd, Heuer, Karsten, \$18.00, Walker, Gr 4-7

Wildlife biologist Karsten Heuer and his wife, Leanne, follow the five-month migration of 123,000 caribou over mountain ranges and icy rivers to their calving grounds in Alaska's Arctic National Wildlife Refuge, becoming the first humans to ever join a herd on the trek. Illustrated with breathtaking photographs taken on the journey. **Open Court: Ecology**

[⊗] Black? White! Day? Night!: A Book of Opposites, Seeger, Laura V., \$17.00, Roaring Brook (2006), Grades PreK-3

Fold-out pages. A series of colorful die-cut pages that introduces a number of things that are opposites including black and white, big and little, and day and night. Each flap is a different bold color, ensuring that the child won't miss the word or the figure representing the concept, and the

scenes under the flaps are in keeping with the simple yet sophisticated graphic design of the book.

Blue Lipstick: Concrete Poems, Grandits, John, \$15.00, Clarion, Grades 5-8

Concrete poems about a girl named Jessie who mocks the school which she attends. Across the thirty or so poems, Jessie reveals she's a vegetarian, plays volleyball and cello, and can't stand cheerleaders. The author uses many different fonts, positioning text in clever ways.

© Capoeira: Game! Dance! Martial Art!, Ancona, George, \$18.00, Lee & Low, Grades 5-8

Describes the history and practice of Capoeira, a centuries-old Brazilian martial art form that incorporates traditional movements and rhythmic music. Vivid, color photographs show a class of young, multicultural students practicing basic moves of offense and defense.

© Captain Raptor and the Space Pirates, O'Malley, Kevin, \$17.00, Walker, Grades K-4

Captain Raptor and the crew of the "Megatooth" are called back into action to save the planet Jurassica from rogue space pirates. A graphic novel that comes alive with watercolor and gouache illustrations. A mixture of dinosaurs, pirates, and science fiction that will appeal to reluctant readers or otherwise.

© Chicky Chook Chook, MacLennan, Cathy, \$11.00, Boxer/Sterling, PreK-1

Chicks, kittens, and bees play in the summer sunshine until a thunderstorm interrupts their idyllic day. Onomatopoeic rhyming text that children will love to hear again and again makes this a good read aloud choice. The artwork is bright, with feathery dabs and blobs of paint inspired by the art and culture of the author's native Zimbabwe.

© Curious Adventures of the Abandoned Toys, The, Fellowes, Julian, \$18.00, Holt, Grades 4-6

When Doc the bear arrives at the dump from his former home, he isn't sure about what awaits him but his new friends are determined to make his new home a welcoming one. Includes artwork, ranging from black-and-white spot art to full-page color pictures.

⁽²⁾ Dog and Bear: Two Friends, Three Stories, Seeger, Laura V., \$13.00, Roaring Brook,

Contains three easy-to-read stories that reveal the close friendship between Dog, a playful, rowdy dachshund, and Bear, a multicolored stuffed toy. Full-page illustrations, which often alternate with small panels to advance the stories. **Open Court: Friendship**

© Dog for Life, A , Matthews, L.S., \$17.00, Delacorte (2006), Grades 4-8

John is close to his older brother, Tom and they share a special bond with their dog, Mouse in that they can silently communicate with him. When Tom contracts a serious illness, they are told that it's not safe to have the dog in the house. John discovers that Mouse is scheduled to go to the pound and he decides to run away and find his uncle, who may be able to help.

© Dogs for Kids!: Everything You Need to Know About Dogs, Mehus-Roe, Kristin, PB \$14.00, Gr 3-6

Contains dog care advice for children; describing the physical characteristics, behaviors, advantages, and disadvantages of over 150 breeds; discussing training, health care, grooming, feeding, and playing; providing dog-related activities; and more. Includes CD.

© Dolley Madison Saves George Washington, Browne, Don, \$16.00, Houghton, Grades 1-3

Describes the significant contribution Dolley Madison made to the United States when she saved a picture of George Washington. During the War of 1812, 100 soldiers were assigned to guard the presidential mansion. When they fled, Dolley lingered long enough to make sure that a life-sized Gilbert Stuart portrait of Washington was removed before the occupying British could destroy it, and then disguised herself as a farm woman to get away. Illustrated with line-and-watercolor artwork.

S Dragon Dancing, Shaeffer, Carole L., \$14.00, Viking, PreK-1

Young children use their imaginations and their art supplies to pretend to be different kinds of dragons. They go *dragon dancing* through a playground transformed into Asian-influenced landscape with their movements expressed in read-aloud-friendly phrases such as "mishmooshing" and "la-dee-daw-dawdling."

S Feathers, Woodson, Jacqueline, \$14.00, Putnam, Grades 5-8

When a new, white student nicknamed "The Jesus Boy" joins her sixth grade class in the winter of 1971, Frannie's growing friendship with him makes her start to see some things in a new light. Introduces big issues: faith, class, color, prejudice, family, disability, and friendship.

© Frog Heaven: Ecology of a Vernal Pool, Wechsler, Doug, \$17.00, Boyds Mills, Grades 3-6

Full-color illustrated photographs describe the frogs, salamanders, and other animals that live in a vernal pool: a forest pool that dries up at the end of each summer and gradually fills with water again during the fall, winter, and spring. Illustrated with clear, color photos that provide excellent visual support to the text. **Open Court: Ecology**

⊗ Giant of Seville, a "Tall" Tale Based on a True Story, The, Andreasen, Dan, \$14.00, Abrams, Gr K-4 A simple, illustrated story based upon the true story of Martin Van Buren Bates who grew to be nearly eight feet tall. Seville's residents welcome him, but accommodating a guest of his stature is difficult. The townspeople work together to build a home large enough for the giant and his equally statuesque wife. An endnote introduces the historical people and events that inspired the story.

© Gimme Cracked Corn & I Will Share, O'Malley, Kevin, \$18.00, Grades 2-4

Chicken dreams about a treasure and sets off on a dangerous journey to find it. "Cornball comedy guaranteed to pun-ish your funny bone... Scramble together bits of the comic cartoon picture books by M.J. Auch with pieces of the egg-zagerated humor of the movie *Chicken Run* and season with the wacky wit of Doreen Cronin and you have a frittata of fun." *-Kirkus*

A brief biography of escape artist Harry Houdini written in graphic comic format that reveals the secret of some of his stunts, including his jump from Harvard Bridge in Cambridge, Mass. on May 1, 1908.

Rhyming text and illustrations describe the ways fish are caught in various locations around the world. ☺ I am Invited to a Party, Willems, Mo, \$9.00, Hyperion, Grades K-2

Gerald the elephant, who "knows parties," gives his best friend, Piggie, advice for getting ready after Piggie receives her very first party invitation. An appealing title that will tickle the funny bone of children and are sure to become a favorite.

© Jabberwocky: the Classic Poem from Lewis Carroll's Through the Looking-Glass, and What Alice Found There, Carroll, Lewis, re-imagined and illustrated by Christopher Myers.\$16.00, Hyperion, Grades 5-8

Illustrated with bright color, this imaginative interpretation of Carroll's classic nonsense poem takes it out of the pages of *Through the Looking Glass*, into a contemporary urban setting, and onto the basketball court. Outstanding and creative illustrations will introduce this nonsensical poem to a whole new generation of readers.

Sane Addams: Champion of Democracy, Fradin, Judith Bloom, \$18.00, Clarion (2006), Grades 5-8 Presents a biography of Jane Addams, suffragist, civil rights activist, and founder of Hull House in the slums of Chicago that draws from hundreds of historical documents; and contains archival photographs of her life and activities.

A biography of Jesse Owens, the African American track and field athlete who won our gold medals at the 1936 Berlin Olympic Games. Told in stirring free verse and illustrated with bright, textured pastel artwork.

☺ Journeys for Freedom: A New Look at America's Story, Buckley, Susan, \$17.00, Houghton (2006), Grades 4-6

Presents a collection of maps and illustrations that describe the stories of a diverse group of people who sought freedom and shaped the events of America's past. The intriguing true stories are illustrated with double-page spreads. Stories range from Pocahontas, to a six-year-old ironworker, to a contemporary Sudanese refugee. Teachers can use the title to illustrate historical events and individuals and they are valuable for research. Left in the classroom, students will also pick them up for browsing.

Trixie's first day of pre-kindergarten gets off to a bad start when she and Sonja discover they have the very same "one-of-a-kind" Knuffle Bunnies.

(a) Leap of Faith, Bradley, Kimberly Brubaker, \$16.00, Dial, Grades 6+

Abigail is expelled from public school and forced to attend Catholic school after being sexually harassed by the principal's son, is not believed, and then attacks him with a knife. In the new situation she discovers friendship, a talent for theater and develops a true religious faith.

S Little Night, Morales, Yuyi, \$17.00, Roaring Book, PreK-K

At the end of a long day, Mother Sky helps her playful daughter, Little Night, to get ready for bed. The artwork is rendered in full-bleed spreads saturated with twilight colors.

S Little Rabbit's Christmas, Horse, Harry, \$16.00, Peachtree, Grades PreK-2

Little Rabbit learns about the joy of sharing after he receives a much-coveted red sled for Christmas and tries to keep it all to himself. Illustrated with watercolor washes and ink drawings that create expressive characters. Young children will find that, just like themselves, the Little Rabbit is not quite civilized and sometimes a bit bratty but basically decent and wanting to be good.

© Living Color, Jenkins, Steve, \$17.00, Houghton Mifflin, Grades 2-4

Looks at a wide range of colorful animals, describing how their feathers, scales, shells, and skin help them survive, warn predators, signal friends, attract a mate, or hide from their enemies. **Open Court: Look Again**

© M.L.K.: Journey of a King,, Bolden, Tonya, \$18.00, Abrams, Grades 5-8

Profiles the life of civil rights leader Martin Luther King, and includes over eighty illustrated photographs that describe his marches, speeches, and non-violence philosophy. The handsome layout will encourage browsers and the engaging text will be an outstanding addition to the school library collection.

⁽²⁾ Magic Horse of Han Gan, The, Chen, Jiang Hong, \$15.00, FSG (2006), Grades 1-5

A painter named Han Gan draws a horse that jumps off the page. The creature goes from the canvas to the battlefield until, overcome by sadness, he jumps into a different painting. The elegant illustrations on silk were inspired by the real Han Gan, a classical Chinese artist who lived over twelve hundred years ago and specialized in painting equine scenes. *Horn Book*

S Magic Rabbit, The, Cate, Annette, \$14.00, Candlewick, Grades PreK-2

Ray the street performing magician, and Bunny, his assistant and best friend, become separated while performing, which leaves Bunny all alone in the big city. Bunny spends several hours hopping around the city before he finds a trail of gold stars and is reunited with Ray. Illustrated with cross-hatched ink-and-watercolor illustrations, all is black and white save for the telltale yellow stars.

⁽²⁾ Max Counts His Chickens, Wells, Rosemary, \$16.00, Viking, Grades PreK-2

Grandma must quickly think of a way to make things fair for Max after Ruby finds all ten of the hidden marshmallow chicks on Easter morning. The fun of counting, along with the humor in the little rabbit's search strategies, will entertain listeners.

⁽²⁾ Make Your Mark, Franklin Roosevelt, St. George, Judith, ,\$15.00, Philomel, Grades 2-5

Profiles the childhood and adolescent years of President Franklin Roosevelt describing the many influences on his life and political career. Illustrated with ink-and-watercolor artwork that resembles political cartooning, using oversized heads and exaggerated perspectives that add humor to the story.

S Midsummer Knight, A, Rogers, Gregory, \$17.00, Roaring Book, Grades K-4

A bear is rescued by a fairy in an enchanted wood and agrees to return the favor by leading the battle against a usurper who has imprisoned the king and queen, along with their loyal subjects, in the dungeon of their castle.

© Miss Crandall's School for Young Ladies and Little Misses of Color: Poems, Alexander, Elizabeth, \$18.00, Wordsong, 2007, Grades 7+

Poems tell the story of nineteenth-century teacher Prudence Crandall and the students she taught at her Canterbury, Connecticut, school for African-American girls before persecution forced its closing.

S Motherbridge of Love, text provided by Mother Bridge of Love, \$16.00, Barefoot Books, Grades K-3

Lyrical text accompanied by vivid illustrations explains to an adopted daughter how the love of her anonymous birth mother and the woman raising her combine to shape who she is. This book shares its name with a London-based organization dedicated to promoting greater understanding of Chinese life and culture among adoptive families in the West.

(a) Moving Day, Fletcher, Ralph, \$18.00, Boyds Mills (2006), Grades 3-6

Twelve-year-old Fletch has a hard time adjusting after his father announces that their family will be moving from Massachusetts to Ohio. Told through 34 free verse poems, this story is illustrated with watercolor illustrations that resonate like flashes of family history.

⊗ My Friend is Sad & Today I Will Fly!, Willems Mo, \$9.00, Hyperion, Grades K-3

Two early reader selections with typically silly and successful results. In the first, when Gerald the Elephant is sad, Piggie is determined to cheer him up, but finds after many tries that it only takes the simplest thing to change Gerald's mood. In the second, Piggie is determined to fly, but Elephant is skeptical, and when Piggie gets a little help from others, amazing things happen. Uncluttered pages feature the two main characters against clean white space. The text is entirely comprised of dialogue, shown in softly colored word balloons. Beginning readers will delight in

these funny stories.

© On the Wings of Heroes Peck, Richard, ,\$15.00, Dial, Grades 4-8

Gentle humor and nostalgic glimpses of life in America during World War II bring another time and place to life. A variety of characters pass through the story as coffee and sugar are rationed, scrap metal is collected to support the war effort, and a world of people "Use it up, wear it out, make it do or do without." It's easy to picture this novel as a wonderful film.

© One City, Two Brothers, Smith, Chris, \$16.00, Barefoot Books, Grades 2-4

To settle an inheritance dispute between two brothers, King Solomon tells a tale of how Jerusalem came to be founded. "Based on a folktale told by both Jews and Arabs, this picture book beautifully captures the spirit of brotherhood and gives both readers and listeners hope for what could be if people thought more about one another than about themselves. The accomplished folk-style artwork, in shades of verdant green, heavenly blue, and harvest orange and yellow, does more than illustrate the story; it adds an air of peace and hope to which children will respond." *School Library Journal*

© Owen & Mzee: The Language of Friendship, Hatkoff, Isabella, \$17.00, Scholastic, Grades 3-6

Sequel to *Owen and Mzee*. Text and color photos tell the true story of the friendship that developed at a Kenyan wildlife sanctuary between Owen, a baby hippopotamus orphaned by the 2004 Southeast Asian tsunami, and Mzee, a 130-year-old giant tortoise. Illustrated with full color photographs. **Open Court: Friendship**

(a) Ox, House, Stick: The History of Our Alphabet, Robb, Don, \$16.00, Charlesbridge, Grades 3-5

Traces the history of the Roman alphabet from Proto-Sinaitic signs to Phoenician script to Greek and Roman letters, and presents information on related topics such as writing materials, punctuation, and printing technology.

© Patience Wright: America's First Sculptor and Revolutionary Spy Shea, Pegi Deitz, , \$18.00, Holt, Grades 4-6

An illustrated biography of Patience Wright, a woman born into a Quaker family in 1725 who grew up to be a celebrated wax sculptor, and whose talent led her to England in the pre-Revolutionary War years where she was able to learn information about England's intentions toward the colonies and send the intelligence to America. **Open Court: Making a New Nation**

© Peter Pan in Scarlet: the Official Sequel, McCaughrean, Geraldine, \$16.00, McElderry, Grades 5+

Wendy and the Lost Boys begin having nightmares and realize they must return to Neverland to figure out the cause of them, and when they get there, they embark on an adventure with Peter Pan to find a buried treasure on Neverpeak. Pen-and-ink illustrations add to the enjoyment of the story.

series of adventures and eventually helps the alien and his people. Bright graphic-novel-style wordless panels show Polo as he goes from one fantastic series of improbable adventures to another.

Six chapters cover the history, geography, climate, ecology, terrain, flora, and fauna of the grasslands and the mountains. Stunning close-up photographs highlight both the changing scenery and the lives of resident animals in these two dramatically different ecosystems.

Presents a comprehensive biography and history of Benedict Arnold that examines many of his heroic deeds and contributions to the Revolutionary cause before he decided to switch sides. Steven Caney's Ultimate Building Book,, Caney, Steven, \$30.00, Running Pr., Grades 4-8

The Entertainer and the Dybbuk, Fleischman, Sid, \$17.00, Greenwillow, Grades 6-9

A struggling American ventriloquist in post-World War II Europe is possessed by the mischievous spirit of a young Jewish boy killed in the Holocaust. Includes author's note which details the murder of over one million children by the Nazis during the 1930s and 1940s.

Epossumondas Saves the Day, Salley, Coleen, \$16.00, Harcourt (2006), Grades K-3

This is a high-spirited Louisiana version of the traditional folktale, *Sody Sallyraytus* that is <u>great</u> <u>fun</u> to read aloud! A huge snapping turtle gulps down birthday party guests one by one until the little possum, Epossumondas, saves the day. Illustrated with hilarious mixed-media artwork.

Escape of Oney Judge: Martha Washington's Slave Finds Freedom, The, McCully, Emily A., \$16.00, Farrar, Grades 3-5

Young Oney Judge risks everything to escape a life of slavery in the household of George and Martha Washington and to make her own way as a free black woman. Oney's story is enhanced by detailed watercolor paintings that create a good sense of household life and the rising issues of slavery in these early days of the new republic. Includes an author's note. **Open Court: Risks and Consequences**

Every Year on Your Birthday, Lewis, Rose, \$16.00, Little Brown, Grades PreK-2

Each year on the birthday of her adopted Chinese daughter, a mother recalls the moments they have shared, from the first toy to the friends left behind in China. Beautifully designed with framed scenes and boxed sequences of her growth and concluding with the Chinese character for "family" which is a synonym for "home".

Extreme Animals: The Toughest Creatures on Earth, Davies, Nicola, \$13.00, Candlewick (2006), Grades 3-6

Describes the physical characteristics and biological processes that enable particular animals to survive in extremely hot and cold climates. Illustrated with colorful cartoon artwork that will pull kids into this fascinating book about survival.

Face to Face with Caterpillars, Murowski, Darlyne A., \$17.00, National Geographic, Grades 3-6

An introduction to caterpillars, discussing where they live, what they look like, what they eat, how they defend themselves, and what they need to survive. Illustrated with vivid, up close photographs.

Face to Face with Grizzlies, Sartone, Joel, \$17.00, National Geographic, Grades 3-6

Joel Sartore describes his experiences with bears while on assignment for "National Geographic" magazine, and provides basic information about bears' bodies, habitats, and behavior, as well as environmental and human factors that endanger bears. Includes animal conservation ideas.

Finn's Going, Kelly, Tom, \$17.00, Greenwillow, Grades 5-8

A ten-year-old English boy decides to run away after the sadness at home becomes unbearable following the death of his twin brother. Days later he returns after accepting his own grief.

Fox, Banks, Kate, \$16.00, Farrar, Grades PreK-1

A baby fox anticipates the time when he can go out alone, but first his parents must teach him the ways of the wilderness. Through the young fox's eyes, the reader observes the shifting seasons. Rich, color-saturated paintings show the fox family and their natural world. **Open Court: Animals**

Fred Stays With Me!, Coffelt, Nancy, \$17.00, Little Brown, Grades K-3

A child describes how she lives sometimes with her mother and sometimes with her father, but her dog is her constant companion. Told in a first-person narrative, playful art shows the mayhem

Fred causes and the power he gives the child because he will never leave her. Illustrations rendered in soft watercolor perfectly complement the quiet story, bringing humor to the story.

Gilda Joyce: the Ghost Sonata, Allison, Jennifer, \$16.00, Dutton, Grades 5-8

Teen detective Gilda Joyce's best friend Wendy Choy qualifies to compete in an international piano competition in Oxford, England, and Gilda is determined to go as well, as a page turner. Suspense builds along with much romantic comedy.

Good Day, A, Henkes, Kevin, \$17.00, Greenwillow, Grades PreK-1

Contrary to the title, the story starts out with a calamity. A bird, a fox, a dog, and a squirrel overcome some minor setbacks and end up having a very good day. Simple details enhance the illustrations. A fine read aloud choice.

Good Masters, Sweet Ladies: Voices from a Medieval Village, Schlitz, Laura Amy, \$17.00, Candlewick, Grades 4-8

A collection of short interconnected monologues featuring characters, between ten and fifteen years old, who live in or near a thirteenth-century English manor. The dialogue helps students step directly into the shoes of medieval children. Designed for performance and excellent for use in teaching history. Illustrations present images of the era and provide ideas for appropriate costuming and props.

Good Sports: Rhymes About Running, Jumping, Throwing, and More, Prelutsky, Jack, \$17.00, Knopf, Grades K-3

These brief, untitled poems are presented across colorful spreads and describe the experiences and emotions of young athletes as they participate in a variety of physical pursuits, including soccer, football, ice skating, and gymnastics. A collection that may convince children that poetry can be fun. A great read aloud just before recess! **Open Court: Games**

Green as a Bean, Kuskin, Karla, \$17.00, HarperCollins, PreK-1

Questions in verse about the many things you could be if you were square or soft or loud or red or small or fat or fierce or dark are answered in rhyme. Illustrated with bright, fanciful acrylic paintings.

Growing Story, The, Krauss, Ruth, \$17.00, HarperCollins, Grades PreK-K

A little boy worries throughout the summer that he's not getting bigger, but at the end of the season he tries on his winter clothes and realizes that he has grown. Illustrated with detailed watercolor artwork. This renewed version of the classic text by Krauss (1947) captures the gentle spirit of the original text.

Half a World Away, Gleeson, Abby, \$16.00, Scholastic, Grades K-3

Amy and Louie are best friends. When Amy moves from Australia to New York City, the friends miss each other dreadfully. Louie wonders if Amy will hear their special call even though she is 'half a world away." His call goes up into clouds that look like dragons and wild seahorses. The clouds float out over the ocean, all the way to New York, where Amy wakes and tells her parents, "I had a lovely dream. . . . I dreamt about Louie and he called me." A comforting story for newly separated friends. **Open Court: Friendship**

Harriet Tubman, Secret Agent: How Daring Slaves and Free Blacks Spied for the Union During the Civil War, Allen, Thomas B., Nat'l Geographic, \$19.00, Grades 5-8

The story of Harriet Tubman's various roles as a spy, secret agent, and leader is set against the stage of the abolitionist movement and the Civil War. It also presents the ways that ex-slaves and free blacks served the Union cause. The spy action is at the heart of this small volume and it is illustrated with primary source artwork consisting of images, maps, and woodcuts.

Heat Wave, Spinelli, Eileen, \$16.00, Harcourt, Grades K-3

Abigail, Ralphie, and the other citizens of Lumberville struggle to endure a week-long heat wave in a time long before air conditioners. "Townspeople, kids, and dogs try a variety of ways to cool down and finally all camp out on the riverbank dreaming of a break in the weather. Stark white pages provide the perfect backdrop for fresh, vivid watercolor cartoons, with the final page displaying splashes of refreshing blue raindrops." *School Library Journal*

Henry's Freedom Box: a True Story from the Underground Railroad, Levine, Ellen, , \$17.00, Scholastic, Grades 2-5

A poignant story about a young boy growing up as a slave, sold and sent away from his family, and ultimately separated from his wife and children. He decides to mail himself in a box to a sympathetic supporter in Philadelphia. With the help of a white doctor, he is successful in his adventure. Illustrated with full spread paintings. **Open Court: Survival**

Here's a Little Poem: a Very First Book of Poetry, Yolen, Jane, Collector, \$22.00, Candlewick, Grades PreK-K

A collection of poems for children and are arranged with themes of self, family, going outside, and when it is time for bed. The poetry is witty, intelligent, and well crafted, and perfect for children in preschool and kindergarten. The illustrations use a wide range of mediums and techniques, and are perfectly suited to the selections.

How it Happened in Peach Hill, Jocelyn, Marthe, \$16.00, Random, Grades 5-8

When fifteen-year-old Annie Grey and her "clairvoyant" mother arrive in Peach Hill, New York, in 1924, each finds a reason for wanting to finally settle down, but to reach their goals they will have to do some serious lying and Annie will have to stand up for herself.

How To Bake an American Pie, Wilson, Karma, \$17.00, McElderry, Grades 2-4

A cat and a dog follow a unique recipe to make an American pie using the attributes of America and Americans. The rhyming text includes phrases from *America the Beautiful* and is enhanced by whimsical full page color artwork, making this a read aloud choice. Use this title to introduce immigration units.

How to Be a Baby...By Me the Big Sister, Lloyd-Jones, Sally, \$16.00, Random, Grades K-3

An all-knowing big sister gives her baby sibling lessons in being a baby. All along it's obvious that her comments hide a lot of love. The humorous cartoon-like artwork featues acrylic paint, crayon, and felt-tip pen.

How to Steal a Dog, O'Conner, Barbara, \$16.00, FSG, Grades 4-7

Living in the family car in their small North Carolina town after their father leaves them virtually penniless, Georgina, desperate to improve their situation and unwilling to accept her overworked mother's calls for patience, persuades her younger brother to help her in an elaborate scheme to get money by stealing a dog and then claiming the reward that the owners are bound to offer.

Hurry! Hurry!, Bunting, Eve, \$16.00, Harcourt, PreK-1

As a baby chick is hatching, the proud hen urges the farm animals to hurry! hurry! in and observe. In just a few power-packed words, Bunting skillfully ramps up the energy, from the hen's first excited call and the hush while the chick is hatching to the resounding "Welcome!" that the animals shout to the barnyard's newest arrival. The bright paintings help to tell the story with details and humor. **PreK Open Court: At the Farm**

I am Not Joey Pigza, Gantos, Jack, \$16.00, FSG, Grades 5-8

Joey's father returns, calling himself Charles Heinz and apologizing for his past bad behavior, and he swears that once Joey and his mother change their names and help him fix up the old diner he

has bought, their lives will change for the better.

Imagine Harry, Klise, Kate, \$16.00, Harcourt, Grades PreK-2

After Little Rabbit starts school, he sees less and less of his invisible friend, Harry, and finally tells his mother that Harry moved away. **Open Court: Finding Friends**

Incredible Book Eating Boy, The, Jeffers, Oliver, \$17.00, Philomel, Grades K-3

Henry loves to eat books, until he begins to feel quite ill and decides that maybe he could do something else with the books he has been devouring. Illustrated with artwork constructed from the pages of old discarded books and a big bite out of the back cover.

Invention Of Hugo Cabret: a Novel in Words and Pictures, The, Selznick, Brian, \$23.00, Scholastic, Grades 4-8

Part graphic novel, part narrative, this is a fantasy that grabs the reader and holds him tight. Hugo is an orphan living and repairing clocks within the walls of a Paris train station in 1931. He meets a mysterious toy-seller and his goddaughter and his undercover life and his biggest secret are jeopardized. Generously illustrated with detailed silvery pencil drawings.

Jack and the Beanstalk, Nesbit, E., \$14.00, Candlewick (2006), Grades K-3

An elegant retelling of the English fairytale, originally published in 1908 in The Old Nursery Stories, using rich language to depict an endearing, but lazy, ne'er-do-well who turns folly into triumph. Realistic pencil and watercolor illustrations.

Jack Plank Tells Tales, Babbitt, Natalie, \$16.00, Scholastic, Grades 2-6

Because he is too nice to be a pirate, Jack Plank looks for a new career, but each night he tells tales of why the one job he looked into that day is wrong. Some of the tales, which beg to be read aloud, will leave listeners arguing about what really happened while others will make them smile.

Jazz on a Saturday Night, Dillon, Leo & Diane, \$17.00, Blue Sky Press, Grades 2-4

A crowd gathers on a Saturday night to groove to an evening of jazz played by a "Dream Team" of musicians including Miles Davis on trumpet, Max Roach on drums, Charlie Parker on alto saxophone, John Coltrain on his sax, Thelonius Monk on piano, Stanley Parker on bass, and Ella Fitzgerald at the microphone. Includes a companion CD.

Just Grace, Harper, Charise M., \$15.00, Houghton, Grades 2-4

Named "Just Grace" by her harried teacher to distinguish her from the other two Graces in the class, third-grader Grace prides herself on being empathetic, but when she tries to help a neighbor feel better, her good intentions backfire. She secretly tries to cheer up her neighbor and gets accused of kidnapping her cat instead. This short chapter book is illustrated with humorous cartoon artwork.

Land of the Silver Apples, The, Farmer, Nancy, \$19.00, Atheneum, Grades 5-8

After escaping from the Sea of Trolls, the apprentice bard Jack plunges into a new series of adventures, traveling underground to Elfland and uncovering the truth about his little sister Lucy. NOTE: This is the middle volume of a trilogy.

Leaves, Stein, David Ezra, \$15.00, Putnam, Grades PreK-1

A bear who has never experienced autumn before is puzzled by the falling leaves, unsure whether he should try to put them back or use them as a bed for a nap. "Simple, declarative sentences and expressive small-scale pictures blend beautifully in this sweet story about a young bear experiencing his first full cycle of seasons. Bamboo pen and earth-toned watercolors are used to great effect to depict the setting of a tiny island with a few trees." *School Library Journal* **Open Court: Weather** Legend of Lao Tzu and the Tao Te Ching, The, Demi, \$22.00, M.K. McElderry Books, Grades 4-7

Introduces children to the life and teachings of Chinese philosopher Lao Tzu, who is credited with creating the Tao Te Ching. Clear, concise writing, thoughtfully considered design, and striking illustrations. **Open Court: Ancient Civilizations**

Let it Shine: Three Favorite Spirituals, Bryan, Ashley, \$17.00, Atheneum, 2-5

Bright collage illustrations accompany the lyrics of three well-known spirituals: *This Little Light of Mine, When the Saints Go Marching In,* and *He's Got the Whole World in His Hands*. Includes a brief music score and a short history of slave songs before the Civil War. A useful addition when studying African-American culture and folklore, or just for singing.

Letters from the Corrugated Castle, Blos, Joan W., \$18.00, Atheneum, Grades 4-8

This novel, told through letters and newspaper articles, is an engaging story set during the California Gold Rush of the 1850s. Eldora, an orphan, moves with her guardians to San Francisco, where she befriends two Mexicano children, one, a boy searching for gold. She discovers she is not an orphan but the daughter of an influential land-owner. Issues of prejudice recur as one of the Mexicano children is killed by a hateful miner and a Jewish shop owner is driven out of town by repeated vandalism.

Lightship, Floca, Brian, \$17.00, Atheneum, Grades K-2

Illustrations and simple text tell the story of lightships that were used in place of lighthouses in order to safely guide ships into port. Watercolor drawings show the daily life aboard one of these ships, cooking, sleeping, working, all the while rolling with the rhythm of the waves. **Open Court: Things That Go**

Little People and a Lost World: An Anthropological Mystery, Goldenberg, Linda, \$29.00, 21st Century (2006), Grades 5-8

Archaeologists examine a humanlike skeleton excavated from a cave on Flores Island in Indonesia that turned out to be an adult woman of extremely small stature, and studies evidence to the discovery of a race of small humans 12,000 years ago. Students will find the plentiful color illustrations, including color photographs and diagrams appealing.

Long Gone Lonesome History of Country Music, The, Bertholf, Bret, The \$19.00, Little Brown, Gr 3-6

A tongue-in-cheek history of American country music that features brief profiles of country music legends, a how to yodel section, short sections about the types of country music (gospel, honky-tonk, rock-a-billy, bluegrass, and more) as well as country words, dances, and a chance to create some original country music lyrics. Illustrated with caricatures. **Open Court: Beyond the Notes**

Look at You! A Baby Body Book, Henderson, Kathy, \$16.00, Candlewick, Grade PreK

An offering that lyrically commemorates a small child's amazing feats, from crawling to clapping to exploring food with their entire bodies. Told in rhyming text. The illustrations look at the many things babies learn about their bodies and feelings. This is a good choice for individual or small group sharing. **PreK Open Court: I'm Special**

Lucia and the Light, Root, Phyllis, \$17.00, Candlewick (2006), Grades K-3

One winter in the Far North the Sun disappears and Lucia, accompanied by her milk-white cat, braves the freezing cold and trolls who want to eat her, trying to find the Sun and bring it back. Illustrated with soft, fluid multi-colored paintings that convey both danger and sunlight-filled safety and warmth.

Lucky Jake, Addy, Sharon, \$17.00, Houghton, Grades K-3

While panning for gold with his Pa, Jake adopts a pig that he names Dog. A chain of events is set off that leads to prosperity. While Pa talks about good luck, Jake believes more in action. Illustrated with pastel artwork that presents different perspectives.

Mama for Owen, A, Bauer, Marion Dane, \$16.00, Simon & Schuster, Grades PreK-1

When the 2004 Indian Ocean tsunami separates a young African hippopotamus from his mother, he finds a new snuggle partner in Mzee the giant tortoise. Based on a true story. "Butler's feathery illustrations, featuring smiling, doe-eyed animals rendered in soft tones of butter, rose, and lavender, hint at the sunny outcome even during the story's troubling opening scenes." *Booklist* **Open Court: Finding Friends**

Marley: a Dog Like no Other, Grogan, John, \$18.00, Grades 4-7

A special adaptation of the author's book *Marley & Me* for young readers, in which he shares the story of his golden retriever Marley, and tells of the love his family has for the dog. Written with real affection and humor, this tender tribute to a dog "with stinky breath and bad manners" will win the hearts of even those who aren't dog lovers.

Me I Am!, Prelutsky, Jack, \$16.00, Farrar, Grades PreK-2

An illustrated, children's poem which celebrates individuality. Bright, energetic illustrations celebrate the kids' distinctly different interests (rollerskating, examining bugs, dancing). **Open Court PreK: I'm Special**

Mercy Watson Fights Crime, DiCamillo, Kate, \$13.00, Candlewick (2006), Grades K-3

Mercy the pig's love of buttered toast leads to the capture of a small thief who would rather be a cowboy. Another adventure in an early chapter book that will engage beginning readers and build

Mr. Pusskins: A Love Story, Lloyd, Sam, \$15.00, Atheneum, Grades PreK-1

Mr. Pusskins is a cat full of full attitude. He hates doing ordinary cat things such as playing with his owner Emily but a night out on the streets in search of adventure makes him reconsider the advantages of a loving home. The bright illustrations capture this fluffy cat in all of his grouchy glory. Good read aloud choice.

Mr. Putter and Tabby See the Stars, Cynthia Rylant, \$14.00, Harcourt, Grades 1-2

Mr. Putter and Tabby find they are not the only ones awake when they go for a walk at midnight to cure Mr. Putter's pineapple-jelly-roll-induced insomnia. Soft pencil sketches colored with watercolor and gouache energize the story and add to the fun. An excellent choice for beginning and developing readers.

My Dog is as Smelly as Dirty Socks: and Other Funny Family Portraits, Piven, Hanokh, \$16.00, Schwartz & Wade, Grades 2-4

A young girl draws a family portrait, then makes it more accurate by adding common objects to show aspects of each member's personality, such as her father's playfulness, her mother's sweetness, and her brother's strength. An excellent model for writing and creating unique family portraits.

My Life as a Chicken, Kelley, Ellen A., \$15.00, Harcourt, Grades K-3

After escaping the frying pan, a chicken has an adventure that includes pirates, a typhoon, and a balloon ride before landing happily in a petting zoo. The rhyming text is enhanced with digital mixed-media illustrations.

Mysterious Benedict Society, The, Stewart, Trenton Lee, , \$17.00, Little, Brown, Grades 4-8

A curious newspaper ad advertising special opportunities for the gifted catches the eye of orphan Reynie Muldoon. He is selected for a crack team to complete an important mission, to infiltrate the Learning Institute for the Very Enlightened and to discover its secrets. In addition to grand adventure, the book also tackles personal concerns: abandonment, family, loyalty, and facing one's fears. Smart kids are the natural audience for this; but, read aloud, the novel will attract many others as well.

Nini Here and There, Lobel, Anita, \$18.00, Greenwillow, Grades PreK-2

Fearing at first that her family is going on vacation without her, Nini the cat ends up traveling with her owners to their new home. Illustrated with vibrant watercolor artwork, this is a comforting story about new beginnings.

No Talking, Clements, Andrew, \$16.00, S&S, Grades 3-6

The noisy fifth grade boys of Laketon Elementary School challenge the equally loud fifth grade girls to a "no talking" contest. The experiment takes on a life of its own, as the collective action turns into civil disobedience when the oppressive principal decides to put a stop to it. By the end, the two camps have become more allies than rivals.

Not in Room 204, Riggs, Shannon, \$16.00, Whitman,

A teacher tells the children in her class to talk to an adult if they are being sexually abused. Regina arrives early at Room 204 to confide her secret, which involves her father. The story ends on a hopeful note. The strength in this book is in the sensitivity of its presentation. Illustrated with clear, bright illustrations. A helpful picture book to raise children's awareness of sexual abuse without raising anxiety.

Nothing But Trouble: the Story of Althea Gibson, Stauffacher, Sue, \$17.00, Knopf, Grades 2-5

Explores the life and achievements of Althea Gibson. "Bursting across Couch's impressionistic Harlem street scenes in a blaze of color, the rangy, grinning young Gibson, the first African-American tennis player, male or female, to win at Wimbledon, seems ready to jump right off the pages of this high-energy profile." *Kirkus* **Open Court: Cooperation and Competition**

O.K. Book, The, Rosenthal, Amy Krause, \$15.00, HarperCollins, Grades PreK-2

A character enumerates a great many things that it enjoys doing, although not great at any of them, knowing that someday it will excel at something. Simplicity of illustrations.

On Meadowview Street, Cole, Henry, \$18.00, Greenwillow, Grades K-2

Upon moving to a new house, young Caroline and her parents encourage wildflowers to grow and birds and animals to stay in their yard, which soon has the whole suburban street living up to its name. Illustrated with watercolor artwork show how the garden grows and how she begins to connect with other children in the neighborhood. **Open Court: City Wildlife**

On My Journey Now: Looking at African American History Through the Spirituals, Giovanni, Nikki, \$19.00, Candlewick, Grades 5-8

Nikki Giovanni celebrates the courage, strength and character of Africans in America through the inspirational words of the spirituals. She traces how the people in bondage created the great spirituals to tell their stories, and what the songs still mean to us today. Includes words to songs. **Open Court: Survival**

Once Upon a Banana, Armstrong, Jennifer, \$17.00, S&S (2006), Grades K-4

A chain of chaotic events begins when a juggler's monkey grabs a banana from a shopkeeper's display and tosses the peel aside. The nearly wordless story is helped along by rhyming street signs and detailed watercolor artwork in a cartoon style. In the end, a garbage truck careens with

a truckload of bananas and all the characters gather for a banana feast! A good selection for teaching prediction skills.

One Well: the Story of Water on Earth, Strauss, Rochelle, \$18.00, Kids Can Pr., Grades 3-6

Tells the story of Earth's water, introducing the concept of the planet's water as being contained in one well, and discussing the importance of water to survival of plants, animals, and people, recycling, access to water, pollution, and conservation. Illustrated with bright paintings that often present a birds-eye view. **Open Court: Ecology**

Orange Pear Apple Bear, Gravett, Emily, \$13.00, S&S, Grades PreK-1

Using just 5 words, four in the title and a concluding word, a charming and unique story is born. The simple text explores concepts of color, shape, and sequence as the bear plays with and ultimately eats the orange, pear, and apple. Illustrated in loose line and watercolor art.

Our Liberty Bell, Magaziner, Henry Jonas, \$16.00, Holiday House, Grades 4-6

Tells the story of the Liberty Bell, discussing its role in the origins of the United States, and looking at how it became a symbol of American freedom. Illustrated with black line drawings that bring a flavor of the Revolutionary period and beyond. **Open Court: Making a New Nation**

Perfect Day, A, Charlip, Remy, \$18.00, Greenwillow, Grades PreK-2

"A child and parent explore all the possibilities of a single day together, taking walks, eating, playing, painting, staring up at the clouds, and contemplating books they've read. The simple rhyming text floats by like a breeze, and the watercolor illustrations gently glow."- *Hornbook*

Perfect Nest, The, Friend, Catherine, \$17.00, Candlewick, Grades K-3

Jack the cat builds perfect nest in the hopes of luring a chicken who might lay an egg for a delicious omelet. He attracts a Spanish-speaking chicken, a French-speaking duck, and an all-American goose. Each bird lays an egg but in the end, none are willing to leave the nest. Pictures from our Vacation, Perkins, Lynne Rae, \$18.00, Greenwillow, Grades 2-5

Given a camera that takes and prints tiny pictures just before leaving for the family farm in Canada, a young girl records a vacation that gets off to a slow start, but winds up being a family reunion filled with good memories. Illustrated with brightly hued, detailed pen and ink and watercolor pictures.

Pierre in Love, Pennypacker, Sara, \$17.00, Orchard, Grades K-2

Feeling "bloopy and love-swoggled" in the presence of Catherine, a rabbit and the elegant ballet teacher, Pierre, a humble mouse fisherman tries to muster the courage to reveal his affection for her. He dresses up and admits his love, but she has already given her heart to a rugged fisherman, who, in the end, turns out to be Pierre.

Pocket Babies & Other Amazing Marsupials, Collard, III, Sneed B., \$19.00, Darby Creek, Grades 3-7 Teaches about the marsupials of the world, including opossums, kangaroos, koalas, and others. Numerous full-color photos break up the text, and organizational charts help readers understand the complex classification system.

Porc in New York, A, Stock, Catherine, \$17.00, Holiday, Grades K-3

Monsieur Monmouton and his shepherd dog Cabot head to New York in pursuit of the farm animals that have taken off on a sightseeing trip, but Monsieur's focus on catching the wayward animals wavers when he meets an attractive waitress at the Kool Kat Klub. The story is fun, and the expansive, exuberant artwork is a wonderful compliment to the story. **Open Court: Journeys**

Probuditi!, Van Allsburg, Chris, \$19.00, Houghton (2006), Grades K-3

On his birthday, Calvin and his friend Rodney see a magician perform, then copy him by hypnotizing Calvin's little sister, but the joke is on them when they are unable to snap her out of it. While Calvin is howling at the memory of his sister "barking and drooling," it is she who has the very satisfying last laugh (offstage). Illustrated with textured pastel and pencil drawings. Another excellent read aloud choice.

Quest for the Tree Kangaroo: An Expedition to the Cloud Forest of New Guinea, Montgomery, Sy, \$18.00, Houghton (2006), Grades 4-8

Full-color, illustrated photographs provide detailed information on the search for the tree kangaroo in Papua New Guinea's cloud forest, and describes its habits, behaviors, and characteristics. Presents an exemplary description of science field work. **Open Court: Ecology**

Rainstorm, Lehman, Barbara, Houghton, \$14.00, Grades 2-4

In this wordless picture book, a boy finds a mysterious key which leads him on a rainy day adventure. Illustrated in brightly colored, simple watercolor, gouache, and ink artwork that combines full-page images, spreads, and pages of sequential panels. This appealing rainy day tale will stir the imagination of those who have ever looked for something to do on a gloomy day.

Ready, Set, Skip, O'Conner, Jane, \$17.00, Viking, Grades PreK-1

Told in rhyming text, this is the story of a little girl who is an accomplished whistler, soap-bubble blower, and skater, just can't skip. Mom comes to the rescue and shows her a special trick that is successful. Bright artwork compliments the story. **PreK Open Court: I'm Special, Open Court: Keep Trying**

Reconstruction, Ruggiero, Adriane, \$26.00, Benchmark, 2007, Grades 5-8

Various primary source documents, such as diary entries, newspaper accounts, political speeches, laws, popular songs, and personal letters, present the history of the era of Reconstruction in the United States. Includes discussion questions.

Saving the Buffalo, Marrin, Albert, \$17.00, Scholastic (2006), Grades 4-8

Provides vivid details as the history of the buffalo is traced, tells how they reached near-extinction in the nineteenth century, discusses the various causes, and explains the slow recovery with the help of the early conservationist movement. Illustrated with a wide variety of primary sources, photographs, and period paintings. **Open Court: Going West**

Second Is A Hiccup: A Child's Book of Time, Hutchins, Hazel, A \$17.00, Scholastic, Grades K-2

Playful rhyming text helps children comprehend units of time, presenting lively examples of what can happen in the span of a second, a minute, an hour, a day, a week, a month, a year, and a whole childhood. Illustrated with bright watercolor artwork making this an excellent read-aloud and a great choice when children are learning about time.

Secret World of Hildegard, The, Winter, Jonah, \$16.00, Arthur A. Levine, Grades 1-4

An introduction to the life of Hildegard of Bingen, who lived in a time when women were expected to serve and obey men, but through her courage, she became one of the greatest mystics and composers of the medieval age.

Seed is Sleepy, A, Aston, Dianna H., A \$17.00, Chronicle, Grades 1-4

An introduction to seeds; explaining their varying shapes and sizes, where they are found, and their life cycles. Detailed watercolors are accompanied by text written on two reading levels, one for younger readers, and one with details for older readers.

Shark Girl, Bingham, Kelly, \$19.00, Candlewick, Grades 6+

"Conversations, letters, and prose poems tell the story of fifteen-year-old artist Jane's recovery from a shark attack and adjustment to life as an amputee. We read letters from sympathizers (after a bystander's video is televised) and feel the sting of pity. Jane's slowly growing comfort with herself is realistically portrayed. Nicely drawn relationships round out the involving, affecting story." *Horn Book* **Open Court: Perseverance**

Skyscraper, Curlee, Lynn, \$18.00, Atheneum, Grades 4-8

Presents a history of skyscrapers around the world including the Pyramids of Giza, the Eiffel Tower, and the Empire State Building in New York. Nearly every spread features a full page of text opposite an impressive acrylic illustration.

Slavery and Resistance, Jordan, Anne D., \$24.00, Benchmark, Grades 5-8

Describes the history of slavery in the Americas from the early colonial times to the end of the Civil War and Emancipation. Describes Jamestown and how both whites and blacks, servants and slaves, worked the land. The information flows seamlessly from detailing how African Americans came to this new country to explaining how slavery spread and took hold, and describing slavery during the Revolution and what life was like for slaves in both the North and the South. Illustrated with paintings and photos. **Open Court: Survival**

Slugs In Love, Pearson, Susan, \$17.00, M. Cavendish (2006), Grades PreK-3

Two garden slugs write love poems in slime to one another but have trouble actually meeting. The artwork incorporates markers, colored pencils and Photoshop to comically characterize the slugs with accessories so they can be easily identified.

Snow Baby: The Arctic Childhood of Admiral Robert E. Peary's Daring Daughter, The, Kirkpatrick, Katherine, \$17.00, Holiday, Grades 4-8

Chronicles the childhood of Marie Ahnighito, the daughter of Admiral Robert E. Peary, who was born in an Inuit village in northern Greenland and spent the next few years making friends with Inuit children, playing on the region's glacial cliffs, and living a life unlike other Victorian children. The text chronicles the beauty of the region as well as the adventure and danger faced by the Peary family. Historic family photos and maps enhance the story. **Open Court: Survival**

Tasting the Sky, Barakat, Ibtisam, \$16.00, Farrar, Grades 7+

The memoir of a Palestinian woman's childhood from 1967 to 1970 told in vignettes through a pair of letters from herself as a high school student in 1981. Careful choice of episodes and details brings to life a Palestinian world that may be unfamiliar to American readers, but which they will come to know and appreciate.

Theodosia and the Serpents of Chaos, LaFevers, R.L., \$16.00, Houghton, Grades 5-8

Eleven-year-old Theodosia has the ability to detect black magic and ancient curses that are attached to objects in the Museum of Legends and Antiquities, of which her father is the curator, and discovers that a new artifact from Egypt is cursed and she must return it to the tomb it was excavated from before it destroys the British Empire.

This is Just to Say: Poems of Apology and Forgiveness, Sidman, Joyce, \$15.00, HoughtonMifflin, Gr 4-7 A collection of poems written by a number of 6th grade students who write poems of apology to someone, and a collection of responses in poetry form. Illustrated with collage drawings and paintings created on mixed backgrounds.

Tinderbox, The, Mitchell, Stephen, ret., \$18.00, Candlewick, Grades 2-5

An illustrated retelling of the Hans Christian Andersen story in which a soldier, helped along by a magic tinderbox, finds a fortune and pursues a princess imprisoned in a castle. The pen drawings,

washed in muted colors, resemble lithographs and have an old-fashioned look.

Today and Today, Issa, Kobayashi, \$17.00, Scholastic, Grades 1-3

A collection of short illustrated haiku poems that tell of an ordinary year in the life of one family, and that describe each season. Each section is introduced by the changing branch of a cherry tree and illustrated with artwork that brings a sense of quiet and contemplation. **Open Court: Weather (Seasonal Patterns)**

Today at the Blue-Bird Café: a Branchfull of Birds, Ruddell, Deborah, \$16.00, McElderry, Grades

A collection of twenty-two children's poems about birds including blue jays, toucans, and cockatoos. Each poem is presented along with a humorous watercolor illustration, and together they address characteristics of different birds. Use as an introduction to poetry, or in beginning a research project on birds.

Top Job, The, Kimmel, Elizabeth, \$16.00, Dutton, Grades 1-4

On Career Day, a young girl entertains the class with a description of her father's exciting job as light bulb changer at the top of the Empire State Building. Brings in themes of standing up for yourself, responding to rudeness and bragging, and girls who are talented mathematicians. Clear, bright illustrations and a great read aloud. **Open Court: Our Neighborhood at Work**

Tracking Trash: Flotsam, Jetsam, and the Science of Ocean Motion, Burns, Loree G., \$18.00, Houghton, Grades 5-8

Tells about an incident in 1990, where containers packed with Nike sneakers were swept off a cargo ship during a storm at sea as well as an incident in 1992, where thousands of floating bathtub toys spilled into the Pacific in a similar mishap. The book profiles two oceanographers who used computer-modeling programs to predict the landfall of these drifting objects. The well-written text will keep readers engaged. The science is clearly explained, and the vivid and lively photographs and well-labeled charts and diagrams help to create interest and build understanding. (Pair with the picture book version of this story, *Ducky* by Eve Bunting).

Traitors' Gate, The, Avi, \$18.00, Atheneum, Grades 5-8

When his father is arrested as a debtor in 1849 London, fourteen-year-old John Huffman must take on unexpected responsibilities, from asking a distant relative for help to determining why people are spying on him and his family. Avi, a fan of Charles Dickens, uses some of the circumstances of the writer's early life as a basis for this story.

Very Ordered Existence of Merilee Marvelous, The, Crowley, Suzanne, \$18.00, Greenwillow, Grades 5-8

In the small town of Jumbo, Texas, thirteen-year-old Merilee, who has Asperger's Syndrome, tries to live a "very ordered existence," but disruptions begin when a boy and his father arrive in town and the youngster makes himself a part of the family.

Volcanoes, Fradin, Judith Bloom, \$17.00, National Geographic, Grades 4-6

Describes volcanoes including their causes and impact on people. Numerous clear, well-chosen photographs and diagrams help to convey the great power of volcanic activity and the consequences to humans. Pull-quote comments from volcanologists, other scientists, and everyday witnesses to these disasters, designed to hook readers' interest, are a distinct plus.

Wall: Growing up Behind the Iron Curtain, The, Sis, Peter, \$19.00, Clarion, Grades 4-8

Artist Sis Peter describes what it was like growing up in a Communist country and discusses how Western culture influenced his life. Maps on endpapers. "Complex, multifaceted, rich in detail, this book shares the artist's specific heritage while connecting to universal longings. His concluding visions of freedom are both poignant and exhilarating." *School Library Journal*

Way Down Deep, White, Ruth, \$16.00, Farrar, Grades 4-7

A warmhearted story set in 1954 in Way Down Deep, a town "cradled between the hills in a place that later became known as West Virginia." Ruby June, a foundling, is happily living with Miss Arbutus at the local boarding house when the mystery of Ruby's past begins to unravel. A thoughtful tale that offers humor, mystery, and a feel-good ending that will please readers.

What Happens on Wednesdays, Jenkins, Emily, \$17.00, Frances Foster Books, Grades PreK-2

A child describes every event that occurs on a Wednesday, from waking up while it is still dark out and deciding it is not a kissing day, through a half-day of school, to snuggling into bed at night. The mixed-media illustrations give readers a real feel for the youngster's Brooklyn neighborhood.

When Fish Got Feet, Sharks Got Teeth, and Bugs Began to Swarm: a Cartoon Prehistory of Life Long Before Dinosaurs, Bonner, Hannah, \$17.00, National Geographic, Grades 3-6

Provides information on the prehistory of animal and plant life before the time of dinosaurs, including fun facts, descriptive illustrations, humorous cartoons, a glossary, a pronunciation guide, and a time line.

When Gorilla Goes Walking, Grimes, Nikki, \$17.00, Orchard, Grades K-3

Gorilla, the cat, stars in 19 short, snappy poems, describing his many interests, talents, and behaviors. The humorous poems vary in style and mood and reflect the happy relationship between girl and cat. Illustrated with bright cartoon artwork endearingly portraying the African-American narrator and her smoky gray cat. **Open Court: Friendship**

White Owl, Barn Owl, Davies, Nicola, \$17.00, Candlewick, Grades PreK-3

One winter, a grandfather and his small grandchild find an owl roost, open owl pellets, install a nest box and watch patiently until spring when they are rewarded with the sight of owls, hunting in their fields and feeding a family in the box they have provided. Illustrated with realistic, watercolor-and-pastel pictures. **Open Court: Animals**

Why War is Never a Good Idea, Walker, Alice, \$18.00, HarperCollins, Grades 3+

Bright artwork in double-page layouts and an eloquent poem describes the destructiveness and hopelessness of war and how it destroys people and beauty, bringing it to a personal level. Will spark discussion with older children and teens, while providing a superb visual experience.

Writing Magic: Creating Stories That Fly, Levine, Gail Carson, \$17.00, HarperCollins, Grades 5+

The Newbery winning author presents a guide for budding writers to hone their craft. She gives youngsters tools for coming up with story ideas, developing characters and plot, and finding opportunities for publication. She writes in a direct and friendly style and provides a multitude of writing prompts. A helpful book to have available for writing groups or for young writers who want to improve.

Young Pelé: Soccer's First Star, Cline-Ransome, Lesa, \$16.00, S&S, Grades K-4

A handsome picture-book biography that explores the childhood of Pele, discussing how a poor, Brazilian boy became one of the best soccer players in the world. Highlights the personal struggles, passion, and successes in his life due to his commitment and hard work. Illustrated with full page oil paintings. **Open Court: Games & Cooperation & Competition.**

Zen and the Art of Faking It, Sonnenblick, Jordan, \$17.00, Scholastic, Grades 5-8

When thirteen-year-old San Lee moves to a new town and school for the umpteenth time, he is looking for a way to stand out when his knowledge of Zen Buddhism, gained in his previous school, provides the answer, and the need to quickly become a convincing Zen master. By allowing the lies to pile up, this faux Zen master becomes like the one person he doesn't want to be. Hilarious and heart-wrenching.
