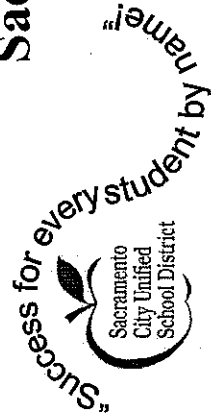

8.0 SHARING / LEARNING / COMMUNICATION

- 8.1 Student Advisory Report (Cameron Fukui) **Information**
- Student Board member stated that although it is our first board report of the year, we as the executive board had been busy since June. On June 30, 2009 the Student Advisory Council (SAC) Executive Board held a meeting for the members of the incoming board for the 2009/10 school year. Outgoing students explained to the incoming board the purposes of SAC. This meeting provided an opportunity for outgoing members to mentor the new board, provide advice and give suggestions for success. 2nd Vice President Kennedy stated that the committee met on Wednesday, September 16, 2009. The following items were discussed: The Met modernization program (which will be discussed later), schools being overcrowded because of the issue of not having enough water pressure on campus. We also talked about the impact to making fire code regulations. We will be putting together meetings with the local water agencies where we have these impacts.

1st Vice President Bell stated that the next Board Policy Review Committee meeting will be held Thursday, October 29, 2009 at 5:30 p.m. at the Serna Center. We will be discussing the Board Administrative Assistant position. We will also revisit Board Bylaw 9270, Conflict of Interest, the Connect Ed and policy on naming of a facility.

8.5 Superintendent and Staff Report (Jonathan P. Raymond)

Information

- HINI

Superintendent Raymond thanked the John F. Kennedy High School team for getting the facility ready tonight for the Board meeting.

On October 5, 2009, we announced a district hand washing campaign. We are one of the first school districts around the country to have a concentrated strategic effort at combating the spread of our HINI on our campuses. We have also launched an HINI newsletter that is sent out every Monday to our schools as a way to keep our school site administrators and staff informed of the latest information. Our school nurses have been out talking to staff, parents, and students about proper hygiene and continuing the efforts to emphasize hand washing. The newsletter will be available on the district website on a weekly basis and will be updated for all of our parents and translated in multiple languages. We are also encouraging everyone to get their regular seasonal flu vaccination.

- Student Achievement Data

Superintendent Raymond shared with the public findings on the different sub-groups of student achievement data in the following areas:

- ✓ Academic Performance Index (API) in English Language Arts
- ✓ Federal accountability standards under No Child Left Behind often referred to as Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP).
- ✓ Highlighted issues of the Achievement Gap

Superintendent Raymond stated that this is a short presentation to share some of the significant challenges and issues that the district is facing as it relates to English Language Arts performance. In the coming weeks, we are starting work to engage our students, teachers, and principals in taking a clear assessment of where we are, what are we doing in our school sites, where are we having success, what strategies are we using, what resources do we have available to us and coming back with a strategy to go at this aggressively. The status quo is not working and it is time to take a new approach.

8.6 President's Report (Roy Grimes)

Information

President Grimes reminded the community that this meeting is being video and audio taped and will be made available on the district website tomorrow by 10:00 a.m. Anyone wishing to make public comment may get a yellow card and present them to Maria Lopez. You will have 2 minutes to speak during public comment.

Members Bell, Kennedy, Terry, Superintendent Raymond and I attended the Mayor's Press Conference on Any Given Child's Arts Sake. Superintendent Raymond did a superlative job in his comments. Also, over a year ago I spoke about a small career technical high school. I have had a conversation with staff and we are exploring the possibility of a small career technical high school.

Additionally, the Association of Government Accountants (AGA) has a process called Citizen's Centric Reporting that is an accountability process that is used for public agencies. School districts are currently not participating in the process country-wide and would like to see this district participate in this process.

Last December an idea was presented to the superintendent relating to the global economy and learning called Sister District to District Program relationship and we are looking international. It will be related to language, language academies and a further push on multiple language immersion programs and also a relationship with other districts outside of the United States. President Grimes also recommended a book called *Leading In A Culture of Change* by Michael Fullan to the Board for perusal. Particularly the second chapter on Moral Purpose which he felt is incumbent upon us as board members to read as we move forward in a culture of change to be aware of what our moral purposes are in this district.

9.0 STRATEGIC PLAN AND OTHER INITIATIVES

9.1 Approve 2009-2010 District Budget Update Revision – State Budget Approval (Patty Hagemeyer)

Conference/Action

Patricia A. Hagemeyer, CBO brought forward the 2009-10 district budget update revision for approval based on the final state budget amendments. Education code section 42127 requires that the district bring to you a budget revision based on the final state budget within 45 days of the state approval or signature. The final state budget for 2009-10 was signed in February but we wanted to bring it forward for your action. The stated budget amendments were signed in late July. Highlighted items being brought forward are:

Revenues – We have final revenue limit reductions. There was quite a slip flop in the final state budget amendments. Originally we were going to have a significant revenue limit reduction impact in 2008-09 and again in 2009-10. The 2008-09 was deferred and we were hit double in 2009-10. Our final revenue limit reductions for 2009-10 were approximately 18.5 million.

State Fiscal Stabilization Funds – We have built into the budget approximately 1.4 million.

Special Education Settlement Funds – The state did not fund the 450,000 that was built into our adoptive budget. This amount will need to come out of the budget.

Career and Technical Education Program (Adult Education) – The Board approved in June to charge our Career and Technical Education Program adult education fees for 2.2 million.

On the expenditure side the Board took action to reduce our summer school program saving almost 2 million for the district. There were class size adjustments at the middle and high schools for a little over 2 million. We set aside as an increase on the expenditure side of 400,000 for our transition schools to pay for some facility needs and to help our schools that were transitioning from those that had closed. Finally, at the beginning fund balance, because we did not have as big a hit in 2008-09, we were able to carry over the stabilization funds to help us balance 2009-10. In addition to that, when we built our adoptive budget, there was approximately 2 million that we had set aside in stabilization funds that we thought would help us balance in the outlying years. With the changes in the final state amendments, we did need those dollars to help balance our budget. The total between the two was a little over 11.6 million. We still have a balanced budget. These are changes that were reflected through the end of August for the state budget amendments.

To give you an update on our Quality Education Investment Act (QEIA), we were somewhat concerned about a potential hit to our budget of 7.7 million. There has been action on it. The Governor vetoed the bill that the education community had worked hard to get passed. The Governor made it very clear those districts and QEIA schools would be held harmless and those funds would be backfilled. It appears at this point in time that those dollars will be backfilled with state-wide stabilization dollars and every district in California will receive a little less than what they originally thought. Roughly, we were potentially looking at \$59.00 per ADA and it looks like it is down to about \$32.00 per ADA. We will not be facing the 7.7 million reductions which would have been detrimental to our district.

Next Steps – We will continue to provide budget revisions to the Board regularly. We will continue to monitor any legislative action and any impact that might have on the district. Unfortunately, we are looking at preparing for potential mid-year reductions. What we are hearing in the state, things are not getting any better. We heard at one time that we did not have to worry about mid-year reductions because of the Prop 98 floor and they could not cut education but we are hearing differently now.

There were questions and comments from the Board members regarding the QEIA funding and stabilization dollars.

Member Terry moved with a second by Member Rodriguez to move this item from conference to action.

Approve/Ratify Facility Use Agreements Sacramento Charter High School, St. Hope Public School #7 (PS7), Language Academy of Sacramento, and S.A.C. Prep (Mellissa Truitt)

Conference/Action

Superintendent Raymond shared with the Board members and public that these facility use agreements under Proposition 39 are on a regulatory timeline that must be followed. It is very important that we come here today to have a conference and discussion on these facility use agreements that technically should have been handled several months ago.

Mellissa Truitt, Associate Superintendent stated that there are 4 facility use agreements that we would like to go over tonight. The key provisions in each of these agreements are as follows: Under Prop 39 the budgets for each of these charters are based on a prorated share fee. This means we take the total number of square footage in our facilities total 5 million and divide that by the operating cost of our facilities which is roughly about 13 million. This determines what the charter, dependent and independent charters, pay per square footage. There are two charters that are based on alternative budget or lease rates, Sol Aureus and CMP which are not on the agenda tonight.

The Language Academy of Sacramento, St. Hope Public School #7(PS7) and Sacramento Charter High School pay a pro rata share. There is language in all the agreements regarding over allocation fees. This mean that when we were granted the charters or when the applications came up and the charter indicated that they would have 200 students enrolled in their charter and we allocated space for 200 students but only 80 student enrolled when school started then the district is owed an over allocation fee.

There is also an oversight fee. All the administrative work that we do to administer to the charters is 1% across the board. All of our utilities, power, gas, water, custodial fees with the exception of Sacramento Charter High School and St. Hope Public School #7 who have their own custodial service.

The John Muir School on Strawberry Lane houses the PS7 K-5 program. The 6-8 grade students for PS7 are housed at Sacramento Charter High School; the Sacramento Prep groups are in a two-story portable at Freeport Elementary School; the Language Arts program is at Fruitridge Elementary school in modular buildings; and Sol Aureus is at Freeport Elementary School. Portions of the PS7 program are at Sacramento Charter High School. As Superintendent Raymond indicated, all of the agreements for the 2009-10 are single year contracts or agreements to allow us to spend more time providing reasonably equivalent facilities for all of our charter schools. Once we agree mutually to the terms of these charter schools then we will have satisfied all of the proposition 39 obligations. Also, Superintendent Raymond indicated that we would meet the timelines of Proposition 39 and Title 5 but we also will be looking at the enrollment trends at all these schools and review the facilities currently for possible future relocation.

Board discussion.

Public Comment

Karen Gunby – Spoke on behalf of “Where is my High School”.
Heidi McLean – Spoke on behalf of the Sacramento Coalition to Save Public Education.

President Grimes stated that this is a Conference item and will be presented in two weeks as an Action item only.

Member Rodriguez stated that Resolution 2587 is to encourage local schools to participate in the 2010 Decennial Census in Schools Week. What we have to remember is that being counted in 2010 Census is a constitutional right for everybody here in the United States. This occurs every 10 years. When people are counted in every community and region throughout the United States, with that count comes funding from many different sources. It is important to school districts because we receive money from the federal government in forms of Title I for children in our schools. The official day of census is August 1, 2010. The surveys will go out to the homes in March of 2010. There will be curriculum for teachers to use in their classrooms to teach children about the census. This whole campaign is set up by the 2010 census. To receive more information go to www.census.gov.

Board comments.

Member Rodriguez moved with a second by 2nd Vice President Kennedy to move this item from conference to action.

Vice President Bell moved with a second by Member Rodriguez to approve the Consent Agenda excluding Item 11.1e.

Action: Motion was passed by a unanimous vote.

2nd Vice President Kennedy asks that Item 11.1e be taken off the agenda due to questions regarding the Met.

Associate Superintendent, Mellissa Truitt stated that Jim Dobson, Director of Planning will be presenting on The Met program. Jim introduced the following team members: Paul Breckenridge and Kip Grubb of Stafford King Wiese Architects, Luisa Park of Hancock Gonos & Parks, Inc. and Associate Superintendent, Mary Shelton.

Jim stated that we would like the approval of Resolution No. 2588 approving the application for state modernization and overcrowded relief grant funding. The Met school site at 8th and V was previously an administrative site and therefore did not qualify for assistance from the state of California when we were doing the majority of our modernization projects in the district. The Met now is being used as an educational facility and is eligible for funding from the state under the modernization program and the overcrowded relief grant program. The site is also over 50 years old and is eligible for additional funding. Finally, the Board adopted the Collaborative High Performance Schools criteria (CHPS) which would be the green design efforts that are being incorporated into this project and that would provide additional funding. These grants do require a match from the district. On average they are about a 50/50 match and that amount would range anywhere from 2.5 to 2.8 million for the project.

Jim introduced Paul Breckenridge of Stafford King Wiese to give a brief presentation of the structure of the Met project.

President Grimes ask to briefly tell us how this is integrated into the new board policy on green.

Mellissa Truitt stated that BP 3511 is our green and grid neutral initiative. This project is special because we have chosen this site which has a lot of green components to it to incorporate that policy. The skylights, day lighting, natural ventilation, concrete floors it is just an ideal opportunity for us to merge the educational curriculum aligning it with a green curriculum. This will be the first time that we have incorporated green building designs with our educational curriculum.

Public Comment

Karen Gunby – Concern where the money is coming from.

Louisa Park stated that the money will come from state bonds. There is proposition 1D that has close to 2 billion for modernization of schools and this particular site qualifies for modernization of 2 million and the district would match 1.3 million. It is a 60/40 program with the state funding 60%. The overcrowding relief grants that the district is eligible for a total of 2.3 million. The combination of both funding is about 5.8 million.

Board comments.

2nd Vice President Kennedy moved with a second by Member Terry to approve 11.1e.

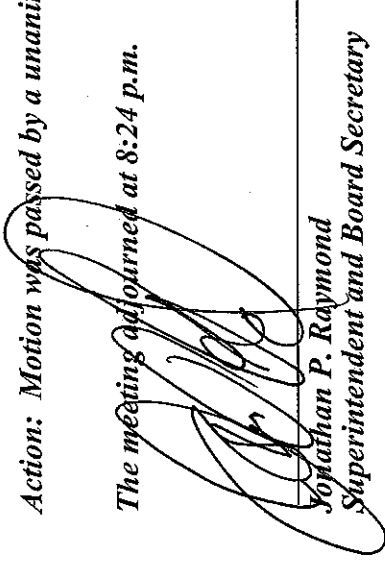
