

Following the Funding: An Overview of the 2021 Budget Act and Special Education Funding

2021 Budget Act

 On July 12, 2021, Governor Newsom approved Senate Bill (SB) 129 as part of the Budget Act of 2021.

• On July 9, 2021, Governor Newsom approved Assembly Bill (AB) 130, the education omnibus Budget trailer bill.

Funding Changes....

• Provides \$396.9 million to *increase the statewide base rate* for special education funding.

Base rate moves from \$685 -\$715 / pupil Provides \$550 million for Learning Recovery & Dispute Resolution Activities

- \$559/pupil for Learning Recovery
 - Reimbursement to LEA
- \$124/pupil for Dispute Resolution
 - 80% to LEAs

Learning Recovery Support for Students with Disabilities

- The Budget includes \$450 million for allocation to SELPAs and their member LEAs to provide learning recovery support to students with disabilities associated with impacts to learning due to COVID-19 school disruptions.
- SELPAs will work with member LEAs to develop and submit a plan to the CDE detailing how the SELPA and member LEAs will implement the requirements associated with this funding

Learning Recovery Support for Students with Disabilities (2)

- With this funding, SELPAs and LEAs are required to do all of the following:
 - Ensure that learning recovery support provided with these funds are related to COVID–19 school disruptions during the period of March 13, 2020, to September 1, 2021.
 - Match funding received under this section on a one-to-one basis by other funds spent for these purposes.
 - Not use this funding to supplant existing expenditures or obligations of the LEA.
 - Not use funds received for this purpose, or use these funds to match expenditures for, attorney's fees.

Special Education Dispute Prevention and Alternative Dispute Resolution

- The Budget provides \$100 million on a one-time basis to SELPAs to support member LEAs in conducting dispute prevention and voluntary alternative dispute resolution (ADR) activities.
- The purpose of this funding is to prevent and resolve special education disputes resulting from COVID–19 school disruptions in a collaborative manner and equitable manner.
- SELPAs must develop and submit a plan to the CDE detailing plans to expend the funds.

Special Education Dispute Prevention and Alternative Dispute Resolution

• ADR funds may be used for:

- Early intervention to promote collaboration and positive relationships with families to prevent disputes through proactive communication, collaborative problem solving, and parent support activities.
- Conducting voluntary ADR activities to reach agreement and resolve issues that are not resolved through the Individualized Education Program (IEP) process.
- Work in partnership with Family Empowerment Centers (FECs) or other family support organizations.
- Develop and implement plans to identify, and conduct outreach to, families who face language barriers and other challenges to participation in the special education process
