





ENVIRONMENT

- What access limitations might they have?

- What kind of support will they and their team require?
- What are the expectations of the student and their team?



TASK

- What tasks does the student participate in regularly?
- What tasks would help the student to participate in their daily environment more?






Peers are the BEST models we could ask for!


















Misconception



My child won't talk if they start communicating with a device



My student doesn't pair words together, so they're fine staying with PECS



My student has a lot of behaviors. If they get a device, they'll just break it.

Fact



There is a TON of research to show that AAC supports verbal language growth



We don't know what they're capable of if they only have access to limited vocab



Behaviors are a form of communication. Let's get them a more functional way to communicate!
