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
## What is Work-Based Learning?

In short, work-based learning (WBL) is a set of learning experiences that allow students to learn about work, learn through work, and learn for work. WBL is one of the key pillars of the Linked Learning approach to education, along with wrap-around student support, rigorous academics, and technical skills. Work-based learning is not a new approach to education. Maria Montessori felt that human behavior was guided by a need to work and explore the environment. John Dewey, American educator, advocated for education through experience around the turn of the last century. More recently, this hands-on approach to education has been largely achieved through Career and Technical Education (CTE) courses. With a Linked Learning approach, career, technical, and experiential learning is further paired with Rigorous Academics and Personalized Support as well. SCUSD has been committed to implementing the Linked Learning approach of education since 2010.
